'Magic Moment' Highlight Of Hands Across America Effort

They called it a magic moment, the instant when a ragged, motley line of millions raised their clasped hands from sea to shining sea and burst into song.

It was the emotional climax of the Hands Across America project, a monumentally ambitious plan to forge a human chain from New York to California Sunday and raise \$50 million for the nation's homeless and hungry.

There were huge gaps in the line, a few planned in desert areas for safety's sake, but most of them the result of insufficient people or inefficient

It would have taken 5.5 million people to make a complete line along the looping, 4.152-mile

Whether their contributions of at least \$10

apiece and massive corporate assistance got the drive to its \$50 million goal was not known. Hands Across America organizers said today preliminary estimates indicated 6 million people took part in the event, including those on and off

One of the chief organizers, Marty Rogol, said in Long Beach, Calif., that \$12 million would cover

the expenses of the organizers, the USA for Africa people. "Fifty million dollars is the goal and \$100 million would be a dream." he said.

Organizers, who say it could take months to determine how much was raised, have indicated they intend to donate 60 percent of the profits to established groups and 40 percent to new ones that will examine the causes of poverty.

They were unable to say whether the line itself exceeded the Guinness record of a 66-mile unbroken chain, but Rogol said, "I'm almost sure

counted it a huge success.

The line began in the shadow of the Statue of Liberty, at New York's Battery Park. It meandered through 16 states and the District of Columbia, where it ran across the north portico of the White House, and ended at the Queen Mary's dock in Long Beach.

Anchoring the East Coast end was Amy Sherwood, 6, who spent the past year living in a New York welfare motel. Across the continent stood Bill and Mary Jones and their five children. chosen as symbols of the "new poor" - families

Seminole Girl Hit By Car First Fatality Of Holiday

A Winter Springs girl became the first Florida traffic fatality as the holiday weekend began when she was run over Friday within two blocks of her home. Since her death, the traffic death toll has risen to 19.

Michele Charter, 10, of 210 Charles St., and her 12-year-old brother had just bought some ice cream at a local store on State Road 434 and were going home when the incident occurred.

A short distance away, her parents, unaware of the tragedy. watched television. The uninlured brother ran home and got them, according to Winter Springs police. The girl was dead on arrival at South Seminole Commumity Hospital.

Charges are pending against Randall Peterson, 37, of Oviedo.

According to the accident report, the children had purchased ice cream at a local convenience store around 9:12 p.m. and were crossing SR 434 at Charles St. when the girl was struck. The brother was about 12 feet ahead of her and was not injured.

According to police, Peterson said he didn't see the girl. She is the 14th traffic fatality in Semmole County this year.

Elsewhere in the state, an elderly Bradenton couple who died when their northbound car ran a red light and was hit by an eastbound car, became the 18th and 19th reported traffic fatalities during the Memorial Day long weekend. Florida Highway Patrol officials said.

Myron Alexander Best, 92, and his wife Beatrice, 90, died on State Road 45 in Sarasota. Best, who was driving, and his wife, were both wearing seatbelts. The accident was not alcohol related. FHP officials said.

FHP officials have predicted 34 traffic deaths during this long the average number of fatalities recorded on Florida roads during this period over the last three years. The holiday began at 6 p.m. Friday and ends at mldnight today.

Three of the weekend's fatalities were children including Miss Charter. Also killed was 2-year-old Dana Michelle Bryant of Webster who died when she was thrown from the car her mother Hilda was driving. The car, which was traveling very fast, overturned, an FHP official

Dana was not in a seat when the accident occurred at 9:10 p.m Saturday about two miles north of Webster in Sumter County, FHP officials said. They did not know whether the accident was alcohol-related.

Area veteran and civilian organizations scheduled 9:30 a.m. services at the All Faiths Memorial Park in Casselberry with Casselberry Mayor Owen Sheppard as keynote speaker. Major Arnold Fields, commander of the U.S. Marine Recruiting Station, Orlando, was honorary host.

President Reagan prepared to lead the nation in Memorial Day observances today as veterans ushered in the holiday with a candlelight tribute to the war dead and pleas that they be remembered for "the price they paid."

Reagan today was to make the short trip across the Potomac River to the Arlington National Cemetery to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and pay homage to America's 1.2 million war dead in an address to veterans, military personnel and their familles.

In addition to the estimated 60 acres of brush and mobile home burned. Sunday's fire destroyed a camper and damaged a home under construction. Schenk said. Value of the damage property has not yet been determined.

Efforts to control the blaze were coordinated by county fire commanders from a rented helicopter. While most of the fire units were used to fight the blaze, two or three were posted in nearby residential areas as a projective measure. Schenk said.

