









# Germ Warfare Preparations Are 'Hush-Hush'

WASHINGTON (AP) — With weapons seen and unseen, the United States has been preparing secretly during this decade for a kind of war where chemicals and germs kill man, his animals and crops.

This chemical biological warfare—CBW—effort is expensive, controversial—and becoming more so—and almost as hush-hush as the development of the atomic bomb in 1945. Budget figures have been classified, but an AP examination indicates the CBW program has consumed about \$2.5 billion since 1960 with little debate in Congress.

Some 5,000 technicians are involved in a network of military labs, arsenals and test areas across the country, busy researching, developing and laying away or maintaining ready production lines for gas and germ weapons.

Size of the U.S. stockpile is secret but appears to encompass millions of pounds of agents ranging from relatively mild CS gas—used in Vietnam—to poisonous GA, GB and V nerve agents—odorless, tasteless, invisible, kill-in-second-instants. Biological or germ weapons can't be stored for more than a few days before their living payloads become sterile, but the Pentagon keeps a pilot production line at Pine Bluff, Ark., prepared to crank out weapons upon hours notice.

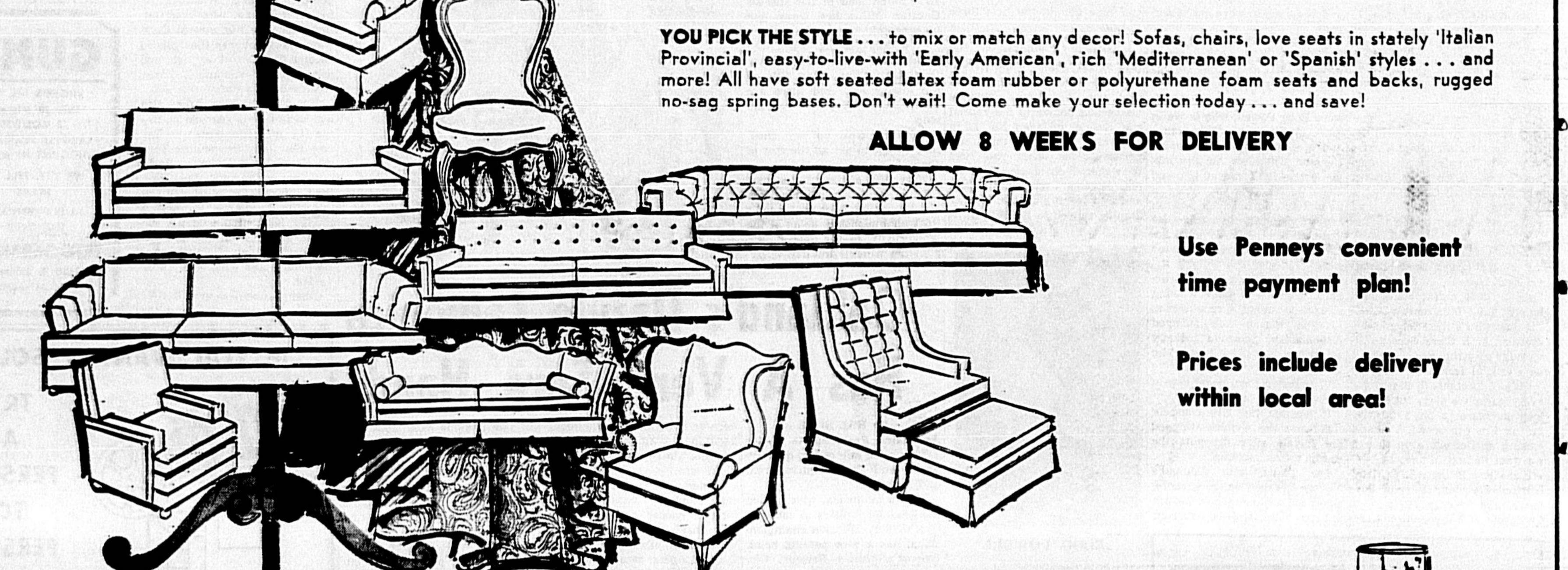

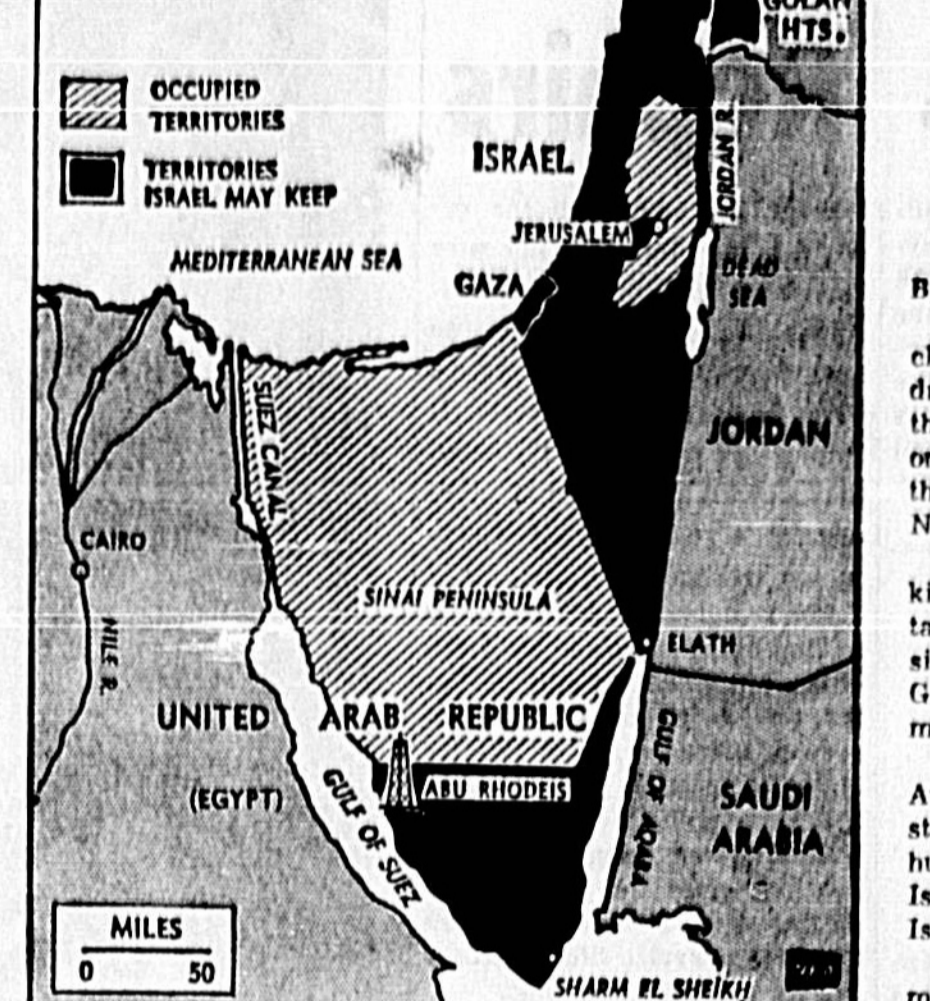
Most enemy and allied casualties were reported since midnight Wednesday than in any such period since June 18, when the current lull in major sustained ground fighting began.

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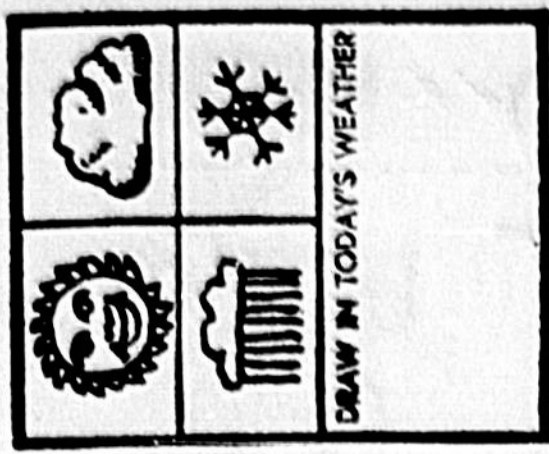

