Goofs Bring Changes In FHP Policy

Mixups Stick Driver With Stuck Car

A series of mixups that led to the towing and storing for five days of a Geneva man's car that was stuck in a ditch east of Sanford has brought changes in some Florida Highway Patrol policies. Troopers now realize the high cost of storage for impounded vehicles.

Tim Wallace, 25, of P.O. Box 258, said he ran his car into a ditch to avoid a collision at about 2:30 a.m. Saturday. Oct. 17. on State Road 46 near the Osteen Bridge. He said that within four hours his car had been ordered towed by the Florida Highway Patrol.

By the time he got his car back early Wednesday he had a towing and storage bill from Altamonte Towing Service, of Altamonte Springs. that totaled \$261 - \$65 for towing. \$16.10 mileage, \$45 for use of winch, \$35 for use of dollies, \$25 administative fee, and \$12.50 a day for five days storage totaling \$62.50 and \$12.43

Wallace said the car had apparently been damaged by the towers and he claims that a flahing rod and reel was missing from his car

when he picked it up.

Wallace said he didn't understand why his car was towed so quickly or why the Florida Highway Patrol couldn't tell him that his car had been towed when he contacted their Deland office after returning to the scene to find his car missing at about 9 a.m. Saturday.

Wallace also didn't understand why he had to wait for trooper Ron Davis, who ordered the towing, to return to work Wednesday before he could pick up his car and avoid storage lees.

Wallace's dismay over the incident brought him to the Sanford Herald Wednesday. After Herald calls to FHP officials and Wallace's own call to the FHP office in Tallahasse, he was visited Wednesday evening by FHP Sgt. Scott Boyd, who apologized to Wallace for the mixip and who fold

him that as the result of this incident and with the FHP learning that Altamonte Towing charges \$12.50 storage charge per calendar day for stored vehicles, instead of \$2 to \$3 a day, which was the industry standard a couple of years ago, changes

will be made in FHP procedures.

Susan Traeger, dispatcher, for Altamonte Towing, said storage rates for automobiles has increased rapidly over the post couple of years and that \$12.50 per day is now the going rate in the area. New procedures, PHP Capt. Bill Sanders of the

DeLand office said Thursday, will enable owers to pick up their towed vehicles quicker, hopefully the next day, to avoid such staggering storage charges.

This would apply only to vehicles that were not in accidents involving property damage or injury. Vehicles impounded in those cases can be released only after an investigation.

Collapse Continues **World Markets Drop**

NEW YORK (UPI) - Stock prices opened lower today with investors wondering whether their worldwide confidence crists will push President Reagan and congressional leaders to a comnomise on cutting the federal udget deficit:

One gotiations in Washington today will focus on an agenda of spending cuts, tax hikes and other measures capable of rimming the deficit by at least \$23 billion this year.

The Dow dones industrial average was down 36.64 to 1914 12 in the lirst eight minutes of trading, Lusers led gatners by a 8-1 ratio among the 919 issues traded but first trades had not been executed in many blue chip issues.

A trader at Charles Schwab & Co. Inc. said be was getting a lot more sell orders than buy or

Early declines in New York followed a worldwide pattern of losses in heavy trading. Prices closed sharply lower in Tokyo, posted record losses in Hong

Kong and were lower in London. Wall Street is mostly caught up on tremendous backlogs of paperwork from last week's tumultuous stock trading but still nervous about what the new week will bring.

Some relief from the intense activity may come from shortened trading hours today

Leading exchanges cut trading hours by two hours at least through Tuesday to give the financial community time to process the record numbers of transactions that occurred last week, when about 2.3 billion shares traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

John Phelan Jr., chairman of the New York Stock Exchange. predicted trading hours would return to normal by Wednesday in an interview with ABC's This Week With David Brinkley" Sunday.