Water Poisoning Chernobyl Threat

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Soviet Union's main concern in the wake of the Chernobyl nuclear accident is how to keep radiation from the damaged reactor from poisoning underground water supplies, says a scientist in charge of the cleanup operation.

Veygeny Velikhov, vice president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, also said no significant leakage of radiation from the reactor has been detected but said there is no way to tell how long the cleanup effort will take.

The Soviet official insisted there had been no significant leakage of radiation from the damaged reactor, ravaged by fire four weeks ago, for the past 10

Additional Combat Casualties **Etched On Vietnam Memorial**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Almost two decades after they were killed in the Vietnam War, 110 American soldiers are finally being officially recognized as among the nation's combat casualties this Memorial Day.

More than 400 members of their families gathered today for a ceremony at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, where their names are freshly etched on a 498-foot black granite wall beside 58,022 previously honored comrades.

"They all deserve to be there," said Leo Broadhead, of Pledmont, Okla. He is the father of Air Force Lt. Larry Broadhead, one of the new additions, and the man who helped lead the fight to honor them.

Larry Broadhead and 96 others had been initially left off the wall — and a place in history — because they were killed outside the official U.S. "combat zone" and thus were not considered war dead.

The other 13 had been ignored because the Pentagon, as result of processing oversights, did not realize they died of combat wounds after leaving Southeast Asia.

Superfund in Fiscal Trouble

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Dwindling funds forced the Superfund toxic waste cleanup to trim operations in September, and now another fiscal crunch crops up this week when an emergency financing package expires.

But signs have appeared that the long congressional stalemate over enactment of new legislation to extend the program for five years is nearing an end.

Technically, the Superfund law expired at the end of fiscal year 1985. Sept. 30, and the Environmental Protection Agency lost its authority to collect taxes from the petrochemical industry to support the multibilliondollar cleanup.

"As of June 1, we will be running out of money again." an EPA spokeswoman said last week.

Drought Aid Has Dried Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Just as the worst drought in Africa's history appears to be at an end, U.S. aid to the continent may dry up before it is able to get its agricultural systems back on track.

The United States gave nearly \$2.4 billion in emergency food and relief to 20 African countries that were stricken by the six-year drought but now faces a severe reduction in the amount of development aid available to put African agriculture back on its feet.

The Gramm-Rudman budget-balanced law, aimed at reducing the federal budget deficit to zero by 1991, may force Congress cut up to 20 percent from the U.S. aid bill.

The State Department has budgeted about \$1 billion for African aid in the coming year but that figure is certain to be cut, whichever version of the foreign aid bill emerges.

Jail Overcrowding Expands

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Overcrowding in the nation's prisons has spilled over to the local level with about one-quarter of America's larger city and county fails operating above capacity, a federal study says.

The Justice Department's Bureau of Justice Statistics released the report Sunday showing that larger local jails - those holding more than 100 people - represent about 20 percent of the nation's jails but house about three-fourths of all inmates.

These facilities were operating at 102 percent of their limits at mid-1984, the last year for which figures were available, the study said.

Sightseeing Boat Rams Bridge

NEW YORK (UPI) - A tour boat carrying more than 600 people around Manhattan Island got sucked into a powerful ebb tide that slammed the vessel into a bridge, hurling wood pilings across the deck. Twenty people were injured,

The most seriously injured, Frank Kearn, 21, of Hastings, N.Y., was admitted to Jacobi Hospital with a possible skull fracture. His condition had not been determined late Sunday.

Seven others injured in the accident, most of them suffering trauma wounds, remained hospitalized today.

Capt. Patrick Patten, 33, who has piloted the 53-year-old boat for the Circle Line sightseeing service for four years. was guiding the boat north on the Harlem River when the accident occurred at 2:52 p.m. Sunday.

GAO: Pentagon Probers Biased

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Complaints of Pentagon waste or mismanagement phoned in to hotlines are not adequately investigated because of bias, a lack of thoroughness and incomplete documenation, the General Accounting Agency

A newly released GAO report and a congressional source cited one such probe of alleged waste by Air Force Gen. W.L. Creech, who was commander of the Tactical Air Command at Langley Air Force Base, Va.

The GAO said the Air Force inspector general's office assigned Creech's subordinates in 1984 to examine hotline allegations that he had wastefully ordered buildings, fences and signs to be painted brown.

Inmates Hold Hostages

McALESTER, Okla. (UPI) - Negotiators worked today to free a prison guard and a prisoner taken hostage by two inmates armed with a foot-long piece of metal who demanded a transfer out of Oklahoma State Penitentiary.

Their main demand is they are requesting a transfer to another facility, possibly out of state," said Linda Morgan, administrative officer for the state prison system.

