WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Britain and any political group running it may be in for a bad time this winter...

The British elections of 1948 Clement Attlee's Labor Party handed Winston Churchill's Conservatives a whopping defeat...

This was a green light to the Labor government to go ahead with its programs. With its big majority, it was able to push them through...

The nationalized, or socialized, bank of England, the coal industry, railroads and long-distance trucking, the electric and gas service, all civil aviation, the cable and wireless services...

To hold down food prices and the cost of living, it had established a "Food Control" office...

But with its big majority in Commons, the Labor Party stayed in the saddle. Then came 1950, five years after the previous elections...

Churchill's Conservatives promised to halt the march toward more socialization of industry but indicated it would undo very little of the socializing already accomplished...

The betting was that in the elections of February, 1950, the Laborites would win again. And they did. But by a startlingly small margin...

Attlee's own party has been split a bit by opposition from within the ranks. And, in addition to its other problems of getting the back to normal, British members of the Atlantic Pact, has to arm and re-arm, meaning more money the government has to spend, more expenses...

All that, together with the prospect of food and fuel shortages and labor unrest, confronts Attlee with a winner which may be severe economically and politically. No matter what happens, Britain will have to keep her lights brightened...

Since his administration still has four years to run and since he still has a majority of six votes in Commons, Attlee might try to sweat it out until 1955...

But far sooner than that he might have found himself defeated through a switch in votes on a vital issue. And when that happens, he'll have to ask for elections anyway...

When a British ruling party has only a slim majority or is outvoted, it faces the question: Does it still represent the wishes of the people or have the people lost confidence in it?

In Britain—unlike this country where politicians hold office for a fixed period, no matter what happens—the only way to get the answer on this confidence is to call for elections and let the people vote at once...

That's what Attlee did yesterday. The elections will be Oct. 25. He may lose. He seems to have decided that before Oct. 25 he had better get the job done...

Army Orders Beef Bids From Nations Outside Red Bloc

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The Army today ordered the purchase of up to 10,000,000 pounds of beef in foreign countries outside the Soviet Bloc...

Major packers refused to submit bids, citing government price controls and a shortage of high quality beef as the reason...

The Army order authorizing the purchase of beef in foreign markets was issued today by Under Secretary Arnehlaid Alexander...

An Army spokesman said the order was designed to "insure an uninterrupted flow of meat to Army, Navy and Air Force personnel overseas who are normally supplied from eastern seaboard points"

The Army did not specify any particular countries where the beef would be purchased. It said it was asking bids from representatives of all potential suppliers of large quantities of beef in countries other than those in the Soviet Bloc...

This apparently could include such countries as Argentina, one of the world's biggest producers. Germany, Spain and other Western European and South American Nations...

The invitation for the bids will be issued through the Army's quartermaster center in Chicago. The Department of the Army in announcing last week the call into active duty of two more National Guard Divisions for early 1952, with four months advance notice, confirms the press statement made recently by Major General Mark W. Lanes, Adjutant General of Florida, that employers of officers and enlisted men of the Florida National Guard are protected against sudden termination of civilian employment to perform emergency duties in National service...

National businessmen who are employees or self employed may plan on not being disturbed in their civilian occupation for at least a year, stated General Lanes. No major troop units of the Florida National Guard will be called into active military service before late next year at the earliest, he said.

Ambulances carried about 85 injured to hospitals. The train was the Liverpool-to-London Express, derailed at a point about eight miles west of Northampton in the industrial Midlands...

The accident cut off communications between the Rugby railway division headquarters and the scene, because the derailed train knocked down telegraph and telephone lines along the right of way. The locomotive and 11 of the 19 coaches left the rails at Stone "Tunnel," just east of Rugby, on a steeply rising embankment.

A press report said an American died, but that his name was not known. The first passenger coach was "crushed" late in the afternoon and an eye-witness. The second coach was sliced in two.

Police, firemen and neighboring residents rushed to the scene for rescue work and tried to injure from the wreckage. Ambulances rushed the injured to nearby hospitals.

