## Sheriff's office readies for next citizens academy

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Community Law Enforcement Academy's next session is set to begin Wednesday, April 21, with expanded offerings, with traffic and DUI enforcement added to the course outline.

The purpose of the Community Law Enforcement Academy is to educate the citizens of Seminole County in the concepts and procedures of law enforcement. It is now a 15-week course, with the addition of traffic and DUI enforcement added to the mix. It uses scenario-based training, which will allow students to participate in important problem solving that is vital in law enforcement and crime prevention.

The course also includes: riding on patrol with a deputy; observing telecommunications personnel in the communications center; and a morning on the gun range, using some of the sheriff's office weapons.

The class meets each Wednesday evening from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Members of the sheriff's office teach it. It is free and there are no physical requirements to participate.

There are, however, some terms and conditions. Participants must live or work in Seminole County, must be 19 years old or older, possess a valid driver's license, and never have been convicted of a felony. They must file an application with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

# First Street project hits funding snag

Bids for the renovation project are at least \$1 million over budget

SANFORD — Plans to renovate downtown Sanford's main thoroughfare hit a speed bump, but city officials remain confident the project will not be substantially delayed.

Bids for the 1st Street renovation project came in well over the budget allotted by

the Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA), with one being double what the CRA's consultant had predicted.

"We're going to regroup and see what our options

are," said Chris Smith, the city's manager for capital projects.

Two companies, Wharton Smith Inc. of Sanford and Gomez Construction of Winter Park, submitted qual-

ified bids to replace stormwater and electrical infrastructure under 1st Street from Sanford Avenue to Oak Avenue. The bids also included extensive streetscape work including rebricking

portions of the street, widening sidewalks and installing landscaping and street lights. A third company submitted a bid but failed to meet city qualifications.

Wharton Smith submitted a bid of \$3.4 million, double the CRA's \$1.7 million budget. Gomez's bid was \$2.7 million.

## Schools rezoning to be considered again

SANFORD — After months of planning and listening to public concern, the Seminole County School Board on Tuesday will entertain more public comment on the latest proposal, dubbed "Plan C," of an elementary school attendance rezoning map affecting students in the Geneva, Oviedo, Winter Springs, Altamonte Springs and other central and southeast areas.

Students at Heathrow, who were part of an earlier plan, will not be affected.

Continued growth and the opening of two new schools in Seminole County are spurring the attendance zone changes.

Both Layer Elementary in Winter Springs at state roads 419 and 434 and Walker Elementary in Chuluota will open in August to relieve crowding, but parents are concerned about their children leaving established environments.

The most affected students currently attend Geneva, Bear Lake, Evans, Partin, Winter Springs and Highlands elementary schools. Parents of Geneva Elementary

School students are concerned about the number of students — 393 — being transferred to Walker. However, 236 students will be transferred to Geneva, giving the school an overall student reduction of

## Church expansion worries neighbors

LONGWOOD — A property switch with the Northland Community Church fell through Monday for the Longwood City Commission, but the church may have bigger worries as City Hall was packed with disgruntled residents of Columbus Harbor.

Earlier this month, the city and church worked out a 99-year lease that would have the city trade about 2.5 acres of city-owned land near the Columbus Harbor neighborhood in exchange for a similar sized plot fronting Dog Track Road.

The church currently leases a portion of the city property near the subdivision adjacent to Fairy Lake at the intersection of Dog Track Road and U.S. Highway 17-92.

According to city officials, the church decided not to switch properties at the public hearing last week, as they

feared the loss of too much parking. With circulating rumors of future Northland Community Church expansion, nearby residents sounded off on the city lease.

"We have a great deal of issues that pertain to our property values," said Robert Corum of Bartholomew Way in Columbus Harbor.

"One thing I want to stress is we want the church to expand. We don't want to stop them from that and we want the city to get what it wants...but we don't want it to be at our expense."

The open land near the Columbus Harbor neighborhood is designated to be a park by its future land use. City officials said they asked residents in the 1996 if they would want a park built near their neighborhood, but they refused citing several concerns, including parking.

## Seeing green: St. Patrick's Day is every day at Sanford pub

SANFORD — Nestled in the heart of Sanford a small slice of the 'Emerald Isle' can be found. The Emerald Hen Pub opened three months ago and the Irish way is proving popular with city residents.

St. Patrick's Day was a big night for owner Heather Moore. "The place was packed," she said, "It was a crack."

One customer estimated that 200 people had come through the door. It was so busy that some of her regulars volun-

teered to wash glasses to keep pace with demand.

"We're a kind of family," said Moore.

People clearly appreciate the atmosphere of the place. Sanford resident, Neil Myers, described The Hen as "our local pub" and explained how Moore remembers her customers' names and drink of choice.

As befits an Irish pub, she serves Guinness, of course, along with other imported beers like Old Speckled Hen, Boddingtons and Harp.

The Emerald Hen is located downtown in a building that

laid empty for 15 years. Moore has given it a new lease of life.

There are tables and chairs outside the Celtic style frontage, and she has remodeled the interior to give the place a cozy feel. Sawdust strewn across the floor, red armchairs by the fireplace, and the most docile bouncer you'll ever meet — a dog called Reilly — aim to make you feel at home. Green clover leaves decorate the walls and board games on the bookcase are there for the playing.

About six weeks after she was named manager of the theater, Kim Nelson submitted her resignation on Tuesday. You'll recall that Nelson replaced Ron Rose, who resigned in November. Unlike Rose, whose departure was rather messy, Nelson said she is parting amicably with the theater's leading diva, Helen Stairs.

"I'm not leaving under the same circumstances as Ron," Nelson was quick to point out. "I'm not leaving in an acrimonious way."

So why is Nelson leaving? "This is a job for a single person who is younger than me," she laughed.

"I severely underestimated the time and overtime needed for this job," she said. "Someone can tell you about how much time is involved, and you can read a job description; but until you actually get into it, you would not believe the number of hours involved."

In addition to operating the box office everyday and taking care of day-to-day operations, Nelson was on duty at the theater during every show.

"There is no one other than me to do the job," she noted.

"I was on a 90-day probation period, and you know, that works both ways," Nelson said. "The job was taking a serious toll on my family life. I made the decision that before I got to deeply involved and before the organization became to dependent on me that I should resign."

Nelson said she is not leaving the theater entirely. She may continue to consult, particularly on fund-raising issues. And she wants to help promote the theater, possibly by writing arts-based articles for *The Herald*.

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## New I-4 westbound lane to open Monday

A third lane on Interstate 4 westbound from Dirksen Drive to Lake Mary Boulevard will open in time for rush hour traffic on Monday, March 22.

Construction crews began the process this week of opening the lane by removing orange barrels and opening the westbound third lane on Interstate 4 from east of State Road 46 to Lake Mary Boulevard.