Inmates David Lee Doyle and David Paul Hammer took correctional officer Aaron Duncan, 32, hostage in their cell in a protective custody unit about 10:10 p.m. EDT Sunday, Morgan said. Duncan of Albuquerque, N.M., has worked at the prison about five years, she said.

Fireworks: Sanford, Yes; Altamonte, No

Altamonte Springs' annual Independence Day Skybiast will apparently fizzle this year for the lack of necessary insurance coverage, but in Sanford plans are going forward for a fireworks spectacle twice the size of last year's, according to Jack Horner, president of Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce.

The city of Altamonte Springs can afford coverage, but none of a dozen carriers contacted will underwrite the \$5 million protection the city wants, said Phil Penland. city manager. He said at least 10 other cities in the state, most in South Florida, are having the same problem.

"We're just another victim of a nationwide crisis," Penland said.

Last year the city spent \$20,000 for the fireworks display, which drew tens of thousands of people.

Horner said he is not concerned because the situation is different from the crowded mall area in Altamonte Springs. In Sanford the marina is blocked off by the fire department and fireworks are fired out over Lake Monroe by a licensed professional pyrotechnics expert Vic Vickers, who has his own insurance. Horner explained.

A contract has been signed with Vickers to provide a minimum of \$3,000 worth of fireworks - more if enough funds are raised.

Horner said the city has liability insurance on the city property. "We've never had any trouble and I don't anticipate any." he said. "I haven't heard anything from the city, but if the city should require us to get our own insurance it would effectively kill the fireworks, because we can't afford it. We couldn't celebrate Independence Day in the traditional fashion."

Jim Jernigan, director of Parks and Recreation for Sanford, said he does not expect any insurance coverage problems that might prevent the sireworks here as the event takes place on city property while in Altamonte Springs the Skyblast is held by

the city on private property. The city provides firemen at the launch site and police for traffic control on Fourth of July

night. Money for the fireworks is raised each year through contributions from local businesses, organizations and individuals. Some funds also come from the Family Day held in Fort Mellon Park on the Fourth of July. Organizations who have booths contribute to the fireworks fund as well as their own projects. The celebration is put on by the chamber in conjunction with the City Parks

and Recreation Department. The festivities also include games, contests, and entertainment run by staff members of the recreation department

during the day.

U.S. Doctor Says 50,000 Soviets Will Need Lifetime Monitoring

MOSCOW (UPI) - American bone marrow specialist, Dr. Robert P. Gale, returned to the Soviet Union to set guidelines for lifetime monitoring of more than 50,000 people exposed to radiation from the Chernobyl nuclear disaster.

Decontamination teams, meanwhile, scaled off the damaged nuclear reactor and focused on containing "radioactive dust" around the Chernobyl power station, where the world's worst nuclear power accident occurred a month ago today.

The death toll for the Chernobyl accident stands at 17 two in the initial explosion and fire and 15 from radiation exposure. Thirty-five people were listed as critically injured, up from 20 a week ago, a spokesman for the International Atomic Energy Agency said in Vienna.

Gale, a specialist from UCLA, arrived in the Soviet Union six days after the April 26 accident at Chernobyl and performed 19 bone marrow transplants - the only known treatment for severe radiation exposure.

He returned to the United States May 16 for consultations and met with Secretary of State George Shultz to brief him on his transplant work.

Gale returned to Moscow Sunday to begin follow-up treatment of the transplant patients.

Libyan Official To Visit Moscow

MOSCOW (UPI) - Abdul Salam Jalloud, the No. 2 man behind Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy, begins "a working visit" to the Soviet Union today - the first by a high-ranking Libyan since the United States bombing last

The Soviet news agency Tass said the trip had been arranged at the "invitation of the Soviet government."

"The forthcoming Soviet-Libyan talks will make a new contribution to the development and strengthing of friendship and solidarity between our two countries." the Communist Party daily newspaper Pravda said today.

Millions Run For Sport Aid

LONDON (UPI) - From Katmandu to New York, from Bangkok to London, an estimated 20 million people turned out in 78 countries to run in Sport Aid's "Race against Time" to raise money for starving children in Africa.

The unprecedented show of unity reduced Sudanese torch-bearer Omar Khalifa to tears in New York, where he ended his 12-nation run by lighting a torch at the United Nations to signal the start of the race.

Hostages Release Imminent?

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - An anonymous caller on behalf of a pro-Iranian Islamic group said it would release two French hostages today, a radio broadcast reported.

The Christian Voice of Lebanon said it received the call early today from a man who said he represented the Islamic Jihad Organization and then hung up before a reporter could question him.