This was the fourth serious accident of Britain's nationalized railways this year. In the earlier accidents a total of 57 persons died and 103 were injured. The train involved in today's crash was carrying about 700 persons, nearly half of whom arrived in Liverpool by ship from Belfast, Northern Ireland, this morning.

The first casualties were taken to Daventry Hospital. As the beds there became filled other injured were rushed to Northampton.

Taft's Grand Forks talk was billed in advance by his aides as a major farm address. The Ohioan has said he won't decide until later in the year whether he will actively seek the 1952 Republican presidential nomination.

Taft said he regards minimum price supports for any commodity as generally inconsistent with the free price competitive system, but he added he believes "special considerations justify a farm support price program at a reasonable level, just as I also believe they justify a minimum wage."

"Nothing is so likely to start a depression as a disastrous fall in farm prices," he said. "I believe that at some point the government should take steps to prevent any such dangerous drop in farm prices and to maintain them at other reasonable relation to other prices."

Taft said supports ought not to be too high, lest they bring acreage limitations and marketing quotas on every major product.

"Under a government guarantee of 100 per cent of parity on all products as recently proposed, the farmer will be told not only how many acres he can plant of what, but also how many beans, but even how many hogs he can raise, how many dairy cattle he can keep," he declared.

"If effect the Department of Agriculture would be telling every farmer in detail how he must run his own farm just exactly as the Labor-Socialist government runs the farms and farmers in England."

Taft praised cooperatives as "just as much private enterprise as a private utility." Comparing cooperatives with labor unions, he said they ought not to get so big they can dictate to the consumers.

John A. Hartford, Chain Food Store Head, Dies At 79

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—(AP)—John A. Hartford, 79, chairman of the board of the A. & P. Chain Food Stores, died yesterday after a heart attack in a Manhattan skyscraper elevator.

Hartford succumbed after he stepped into an elevator on the 5th floor in the Chrysler Building. He had been attending a board meeting of the Chrysler Corp., of which he was a director.

The A. & P.—the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company—was founded by his father, George Huntington Hartford, in 1853. John A. Hartford, in 1912. This idea developed into more than 15,000 stores in 1935, when the super-market method was introduced and food store consolidations started. There now are about 4,700 A. & P. stores.

Lone known as a "mystery man" of big business because he shunned publicity, Hartford hit the headlines in 1948 when he had loaned Elliott Roosevelt \$200,000 in 1939 and finally settled the debt for \$4,000.

The son of the late President Roosevelt then was interested in a Texas radio chain. The matter became a political football before the House Ways and Means Committee allowed Hartford a tax deduction on his \$100,000 loan.

Hartford was known as "Mr. John" to the thousands of A. & P. employees. He frequently visited as many as 2,000 of the company's stores in a single year.

## Alabama Votes Again On Bill To Set Up Rigid Voter Test

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 21—(AP)—Alabama voters who once wrote an anti-Negro amendment into their constitution, then saw it knocked out, will decide soon on another approach to stricter requirements at the polls.

A rigid new test to determine who can vote and who cannot in future elections is to be voted on Dec. 1. It cleared the legislature this summer after false starts in 1949 and 1950.

Written as a substitute for the outlawed Boswell Plan, the pending constitutional amendment would give county boards of registrars broad judicial powers to pass on the fitness of prospective new voters.

It would require those who seek registration, for example, to be of "good character" and to "embrace the duties and obligations of citizenship" under the Federal and state constitutions.

New voters would have to be able to read and write any article of the U. S. Constitution submitted to them by the registrars, and also to pass a written examination prepared by the State Supreme Court.

Further, each applicant would have to take an oath disavowing "any group or party" which advocates overthrow of the government.

Since the Boswell Amendment was outlawed by the U. S. Supreme Court in 1948 on the grounds that it gave registrars a means of discriminating against Negroes, Alabama has had virtually no requirements for voter registration.

As it is now, almost anyone is eligible to register if he can read or write or if he owns \$300 worth of property.

But the \$150 a year poll tax still stands, and a person voting for the first time has to pay the fee.

## Robinson First Boxer To Lose, Regain Title Between Ratings

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21—(AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson today is the first boxer in the 31-year history of National Boxing Association ratings system to lose and regain his title in a three month period between NBA announcements of last standings.