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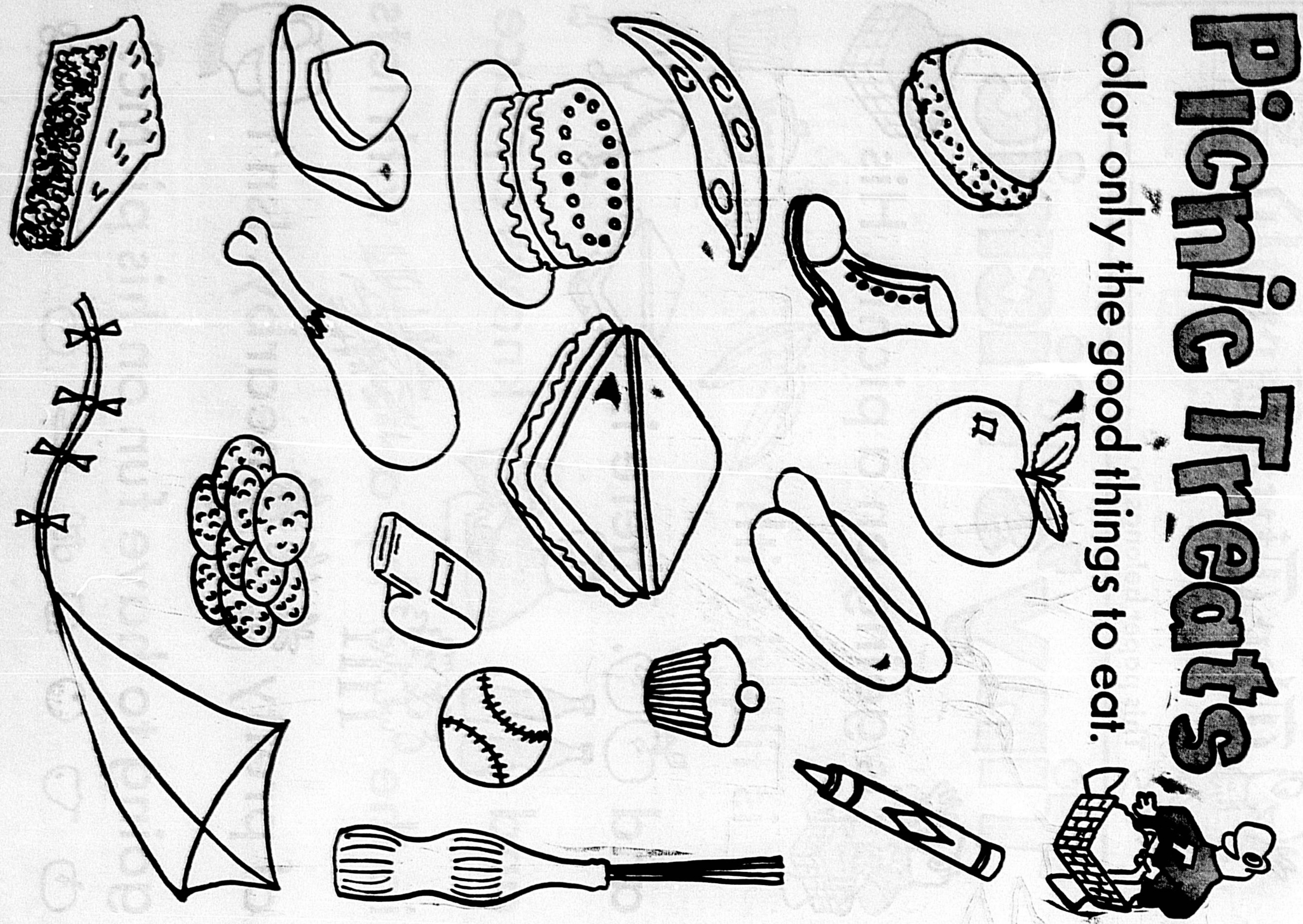