Code Board Delays Decision On Wetlands Fill Controversy

By Sarah Fischer Herald Staff Writer

A Longwood man charged with violating a county ordinance by filling in a wetlands area without a permit told the Seminole County Code Enforcement Board Thursday he was attempting to solve a drainage problem near his home.

Janis E. Bastin, 1460 N. Highway 427, said several local and state agencies he has contacted over the years would not assume jurisdiction for solving flooding problems from waterways in the area. Bastin said Lake Ruth drains into Duck Pond under 427 causing severe flooding on his property.

To help remedy the situation, he said he told a Longwood company it could dump fill dirt on his property.

The material, however, was also put on adjoining property, was more than county ordinance allows and contained debris and trash. County Environmental Services Inspector Carl Merkle said.

Bastin and his wife, Lula, have been charged with placing trash and debris. used or scrap building materials, rubhish, junk and and fill dirt in county waters without having obtained a dredge/fill permit.

Merkle said Bastin will be required to remove the fill from the wetlands area. however the code board said Bastin may not be the only one at fault and decided to continue the case until its next meeting. Members also voted to sub-

poena a representative of JCL Land Clearing Inc. to appear at that meeting. after Bastin told them he gave the company permission to dump fill dirt only on his property.

"I think (Bastin) got caught in the middle," said Code Board Member Margaret Crozier-Wimberly. "He is not totally responsible or to blame."

Board Member Steve Cook recommended the county give Bastin six months to obtain the necessary permits.

Merkle said difficulty determining Bastin's property line could hamper compliance with county codes, howev-

"If one was fired in the gas tank of your car, you could make arrangements with (a) funeral home," police detective Bob Ellis said.

Rowe said the bombs were built using a two-part commercial explosive, but he declined to identify it further. When the device is prepared, he said, a powder is mixed with a liquid component before the blasting cap is inserted and the timer set.

Paxton was charged with 54 counts of manufacturing, possessing and delivering bombs.

Each charge carries a maximum sentence of 30 years in prison and \$30,000 in fines.

Francis Paxton was charged with delivering a pipe bomb May 6 in Round Rock to the same two undercover agents. If convicted, she could be sentenced to a maximum of 20 years in prison and fined \$20,000.

Nicewander was charged with interstate transporation of explosives, which carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

Paxton was held in the Bexar County Jail while his wife and Nicewander were held in the Travis County Jail.

Agents said they were unsure where Paxton and Nicewander served in the Green Berets together.

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

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Limited Only By The Imagination

"The universe is not only weirder than we imagine, it's weirder than we can imagine." We were reminded of these words of J.B.S. Haldane upon hearing recently of the discovery of a new mystery in space — an invisible but incredibly powerful source of gravity that appears to defy conventional explanations.

In a universe already populated with oddities of one sort or another - quasars. quarks and black holes to name just a few this is something that astronomers believe may be the most massive of all known objects. It's apparently so big that it contains about a thousand trillion times the mass of the sun, or 1,000 to 10,000 times the mass of the entire Milky Way.

The theorists are having a field day. Not since the discovery of quasars 23 years ago has a cosmic phenomenon generated so much excitement among astronomers. In fact, quasars - starlike objects that can produce massive amounts of light and other radiation - had a lot to do with this latest discovery.

The tip-off came in studies of what appeared to be a pair of quasars whose light profiles - sort of "celestial fingerprints" were astonishingly similar. But, the experts say, a single quasar could appear as two quasars if a massive object between it and Earth acted as a lens, bending the quasar's light so that duplicate images are seen from

The gravity lens could be a super dense black hole - a concentration of matter so dense and with such a strong gravitational pull that no light can escape from it. Or it could be what astronomers call "cosmic strings," fragments from an early stage of the universe that would exist as infinitely long one-dimensional loops or strings capable of creating bizarre gravitational and optical effects along their paths, including double celestial images. Some theorists have even suggested the object could be an extremely dense cluster of galaxies that, for some reason, cannot be seen.

Whatever it is, the astronomers are going to have a lot of fun trying to explain it. And why not. Curiosity is one of the more endearing qualities of the human species. We love mysteries, if for nothing else but the challenge of explaining them. And when we do, we add another piece of information to our store of knowledge, using it to confirm earlier theories or to rearrange pieces of the cosmic puzzle. Each new discovery inspires a renewed quest for answers to even greater mysteries.

Back in the 13th century, the king of Castile, one Alfonso the Wise, declared that, "Had I been present at the Creation, I would have given some useful hints for the better ordering of the universe." If he had simplification in mind, the king was as unwise as he was presumptuous. And not very imaginative either. What intellectual changes would we humans have to look forward to if the universe were as easily explained as a child's toy?

