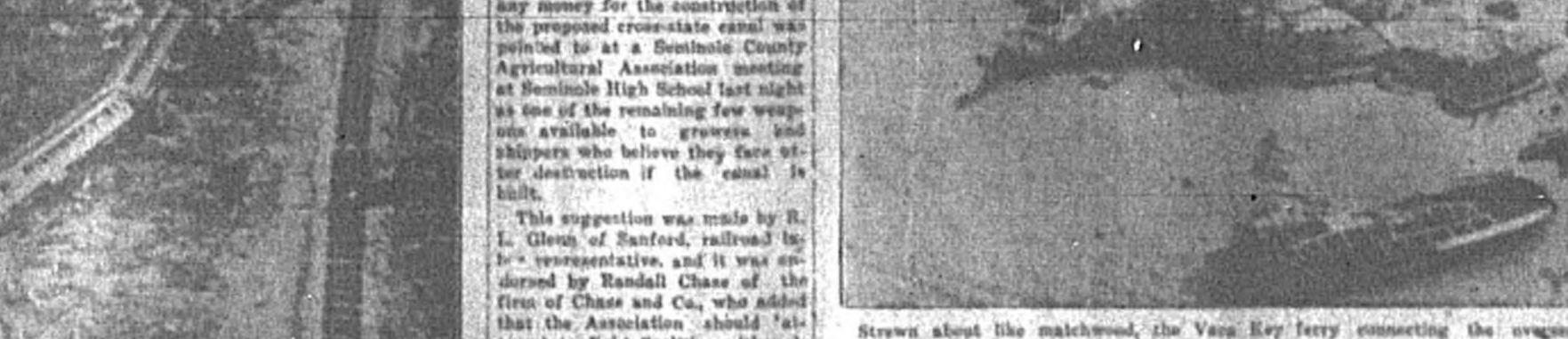

Pope Pius Prays For Divine Aid In Preventing War

Pontiff Recalls Unforgettable Sufferings Of 1914

VATICAN CITY, Sept. 6.—Pleading for peace and divine aid to prevent hostilities between Italy and Ethiopia, Pope Pius recently expressed the hope that "it may be possible to solve all difficulties by other means but war."

Addressing a Catholic international pilgrimage of nurses at Castel Gandolfo, the Pope exhorted the nurses to "pray to the good Lord that He may second the activity and industry of clairvoyant men who understand the exigencies of the real happiness of peoples and social justice."

Recalling the unforgettable suffering caused by the last war, the Pontiff stated:

"We want to ask you again to pray particularly for this objective that war be discarded and that we may be saved from it. Alluding to the Italo British tension in the Ethiopian crisis, the Pope continued:

"We already see abroad that

they are talking about a war of conquest, an offensive war. That is a supposition which we don't even want to consider here—a supposition which disconcerts one.

"A war of mere conquest is obviously unjust—here is something unspakably sad and horrible. We cannot think of an unjust war. We cannot even admit this possibility. We do not want to think of an unjust war."

"On the other side they say in Italy it is a just war, because it is defensive to insure her frontiers against continuous unceasing dangers."

"They say it is a war which has become necessary for expansion of a population which increases daily—a war to defend or insure the material security of the country—such a war would be justified by itself."

"It is true, however, that we cannot help ponder that if this need of expansion exists, there exists also the necessity of insuring through defense the security of frontiers."

ITALY TAKES NEW VIEW OF WAR PROBLEM

(Continued From Page One) who was in frequent telephone communication with Premier Mussolini at Rome, placed a barrier against the two powers which have sought to disengage Italy from war by offers of concessions in Ethiopia.

Italy's stand was revealed shortly before the council was scheduled to open its second public session on the Italo-Ethiopian question. It caused consternation among diplomats, who hurriedly conferred, deferring meetings over an hour.

Council members had hoped to turn the problem over to a commission last night but Aloisi's ultimatum ended that hope.