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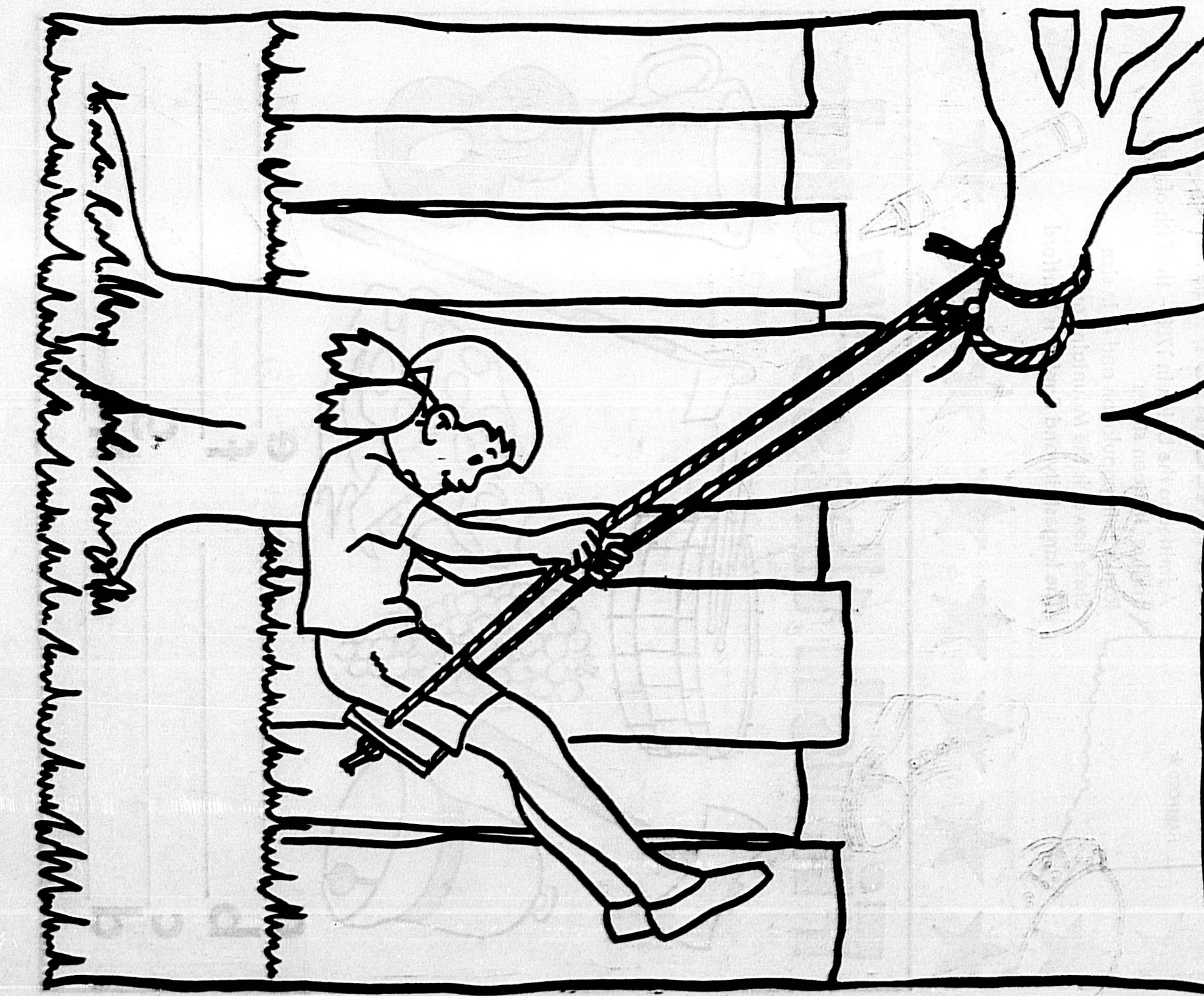