In releasing its third-quarter ratings for this year, the NBA said only one other fighter equaled the feat—Stanley Ketchel, Grand Rapids, Mich., lost his middleweight crown by a knockout to Billy Papke on Sept. 7, 1938, and knocked out Papke on Nov. 28 of the same year to regain the title. NBA did not begin its rating system until 1920.

Turpin was listed as the outstanding boxer in the middleweight division before he lifted the title from Robinson in an amazing upset on July 10.

His rating has sagged to 10-1 in the outstanding boxer 10-10 after his Sept. 21 defeat by Robinson in New York. He is preceded by Dave Sambo, Australia and Laurent Douthuille, France.

In order to make the division champions lay their titles on the line, the NBA said it is mailing written notices to titleholders which in effect order them to defend their titles every six months or forfeit their crowns.

The NBA said enforcement of the rule is aimed at titleholders who look for soft touches or dodge the rule when purses are not suitable.

In the heavyweight group, Massachusetts slugger Sensation Rocky Marciano, moved into the outstanding boxer slot. Aving Jersey Joe Walcott, wears the crown, with ex-champion Ezzard Charles, and Joe Louis listed as logical contenders in that order.

Joe Martin leads in the light heavyweight group. Archie Moore and Harry Matthews are listed as the logical contenders.

California's Irish Bob Murphy is rated as the outstanding boxer in that division.

There are no logical contenders to the middleweight throne now worn securely by Robinson. Dave Sands, holder of three Australian boxing titles, is rated as the outstanding boxer.

Cuba's Kid Gavilan heads the welterweight division. Billy Graham is rated as the logical contender. Graham has dropped two decisions to Gavilan.

Willie Pep, who meets Sandy Saddler in a title bout on Sept. 29 for the featherweight crown, was rated as the logical contender. In three outings with Saddler, Pep has dropped two bouts.

The bantamweight and fly weight divisions are headed by Vic Towel, South Africa and Dado Marino, Hawaii.



### Rural Common Sense

By Sybil Johnson

Florida's corn crop this year is an example of significant progress in agriculture in the state, but it is still far from what farmers should be satisfied with in production of this important food crop.

When he pointed out recently that the crop this year will average 15 bushels per acre and is the best in the history of the state, Agronomist Russell Henderson of the University of Florida Agricultural Extension Service commended farmers and research men for the rapid progress in corn production but also pointed out that the average yields is still one of the lowest in the Southeast.

"Since the average yield of corn in Florida was 11 bushels per acre during the 10-year period beginning in 1936 and ending in 1945," Mr. Henderson said, "our yield of 15 bushels per acre this year is a notable sign of progress. That average of 15 bushels, however, is for the state as a whole, and were it not for the much higher yields obtained by some farmers, it would be less than 15 bushels. Many bushels per acre this year, and those are the farmers who will do well to follow the example set by those who have obtained high yields. Our average yield this year should stimulate many farmers to strive for higher production."

Increased acreage of high-yielding hybrids—such as Dixie 18 (in the development of which the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station played an important part) and North Carolina 27—has been an important factor in corn progress in Florida during the past three or four years. The greatly increased plantings of these hybrids and other cover crops have enriched the soil and have resulted in heavier production. More efficient use of nitrogen fertilizer has been important. More fertile soil as a result of cover crops and better use of fertilizer have made it possible to plant corn more closely than in the past, and the high-

yielding hybrids have responded well to the improved soil conditions.

"All of those factors," the agronomist averred, "are responsible for the notably larger yields obtained by farmers who used them to advantage and also for our increased state average, but there are many farmers who are not using them and are not obtaining satisfactory yields. It is to be hoped that those who are not doing so already will plant winter cover crops this year, use fertilizer more efficiently with their crops next year, and plant one of the proven hybrid varieties."

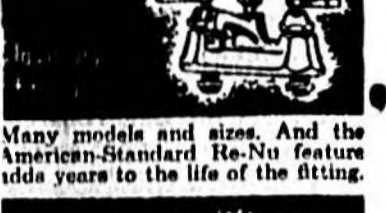