Italy's refusal to accept France and Britain as members of the commission caused Poland last night to withdraw. There was only a remote possibility of forming a commission from the remaining council members, Spain, Turkey, Portugal, Denmark and Czechoslovakia—and still remote chance of such a commission producing an effective solution.

The council meeting was only a few minutes old when the Italian delegation sprang a sensation that

cocked the meeting to its foundations.

As Gaston Jeze, famous French jurist and Ethiopian legal expert, began his defense against Italy's charge that Haile Selassie's empire was savage and unfit for League membership, the Italian delegates arose and marched from the chamber.

Jeze paused, nonplussed. A hush spread over the galleries. Faces of diplomats, tense in the hour of crisis to peace and the whole League structure, blanched.

"Has Italy quit the League as she threatened?" everyone asked. In a few moments the Italians made it clear that the withdrawal did not mean Italy's departure from Geneva.

A spokesman said it was a protest against Jeze, who had launched into his case with a demand that the council "unmask Italy's sinister designs."

The dramatic gesture—bearing out Italy's indication, that so far as she is concerned, Ethiopia no longer is in the League—was believed engineered by Aloisi, although he was not present with his delegation. Guido Rocca, head of the League of Nations section of the Italian foreign office, was in charge.

Rocca listened stolidly to the first part of Jeze's speech. Then the secretary to the Italian delegation entered the council room

and whispered in Rocca's ear. Rocca signaled the rest of Italy's representatives and they marched out of the silent chamber.

An Italian spokesman said Italy would return to the council table when Jeze had finished presenting Ethiopia's legal case.

"This is the first time in League history that insulting language has been used at the council table—that is why we withdrew," the spokesman said.

White immediately gave notice of appeal and filed a \$5,000 superdecedent bond on which he is at liberty.

Death Rate Trend Moves Up After Gradual Decline Birthrate In America Also Increased During Past Year

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—(AP)—An upward turn in the country's death rate trend, after five years of continuous decline, was reported Monday by the Census Bureau in its preliminary summary for 1934.

The birthrate also increased. There were 2,807,500 deaths and 2,871,000 births, compared with 2,802,100 deaths and 2,851,200 births in 1933.

The death total was the largest since 1918 when there were 2,724,977 and a rate of 10.3 per 1000 of population. Last year's rate was 11.9 per 1000 compared with 10.7 in 1933.

Infants continued a decline begun in 1932, after a nearly increase beginning in 1929, when the rate was 10.3 per 100,000. Firearms was the leading method, killing and strangulation, second.

Local executions numbered 162. In 1933 there were 163 and the previous year, 131.

Excessive heat deaths showed a big jump for the year. They totaled 3250 against 1025 the previous year and 683 for 1932.

Excessive cold caused 437 deaths, compared with 319 and 237 in the two preceding years.

Automobile deaths totaled 22,900, marking a continued increase from 20,223 in 1933 and 20,350 the previous year. The rate per 100,000 population was 26.9, while the two previous years were 23.3 and 21.9.

Deaths from alcoholism increased from 3049 in 1933 to 3921 in 1934. Social disease deaths mounted from 11,600 in 1932 to 12,777 last year.

Deaths from childbirth and related causes declined over the three-year period, while disease of early infancy claimed an increasing number of babies. Deaths from senility were down from 1923 but up from 1922.

Ebert left the interview tight-lipped and refusing to reveal progress of the conversations. However, Ethiopian officials revealed to the press the nature of the Lion of Judah's roar of protest.

Haile Selassie considers that Secretary of State Cordell Hull acted with gross misjudgment in peremptory the American oil company to relinquish the concessions which rocked diplomats circles on three continents on the eve of Premier Benito Mussolini's anticipated occupation of Ethiopia.

Ethiopia wishes to extend the privilege of developing her vast natural resources in any foreigners willing to co-operate, the U. S. envoy was informed. Those willing to co-operate should be free from official influence by their governments he added sharply.