The project has been in two

phases, both under the same contractors, and includes the new St. Johns River bridge. Locally, the project, which includes widening of Interstate 4 to six lanes between Lake Mary Boulevard and the U.S. Highway 17-92 intersection at the St. Johns River, started in September 2002.

The other phase is the six laning of Interstate 4 from between Dirksen Drive to U.S. Highway

17-92 in Volusia County, which got underway in March of 2001.

The eastbound lanes however, in this same area, between Dirksen Drive and Lake Mary Boulevard, will not be opened completely until May. Bridge work at Padgett Creek, Dirksen Drive and the Enterprise Road overpass will prevent opening eastbound lanes all the way to Saxon Boulevard before the summer completion time of the project.

## Camping Talk

*Modern conveniences have changed the way we camp*

Did the headline turn you off? Did you immediately decide this isn't for you? Personally, I think it is for you, especially if you are a family (and most of us are). I recall talking to a friend of mine in North Carolina about camping.

"I spent too much time in a tent in the Army," he said (World War II). "The last thing I want to do now is go out in another tent and think of it as fun."

He is partially correct. Going out in the wilderness and staying in a small tent, especially in a rain shower, cold weather, or with bugs and snakes to worry about, isn't my idea of a fun time. But camping can be so much more than that. Talk about tents — our sporting goods stores have unbelievable tents these days — some even with separate bedrooms, screened-in porches and many other attributes.

Most of them can be put up in less than an hour, some in only a few minutes. One no longer needs to cram a family of four or five into a small tent where people end up sleeping on top of each other and have no room to dress or relax.

If you don't have a tent, and consider the purchase of one of those large ones too expensive, most campgrounds have cabins you can rent. With a cabin, all you need to do is bring your bedding in addition to regular needs. They are rainproof, and many have air conditioning. Some even have a front porch with a swing, and if they are located on the water, you can sit on the porch and fish to your heart's delight. The cost is slightly higher than a normal campsite, but much below the cost of a motel room might be.

Then there are the camping trailers, motor homes, pop-ups and other type of movable campers. If you don't own one, these can often be rented. Talk about modern convenience, they can have TV sets, ovens and cook tops, heat and air, even refrigerators. Don't worry about a bathroom — most campgrounds have excellent and clean facilities, complete with showers. You can check on their cleanliness before you obtain a campsite. If they're not to your standards, look for another campground.

While I personally know more about KOA campgrounds, there are many others, such as Good Sam's which are excellent choices.

What I suggest is taking the entire family, right down to the baby, and even the dog (many campgrounds allow you to bring a dog — on a leash).

Then select a campground which has something to do nearby. These can be historic sites, special parks, entertainment complexes, a beach, or some feature your family will enjoy visiting between the camp times.

If you don't mind spending some money, don't want to travel too far, and want a campground that is REALLY special, visit Fort Wilderness at Disney World. The camping facilities are large, wooded, paved, well lit, and bus transportation is available to almost everywhere. Talk about things to do, you can ride the boats to the major hotels, visit the petting zoo, rent horses, bikes or golf carts for riding, and the great Hoop-De-Doo Review (for an additional charge).

As long as the surroundings are clean and well-kept, it doesn't really matter where you go. You can stay overnight or for a week at various campgrounds. The main aim is to provide your entire family to an outing with nature as well as things to do. Everyone will enjoy it, and although it may seem a busy time when you first try it, soon, it becomes a real joy and fun for one and all.

Regarding all of this talk that President Bush took us into war with inadequate intelligence, I offer the following thoughts.

I pursued a military career for 34 1/2 years, retiring on Jan. 1, 1971. During the time of my service I was taught something like this. In combat, intelligence regarding the enemy, his strengths, his weaknesses, his plans and intentions, are seldom as adequately known as a commander would wish — for the enemy does his best to deceive us.

So, the commander has his Intelligence Officer (S-2 at lower levels, G-2 at higher ones) brief him on the enemy situation as best as known and can be determined. Then, he has his Operations Officer (S-3 or G-3) brief him on the various possible lines of operation his command could take, considering all available intelligence. Although the commander might wish for greater intelligence that is known, the commander must decide as to which course of action seems to be the most favorable one.

Some of us learned this in WW-II. I believe it was from observing the Germans, that a poor plan vigorously pursued may produce better success than a perfect plan weakly or inadequately pursued. Delaying while the enemy gets his side in a better position is not always a good solution. As for intelligence, the allies themselves, took actions to make Hitler believe that the D-Day invasion would come at a different place than that which was really planned, thereby causing German troop strengths at the real D-Day invasion points to be lowered.

So, how does all of this apply to the present situation? It tells us that regardless of whether or not Saddam and his bad guys already had WMD or were only trying to get ready to make them (Weapons of Mass Destruction), President Bush was right to go after them. Why wait until they are better prepared to do us in with a bigger 9/11?

In WW-II the Allied successes taught the Germans under Hitler and the Japanese under their Emperor that it was very unhealthy for them to go after the United States. The terrorist bombings using our own passenger planes was, I am convinced, enough to justify our troops going to teach today's

terrorists a lesson, NOW before they can become better prepared to attack our land.

So, I say in the coming Presidential Election, vote to keep President George W. Bush and his staff in office. Another saying goes like this: "Don't change horses in mid-stream."

Therefore, I say, "Vote for President Bush."

Since I received a number of calls from citizens wondering if I had resigned from my city commissioner position or perhaps been removed my request was to use the power of the press consistently to not unintentionally confuse readers. Regrettably, my comments were taken by *The Herald* editor to mean something I had not intended. For that I am indeed sorry for any misunderstanding. I never called to complain regarding Jan's article. In fact, I am very proud to have nominated her for deputy mayor. She has done an excellent job and is a credit to Lake Mary and our local community.

Around the Clock states that Commissioner Jernigan's term was up in November 2003. For her elected term that was indeed correct (She was re-elected without opposition — again a credit to her), but we

did not have a change of the deputy mayor "guard" until Feb. 4, 2004. Frankly there was no urgent need to consider a new deputy mayor as Jan was doing a great job. Certainly there was no one "itching" to remove her. In our Strategic Planning Meeting on Feb. 2, the Lake Mary City Commission unanimously decided to elect a new deputy mayor at our next scheduled meeting on Feb. 4, 2004. I would never make a statement that would lower the position of Commissioner to second-tier status. I have to much respect for my colleagues George Duryea, Gary Brender and Jan Jernigan whom I mentioned

earlier.

It was not my intent at all to focus attention on myself (as you have inferred) but to have the information presented correctly to the readers of your newspaper and particularly to the citizens of Lake Mary who count on the *Herald* for accurate local information. Your comparison of myself and Deputy Barney Fife from "The Andy Griffith Show" was amusing and, I feel, accurate in ways you probably didn't intend. Anyone who has ever watched the show knows that Deputy Fife — crazy as he can be sometimes — is fiercely loyal to his immediate superior, Sheriff Andy Taylor. My feelings are similar for Mayor Thom Greene. Your description of "cool-headed" is only one of the many positive attributes he possesses in abundance. # President George W. Bush's campaign ads hit the mark

At last George W. Bush is doing what he needs to do to win this election — run ads that explain John Kerry's liberalism to moderate swing voters.

