



Timely Hitting Brings Feds 6 To 4 Victory Over Reds To Break Long Losing Streak

Falling on Gordon Gill for five hits and four runs in the second inning, a hustling Sanford Colery fed baseball team established a lead which later led to a 6 to 4 victory over the Inland Reds at Conrad Field in Inland yesterday afternoon.

The victory ended an eight game losing streak, and it was the first serious game for the Feds since Wednesday week.

After working out of a couple of holes in the first and second due to his own making Flora's attempt to pitch them by Moseley, first up in the third resulted in Moseley's knocking the ball out of the park over the left field fence. Culp drew a walk and Loper got a fluke single to right only to be caught stealing before Richardson first out in center who caught Culp at second.

While Gill was visiting the Feds in order from the third through the eighth, aided by two fast double plays and some sparkling fielding plays led Robertson and Davenport. Flora had one hit during the sixth, in which a single run came over. Not a Fed reached second after the second through the eighth, and only two reached first, one on a single and one on a walk.

As it was, Flora suddenly went wild, walking Davenport and Lacerot. Doc Harden was sent to the ball pen during the argument and, after Gill had been struck out and Flora had pitched two balls to Porter, hitting for Wynn. Doc came in to relieve Flora.

Selassie Bitter In Criticism Of U. S. Hand In Oil Deal

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 6.—Emperor Haile Selassie, furious at what he considered an invasion of Ethiopian sovereignty, denounced U. S. Minister Cornelius Van H. Ebert to the palace Wednesday and delivered a severe tongue-lashing to the U. S. State Department for causing cancellation of the Standard-Vacuum Oil concession.

Ebert left the interview tight-lipped and refusing to reveal progress of the negotiations. However, Ethiopian officials revealed to the press the nature of the Lion of Judah's roar of protest.

Haile Selassie considers that Secretary of State Cordell Hull acted with gross misjudgment in permitting the American oil company to relinquish the concessions which vested him in the care of Premier Benito Mussolini's anticipated occupation of Ethiopia.

Ethiopia wishes to extend the privilege of developing her vast natural resources in any foreigner willing to co-operate, the U. S. envoy was informed. Those willing to co-operate should be free from official influence by their governments he added sharply.

"We need the co-operation of someone instead of obstacles," officials said in paraphrasing the monarch's words to Ebert.








