**W-U Clerk Robbed By Affable Bandit**

"Lightning Does Strike Twice . . . Or You Cannot Tell A Robber By His Appearance" could be the title of a book to be written by Mrs. Ida Fakes, of 827 E. Cambridge. Mrs. Fakes has become qualified as an expert on the latter part of that suggested book title.

Mrs. Fakes is a telegraph operator at the Western Union office on West First Street. A "customer" entered the office at about 8:30 p.m. last night and chatted for awhile with Mrs. Fakes, who even obliged by calling Orlando for a weather report for the man.

At 9:30 p.m., it was reported today, the man smiled, and handed Mrs. Fakes a note, which read, in effect, that "this is a hold-up and this sack I have contains a pistol." Mrs. Fakes handed over an estimated \$200 of the company receipts, the hold-up man thanked her and departed.

**Governor Is Asked For Local Inquiry**

A member of the Seminole County School Board has asked Gov. Claude Kirk to inquire into the possibility that Constable Robert James and Justice of the Peace Thomas Lovett arrested and convicted persons in 1969 out of their Seminole County jurisdictions.

Pat Bule, member of district school board, said . . . "It is my understanding that more than 100 persons have been arrested, the majority of them convicted, and all for the same charge, at the same time, by the same complainant."

Bule continues . . . "If this is true, it would appear that it would be easy to check out."

"Again, if true, it would seem to me that there should be an inquiry into the possibility of an official investigation against the constable and peace justice seem indicated."

If this is not the case, then the shadow of doubt should be removed from these men," Bule added.

The letter to Kirk was released to the press by Bule one week after the school board member asked Kirk for some word on the state's investigation.

Bule was arrested in December by Frank Smith, a caretaker for Conroy Hillidge on whose Wiltra property Bule was alleged to have been trespassing.

Resulting action saw the case thrown out of court by Lovett, after Bule said the arrest had occurred in Orange County and he was being prosecuted in Seminole County by officials here.

Bule said this was out of James and Lovett's jurisdiction and they therefore had no authority to make arrests or prosecute.

**Judge Issues Jury Warning**

When told of the attorney's legal decision this morning, Brumley stated, "I did not ask for the mayor's radio, but just for a radio." Brumley is hopeful that the city council will purchase a radio for his department that can be used in stake-out and other police work.

# President Turns Big Guns On Crime, Pollution

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon today turned his attention to crime and pollution, the two most serious domestic problems in history.

Nixon's first State of the Union message in history focused on crime and pollution. He said that these two issues were "the greatest threat to the future of our nation."

In a largely domestic message, Nixon said that the federal government would lead the way in fighting crime and pollution. He said that the federal government would increase its efforts to fight these two issues.

"The program I shall propose to Congress will be the most comprehensive and costly program in this field ever in the history of the nation," he said.

"In referring to budget cuts, there is one area where I have ordered an increase rather than a cut—the request of those agencies with the responsibility for law enforcement," Nixon said.

He also announced a doubling in fiscal 1971 of the federal expenditure for aiding local law enforcement—double the 1970 budget for such purposes.

## Enemy Shows Its Strength

# VCS Launch Biggest Attack In 2 Months

SAIGON (AP)—North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops started out on a 17-kilometer offensive early today and made their biggest attack in the Mekong Delta in two months.

The enemy force killed 20 South Vietnamese marines and wounded 41 others. But the government claimed 27 of its attackers were killed in the two-hour battle on the northeast side of the forest 12 miles southwest of Saigon.

An estimated 400 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops attacked about 60 South Vietnamese marines in a brigade command post after setting it up with a 160-round mortar barrage.

The enemy first broke through the defenses on Jan. 18. South Vietnamese forces fought back for two hours, but the enemy pushed in after two hours, leaving 27 bodies and more than a score of weapons on the battlefield, field reports said.