And the Bush ads are very good. He focuses on three lines of attack: Kerry's advocacy of a "\$900 billion tax increase," his support for weakening the Patriot Act and his commitment to awaiting United Nations approval before "defending America."

Particularly clever is the tax-increase charge. Throughout the Democratic primary, Kerry competed with his fellow candidates to denounce the Bush tax cut and to urge its repeal. Now Bush has turned the rescinding of a tax reduction into a tax increase.

The sunset provisions the Democrats agreed to include in the tax cut legislation specify that the cuts automatically expire in 2005 and 2006,

making them highly relevant in the election. While Bush has never had a convincing majority in favor of his tax cuts, over 80 percent of Americans oppose a tax increase.

Kerry's answer is weak. In a rebuttal ad, the Democrat just says it ain't so without elaborating.

Kerry's commercial says "John Kerry has never called for a \$900 billion tax increase. He wants to cut taxes for the middle class."

But voters are inclined to believe that Kerry does want to raise taxes, and they have heard the Democrat exhortate the Bush tax cuts in his speeches for

a year. So Kerry has to do more than just deny the charge. The Bush attack will hit home and score deeply.

Kerry doesn't even answer the other two charges: That he would weaken the Patriot Act and await United Nations approval before acting against terrorism. These two attacks will open up a big distance between Bush and Kerry over terrorism. While the issue now works as a positive for the president, it has yet to come into play as a negative for the Democrat.

By charging that Kerry would weaken homeland security on Kerry, Bush is framing the issue in the best possible way. With the recent horrific bombings in Madrid and the consequent rising insecurity over terrorism in the United States, any imputation that Kerry would undermine our defenses will cut deeply into the Democrat's vote

share.

And Bush cleverly avoids the issue of weapons of mass destruction and says that the real issue is whether the United States should preserve the ability to defend herself or if we must first wait for the United Nations to permit us to do so. By framing the issue this way, Bush is tapping into American distrust of internationalism and of the United Nations in particular.

The fact that Kerry is not answering these two charges plays into Bush's hands. A charge that goes unanswered is one that is, in effect, admitted in our modern political dialogue.

Kerry is making a huge mistake in letting Bush hit him without a response on this critical issue. But to respond puts Kerry in the position of engaging with Bush over the Republican's strongest issue and distracting atten-

tion from the economy, which the Democrats would rather debate. The Bush attack puts Kerry on the spot. Either he lets this attack stand and suffers the consequences or he makes terrorism the central issue of the campaign and hurts himself that way.

But the key event in the presidential race this week happened 3,000 miles away. The terrorist bombing in Spain will reawaken Americans' fears and their sense that terrorism is not going away. This reminder will make voters think longer and harder before they trust the presidency to a man who they do not think is up to the job of battling al Qaeda.

The conventional wisdom is that the election will be close, a replay of 2000. Not if Bush keeps attacking and Kerry fails to respond. Then it will be a replay of 1988.

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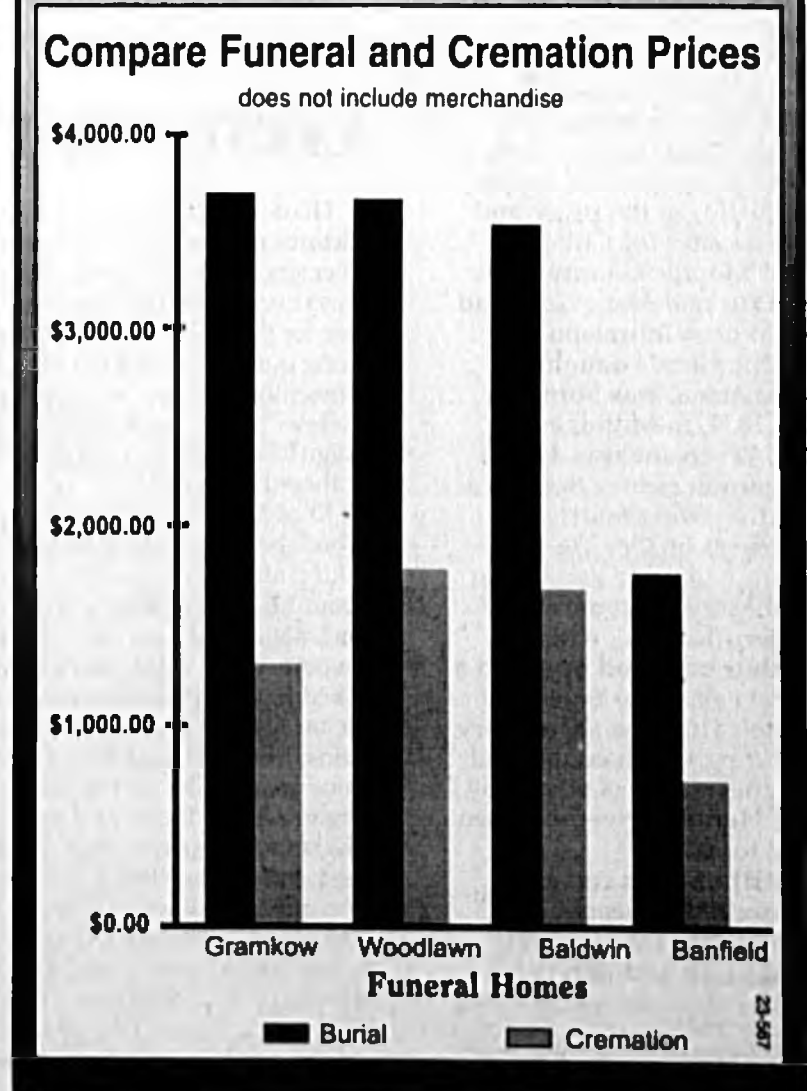

## The Way We Were: Speer family was involved in city's past

"Memories of Seminole County Families, 1850-1945," published by the Seminole County Historical Society, includes several excellent family histories, one of which is that of the Speer family, written by Thomas A. Speer. I have edited this for you to enjoy.

### Memories of Dr. Algernon Speer and his family

William Speer served in the American Revolutionary War as a scout under Col. Pickens at the Battle of '96

..... in upper South Carolina. He was captured by the British and imprisoned in Charleston; he later escaped to serve again. After the war, the state of South Carolina issued him a land grant on the Savannah River known as Cherokee Heights.

..... William Speer's third child, Alexander, was a frontiersman, planter, politician, lawyer, Methodist minister, journalist and family man. He was a highly respected member of South Carolina politics. He served as secretary of state and comptroller for South Carolina from 1826 to 1829 and served four terms in the South Carolina House of Representatives. He was also a personal friend of Andrew Jackson, who would later serve as president of the United States.

