



The City of Casselberry entered the 1960's with litle more than 1,000 people living within its bounds and is ending the decade with an estimated five times that number of residents. The growth didn't happen haphazardly or by accident. The city planned for it and was ready each time opportunity knocked on the

Before the new home building boom began the city adopted a subdivision ordinance which required builders to pave the streets properly, to construct sidewalks, install street lights, and to provide five per cent of each development to be deeded to the municipality for parks for the citizens of the community.

Industry and business found the welcome for an enterprise and one only need look at the intersection of SR 436 and U.S. 17-92 to see the results of this attitude.

The friendly and cordial atmosphere of the city governing body encouraged the new residents to not complain about matters which bothered them, but to take an active part in their community to correct them. When speaking of Casselberry, one has to





Spring primaries and a Fall general election becomes, in effect, two separate elections with great expense to the candidates. 















"Where Action Is"

Casselberry councilmen have requested that police protection be furnished as tempers got out of hand at a recent zoning board meting when the proposed rezoning of an 8.1-acre tract from R-1 residential to C-1 commercial was requested by Orlando realtor Julian P. Myrick. Myrick is seeking permission to build a compact shopping facility for an estimated cost of one-half million dollars. The price tag on the tract is estimated at \$250,000.




