Grace: Suber's lying

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Kevin Grace, the former deputy manager for Seminole County and now City Manager of Edgewater, said Thursday that Joyce Suber never told him that she was being sexually harassed by county commissioners and officials.

Suber, fired from her job in 1996 as land acquisitions coordinator for the county, has a \$20 million law suit against Seminole County and swore under oath she went to Grace for help before being terminated.

"He (Grace) told me, Joyce, don't rock the boat. Just enjoy it."

Grace said Suber's testimony is a "total fabrication. She never came to me with anything resembling such a charge. If she had, I would not have tried to cover it up. I would have dealt with it. Any one who knows me, knows I wouldn't tell her something like

Adding cops to Sanford streets

SANFORD - Police Chief Joe Dillard has asked for additional officers to patrol Sanford streets, and it looks like he'll get them, but the question of how many is unresolved at this point.

The new officers may come from two separate sources. During this week's Sanford City Commission work session, it was announced that a grant has been awarded to the city for 4 new full-time officers in the amount of \$297,044. The money is from Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), an arm of the U.S. Justice Department.

The additional officers have been requested for inclusion in the preparation of the fiscal year 1998/99 Sanford budget, presently being compiled. Dillard at the outset has requested as many as 11 new officers, which would not be related to the additional 4 if the grant is accepted.

The grant is so written that it covers three years. While the grant money would pay for some of the officers salaries, the amount diminishes each year until the fourth year when

the total amount of salary and equipment would have to be paid for through the city's budget.

The matter was discussed Monday and is to be taken into consideration when specific costs to the city have been determined.

On the request for new officers, Dillard is requesting a new officer assistant, corporal position in administrative, 5 uniform officers, 2 investigations officers, a property custodian/supply clerk, a community services officer, also for the investigations division.

One of the 5 uniform officer positions would be used in training, Dillard said there is presently one officer handling training, and when there is a sick day, vacation or other need, the department is lacking a replacement.

He also projected putting the other 4 officers in the field, one to a squad, to help alleviate some of the problems caused by similar situations where there are insufficient officers available for temporary filling of vacancies. "Rather than having to react, a proactive approach can be taken," he said.

Some Seminole schools to deregulate

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Six Seminole County schools will be allowed to deregulate from the state. The 2 elementary, 2 middle and 2 high schools will be able to toss state regulations and almost become com-

pletely autonomous.

A new plan approved by the Florida Senate and House will allow 6 counties, including Seminole, to choose schools to function without restrictions that are currently in place. The other counties include Citrus, Leon, Palm Beach, Pinel-

las and Walton.

This is a one-year experimental situation that comes with a few road blocks before final implementation. Seminole County School Board member Bob Goff said the system may be implemented in the fall of 1999 at the earliest.

To begin with, the school board has to approve to adopt the plan. School advisory councils would then have to create a proposal that the board will have to approve and a majority of teachers would have to vote on. Before the board makes the final decision,

surveys will have to be taken to gauge parental support. These schools will become like charter schools which are private schools with state dollars being fed into them, but the schools do not have to follow a lot of the state regulations.

Remembering fallen soldiers

GENEVA - It was a solemn event, but one filled with remembrance and camaraderie last Sunday as a Confederate Memorial Day ceremony was conducted at Geneva Cemetery.

Graves of the 16 confederate army veterans buried in the cemetery were decorated with the flag under which they served in the struggle against the northern states.

Members of the Sons of Confederate Veterans Camp 1709, the 1st Lieutenant Daniel Sloan Camp served as color bearers and honor guard. Several direct descendants of veterans buried at that cemetery were present for the ceremonies.

Confederate Memorial Day has never been recognized on the federal level. Individual states which were members of the confederacy have designated their own observances. Traditionally, Confederate Memorial Day is observed on April 26 in Florida and Georgia, on April 27 in Mississippi, May 10 in North and South Carolina, and May 25 in Virginia.

Additionally, Confederate Heroes Day is observed on Jan. 19, Robert E. Lee's birthday, but it's only an official holiday in Texas.

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Medfly treatment to begin

SANFORD - It was only two weeks ago that Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford spread the news that this past fall and winter fruit fly infestation as ended. Then on Tuesday, April 28, one Mediterranean fruit fly was found in Umatilla in Lake County. The number has now grown drastically.

The female Medfly was discovered in a Jackson Trap, hanging in a sour orange tree at the intersection of Owens Lane and Bayless Road, adjacent to an abandoned grove.

Inspectors with the Florida Department of Agriculture (FDA), and three other state and federal agencies immediately launched an expansion of the trapping. By

the end of the week, there were approximately 1,700 traps in an 81-square-mile zone around Umatilla.