Alexander Speer opposed John C. Calhoun's movement for the Nullification Resolution adopted in the legislature in the 1830s. This resolution was the beginnings of the sentiment for secession which later resulted in the War Between the States.

Alexander Speer's son, Algernon Sidney, like his siblings, was born on his family's homestead on South Carolina in 1818. The exact location of the plantation is unknown, but it may have been part of the large William Speer plantation on the Savannah River. The family raised numerous crops, operated a grist mill and ran a general store.

In 1832, Alexander Speer moved his family to Culloden, Monroe County, Ga. after he had resigned as secretary of state. He had become bitter about the nullification movement and forgoing politics, became a highly regarded Methodist minister, serving numerous churches in central Georgia. He was later editor of the *LaGrange Methodist* newspaper.

While in Culloden, the Speer family became good friends with Arthur and Mary Ginn. Arthur Ginn, an avid peach grower, served as justice of the peace and postmaster for Culloden and Monroe County. Both Arthur and Mary Ginn had been born in Ireland.

The Ginn's daughter, Christiana, was born July 13, 1831, in Millidgeville, Ga. When she was 14 and Algernon Sidney Speer was 17, they were married in Marietta on Oct. 20, 1835.

In the late 1830s, Arthur and Mary Ginn moved to Enterprise, Fla., where Arthur built and operated a hotel called the Enterprise Hotel. This was a two-story building which could hold 20 guests. It was visited by Cal Hunter's riverboat men and tourists.

Arthur Ginn served as justice of the peace and postmaster for Mosquito County, in addition to his duties as owner of his hotel.

# SCOUTING FOR POTATOES, TRASH

## Three Seminole County Boy and Cub Scout troops serve the community with state forest clean-up project

**LAKE COUNTY** — About a dozen Boy and Cub Scouts from three different troops in Seminole County journeyed across the county line last weekend for an air potato raid.

Near the Wekiva River in the Seminole State Forest, Scouts from Sanford, Casselberry, Winter Springs and Altamonte Springs gathered up several large garbage bags of the air potatoes.

Native to tropical Asia, the air potato, or *Dioscorea bulbifera*, can quickly engulf native vegetation in natural areas, climbing high into tree canopies. It produces large numbers of "potatoes" or bulbils, which facilitate its spread and make it extremely difficult to eliminate because new plants sprout from about every potato.

In addition to their search of the air potato, Scouts also rounded up a heap of trash that included a set of tires, three hot water tanks and an old television.

"The rangers said don't worry about the garbage, but I can't see Scouts leaving garbage behind," said Scout Master Daniel Leonhardt of Cub Scout Pack 692 in Casselberry.

"Anything and everything is out here," he said to the scouts as he held up a pair of discarded sunglasses reminding them to be careful as they searched for air potatoes.

The clean-up event was organized by Leonhardt and was also attended by two other troops from Sanford and Altamonte Springs. The Saturday morning event began with Leonhardt pointing out the air potatoes as he said "you know what this is guys? This is a potato vine."



Many of the scouts were very familiar with the air potato, as they had previously worked in the Black Hammock area to rid the county preserve of the invading weed. They frequently sacrifice their free time for community clean ups to help them earn world conservation awards and eagle projects.

Along for the community project was the Cub Scouts' fellow Boy Scout Troop 543 of Sanford, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. As did several Sanford Boy Scouts make the trip so did other Cub Scouts from Altamonte Springs Pack 237.

"We even had siblings that came out (to help)," said Nicky Dreibeis of the Sanford troop. "It's really good how everybody pulls together on a weekend to help out."

# Geneva readers speak out and it's all 'trash talk'

I have few pet peeves, but the one that disturbs me the most is people who litter. Ever since those commercials ran when I was younger with the Indian who shed a tear for the landscape blight that is trash along our roadways, I have felt that way. Remember "Give a Hoot - Don't Pollute?" How about the "Pitch In" campaign? For a time, it seemed that litter bothered everyone.

Knowing last Wednesday that I would be spending the next several days hiking and camping in the unspeakably beautiful Florida that is Desert Ranch, and that I would not have much time to prepare the coming week's column, I asked readers to sound off about the litter on Geneva's roadways and natural lands. The topic had been on my mind since an attendee at the recent Geneva Organizations Picnic had expressed his disgust and concern about the filth-covered state of State Road 46 from Geneva to Sanford and asked that the issue be addressed in "Stetson's Corner."

He was evidently not the only one who feels our slogan "Seminole County — Florida's Natural Choice" needs some cleaning up to make it so. Here's what

Seminole County trash transport trucks. It's going to happen.

I think the solution is for Seminole County to provide a dedicated trash maintenance team that would patrol: 1. State Road 46 from County Road 415 to Osceola Road. 2. Osceola Road from State Road 46 to the landfill entrance. 3. County Road 426 from Lockwood to State Road 46. I'm sure there are other routes through Geneva that need to be patrolled. Let me know how I can help. I often pick up trash along Cemetery Road and along First Street to Geneva Elementary. That's more often littering

from kids on their way to school. The real issue is that we are on the way to the landfill. The county needs to provide some extra services for the blight they are incurring on our community."

"The litter on Geneva's roadways bothers the heck out of me and I have even stopped to pick it up from time to time, not that it matters because it is right back in a week or so. We live in such a beautiful community and it really makes me mad that folks treat it like a garbage dump. It is not just the major roadways either, I ride my horse through this community all the time and find places where folks have apparently just come out and dumped their garbage in what they thought was an out of the way spot. If they can take the time to find an out of the way spot in Geneva why the heck can't they just go that little extra distance and take it to the dump? It would be really nice if the county would come out and clean up around here but it would be even nicer if folks would respect our community and put their trash where it belongs in the first place."

"It seems to me that 46 is a MESS and a lot of it leading into Sanford is

because of all the TRUCKS going to the LANDFILL!! Osceola Road is a MESS with TRASH all in the ditches and on the road. It is because of the TRASH TRUCKS and they do not keep their load covered like it should be. As to solving this problem I did call the Road Department and for a few months it was better and the county did have work crews out here cleaning it up and then they slacked off and I guess it is time to call them again...With all the work that was done at the Vault, every week we stop by and pick up the TRASH that is dumped off there. Maybe it might be worth time to get my video camera and take some moving pictures of the trash flying off the trash trucks— It might take a day or two but it would be well worth it. I am sure that on trash pick up day I could get plenty of proof where most of the trash is coming from, at least on Osceola Road. If I can be of ANY HELP please get back with me. Hope this helps SOME!!"

"I live in Seminole Woods. I have noticed this littering problem especially

In the 1840s, Dr. Algernon Sidney Speer, his wife Christiana, and their two small children, Arthur Algernon and Mary Christiana "Molly," followed the Ginns to Enterprise.