On Jan. 18, 1961, only 7,042 Americans were in Vietnam. The American death toll was 14 less than the week before. The South Vietnamese exactly half what it had been, and the total for the week government dropped on all sides last week. The toll for South Vietnamese troops was the lowest in eight months.

The allied command reported 24 Americans, 157 government troops and 1,791 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong killed in action. The U.S. Command said 796 Americans were wounded in action.

# Ship 'Sinks' Span In Chesapeake

NORFOLK, Va. (UPI)—Capt. W. Kelly went aboard the Navy attack cargo ship *Yankee* Wednesday to determine why it tore loose from its moorings and sank a 150-foot hole in the 320-million Chesapeake Bay bridge-tunnel.

Rear Adm. Philip E. McManis, commander of Ship Group Two, ordered Kelly to look into the cause of the damage after the ship reached port.

The *Yankee's* skipper, Capt. Dean Johnson, told newsmen that the ship was on duty and on station as it went to sea.

## Politicians 'Scratch' More Than Heads

VALARASSIE, Fla. (AP)—Headless chickens could hardly have scratched up more confusion than Florida politicians have in the week since the U.S. Supreme Court issued its Feb. 1 desegregation order.

The most obvious thing—a week when hardly anything has been obvious—is that state politicians of all persuasions are taking on the U.S. Supreme Court as an extra, added opponent in their 1970 election campaigns.

Gov. Claude Kirk, for instance, could say in one breath that he might issue an executive order against compliance with the deadline and in the next that he was not encouraging defiance of the court.

"We can have complete resistance to forced busing and still be in compliance with the law of the land," Kirk said Tuesday at the Cabinet meeting of Education Commissioner Earl Patrick, a gubernatorial candidate, for an opinion on Kirk's proposed executive order.

Legislators jumped into the fertile political field as House Minority Leader Don Reed, R-Boca Raton, and Sen. Tom Slade, R-Jacksonville, said they were trying to get one million signatures on a telegram to urge Supreme Court members to view the result of their decision in person.

"They should get on their horses, ride about the country and see what they're doing," Reed said.

Republican Reps. David Clark of West Palm Beach and Jack Poughrath of Boynton Beach issued a statement saying "The federal government has already refused to fund the busing of children and we advocate that the state should follow a similar approach and thereby force a showdown of responsibility for these federally required programs."

The desegregation decision was announced last Wednesday. Two middle-sized Florida school districts, Bay and Alachua counties, were ordered to desegregate on Feb. 1.

It is likely that some or all of 15 other counties under federal court integration orders will also be compelled to meet the Feb. 1 deadline, but each case apparently will have to be decided on its own. The 15 are Brevard, Columbia, Dade, Duval, Escambia, Hillsborough, Indian River, Manatee, Orange, Pinellas, Polk, Sarasota and Volusia.

Anticipating the Supreme Court decision, Kirk sent legal aide Gerald Mager to Washington with a motion for delay of the deadline. Mager, however, had barely climbed the steps of the Supreme Court building when the decision was handed down.

The National Association for Colored People, which instigated most of the order's provisions, hailed the decision.

"This is one of the greatest decisions ever handed down by the Supreme Court," said Florida NAACP Field Secretary Marvin Davis. "It will show that local school boards have been the stumbling block to integration."

Christian, who was home with the flu, issued a statement saying the order would be very disruptive to Florida schools.

"Thousands and thousands of students and teachers will be required to make sudden adjustments for which they are unprepared and for reasons totally outside their sphere of responsibility," Christian said.

Kirk, Christian and other officials continuously stressed the financial hardship aspect of the decision, but were unable to come up with cost figures. Nor could they say how many children would be involved.

Senate President Jack Mathews, a Democratic gubernatorial candidate, he and House Speaker Fred Schultz would call a special legislative session if necessary.

On Thursday two Florida congressmen attacked the desegregation order. Rep. William Chappell, an Ocala Democrat, said he would sponsor a constitutional amendment to allow school systems to operate free of choice plans.