## Casselberry Is Site 'Where Action Is'

 The Casselberry Women's Club will be the site of "Where The Action Is" tonight as a delegation of residents from the Indian Hills subdivision is expected to be on hand at the Casselberry City Council meeting to protest a zoning change.  
 Casselberry councilmen have requested that police protection be furnished as tempers got out of hand at a recent zoning board meeting when the proposed rezoning of an 8.1-acre tract from R-1 residential to C-1 commercial was requested by Orlando realtor Julian P. Myrick. Myrick is seeking permission to build a compact shopping facility for an estimated cost of one-half million dollars. The price tag on the tract is estimated at \$250,000.  
 Dr. Jerry Grissom, president of the Indian Hills Association, stated that his group would not compromise the situation and that it planned to fight the zoning proposal with every means at its disposal.  
 The zoning change was accepted by the Casselberry zoning board and has now been sent to the city fathers for their seal of approval.  
 The shopping complex, if approved, will house a factory furniture store, several small shops and a large food store facility, along with a community room that can be used for local meetings of civic clubs and other organizations.

# The Most Unifying Influence

On the record, the most unifying influence in Seminole County during at least the last quarter-of-a-century has been and is the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.  
 From the southern border... Ocoke to Altamonte Springs... along the green-belted beauty of the central cities, stand witness of what this group of civic-minded leaders, too strong, have achieved.  
 Expanding businesses as obvious as the Dynamex division of General Dynamics are in our county because of the vigor of the chamber's leadership. Where would Seminole Junior College have been without the very strong backing for its present location from the chamber's committees?  
 From the time when Sanford was, in fact, the heart of the business and industrial economy until today when this major municipality is renewing its role with a fine example of progressive action to the lake-front, marina and Holiday Inn, the chamber has been a critic of procrastination and a spur to action.  
 But what is more important than these physical evidences of a unifying influence, is both the caliber and the character of the leaders who have come from every section to argue out programs, muster combined attacks and bring economic health to every section.  
 It is this sort of organization which should have its muscles cut by a short-sighted or prejudiced County Commission. Not at all! The sort of asset which this chamber has proved itself to be should be supported, expanded and given a pat-on-the-back.

acquisition. The body is also expected to adopt a new electrical code for the county while holding six other public hearings on zoning matters.  
 The decision will be whether the county will continue to allocate funds to the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce for publicity and advertising purposes and also a subsidy to the Sanford-Seminole and South Seminole Jaycees for operation of two tourist information centers.  
 The county has been allocating some \$25,000 per year to the three groups, with the most sizable portion of \$21,000 going to the Seminole C of C while \$2,000 went to the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees and \$1,500 to the South Seminole organization.  
 Last Tuesday the commission heard arguments from many of the county's leading citizens in opposition to the commissioners' proposed cut of funds. No citizen spoke in favor of the commission's action.  
 Opposition has been brought to bear on the commission and motion last week to extend the three chambers' funds for additional three months to April 1, was tabled to give the governing body more time to study the situation.  
 Commission Chairman John Alexander has led the fight to cut the three organizations' funds, backed by Commissioner Greg Drummond, the only Republican on the county body.  
 Commissioner Robert Parker asked the assembly to extend the cutoff date for funds an extra three months while Commissioners Edward Yarbrough and Dan Pelham apparently favored a complete one-year extension.  
 Both Jaycees organizations have said they will have to close their information centers while the senior chamber would have to curtail many of its activities throughout the area.  
 The commission will discuss acquisition of county park lands tomorrow and also hear a report from county attorney Harold Johnson on a proposed bond referendum to fund land.

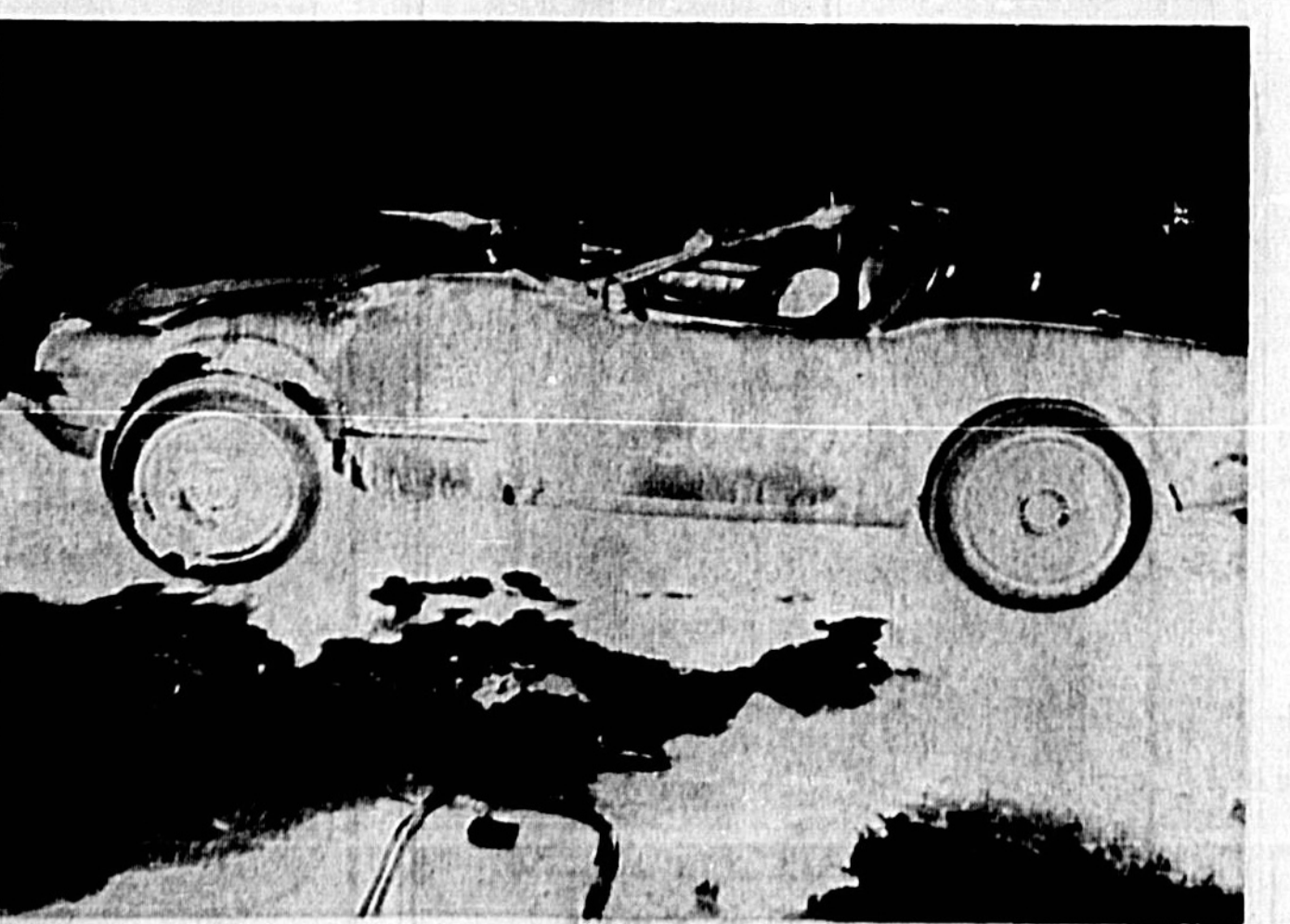
## Beautification Plan Outlined For City