During Dr. Speer's exploration of the upper St. Johns River, he discovered a large Indian mound which would become known as Indian Mound Slough and Indian Mound Village. Because of the rich shell soils and the warm river water, wild oranges flourished there. Dr. Speer selected 100 acres of these lands for a patent having sworn the lands were unusable for a military site. Soon afterward, he cultivated his first orange grove.

During the second Seminole Indian War, which lasted from 1835-1842, Arthur Ginn served as a

lieutenant colonel and quarter master. His son-in-law served as a physician in Aaron Jarnigan's company, Gen. Benjamin Hopkins Division of Florida Troops.

About 1844, the Speer and Ginn families moved from Enterprise to a little north of Fort Mellon. Dr. Speer built a typical two-pen log house with a dog walk between its two living areas. Arthur Ginn built his home south of Dr. Speer's House.

The Speer's log home was where their neighbors gathered during the last Indian scare. This turned out to be a false alarm by a black servant who was homesick for her former home in Georgia.

Dr. Algernon Speer cultivated his commercial orange grove in the region just north of his home; this later became known as the

famous Speer Grove. It became a tourist attraction about 1866; today the site is marked by a small city park and a granite monument erected in 1941.

Dr. Speer was also the owner and operator of three river boats: The "Hancock," the "Tom Thumb" and the "Sara Spaulding." They plied the river between Fort Mellon and Jacksonville, carrying passengers, freight and mail during the 1840s and 1850s. These boats were the only contact with the outside world for many of the settlers of Fort Mellon and Fort Reid. Dr. Speer's riverboat line was the earliest riverboat transportation on the St. Johns River. After Speer's death in 1857, Arthur Ginn sold the riverboats to Jacob Brock, who expanded the line to include

the "Darlington," which would later be captured by the Yankees during the Civil War.

On Jan. 30, 1845, Mosquito County was renamed Orange County, greatly influenced by Dr. Algernon Speer, who became the first representative to the territorial legislature to the newly named county.

On March 30, 1845, Florida was admitted into the Union, and on July 16 of that year, Mellonville became the county seat of Orange County. Arthur Ginn was appointed clerk of the court; his jurisdiction included lands which would later comprise Volusia and Seminole counties.

In 1854, while serving in the Florida legislature, Dr. Speer introduced a bill to

form Volusia County out of the north end of Orange County. The St. Johns River formed the dividing line, largely because of the support by Dr. Speer.

Dr. Speer's wife Christiana died in 1853 during the birth of their child, Ella. Their other children were Arthur Alexander, Algernon Sidney Jr. and Mary Christiana. Later, Dr. Speer married Julia A. Hart. She was the daughter of Isiah D. Hart, the founder of Jacksonville. Julia Hart's brother, Ossian B. Hart, became Florida's first governor after Reconstruction. Algernon and Julia had one child, Lula, born in 1856.

In 1855, Dr. Algernon Speer's first cousin, Judge James G. Speer, came to Fort Reid from South Carolina, having been appointed

United States Commissioner for Indian Affairs. Judge Speer's appointment was not well received by the settlers who had fought the hostile Indians during the war. Within a year, Judge Speer moved from Fort Reid to Oakland, where he built his homestead and orange grove.

Dr. Algernon Speer drowned at the age of 39 on a boating accident on Lake George in May 1847. Also on board were a black servant and Algernon Speer Jr., age 12. The small steamer was being towed to Jacksonville by the larger steamboat "Darlington" when it swamped and sank. Algernon Speer Jr. was rescued by Capt. Brock. Dr. Speer's body was recovered and he was buried Sept. 7, 1857.

on Rt.46 and Rt. 426. In an area dotted with horse farms and tree farms, there is so much litter in and along the ditches it is really sad and disgusting. I suggest an 'adopt a roadway' program might help."

"State Road 426 toward Geneva was a mess the other day. There can't be that many litterbugs. I have seen trash blow out of garbage trucks as they race along. My particular complaint is that First Street has become a shortcut to the dump. Most of the afternoon traffic is made up of trucks and trailers loaded with debris, not paying any attention to the 'No Trucks' sign, and usually not respecting the speed limit. The trucks that say Seminole County on the side are the worst offenders, obviously enjoying immunity. We no longer see any speed enforcement through town, even near the school. I don't want landfill traffic going past my house, but then I think you live on Osceola Road and probably don't like it there either, so I might as well accept it. But that's off the topic. Good luck with any effort to keep Geneva beautiful. The trouble is, someone who reads 'Stetson's Corner' is

likely to litter."

"I don't travel State Road 46 too often, but I do travel County Road 426 every workday. I am amazed at the amount of litter in the ditches. I would be more than happy to participate in periodic community cleanup days. You must be psychic, because I had just been bemoaning the condition of the roadsides."

"I think the worst roads are the ones leading into the landfill, especially State Road 46 from Sanford. You can see that the trash ends where the trucks pull in to Osceola Road. I think the landfill trucks need to get new covers for their trucks and that they should be forced to clean up along the total roadway from Sanford to the landfill."

"One thing that ticks me off about littering is that on the way to the county landfill on Osceola, numerous items fall off vehicles or trailers and just end up cluttering the side of the road. Many large items lay there and never get picked up by the person who dropped it (even though you know who you are). How would you like it if we dropped things in your community that created an eyesore? Take some pride in the

environment."

"I live on Osceola Road, the dump road, and it is terrible here because of all the trash that goes to the dump. I see people all the time stopping right outside the gates to the dump to tie a tarp on the load. They get fined if there is no tarp, but stopping outside the gates does nothing for the rest of the roadways. There is no good answer because the county does not want to spend the time and money keeping the roads clean. It needs to be the responsibility of the people who live on the roads in to take care of the trash, theirs or not, if they want clean roads. I am always picking up trash in front of my house."

"I agree that there is a lot of trash along the roadways in Geneva. State Road 46 seems to collect a lot as well as Osceola Road. I don't know the answer, except to make sure the garbage trucks are covered when they are hauling trash."

"I hope you receive lots of feedback on this issue. It occurred to me that I'm 'blaming' it on our locals rather than the folks that fly through on the way to someplace else. Maybe 'do not litter' signs would help on State Road 46 or

'dispose of your trash at the dump, not before' for the folks that cut through our back roads to the dump. In any case here are my thoughts: It's a shame that the words trash and Geneva should ever be found in the same sentence. In a time where we complain about not having control over so many aspects of our lives, I believe that disposing of one's personal trash is one we can easily control and should take responsibility for. It's not as if there aren't plenty of appropriate places to dispose of it: convenience stores such as Marathon and Handi-Way, the U.S. Post Office, gas stations, drug stores, grocery stores, discount stores, feed stores, and fast-food chains. Think about how many of these places we pass or stop at on any given day. On a personal note, I'm sure that I echo the sentiments of other Geneva residents that I resent having to walk my road front property before I cut the grass on my ride-a-mower, checking for beer bottles and soda cups; glass and paper items that lie in wait for my mower blade to either shred them into hundreds of annoying or dangerous pieces. We are better than

this. Let's start acting like it. Our human and animal neighbors deserve better. Geneva, 'our beautiful lost world' deserves better."