"We need the co-operation of someone instead of ourselves," officials said in paraphrasing the monarch's words to Ebert.

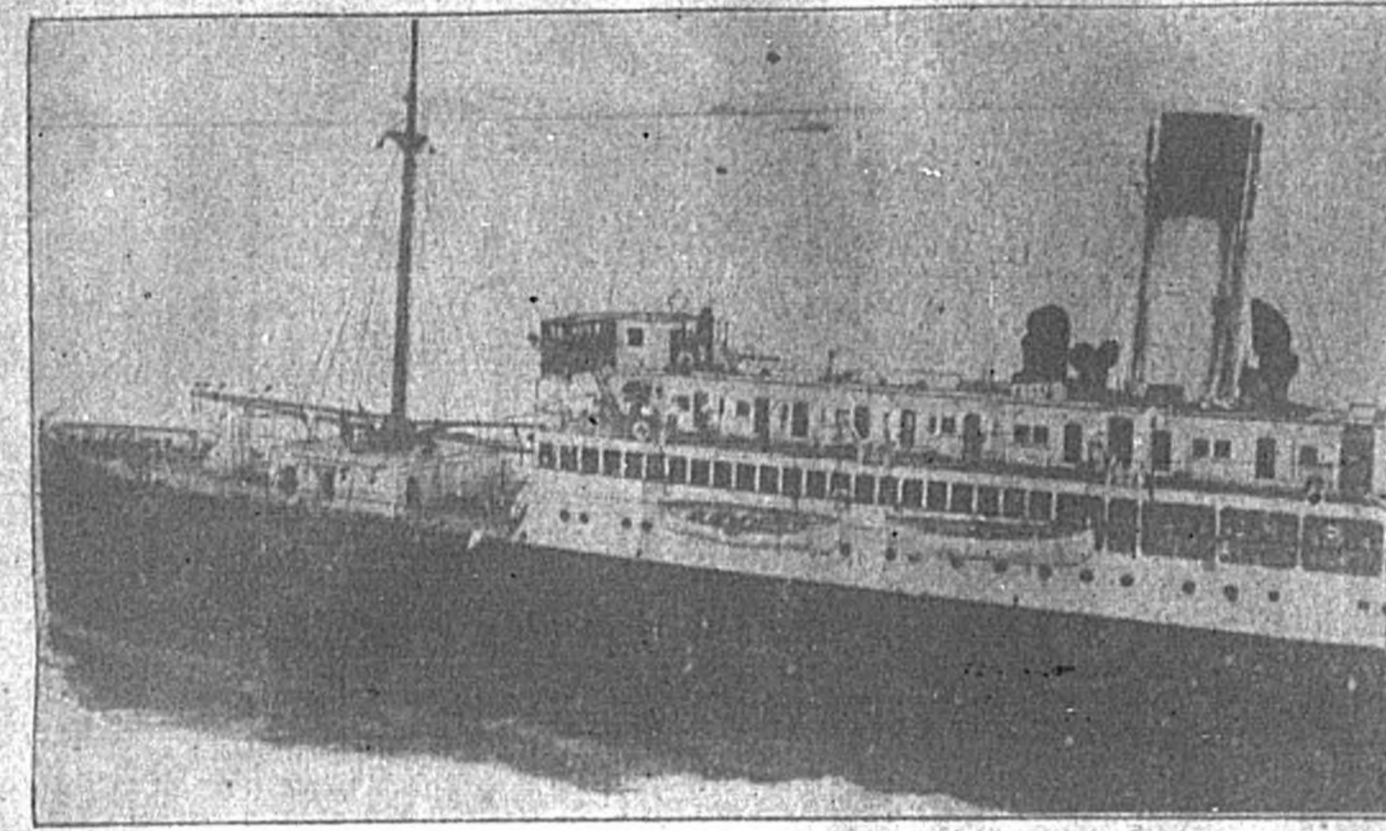

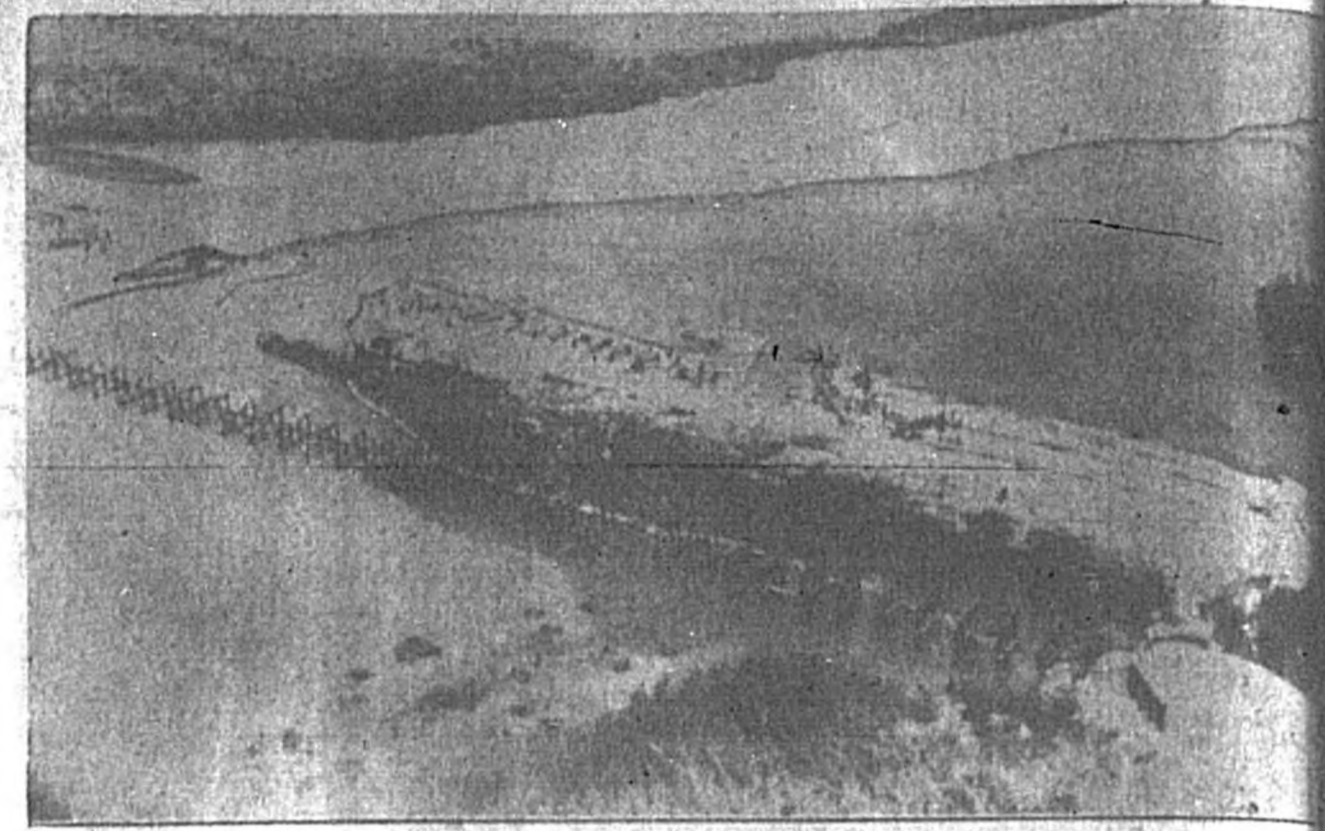