Jackson Traps are maintained on a year-round basis, with approximately 800 traps at various locations in Seminole County. Thus far, no infestations have been found.

However, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Plant Protection & Quarantine Work Station in Sanford has announced plans to put out more traps beginning today.

As a result of the additional traps in the Umatilla area, in just two days, over 50 more confirmed Medflies were located in that area.

"This Medfly detection demonstrates the effectiveness of our trapping program," Crawford said. "The Jackson trap is designed to attract male

Medflies, so the fact that we caught a female Medfly who had not yet mated suggests that this fly is on her own. But only time and intensive trapping will prove that."

There is concern in Umatilla however. The U.S.D.A. has announced plans to implement both aerial and ground applications of bait treatments as part of the eradication protocol. The bait treatments are composed of a protein bait with a small amount of Malathion.

Aerial treatment of the Umatilla area is planned for Sunday.

The FDA and Consumer Services are establishing a Medfly information help line that is expected to be operational by this coming week.

"The plan will take about a year to develop," said Goff. "I think it is an absolutely fascinating idea." Goff was a proponent of a charter school system when he ran for his position on the board. "Ultimately, it could help the education

process if it is done right," said Goff. Seminole School Board chairman Barbara Kuhn agrees. "It's absolutely wonderful," said Kuhn. "I believe less government is best."

Schools still have to follow state health and safety regula-

tions. They will also not be allowed to discriminate. They do not have to follow regulations regarding textbooks as long as they are not religious in content. And the schools do not have to follow Florida standards on curriculum and student-teacher ratios.

she alleges."

The only occasion Grace recalls that Suber came to him with a complaint was over a drainage problem at a site the county was going to purchase.

"Commissioner Win Adams had asked for a copy of the report and I asked me why she had to give him one. I told her 'because he is a commissioner - he has every right to it.' "Grace said.

Grace said Suber was a "politically motivated" woman who brought on a good part of her demise. He said in 1996 she made plans to hold a press conference to accuse her ex-husband Bill Suber of "beating her." Suber was running against Ben Tucker in the race for county property appraiser. Warned that could get her in trouble, Joyce Suber said to those close to her that Kevin

Grace would protect her. convinced her not to do that," he said. "I believe she then tried to get the newspapers to use it."

Suber defeated Tucker in the race even though a letter with Joyce Suber's charges of domestic abuse was circulated before the election. Joyce Suber denies she distributed the letter. Tucker denied knowing anything about the mailout.

The reason Suber was fired from her job in land acquisitions, the county says is for falsification of time cards and insubordination. Suber, 54, says it was for the fact she was going to blow the whistle on those who were sexually harassing her, for wrongful termination, and for age discrimination.

The county's land acquisition

department subsequently has been investigated by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) and the F.B.I. Some insiders insist that Joyce Suber is in for more trouble when these investigations are concluded.

Meanwhile, she has at least one more deposition to give in her suit against Seminole County. It will take place the last week of May in Orlando.

"That," Grace said Thursday was not true. "I warned her -

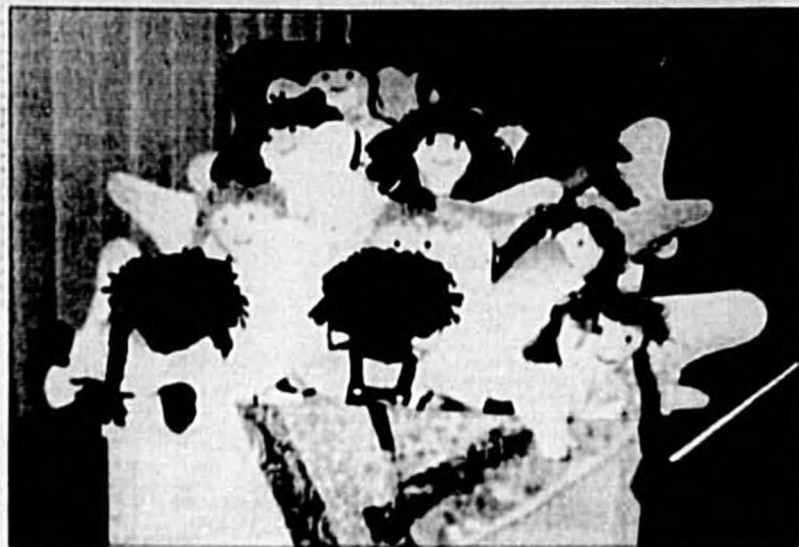

The Catholic Church: Helping those with AIDS

Part 1 of 2 parts

The issue of AIDS has been one of controversy and speculation in our society.

The Orlando Catholic Diocese is endeavoring to help individuals with AIDS and their families. The help is non-denominational. As Fr. Jack Flynn of Casselberry says, "we are there to serve everyone, they don't have to be Catholic."