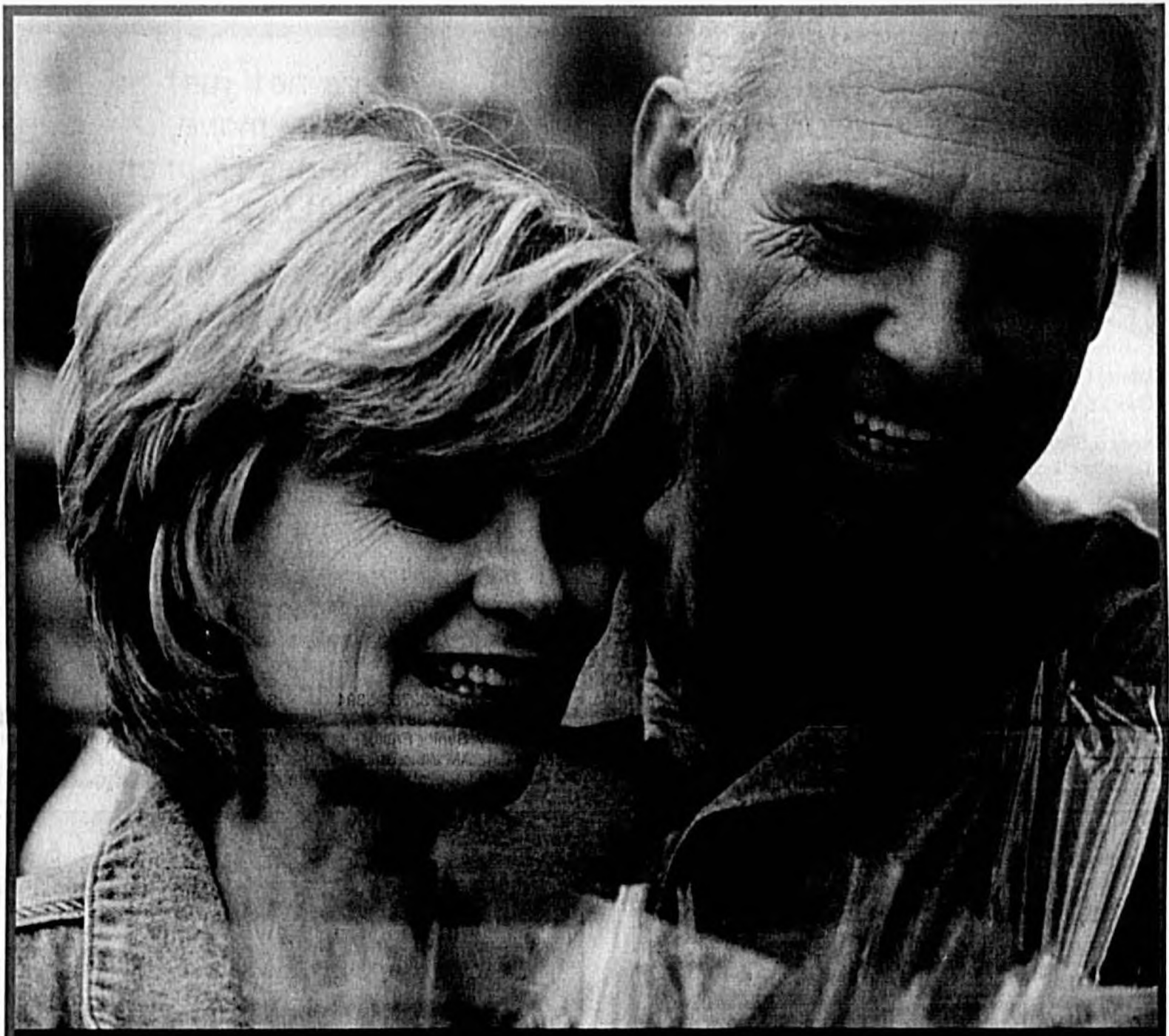

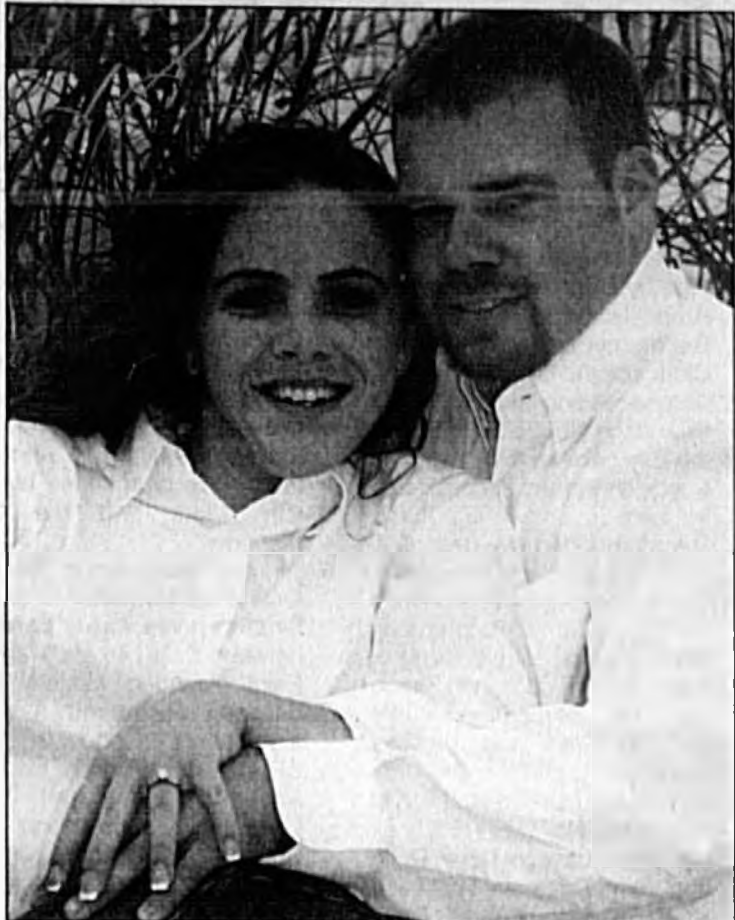

City Manager Al Grieshaber said the bid submissions do not doom the project. In fact, he remains "committed to doing the project on time if that's the direction of the CRA and it does not substantially inconvenience our downtown merchants."

Grieshaber said city staff would explore "financial alternatives and construction alternatives" the city might choose to move forward with renovations.