MORGAN LINER HARD AGROUND IN HURRICANE-SWEPT WATERS



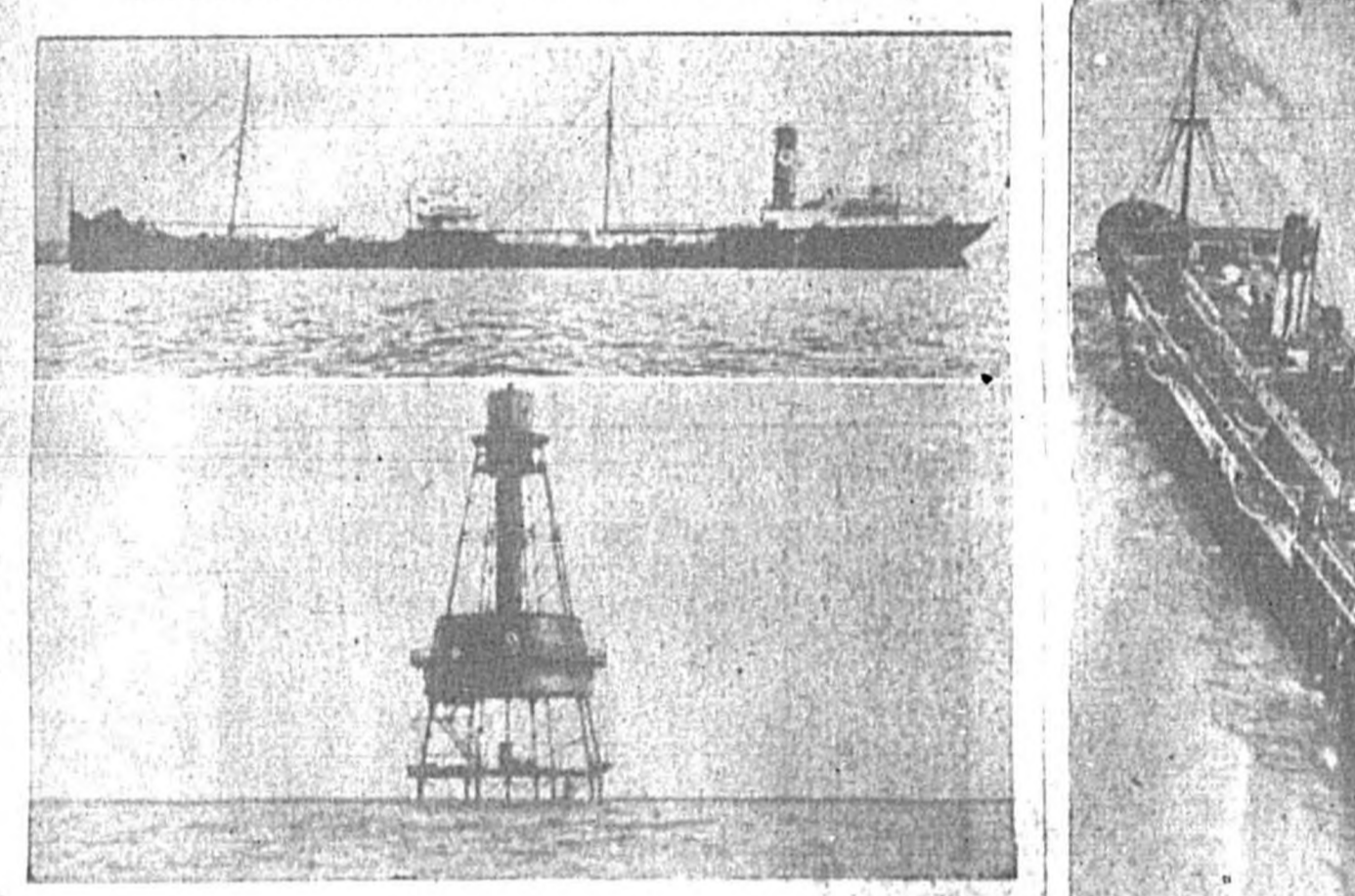