 Sanford's Scenic Improvement Board at this morning's meeting approved two of five expected city beautification projects presented by a Winter Park landscape architect and listed as priority a plan to beautify the old handball area near the lakefront, which was renamed Memorial Park.  
 A. B. Peterson Jr., board chairman, will approach the city tonight during regular City Commission meeting with the entire plan and a request for funds to implement the first of five beautification projects to come this year from Thomas H. Wallis-Stratton Associates.  
 Wallis was retained by the city at \$5,000 cost to furnish a beautification plan for the city and the Memorial Park project, together with a plan to beautify the marina area near the Holiday Inn.  
 The landscaper outlined cost estimates at \$14,748 to install concrete walks, plant trees and add lighting to Memorial Park. He said some of the cost could be averted if city crews undertook the task of laying walks, planting trees and flowers, etc.  
 Priority was given to the park area but both the marina and park are included in the two plans which would cost approximately \$28,100.  
 Wallis wants city to do away with the old monument base at the park, preferring to have a new base constructed and retain the flagpole.  
 The landscaper said he had tried to keep the plan as simple as possible and advised that 14 lights mounted on standards would be needed for both the park and marina. The lights would follow concrete walkways on both areas.

 David Michael Murray, 21, Rockledge, was bound over after a trial containing "junk pills" was found in a van occupied by Bobby Lee Gould, 17, Sanford, John Scull, 18, Rockledge, and Murray.  
 The van was observed by Sanford Detective Tom Deppen, Lt. Edward Hayden and Patrolman Charles Tate for two months before the officers decided to stop the vehicle at 12th Street and Magnolia Avenue.  
 Murray, the van owner, reportedly approved a search which ultimately revealed a bottle of pills found by Officer Tate.  
 Deppen reported the tablets to be LSD, an hallucinatory drug, but admitted the pills had not been analyzed by a chemist, but given tests by him (Deppen).  
 Ned Julian Jr., public defender, questioned the admissibility of Deppen's testimony and Judge Hall ordered Murray bound over and charges against Gould and Scull dismissed.  
 Hall ruled that probable cause had not been established by police against Scull and Gould and the two were released.  
 Murray is free on \$2,000 bond.

## Mother Freed From Jail On Bond

Virginia Joiner, 19-year-old mother, was released from Seminole County jail on \$500 bond late Saturday afternoon after a preliminary hearing Friday before County Judge Wallace Hall.  
 The woman is accused of trying to drown her 14-month-old son in a bathtub, and was ordered bound over to Circuit Court by Hall, who reduced original \$1,000 bail after hearing charges the woman tormented and tortured her son.  
 The investigation to determine who will gain custody of Christopher Joiner continues. In the meantime, the child is being cared for by grandparents.
