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"MONK" DORSETT SHOWS HIS STUFF AFTER BAD START

Sophomore Player Is Slow In Living Up To Great Reputation

By Frank S. Wright. GAINESVILLE, Dec. 2.—"Monk" Dorsett is coming through!

Picked three months ago as the boy most likely to be the sophomore sensation of the Southern Conference, Dorsett after a shaky start this year, is beginning to assume the characteristics of great men for which he was famous before he entered college.

Through week-ends of the current football season, Dorsett seemingly had lost his football talent and his ability to "come through" was a marked disappointment. But the faith of those who stood by and knew that the "old color" was not permanent, has been rewarded.

Wounded in the past two games, "Monk" has at last been able to run, kick and pass with a regularity and ability, and is being figured among Florida's leading players for the 1930 and '31 campaigns.

Few, if any, boys have come to Florida University with a better athletic reputation than Luke "Monk" Dorsett, a boy who had achieved head honors, and who reflected a wealth of possibilities. He was born in Macon, Ga., on Friday the 13th of May, 1909, and in the early years of his life, acquired a reputation for athletic prowess that probably tells the story of the success he has gained.

Maybe he had his roots in the "Monk" of the Central Grammar school, playing his first year as a sub-center on football, but in a regular halfback the next season. Both years he made a first team position in basketball.

In 1924, with the creation of the Junior High school, in Jacksonville, "Monk" was captain and halfback of the Kirby-Smith team that was not named upon all seasons, and which won the first of three state championships that year. He also captained the basketball team, and played third base on the baseball team, both teams winning the state junior high title.

"Monk" entered Duval High school in 1925 and excelled in every athletic career. He was picked all-state basketball player, and played third base on the baseball team, both teams winning the state junior high title.

The following year he was named Duval High "Monk" and won his football and basketball titles, winning all-state titles on the latter team, this time at center.

In 1927 he went to Andrew Jackson, senior high in Jacksonville, a top-notch football and basketball player, and was named all-state basketball player, and was named all-state basketball player.

"Monk" entered the University of Florida in September of that year. He was ineligible for freshman football last season, and was re-injured by an injury during the spring training period, but his work this fall has not only been very satisfactory, but comforting when one sees the ever-improving future in football.

Standing 5-11 and weighing 175, Vickery is splendidly qualified for a flank position. He has a real devotion to football, a Lindbergh modesty and excellent temperament for the game, and with his physical qualities, can make more than good his own. 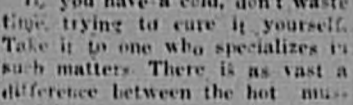