"To deny any parent the right to send his child to a preferred school is directly opposite to the meaning of freedom," Chappell said.

Rep. Don Fugua, an Altha Democrat, said "Students, without regard to race, color or creed, are the actual victims of disruptive situations which face our school boards."

## Spiro Makes 'Big Hit' On Trip Through Asia

 Vice President Spiro T. Agnew's 11 nation trip to Asia appears to have been a diplomatic and political success, at home and abroad.

Agnew impressed Asian leaders with his straight and candid talk as he sought to reassure them that the Nixon doctrine means the United States will maintain its own as a Pacific power. At the same time, he emphasized the twin goals of greater Asian self-reliance and avoiding use of U.S. combat troops there in the future.

The trip certainly succeeded in its first basic purpose: to enable Agnew to broaden his knowledge of the world and its problems, and the vice president believes that it succeeded in its other main aim, to give Asian leaders a clearer idea of U.S. intentions in the 1970's.

President Nixon sent Agnew on the trip clearly remembering the benefits he received from a similar mission for President Dwight D. Eisenhower 16 years ago. Agnew returns more conversant with the problems in the key area of the world and as to display this knowledge in the political speech making he is about to undertake.

But Agnew's belief that the Asian leaders with whom he met understand U.S. policy, some doubts remain. His statements about U.S. initiatives towards Communist China caused apprehension and confusion in Formosa, and Thailand seems unsure of American intentions.

The administration appears to be deliberately leaving uncertainty in its wake to react to future Communist moves in Asia.

The vice president got through his hectic schedule without major slips.

