Longwood holds taxes steady By Joe DeSantia Commission dismisses mayor's Herald Correspondent

LONGWOOD - Longwood city commissioners adopted a millage rate Monday night that maintains the same level of taxation property owners have paid for the past six years.

Following sometimes testy debate, the board voted 3-1 to hold the millage rate at 5.061 for the next fiscal budget year, fending off a push by mayor Paul Lovestrand to lower the millage to an

even 5.000 or \$5 in tax for each \$1,000 of assessed property value. Commissioner Steve Miller was absent from the meet-

ing. In pushing for a reduction, Lovestrand said it was a sin for the city to carry sur-

pluses in its budget and that Longwood should put the money back in the pockets of taxpayers. Commissioner Butch Bundy called the suggestion to reduce the millage rate nothing more than a symbolic gesture that would mean no

more than pocket change to property owners. In siding with Bundy, fellow commissioners Dan Anderson and John Maingot expressed concerns about putting the city's financial health at risk in the future and striking a balance between fiscal responsibility and providing Longwood citizens with the services they desire.

"We have to know exactly what we are

Commission and the Planning and Zoning Board to discuss revisions to the sign code.

The proposed changes are part of an effort to standardize the code and bring it up to date, Lake Mary City Manager John Litton said.

"It is also a First Amendment issue," Litton said. "We can control the size of the sign but not what is on the sign."

According to Susan Deines, Lake Maryt's senior planner, the current sign code is "geared toward regulating signage based on the type of use or the content of the sign, the potential exists for challenge of (the city's) regulatory capabilities."

The proposed revisions were also created to be consistent with federal law, which leans toward more content-neutral regulations.

City Commission will conduct its regular monthly meeting following the worksession.

During special presentations, City Commission and the Lake Mary Fire Department will rec-ognize Bill Gibbon for five years of volunteer service as a fire inspector. 



we'll regret it in the future," said Maingot.

Police and fire are asking for additional personnel and we face all manner of other projects in the city," said Anderson. "It's dangerous to fund ongoing expenses from reserves. Our citizens want services, and we are here to manage the budget with balance. Reducing the rate by that amount is symbolic and does not remedy the situation. I think most residents feel the city is living within its means."

The millage rate debate came prior to another round of verbal sparring among board members that pushed the commission's meeting well past midnight. The commissioners' debate focused on requests to hire as many as four additional police officers and three firefighters

ought to be done." The mayor also contended that the city's rollback rate, the millage rate necessary to fund the budget, would wind up being. less than 5 mills by the end of the 2000-2001 budget year, pointing to this year's surplus of \$37,000 based on the 5.061 millage rate last year.

But Bundy responded that dividing the \$37,000 surplus by the city's 14,000 residents after commercial and industrial taxes were factored in would mean the city would be sending refutil. checks to property owners for nothing more than pocket change.

"I would be insuited if you sent me a tax refund check for 75 cents," Bundy said. The board asked City

Administrator John Drago for his

\$90,000 in the budget when the board voted to add three firefighters after the millage rate had been set at a final public hearing on the budget.

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
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Anderson and Bundy argued that the city had faced lean times in the past and that Longwood possibly could face personnel cutbacks and other reductions in the future.

"I don't want to keep growing reserves, but lean times will come again," said Anderson. "Then we'll have to cut people and take other drastic measures."

Pointing to the dramatic rise in gasoline prices in the last few months as just one example, 114 Bundy argued a symbolic tax cut now could mean a tax like for residents in the future.

"The city has had major increases in expenses and we have building projects and park projects on the board," Bundy said. "In three-to-five years our current surpluses could be gone." On Bundy's motion, the board approved the 5.061 millage rate with Lovestrand casting the dissenting vote.

Saving us Government should let people make their own decisions

I do not like tobacco. I choose not to smoke, inhale, chew or dip it. But the Florida court decision awarding \$144.8 billion in punitive damages to 500,000 smokers is another example of big government attempting to save us from ourselves.

The federal government has subsidized tobacco growers at the same time it has sought to dissuade people from using tobacco. It has banned advertising of this legal product from radio and television and required explicit warn-ings on cigarette packaging, billboards and magazine ads.

The argument of tobacco's enemies is that because tobacco companies withheld informa-tion about the hazards and addictive properties of their products, they are liable for the enormous damages a jury has inflicted upon them.

What ought to bother us as Americans is that, once again, government has intruded on indi-Thomas vidual choice. There are plenty of things not good for us and plenty more whose manufacturers make questionable assertions in their

advertising. Dueling ads make claims that one product is superior to a competitor's. The choice is left to the consumer.


If the government will now determine whether a company deserves to be punished when people use its legal products, we might reasonably ask where this will stop. Trial lawyers - the really big winners in these class action lawsuits - will find this big government precedent too inviting to stop with tobacco. They will hear the siren call of many other addictions crying out for judicial remedy and big profits for themselves.

Gambling is a serious addiction for some. Will gambling establishments be sued by addicts who have lost their rent and food money? Casinos advertise good times, but what if a gambler loses his shirt and claims his addiction, caused by the "false advertising" of the house, is liable for the injury done to his wallet?

Thanks to Supreme Court rulings which have struck down laws aimed at controlling pornography, increasing numbers of people are becoming addicted to porn. If a marriage is ruined, or if someone is raped and the rapist testifies it was porn that made him do it, should injured parties be allowed to seek a judgment against the companies which produced it and the women and men who appeared in it?

Credit card debt is at a record high. If someone is forced to declare bankruptcy and claims an addiction to credit cards, why could the "victims" not be able to sue the card companies and the banks which issue them? In many cases they offer the cards unsolicited ("You have been pre-approved"), even sending cards to college students who usually have no credit record. Why couldn't it be argued that the banks and card companies, like big tobacco, are attempting to addict people at a young age?