On the financial side, the CRA has two options: scale back on the project or find

additional revenue sources. Reducing the scope of the project may be difficult because CRA members, particularly chairman Bob Parsell, have been adamant about installing enough infrastructure underground to serve downtown's needs for at least 20 years.

"We don't want to dig up the street five years from now because we didn't provide enough electrical or stormwater capacity," Parsell.

Likewise, Parsell said the CRA doesn't want to skimp on the above-ground ameni-

ties.

"We want this to be a first-class project," Parsell said. "There is no way I would agree to do this job halfway."

Grieshaber said the city could supplement CRA funds by using revenue from sales tax or the stormwater fund.

"I haven't looked at that yet, so I'm not sure what our capabilities are," Grieshaber said.

An alternative on the construction side could be to limit traffic on 1st Street during construction. Plans by Glatting Jackson, the CRA's consultant, call for maintain-

ing two-way traffic during construction.

"The maintenance of traffic is very expensive for that plan," Smith said. "We're looking at possibly making 1st Street one way westbound and 2nd Street one way eastbound during construction."

Smith said that option would not only reduce costs but would shorten construction time.

Grieshaber and Smith will continue to review the bids and submit alternative action plans to the CRA board at its next meeting on April 7.

Longwood leased a portion of the land to Northland Community Church in 1996 for recreational fields. That agreement was modified in 1998, but was not finalized as the church was pursuing a purchase of the city-owned property. The new lease would have finalized the 1998 deal.

Some residents said they might want to reconsider the original offer if it could stop the church from further encroaching on their neighborhood. Conum said the neighborhood has already retained an attorney to investigate the first city lease.

"No one has asked what we want to do with the property," he said. "If that means attack-

ing the first leases that is what we will do."

Northland Community Church is reportedly in the process of developing expansion plans. Although the church did not return calls, Longwood officials confirmed they did submit plans for an expansion but they were rejected.

A requirement of submitting site plans in Longwood is a developer must sit down with area residents to discuss the proposed project. Some residents of Columbus Harbor say church officials tried to tell them the expansion was already approved by the city when they met with their neighborhood association on March 1.

"We need to send a message to the church and engineers. They need to start all over because these people are not going to like it because there is a seed of mistrust," Commissioner Butch

Bundy said.

Commissioners instructed the city attorney to create a timeline of the lease negotiations, as many of them were not on the board when it was agreed upon.

157 students.

"Everybody is happy the school is opening," said Dianne Kramer, school board director of planning and facilities. "This plan aims for as little movement as possible for our students. But when you open new schools, you have to create attendance zones. What we have focused on in some areas is transferring students who live in apartments versus those who live in homes because parents said homeowners who have invested in property should be considered."

The School Board will take action on the plan at the 7 p.m. public hearing at the Educational Support Center, 400 E. Lake Mary Blvd. in Sanford. If the plan (the third revision after much public input) is approved, it will be finalized at the Board Meeting on April 13. If the attendance zones are not accepted, the board may send the committee of parents and administrators from 26 elementary school back to the drawing board to come up with an acceptable, workable map for the 2004/2005 school year.

According to Kramer, the revised plan, in which more than 1,000 people attended

sessions and offered input, attempts to address several issues from the public sessions:

- Try to shift students who are currently being bused, rather than "walkers."
- Whenever possible, shift apartment complexes rather than single family homes
- Minimize the changes in boundaries as much as possible.

Two college baseball players with Lake Mary ties picked up the weekly hardware handed out by the Atlantic Sun Conference.