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is the destruction of the immune system resulting from infection with the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). Someone infected with HIV gradually loses immune function along with certain immune cells, causing the infected person to become vulnerable to pneumonia, infections and other ailments.

With the loss of these immune functions, a clinical syndrome, a group of various illnesses that together characterize a disease, develops over time and eventually results in death due to opportunistic infections or cancers. Fr. Tim La Bo started the AIDS Ministries because he realized that the Diocese needed to set up some kind of ministry.

His goal was that there would be an AIDS Ministry in every Parish. Sister Julie Sullivan, Sister Julie, is now the director of the AIDS Ministries. She is also involved with CENTAUR as a part time counselor that also helps people with AIDS. In the ministry, people who represent ministries from various parishes in the Diocese, meet once a quar-

ter. They come from as far away as Ocala to the north and Melbourne to the east. Led by Sister Julie, the group has an informal exchange of ideas. During these exchanges many facts come out.

In Central Florida, one out of every hundred citizens have AIDS, which is considerably lower than larger cities such as Miami, where it is one out of forty. Most gay men are in a monogamous relationship. Education is the key to maintaining the spread of AIDS. Mentioning how more education is needed for young sexually active adults, Sister Julie said, "It's all done from a position of abstinence."

Bishop Dorsey it is said, calls AIDS a modern day leprosy. In the same way that lepers were

shunned, distrusted and disenfranchised, so are AIDS victims. AIDS has become pandemic, an interesting phrase that came up. Pandemic defined means, epidemic over a large region; over a whole area, country, etc.

The ministry also does respite care to people affected and infected with AIDS and HIV to help the AIDS patients primary caregivers a little break. They even help if there is no caregiver. They clean, shop and run errands for the patient. Another activity is arranging retreats like the ones recently held for AIDS patients and their caregivers at St. Leo's in Tampa.

"The face of AIDS is changing," so says Vince Soto from the "Hope and Help Center" of Central Florida. Most new cases are diagnosed in the heterosexu-

al population and involve women of color. "It is no longer just white gay men who get it." Soto runs two AIDS support groups, one in English and one in Spanish. They are the two largest in Central Florida.

AIDS has no age barrier. Soto explained, "We have two people in our group right now that are over sixty. Our oldest support group person was seventy-two." There are many fund-raising projects going on all the time. There is presently an urgent need for the basic necessities such as toilet paper, razors, soap and shampoo.

Other agencies not mentioned include the Aids Resource Alliance (ARA) and Serenity House, the pediatric branch of ARA. Many of these organizations provide legal aid, food banks, transportation, referrals, education, buddy programs, counseling sessions, case management, client services and more.

Continuing on the prejudice of people for anyone with the disease, something very poetic was said at the ministry meeting. In trying to get through to people about AIDS and the need for help, this analogy was given "instead of breaking a whole stick, break of a little at a time."

Support, or the lack thereof, is very crucial to a person with AIDS and sometimes even more important, their caretakers. That is why it is suggested by the Florida Department of Children and Family Services that even the caretaker(s) join a support group or see a counselor. It is important that those affected by AIDS realize they are not alone.

Jerusalem: The undivided city of Israel

This past week we commemorated the Remembrance Day for Heroism and Holocaust, the darkest chapter in Jewish history and mankind as well.

On May 15, Israel will celebrate a Jubilee of its independence and its capital Jerusalem its three millennium.

Jerusalem means a great deal to the western world. Every city in the United States has a Salem Avenue in it, Salem is the abbreviation of Jerusalem. The people who built the cities in which we live felt the need to express the connection between their city and Zion and so they named their cities Salem.

Jerusalem meant a great deal to Jewish civilization. For example, the text of the wedding invitation that Rabbi Yitzchak of Berditchev sent out for his daughter's wedding. "The wedding will take place at such-and-such time, on such a date, in the holy city of Jerusalem. But, if God forbid, the messiah doesn't come by then, then the wedding will take place here in the city of Berditchev."

Another example of the love Jews held for Jerusalem is told of Rabbi Levi Yitzchak's living room, where there were two clocks. One had the time according to Berditchev, and the other had the time according to Jerusalem, so that, at any moment, he could look up at the clocks and think of what time it was in Jerusalem.

Today, Jerusalem is a short distance away. One can get there in less than two hours from Tel Aviv by car. One can get there in six hours from London by jet. One can get there in eleven hours from New York by plane. But it was not always that way.

In 1840, a man set out from Poland to Jerusalem to see the holy city before he died. He left

just after the Festival of Sukkot (September). He arrived in Palestine spent, sick and exhausted, just in time for Passover (April) eighteen months later. He had crossed mountains and rivers and fought off robbers and diseases in order to get there. There were many such pilgrims in the nineteenth century.

