### John A. Haziford, Chain Food Store Head, Dies At 79

NEW YORK. Sept. 21—(A)— John A. Hartford, 79, chairmand of the board of the A. & P. Chain Food Stores, died yesterday after a heart attack in a Manhattan skyscraper elevator. Hartford succumbed after he

stepped into an elevator on the fifth floor of the Chrysler Building. He had been attending a board meeting of the Chrysler Corn., of which he was a director. The A. & P,-the Great Atlan-tic and Pacific Tea Company-was founded by his father, George Huntisgton Hartford, in 1853. with a single store on New York's lower east side. The business then was called the "Great Amer-

ican Tea Co."

The son conceived the idea of an "economy store," which he opened in Newark, N. J., in 1912. This lifes developed into more than 15,000 stores in 1935, when the super-market method was in-troduced and food store consolida-tions stasted. There way are about 4.700 A. & P. stores. Long known as a "mystery man" of big business because he shun-ned publicity, Hartford hit the headlines in 1945 when he said he

loaned Ellintt Ronsevelt \$200,000 in 1939 and finally settled the debt for \$4,000. The son of the late President Roosevelt then was interested in Texas radio chain. The matter became a political football before the House Ways and Means Committee allowed Hartford a tax deduction on his \$190,000 loss, Hartford was known as "Mr.

John" to the thousands of A. & P. employes. He frequently visited as many as 3,000 of the company's stores in a single year.



### Robinson First Boxer To Lose, Regain Title Between Ratings

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21-(P)- Sugar Ray Robinson today is the first boxer in the 31-year history of National Boxing Association ratings system to lose and regain his title in a three month period between NBA announcements of last standings.

In releasing its third-quarter ratings for this year, the NBA said only In releasing its third-quarter rating one other fighter equaled the feat.

Stanley Ketchel, Grand Rapids, Mich., lost his middleweight crown by a knockout to Billy Papke on Sept. 7, 1908, and knocked out Papke on Nov. 26 of the same year to regain the title. NBA did not begin its rating system until 1920.