The Florida court ruling again demonstrates the name, tendencies of our government. You are not capable of making decisions without government assistance. You do not have the will power or moral competence to break your addictions, so the government will punish corporations, while saying nothing about your moral weakness. The government and various activists believe we are all actual or potential victims of giant corporations who are so much more intelligent and sophisticated than we are that the Marlboro man or Joe Camel



But Mr. Arafat and his Palestinian colleagues are well aware that Mr. Clinton is offering to sprinkle around something on the order of \$150 billion of the American taxpayers' money as an inducement to the parties to reach some agreement, however

who want to make inconsistent kinds of worlds," he declared, "I see no remedy but force."

That is the problem in the Middle East. The Israelis believe that God gave them Israel in perpetuity. They created the present state in 1949, and have defended it boldly and successfully ever since — massively aided by the fact that their only major ally, the United States, won the Cold War. The Palestinians, per contra, believe equally firmly that the land is theirs, and that it was simply seized in the late 1940s by an influx of Jewish refugees from Europe.

The Israelis have proven willing to make major sacrifices of territory in return for the Palestinians' consent to let them live peacefully in what is left. The Palestinians have gladly accepted what has hitherto been given them at the bargaining table, and will no doubt be equally gracious about adding

to it whatever they euchre out of Messrs. Clinton and Barak at Camp David. But they haven't the slightest intention of settling, permanently, for anything less than what they regard as their ancestral Palestine, with Its capital in Jerusalem, and any Arab politician who seriously thinks otherwise would be swiftly disabused - or, as in the case of the late President Anwar Sadat of Egypt, simply shot.

The Palestinians calculate that time, in the deadly form of inexorable increases in the Arab populations of the area, is on their side. The Israelis have been ingenious, as the desperate often will, in staving off minority status by importing in recent years large numbers of Jews from Russia and elsewhere. But that can't go on forever, or even for much longer, and many Israelis have opted instead to


hope the Arabs can be persuaded to forget about politics and settle for the prosperity that a peaceful Middle East might welk achieve.

But, once again, they are confronted with the Arab conviction that, over time, they can have even that and still be rid of the Israelis.

Is it any wonder that so many Israelis are hawks? Whatever Mr. Barak brings home from Camp David, he will have trouble selling it to a majority of the Jewish population. They prefer (and who can say they are wrong?) to hold onto as much of Israel as they can, and hope that the future may suggest news possibilities not now visible, or even conceivable.

Meanwhile, and in any case, there will be no lasting peace in the Middle East.

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

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

Sports injuries can have consequences DEAR DR. GOTT: My 18-

year-old son is an avid (and capable) high-school football player. He is counting on an athletic scholarship to college.

However, he has a tendency to head injuries when he plays. Along with having his "bell rung" almost weekly, he has suffered three concussions to date. In each instance, he was momentarily dazed and couldn't remember the score. The last concussion caused a temporary loss of consciousness, after which he was benched for two weeks. Will these minor episodes harm him?

DEAR READER: Until recently, team physicians took a fairly relaxed view of sportsinduced closed-head injuries, which are common in football, soccer, hockey and lacrosse - in both girls and boys.

But last year, based on a study of such injuries, investigators discovered an unnerving principle: apparently minor head injuries often lead to permanent problems with cognitive thinking and memory. This relation is even more striking if the athlete has experienced posttraumatic confusion or loss of consciousness. The experts concluded that three concussions

brain damage was almost a certainty.

Consequently, many sportsmedicine authorities now recommend prolonged prohibition from contact athletics - up to a month following severe concussions - and permanent prohibition if the athlete has had three such episodes.



Gabriel and Rivers did get some good news over the weekend when the 6-foot-10 Amaechi turned down a bigger offer from the World Champion Los Angeles Lakers and will remain with the Magic, who can only offer the Great Britain native a 20-percent raise over his 1999-2000 salary of \$385,000, the NBA league minimum, or about \$600,000.

The Lakers have a \$2.25-million exception they could have given Amaechi, but, much like Tim Duncan did when he decided to return to the San Antonio Spurs instead of taking more money to come to Orlando, the Penn State graduate showed his loyalty to Rivers, who invited Amaechi to camp despite him not being in the NBA since 1996.

If Amaechi has another good season for the Magic, he averaged 10.5 points per game in 80 outings this season, he will be in

much more than the Lakers in the long run.

Now the attention turns to Outlaw and Wallace, plus other forward Monty Williams and guards Chucky Alkins and Ron Mercer, who are also Magic free agenta.

The immediate work will be on Outlaw and Wallace, who combined for nearly one-third of the rebounds and almost half of the blocked shots the Magic had this season.

Wallace, 6-foot-9, is coming off a two-year \$1.7-million contract that he signed while he was with the Washington Wizards and has already met with the Pistons. He is expected to meet with the Mugic later this week. The TADATA Outlaw, also 6-foot-9, has been with Orlando for three season and is coming off a one-year, \$2.25-million contract.

Both have enough service in the league that the Magic can pay them up to the league cap, but Orlando must decide how

a pair of forwards who are not much of an offensive threat.

Orlando Magic have turned their efforts to re-sign-

ing their own free agents like forwards Monty

Williams (left) and Bo Outlaw (right).

Mercer is a minor star who fills the scoring role, but he does not appear to be in the Magic's immediate plans and is probably headed back to the Boston Celtics, who he began his career with, or the New Jersey Nets, who have offered him a contract. Williams and Atkins are not as well known nationally and probably will not attract a lot of attention, but could still be offered contracts by teams looking to fill out their rosters.





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