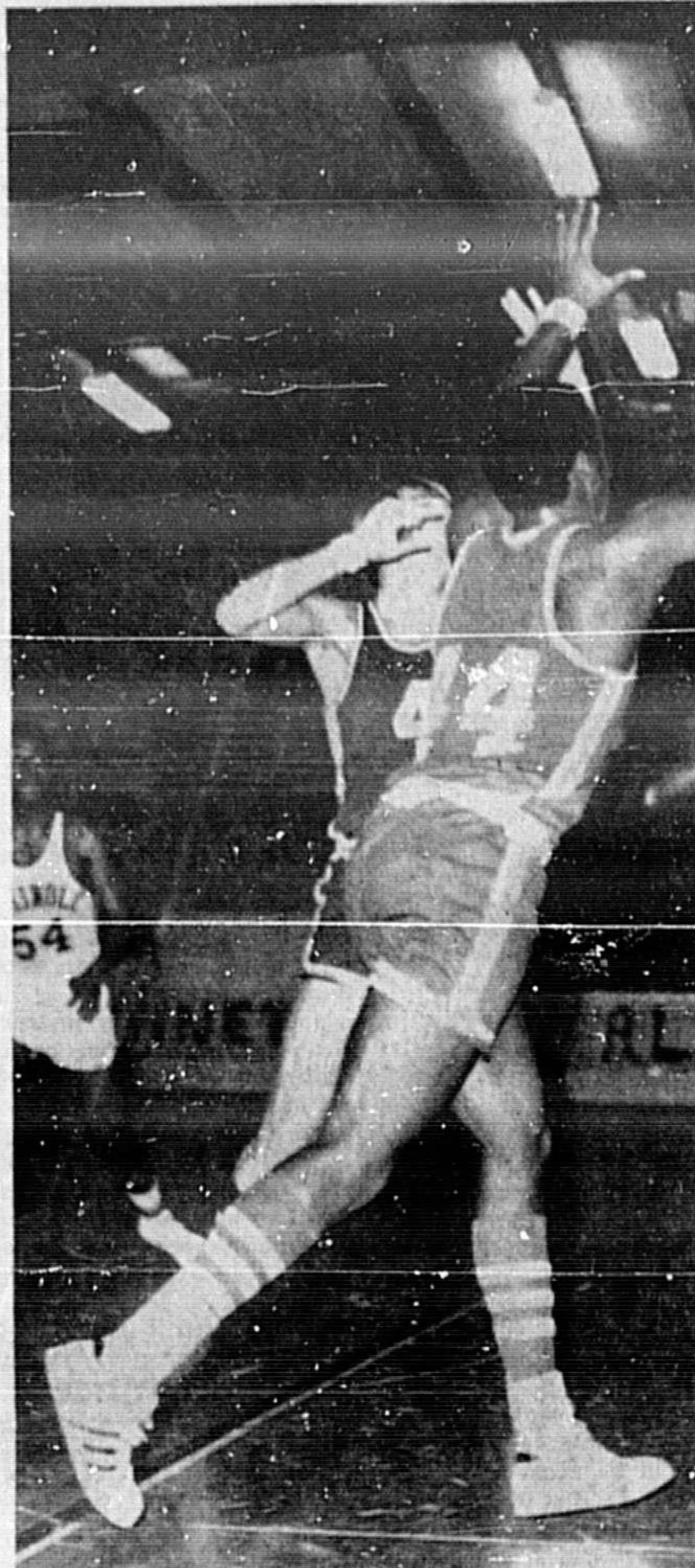

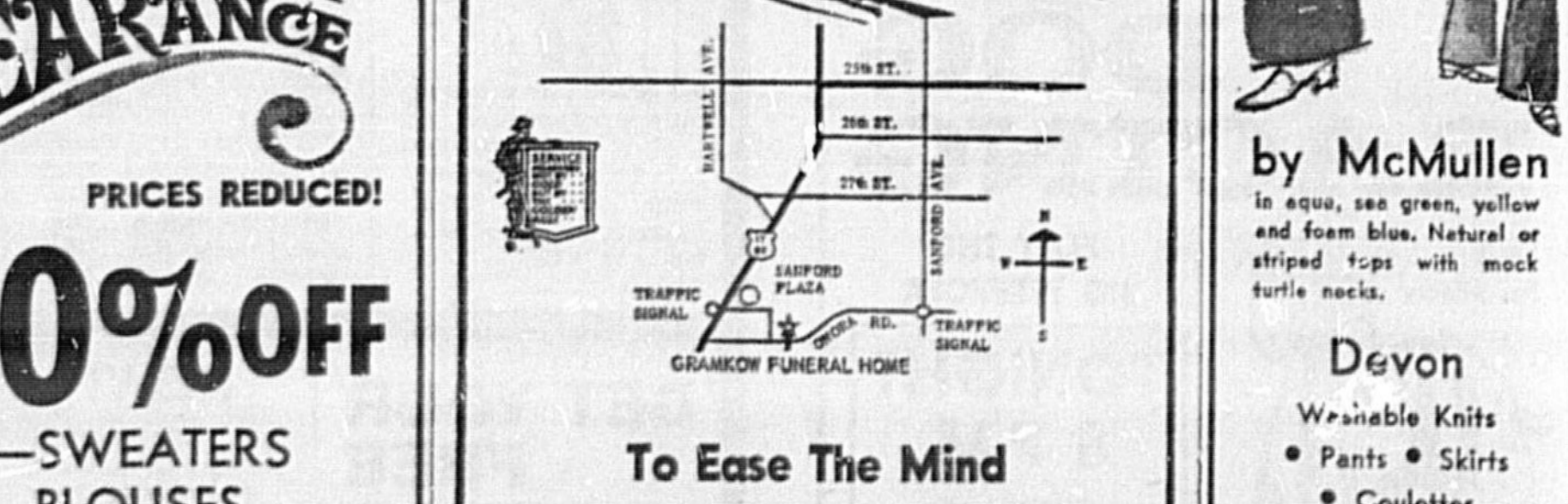
A demonstration upon how birds grow and feeders can be constructed from half gallon milk cartons, bleach bottles and gourds, was given by Mrs. Frank.