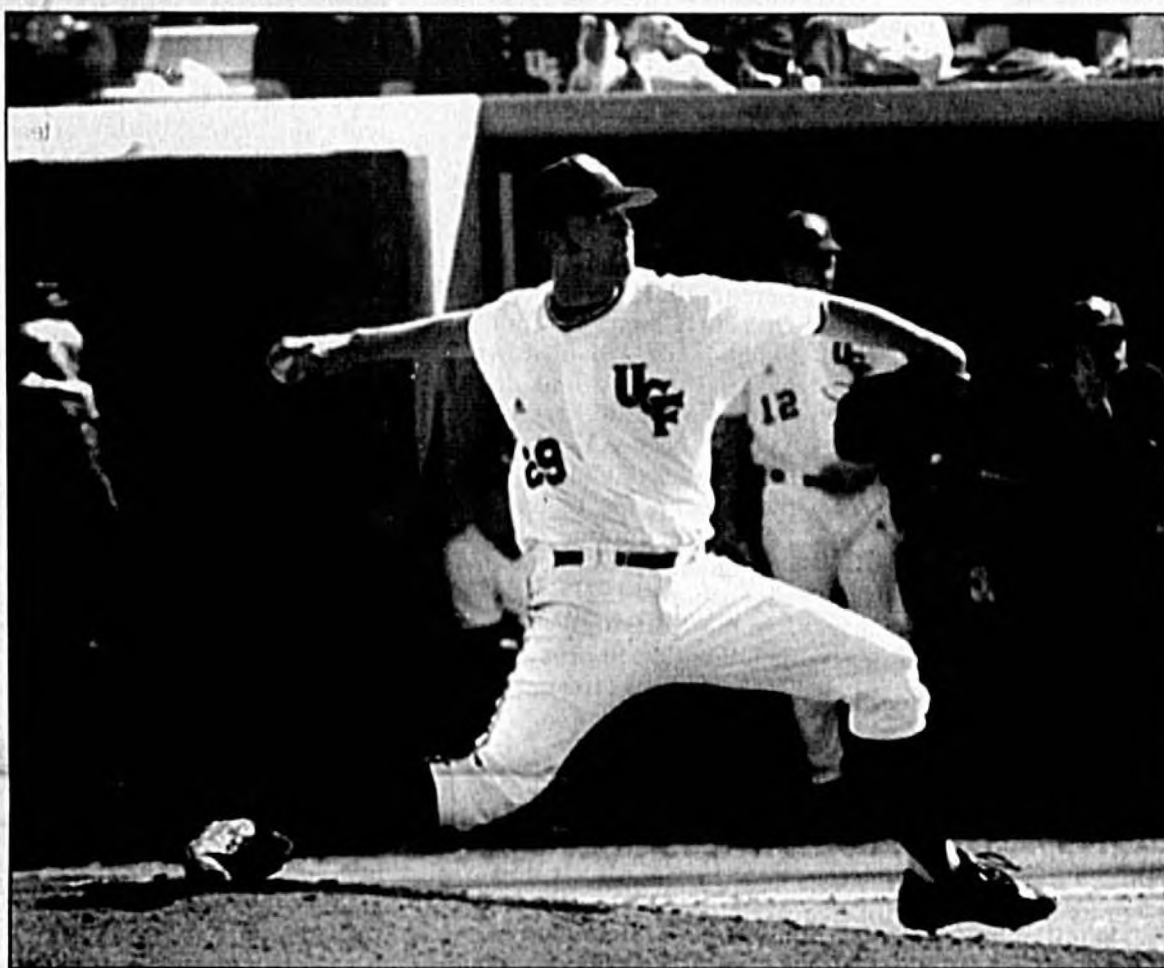

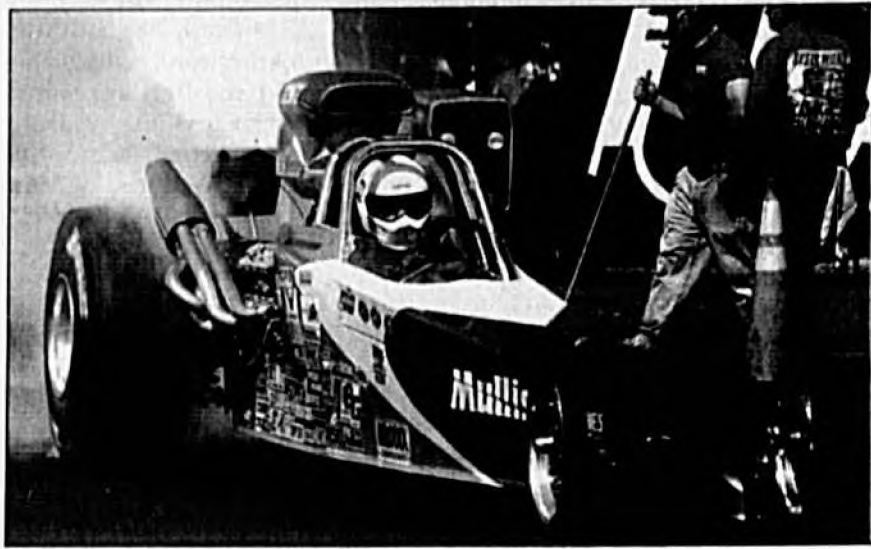

The UCF offense exploded for five runs in the first inning after Wagner jumped out to a 4-0. After hitting just two home runs in 20 games, the Golden Knights hit two in the first inning including a three-run home run by Lake Mary's Ryan Bono and a two-run homer by Matt LaFleur. Following the five-run first, UCF scored in every inning except the fifth and eighth en route to the blowout win.

Freshman Derek Abriola earned his first collegiate victory with 4.2 innings of solid relief. Abriola (1-0) yielded just one run on five hits with two strikeouts on the night.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is seeking a suspect whom is believed responsible for an early Sunday morning shooting at a Sanford area nightclub.

# County bans video-slot machines

SANFORD — The county is the latest local government agency in Seminole to ban video-slot machines, but that still may not stop the rise of the casinolike establishments in the area.

Following in the footsteps of the city of Longwood, which passed a similar ordinance March 1, county commissioners voted unanimously Tuesday on a measure that

would outlaw commercial facilities that house any sort of slot machine. It does not prohibit personal ownership.

Adult-arcade owners in other Central Florida communities skirted state laws prohibiting gambling by confining their video machines paid out based on skill — not

chance. A 1997 revision in the state gambling law allowed games of chance at popular children arcades such as Chucky E. Cheese, in which players receive tickets that can be redeemed for candy or small trinkets.

But unlike Skee-Ball and Super Shot, adult arcades

fashioned video-slot machines with images rolling by at more than a 100 per second. Players are expected to push a button to stop each row of rotating figures to match up like images. And instead of cash payouts, the establishments awarded gift certificates, small prizes and

coupons.

An Apopka woman inquiring about Seminole County's ordinance Tuesday said she feels adult arcades are being shortchanged. She is considering opening a video-slot business, but says she will have to look elsewhere — maybe Sanford.

"There are different types of games just like there are many types of Fords," said Jackie Trevathan about the

## Airport hears it from citizens

SANFORD — About 250 people gathered last week at Gate 6 in the domestic terminal of Orlando Sanford International Airport to ask questions about the airport's future expansion.

The meeting was requested by the Seminole County Sustainable Communities Advisory Council (SCAC) to address specific questions the group has regarding the airport's growth. While many of those who attended were able to ask pointed questions of airport president Larry Dale, those who organized the meeting say their questions remain unanswered.

"I don't think our objectives were met because we let the audience take over the meeting," said Deborah Schafer, who is active with SCAC. "Not that that's a bad thing."

Dale had planned a presentation of the airport's expansion and intended to address a list of questions SCAC had submitted prior to the March 15 meeting. Shortly after he began his presentation, however, Dale was peppered with questions from the audience.

"Why are you subsidizing the airlines?" asked one man.

"Why does the Sanford airport continue to grow when there is ample capacity at Melbourne or Daytona?" asked another.

## Idyllwilde principal is retiring

SANFORD — Seminole County Public Schools announced that principals in schools around the county will be moved due to principals that are retiring and the opening of new schools.

The transfer of 10 principals to different schools will require approval by the school board.

The county will also have eight vacancies to fill by July, when new principals in Florida usually begin their jobs.

Idyllwilde Elementary in Sanford is one of the schools that will need a new principal after the retirement of current principal David Scott, who has been there for nine years.

Scott, who has been an educator in the county's school system for 32 years, said he enjoys "being a part of student achievement and providing a system where students get to learn outside the classroom."

Scott received his bachelor's degree from Florida State University and completed his master's degree at the University of Central Florida. He taught at Red Bug Elementary, was assistant principal at Sabal Point Elementary, and was principal at Longwood Elementary and Hamilton Elementary.

"It's been very rewarding. I enjoy a lifestyle that has challenges in it," Scott said.

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# Task force lobbies for mental-health law reform

SANFORD — Many Seminole County residents will never forget July 8, 1998. Come next year, law enforcement agencies around the state will also know of that tragic day, as a new bill expected to be passed into law is a direct result.

Seminole County Deputy Sheriff Eugene "Stetson" Gregory was shot and killed in a 1998 dispute with Alan Singletary.

Singletary, 43, wounded two other deputies in that 13-hour Geneva standoff before being fatally shot himself. Singletary's family had tried for years to get him help for

his paranoid schizophrenia, but one outdated law stood in their way, said Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger.

With the direct help of two family members from that heartbreaking event — widow Linda Gregory and Alan's sister Alice Petree — and countless other supporters, Eslinger is pushing for reform. Once considered a pioneering act, Florida lawmakers created the Baker Act more than three decades ago. It permits treatment facilities to hold patients up to three days if they are deemed an imminent danger to themselves or others.

The problem is after 72 hours, the patients are most often let free without any

stipulation to continue treatment. The cycle can be vicious as patients identified by law enforcement officials can be readmitted under the Baker Act numerous times.

The deaths of Gregory and Singletary are about to break that sometimes never-ending series. Eslinger and others introduced a Baker Act reform bill to state lawmakers in 2002. After some tweaking in 2003, the House almost unanimously passed the bill with a 113-2 margin. The Senate failed to hear the bill before the end of the session and another year went by and possibly five more deaths that could have been averted,