Haldane, as well, may have been wrong when he suggested there is a limit to the human imagination - that other endearing characteristic of the species. Indeed, it was Haldane who also pointed out that science is more stimulating to the imagination than even literature. It was, after all, the scientists who came up with the imaginative notions of quasars and black holes to explain the curiosities of the universe.

It may be years before the scientists find the answer to this latest enigma. In the meantime, the rest of us are free to let our imaginations run wild as we gave at the heavens. Maybe that thing up there is a giant planet whose inhabitants have discovered the secret of invisibility. Sounds fanciful? Maybe. But remember that the notion that the earth is round would have sounded equally fantastic to Alfonso the Wise and his contemporaries.

Is The Senate A Citadel Or Massage Parlor?

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Some years back. William S. White wrote a love song of a book about the Senate called, "The Citadel,

White's book described a pantheon of statesmen, an ivory tower where the noblest Americans of them all forgathered to meditate. discourse and sometimes even vote upon the most cosmic issues confronting mankind.

White's glowing portrait of the Senate may have laid on true blue and pristine white a bit heavily, but it did seem that there were some real heavyweights in the Senate immediately after World War II.

Men like Harry Byrd Sr. of Virginia, Richard Russell of Georgia, Lister Hill of Alabama, Paul Douglas of Illinois, Herbert Lehman of New York, Robert A. Tast of Ohio and Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan commanded respect and awe.

- John Kennedy of Massachusetts, Lyndon Johnson of Texas and Richard Nixon of California - occupying the presidency for 14 years starting in 1961.

members of the Senate in those days probably would have been considered insane. In the late 1950s, after Sen. Francis Case of South Dakota declared that he had been improperly approached by a lobbyist, President Eisenhower vetoed the measure with a stinging rebuke to the lobbying community.

Oh, how that little world atop Capitol Hill has changed.

Nowadays, many lobbyists don't bother to spend years cultivating the friendship and confidence of senators. They just form a political action committee and threaten to put anyone who votes against their clients on a hit list for the next election.

And it works. In the recent past, any tax bill that came before the Senate was in grave danger of being converted into a "Christmas tree" festooned with amendments conferring benefits. shelters and favors on this, that or the other special interest. Efforts to simplify reform the tax system usually ended up making it more complicated and manifestly unfair.

It looked like it was going to be the same old story again this year when the tax reform bill arrived at the Senate Finance Committee. Under

the prodding of the lobbies, the bill grew heavy with Christmas ornaments hung on the bill by

Finally, committee Chairman Bob Packwood of Oregon called a halt. He made his colleagues take a good look at what they were creating and then started over again. Working out of sight and hearing of the lobbyists, the committee members rebuilt a bill that, while far from perfect, actually would move toward simplifying the tax code and closing some of its more flagrant loopholes.

The Senate is to take up the bill next month. Unlike the House, which operates under rules that permit very little tampering with a tax bill once it reaches the floor, the Senate measure is wide open to the same kind statutory rape that was being committed on the committee legisla-

Now the question is, can the Senate restrain itself with the lobbyists looking on from the galleries? The answer to the question will determine whether the Senate can again call itself an old fashioned citadel or a modern day massage parlor.

Summer Summit Fading

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The possibility of a summer summit meeting between President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev is fading fast.

The distance between the two leaders has grown since they met last November in Geneva. Political events and the Chernobyl nuclear catastrophe have intervened to push the summit to the back burner.

Nevertheless, there is a good chance a summit meeting may be held in Washington after the elections in early November.

Reagan had hoped to hold a second round of meetings with the Kremlin leader in June, or possibly July. But in view of the necessary planning, and no public announcement of a date, it appears a fall summit may be arranged.

Reagan was in good form at the White House Photographers Association dinner, teasing, joking and appearing to have a good time.

He began by telling ABC's Kenneth Blaylock, association president: "Ken. I understand that you were the first president of this organization to serve a third consecutive term. Congratulations. Hmmm, hey - a third term that's not a bad idea."

On several occasions, Reagan has complained about the 22nd Amendment that limits a president to two terms.

His other quips:

"It's not easy to have so many photographers around. For Instance. I've told everybody my right side is my good side - my far right

"Keeping my right side to the cameras is no problem when I walk home from the Oval Office in the evening. But morning, it's a different thing. Do you know what it's like to start the day by walking to the office backwards?'

'Tip O'Neill once asked me how I keep looking so young for the cameras. I told him I have a good makeup team - it's the same people who have been repairing the Statue of Liberty."

"Now I know that sometimes there's a little professional jealousy between you and the other news people at the White House. especially the TV reporters. One item I hear from time to time is how much more those TV journalists get paid. But - you have to undersand how they have to spend the difference on hair spray."