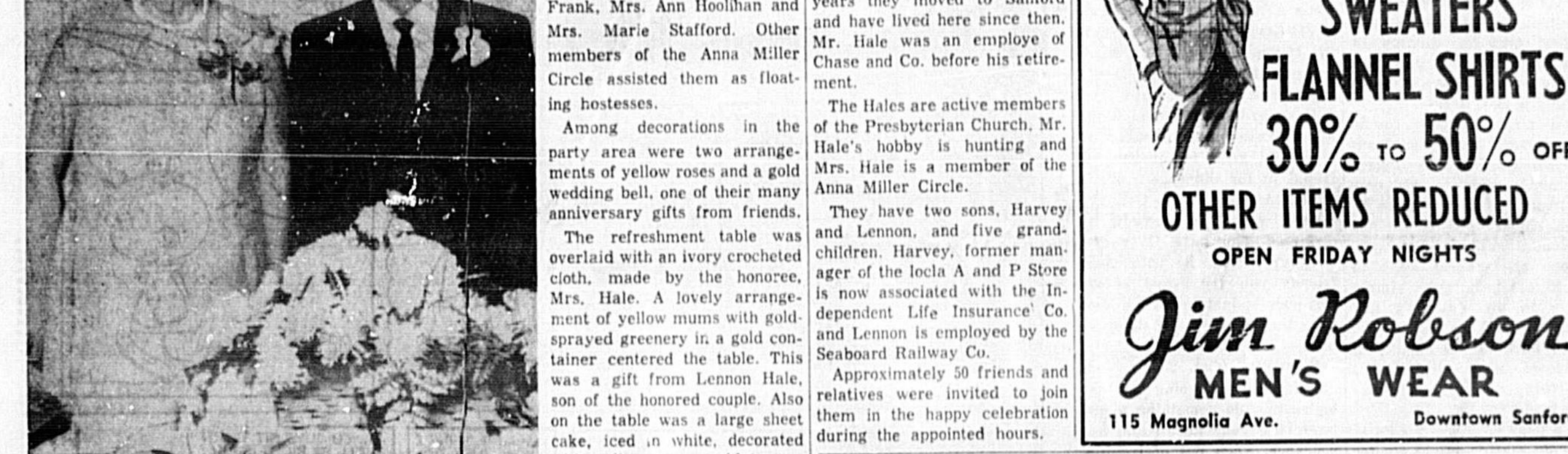

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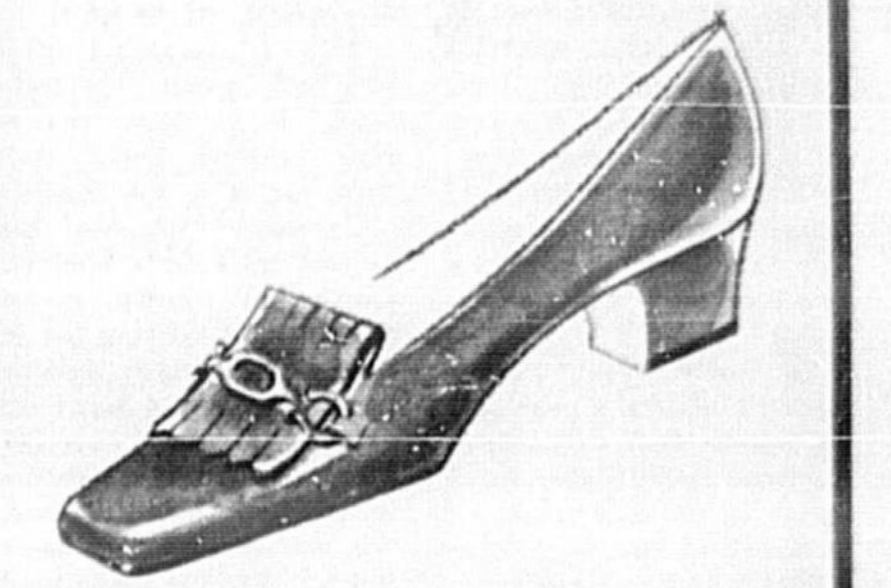