Jerusalem is an incredible city. Today, it is rapidly changing. Today, it has pollution, sewage problems and all other 'blessings' of modernity. Today, it has clubs and television antennas. It has a city hall and a slum district and a crime problem and traffic problems and all the other problems and all the other problems that every other modern city has.

And yet, it is still a place of mystery and magic. It is still a place where one turns a corner and wonders if he or she will bump into a prophet or a madman or a memory. It is still a place where one feels the presence of King David and King Solomon and Rabbi Akiva and Rabbi Yehudah Halevi and Richard the Lion Hearted and Mohammed and Kaiser Wilhelm and the Pope. It is a city in which all the people of the western civilization have a share, and yet it is uniquely, in a very special sense, OUR CITY, a Jewish city.

It is ours, for we are the only people I know of on this earth who pray for it towards it, three times a day, the only people I know of who thank God for it in the grace after meals, the only people whom I know that faces toward Jerusalem from whatever direction we may happen to be on the globe when we pray. For others, Jerusalem, may be a place to visit, a place to tour, a place to fight over, or a place in which to play politics. But for us, it is the City of David, the city of our past, our present and our future.

Since June 1967, Jerusalem

became united again, and Jews, Christians, Muslims and all other religious beliefs may walk freely around Jerusalem. At the Kotel-the-Western Wall, Jews gathered for their daily morning service. One of these worshippers prays: "Now, if believers of all faiths will stop looking for God within the walls of Jerusalem, if they will understand that God is to be found everywhere, if they will begin to look for themselves in Jerusalem, they will be able to hear the church bells, the calls from the mosques and the melodies of 'sh'ma Israel' from the Western Wall unite into a single mighty symphony to God and to humanity."

And the Lord shall be long over all the earth; on that day the Lord shall be one and his name One.

It would have been easy for a class deflection after the disaster of last season, but Gillespie said that was never an option.

Can statin drugs cause muscle damage?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've read in your column that the "statin" drugs used to lower cholesterol can cause muscle damage. My doctor says that you're wrong and printed the warning only to scare readers.

DEAR READER: Nothing I write is calculated to frighten readers. However, ALL medicines have side effects and risks, and I believe that an informed public is a worthwhile goal.



them would touch you at 360 pounds. Also, you would have to go through an extensive and intense period of counseling and treatment with female hormones. With your present size, you would merely become an obese female, and I doubt that your social life would improve at all. If you eventually choose to become a size 10 female, you'll first have to become a size 10 male. Take the first step by getting yourself on an effective weight-reduction diet. Once you've slimmed down, rethink the entire issue.

The "statin" drugs are useful and unquestionably save lives. Such drugs include Lipitor, Zocor, Pravachol, Lescol and Mevacor. However, a small percentage of patients who are prescribed these medications can suffer from a potentially dangerous complication, known as rhabdomyolysis. When this unusual side effect occurs, muscle tissue breaks apart and releases substances that can block the kidneys, leading to renal failure. This is why the drugs' manufacturers warn patients to be alert to any muscle pain, tenderness or weakness. If such symptoms appear, immediate medical attention (including special blood tests) is mandatory. In addition, the statin drugs can also cause liver inflammation. Thus, patients on these medicines must undergo periodic blood tests for liver function.

I didn't make this up. The warnings are clearly printed in the Physicians' Desk Reference and should be shared with anybody who is prescribed statin medications. Your doctor is behind in his reading.

STUMPED? Call for Answers

Watch those entries

What did Oscar Wilde say when, upon entering the Customs Hall in New York, he was asked, "Do you have anything to declare?"

Apart from keeping track of losers and tricks, you must watch your entries. This is especially true against tough defenders in today's deal. You are in four hearts. West leads the spade queen. How many losers do you have? What is your line of play?

Over West's latest double, if North had a normal two-no-trump response, he would have redoubled. So, his two-no-trump can be used to show a limit raise in partner's suit: 10-12 support points and four-plus trumps. (Some use two no-trump as showing a limit raise or more. Others use a three-no-trump response as showing a game-forcing raise. An immediate jump

many of our heart to three hearts over West's double is pre-emptive: a weak hand with four trumps.)

You have four losers: one in each suit. And if you play a trump immediately, you should lose those tricks. Somehow, you must avoid that spade loser. One option is to lead a diamond to dummy's jack, hoping West has both the king and queen. But it is much better to build up a discard in clubs. However, a veteran West will duck the first round of clubs, winning the second only when dummy will be out of the suit. So, you must win trick one in the dummy. Then play a club to drive out West's ace. When you win the second spade trick, you are in hand, able to discard dummy's spade loser on your third club. Now lead a trump. In a moment, you will ruff your spade loser in the dummy.