Crack In System

With the forthcoming Reagan-Gorbachev summit on our minds, a book about a now distant Eisenhower-Khrushchev summit comes to hand in a timely way. The author of "Mayday," Michael Beschloss, is a brilliant and startlingly young historian. He is, migod. 30. He graduated from Williams College in, gasp, 1977. And, more astonishing still, this is actually his second book — his first was about Franklin Roosevelt and Joseph Kennedy. Well, as the poet sald, hungry generations tread us

Mr. Beschloss both tells an absorbing story, and has a serious recommendation to make.

First, the story. On May 1, 1959 one of our U-2 spy planes was shot down over the city of Sverdlovsk while on an intelligence gathering flight from Peshawar, Pakistan to Bodo. Norway. Initially, the Soviets did not reveal that the pilot, Francis Gary Powers, was alive and that large parts of the U-2 had been recovered intact. The initial cover story offered by the Eisenhower administration was that a NASA weather plane had strayed over Soviet territory. Khrushchev proceeded to reveal that the pilot had confessed to being a spy, a fact impossible to deny because of the plane's photographic equipment, and the Eisenhower administration was thus caught with its U-2

hanging out. The problem was that the plane went down two weeks before a Paris summit meeting was to occur bringing together Eisenhower. Khrushchev, Macmillan and De-Gaulle, at which an arms control agreement might have emerged that, at that juncture, would have left the United States in a position of substantial superiority.

The Eisenhower administration had to face the problem of how to handle the embarrassing flap. Khrushchev's real or feigned indignation would probably have been assuaged if Eisenhower had blamed subordinates and disclaimed personal knowledge of the spy flight. But that would have made Ike look like an absentee president, the "golfer" of hostile myth. Eisenhower decided to accept direct responsibility.

When the big four arrived in Paris. Khrushchev demanded that Eisenhower apologize for the invasion of Soviet airspace. The president refused. Khrushchev went home, and the summit conference was wrecked. Eisenhower's hopes for a last great turn on the world stage and an advantageous arms agreement were dashed. This, in turn, might have affected the result of the upcoming 1960 presidential election. In the wake of a global diplomatic triumph, Kennedy would not have been able to run against a "tired" Elsenhower regime and as the champion of youth and vigor. (The Democratic rivals, Kennedy and Stevenson, it is recalled here. conducted an elaborate semantic ballet, the more dovish Stevenson saying that Eisenhower should have apologized to the Soviet dictator, Kennedy willing only to "regret" the incident - while Nixon, of course, endorsed Eisenhower's decision to accept responsibility.)

Nuclear Power's **Perks**

WASHINGTON (NEA) - In the wake of the calamity at the nuclear power plant in the Soviet Union. defenders of commercial nuclear energy in this country have launched an elaborate ''it. can't-happen-here" propaganda campaign.

But proceedings on Capitol Hill belie their assurances of "safe, reliable operations" at the approximately 100 domestic nuclear power plants. At issue is a federal law that dates back almost three decades.

The Price-Anderson Act of 1957 grants the operators of commercial nuclear power plants immunity from federal, state and local liability laws - an exemption enjoyed by no other industry,

The original statute committed the federal government to paying damage claims of as much as \$500 million in the event of an accident too severe to be fully covered by the

operator's insurance. The government no longer provides that free insurance, but the law still shields the industry from financial responsibility for damages in excess of \$640 million. The amount of insurance the industry now holds.

The law also contains a clause suggesting that federal officials might still ball out the industry following a catastrophe.

The potential inadequacy of the industry's insurance is illustrated by the results of a 1982 study commissioned by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to identify the worst conceivable accident in terms of financial liability.

A disaster at Indian Point on the Hudson River 26 miles north of New York City, the study found, could cause more than \$300 billion worth of damage.

Even if that never happens, countless other possibilities would require victims to forgo full compensation for their injuries because of inadequate insurance coverage.

The issue is now being debated on Capitol Hill because the Price-Anderson Act, renewed for 10-year terms in 1967 and 1977, will expire in 1987 unless it is extended again.

The very existence of Price-Anderson poses a crucial question that never has been satisfactorily answered: If nuclear power is as safe as its proponents claim, why is it necessary to have a special federal law whose only purpose is to protect the industry in the event of a catastrophe?

Spetsnaz Training Exercises Are Deadly

WASHINGTON - The Soviet special forces, or Spetsnaz, are an anomaly in the Soviet Union: elitists in a collectivist society, encouraged to operate independently and to improvise, instead of following the strict letter of the rules according to Marx. Their generals must envy them at times.