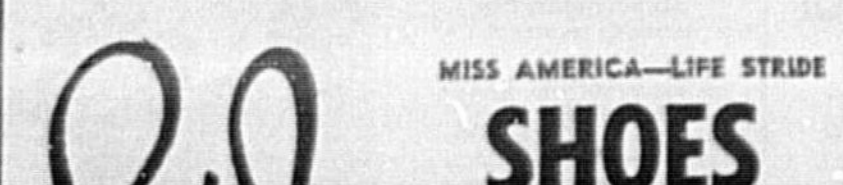

Then back to his hand with the ace of clubs to draw East's last trump and the slam has been made.

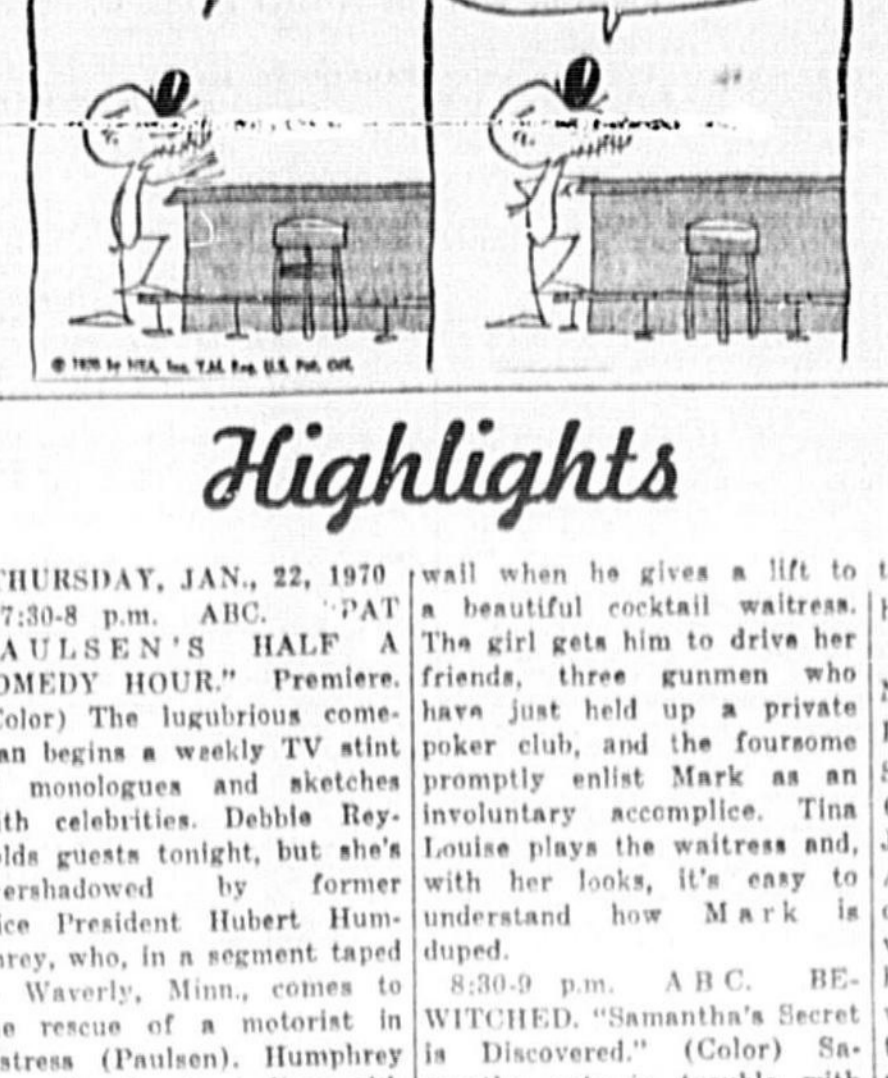
