# Daytona Beach Trips Sanford In Double-Header, 6-0, 3-1

## Islanders Pound Pierce Corley From Box With 11 Hit Barrage

**Creel Chalks Up Ninth Straight Win In Beating Sanford In Opener; Jeter Faces Orlando There**

Sanford battled Daytona Beach getting three more hits in the eighth and ninth, but no runs.

Corley, on the other hand, struck the Seminoles eight hit attack with a fine brand of pitching. His curve ball was breaking sharply, his pace was good, and he threw for corners. Sanford connected frequently as the fact that only two fanned attest, but their hard hit balls were going directly to fielders while the majority were not hitting the ball squarely.

A large throng of Daytona Beach fans was on hand for the twin bill and they practically cheered their team to victory. Sanford fans were waiting for something to cheer about, but they waited in vain.

The nearest Sanford came to scoring was in the third. Corley smacked a ground ball to center, but for Sanford's first hit off Corley. Then Hyder poled a long drive to left center field, Corley running before the fleet Hyder failed to tag second, realized his mistake and attempted to turn around but got his feet tangled and fell, so he got up and continued to third. Hyder pulled up at second, but the second baseman, Wayton, called for the ball and tagged second to put Corley out. Hyder's double could then only be cashed a single.

In the second game, Sanford made a nice leaping catch of Kimble's liner which appeared to be labeled a hit.

Hyder withdrew from the second game because of illness. Al Kimble played his right field position.

Rain fell after the first half of the first inning of the second game had been completed and play was called for 25 minutes. The field was still in good shape.

To Andy Johnson went the driving gem of the day. He ran over to the negro grandstand and made a one handed stab at a foul fly ball which everyone thought had fallen out of reach.

## Population Of County Is 18.6 Percent Higher

### 12,226 Inhabitants Are Counted In Decennial Census For Increase Of 3,491

The population of Seminole County has increased by 18.6 percent in the past decade, according to information released today by Dick Bell, district statistician of Orlando who is supervising the results of the census made in this county.

The 1940 census gave Seminole County a population of 12,226 as compared with a total of 10,735 residents in 1930.

These figures, he pointed out, are subject to change until the final tabulation is forwarded to Washington, although he expected a belief that the final figures would not be altered materially.

Because of the fact that the figures have been brought in recently since the 1930 census there is no material increase in population in Seminole County, most of the increase being distributed among rural precincts.

Estimated figures give Seminole County a population of 15,170.