The 30,000 Spetsnaz men and women are "determined, welltrained troops selected for their political reliability, athletic skill and intelligence," according to a secret Pentagon report. Because they are indeed special, they earn more money and qualify for retirement earlier; each year as a Spetsnaz is equated with 18 months of regular military service.

But unlike the special forces of any country, the Spetsnaz earn their perks. Though they train along with regular army officers at the Reconnaissance Faculty of the Kiev Higher Combined-Arms School and at the Special Faculty of the Ryazan

Higher Airborne School, once they are assigned to Spetsnaz units they get training that is probably unequaled in its rigors.

A common training exercise is to parachute small groups in totally uninhabited regions of the frozen taiga, hundreds or even thousands of miles from their rendezvous point. They spend days or weeks on their own, scrounging their food and transport as best they can.

Often special troops from the Interior Ministry are put on the trail of the Spetsnaz trainees - who probably have a better chance than most Russians to evade the KGB. An annual three-month exercise in the Kirovograd region of the Ukraine pits the best Spetsnaz units against each other.

Spetsnaz troops risk death during their realistic training exercises, which include the routine use of deadly chemicals, explosive barrages and live ammunition.

According to U.S. intelligence reports. Spetsnaz training includes infiltration techniques; reconnaissance and target location; survival behind enemy lines; language and customs of target nations, like France or West Germany: clandestine communications; sabotage with explosives, incendiary devices, acids, abrasives and bacteriological weapons; hand-to-hand combat and silent killing methods; skling. mountain-climbing and rigorous physical conditioning and, of course, parachute training.

Spetsnaz parachute training includes conventional static-line drops; high-altitude, low-opening drops, and high-altitude, highopening drops with directional chutes that allow the troopers to drift, undetected by radar, for 30 miles or more behind enemy lines.

Airborne Spetsnaz units prefer silent, ultra-light planes to glide in on an isolated target. They avoid noisy helicopters if at all possible. Naval Spetsnaz use minisubmarines.

In addition to their rifles, pistols, hand grenades and other standard

weaponry, each Spetsnaz unit carries SA-7 anti-aircraft missiles. They are also equipped with R-350M radios with encryption and bursttransmission capabilities - meaning their coded messages are sent in quick, hard-to-detect bursts to a satellite overhead.

Despite reports of Spetsnaz prowess that have come to U.S. intelligence agencies from defectors and other sources, an Army intelligence officer warned that it would be wrong to consider them an unbeatable force that never makes mistakes. "They are not peasants in leg wrappings." he said. "Neither are they 10 feet tall.

In fact, defectors told of one time when the regular army one-upped the Spetsnaz. Staging a sneak attack on a nuclear weapons store in the Far Eastern Military District, the Spetsnaz elite troops were spotted - and humiliated - by the defenders. The alarm sounded and pre-rigged vehicles shone spotlights on the intruders.

Prison Inmate With AIDS Charged With Attempted Murder

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI) — A prison inmate who has tested positive for AIDS was still in jail two days past his scheduled release date after he was charged with attempted murder when he bit a deputy's finger.

Instead of being released. Kelly Dobbins, 26, of San Francisco was arraigned and held without bond after he bit the finger of deputy Harold Bennett. Dobbins has tested positive for AIDS four times.

"Before they could complete the paperwork for my release, they just came out of the blue with these charges," he told the Fort Lauderdale News/Sun-Sentinel Sunday. "I feel like I'm losing my mind. I'm not psychotic, but I still can't believe I've been charged with this."

Bennett, who was on duty as a jail guard at the time of the attack, tested negative for the fatal illness, which destroys the body's natural immune system.

Dobbins was serving time in Orange County for a 1982 grand theft charge and was transferred to Broward County jail in April for violating probation.

The violation was dismissed last week by Circuit Judge Lawrence Korda and Dobbins prepared for release Saturday.

Her alleged attacker Timothy Wallace, 19, a red-haired dishwasher who said he was born in Baltimore, Md., was arrested late Thursday and charged with kidnapping, attempted murder and auto theft. Broward County Circuit Judge Joseph E. Price refused bond Saturday.

Extradition Eyed In Murders

COCOA (UPI) — Brevard County authorities said they would file extradition papers Tuesday to have a man returned from Pennsylvania for prosecution in the fatal shooting and burning of two Cape Canaveral roommates.

Robert Anthony Smith, 37, of Merritt Island is held without ball in the Monroe County Jail at Stroudsburg, Pa., on two counts of first-degree murder, authorities said.

Smith is accused of shooting to death Floyd Breckenridge, 31, and Patrick Haddenman, 32, at Smith's home in Brevard County May 16, driving the bodies in his 1977 pickup truck into Osceola County and setting the remains ablaze in a remote area of the Descret Ranch.

A motorist alerted the ranch of a brush fire, and ranch hands discovered the victims amid the small fire early May 17. The pickup truck was found 100 yards from the charred corpses, pointing a finger at Smith, according to Brevard County sheriff's Cmdr. S.R. "Speedy" DeWitt.

DeWitt said the arrest late Friday resulted from "damn good investigating" by sheriff's agent Sam Collins, who learned Smith might be fleeing toward the Pocono Mountains where he has relatives.

FBI Investigates Miami Police

MIAMI (UPI) - FBI officials investigating corruption in the Miami Police Department are concentrating their probe on whether law enforcement officers profited from narcotics smuggling or illegal lotteries, a report said.

Federal agents received some help in their inquiry after they subpoenaed records on 25 present and former police officers, some of whom hold high positions in the department, the Miami Herald said Sunday.

Ranking officials included assistant chief Alfredo Bared, a top candidate for the job of police chief last year. Col. Walter Martinez, assigned to the police chief's office, and Col. Guillermo Zamora, supervisor of the 330 officers assigned to street patrols.

"I'm extremely disappointed, because nobody has bothered to ask me anything," Zamora said. "I don't really know what's going on. I do certainly know that somebody should talk to me."

Martinez worked in the anti-terrorist squad of the Special Investigation Section, which handles major narcotics cases, in 1977. At least 15 people named in the subpoena have been involved in that operation. It answers directly to the Chief of Police.

Role Of Women, Blacks Covered Better

History Books 'Smartened Up' Citizens Review Panal Says

NEW YORK (UPI) — The new generation of American history books tiptoe around religion and need more background on minorities but the texts are better than earlier "dumbed-down" versions, a review panel said.

A study of 31 textbooks for junior and senior high school students was made by People for the American Way. a 250,000-member non-partisan citizens group working to protect constitutional liberties.

The report card from the "Looking at History" panel of five historians and educators rated 13 new texts "good to excellent," 12 "satisfactory" and six "poor."

The critics called earlier editions "dumbed-down" — oversimplified to the point of being inadequate. But the educators said the new crop of history books were "smartened up." with more than half of the texts doing a relatively good job of covering the role of women and blacks.

"While the new texts offer better coverage of most subjects, they neglect topics ranging from religion to some racial and ethnic minorities," the report said, citing poor coverage of Hispanics and Asian-Americans.

Asian-Americans.

"This new crop of books shows that the national trend towards 'dumbing down' textbooks appears to have been reversed. But the poor coverage of religion is evidence that textbook publishers are still gun-shy about certain controversial topics." said Anthony Podesta, president of

People for the American Way.

"The fact is, you can't understand American history without understanding the important part that religious institutions have played in shaping our society," Podesta said.

Despite the criticisms regarding coverage of religion, racial and ethnic minorities, the panel noted:

• 51 percent of the books do a good job of covering controversial periods in American history, such as the Civil War, Resconstruction, and the Great Depression.

 45 percent do a good job of stimulating students' intellectual curiosity by asking thoughtprovoking questions.

 61 percent offer relatively good coverage of the role of women and blacks.

Among the books rated good to excellent were: "A History of the United States to 1877" (Coronado); "A History of the United States Since 1861 (Ginn); "Land of Promise, Vol. 1: A History of the United States to 1877" (Scott, Foresman); "Triumph of the American Nation" (Harcourt Brace Jovanovich).

Among the satisfactory: "United States History, Vol. 1: Beginnings through Reconstruction" (Charles E. Merrill): "American Spirit. A History of the United States" (Allyn & Bacon).

Among the poor: "A History of the Republic, Vol. 2: Reconstruction to the Present" (Prentice-Hall); "Heritage of Freedom. Vol. 2: History of the United States from 1877" (Scribner Educational; MacMillan.

What seemed to be a negative has turned out to be a positive." said Boston assistant coach Jimmy Rodgers after Sunday's practice. "It forced them to go to another level of their depth."

The top pick in the 1976 draft. Lucas played 65 games for the Rockets this season before his drug problem resurfaced, and he was released. Six-foot-8 swingman Robert Reid took his place. and Houston has a lineup with 6-6 Lewis Lloyd as the smallest starter.

Lucas averaged 15.5 points and had 8.8 assists per game, seventh-best in the league this year. At Sunday's practice in Boston Garden, Reid agreed defense was where his presence would be felt.

John and take it to him. Now they'd have to just go into their regular offense." said Reid, one of two Rockets left from the 1981 championship loss to the Celtics.

"If you pressure Robert Reid, he'll give it to Lewis Lloyd to bring it up, if you pressure him. he'll give it to Rodney McCray." said Ainge. 
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