Monday and Tuesday are the settlement days for the two 600 million share days that occurred last Monday and Tuesday." Phelan said. "Once we get through those two days, we will know whether there have been any real systemic damages done

Only a week ago. Hie Dow Jones industrial average plummeted 508 points to 1,738.74, losing 22.6 percent of us value in a plunge eclipsing the 12.8 percent loss that occurred Oct. 28, 1929

For the week the Dow fell 295.98, closing at 1950.76. nearly 800 points below its record closing high of 2722.42 set on Aug. 25.

The collapse followed two weeks of record losses amid rising auxiety about a brisk upward spiral in interest rates and the nation's trade imbalance.

The Dow dropped 235.47 points in the week that ended Oct. 16, surpassing the previous week's record drop of 158.78

A sharp decline in the value of the dollar, symbolizing the difficulty the United States and its major trading partners have had coordinating policies to promote stability in exchange and interest rates, sent the market plunging Monday in a fall greased by panie and program trading.

In program trading, huge blocks of stock are traded as professional investors, known as arbitragers, seek to profit from the difference between the current value of a stock and its estimated future value.

The volume of shares traded last Monday totaled 604.3 million, nearly double the previous record of 338.5 million set on Oct. 16.

Last Monday's drop wiped out more than a year of bull market gains and sent the Dow to Its lowest level since April 7, 1986. when it closed at 1735.51.

This country did probably the most noble thing that any country has done after war and that was the institution of the Marshall Plan." said Askew. That 4-year plan saw \$12 billion spent to rebuild foreign countries down-and-out after WWII.

"We created competition," said Askew. He said, as an example, the United States built the Japanese's steel industry, and did so using the latest technology. Japan's steel industry then successfully took on the U.S. steel industry.

The residents called the girl's parents and police. Some evidence was recovered.



The commies sent the log back! That was what is was this morning. That same messy soup that grounded Secretary of State George Shultz' airplane in Moscow. Burned off though, and turned out sunny didn't it. Good guys win again.

It's going to stay nice awhile. At least until Wednesday evening. Then we might get some rain. Face it. Seminole County could use a little to go with the fertilizing we're supposed to be doing for the winter" months.

Temperatures should stay real nice. Seventies and low 80s during the day and low 60s to high 50s at night. Some early morning fogginess can be expected but it'll burn off by the time most folks leave for work.

If you're keeping track, the highest temperature in the nation yesterday was at Junction, Texas - 93 degrees. The lowest? Gunnison, Colorado again. 15 degrees.

Talk about rain, folks in the northwest are really hurting.

The drought in the Pacific Northwest has dried up forests, fishing grounds and even western Washington's usually abundant crop of "magic mushrooms."

Experts say the lack of rainfall, which has caused the driest June-to-October period since 1895, has reduced the number of hallucinogenic mushrooms and the number of "shroomers" prowling fields in search of them.

"In order to fruit, most mushrooms need some chilly weather and then a good drenching rain." Dan Schwenk, a mushroom expert with the Puget Sound Mycological Society, said. "Overall there are fewer mushrooms this year, and that

includes those of the hallucinogenic variety.

Western Washington is one of the most fertile mushroom-growing areas in the world because of unusually cool, moist weather and a wide variety of altitudes. More than 2,500 varieties grow here, and at least 10 species are classified as hallucinogenic.

For two decades, people have scoured the Puget Sound lowlands in October for mushrooms containing psilocybin, a hallucinogen, in pastures where they grow in animal manure and on irrigated sod lawns.

This year with pastures and lawns as dry as deserts, the story has been different.

If that isn't bad enough. think about earthquakes in places other than California. The second strongest in a

series of earthquakes to hit the Great Salt Lake Desert of Utah in the past five weeks occurred late Sunday, the U.S. Geological Survey reported.

Sunday's quake was recorded at a preliminary magnitude of 4.6 on the Richter scale, USGS spokesman Don Finley said in Washington, It was centered in the Great Salt Lake Desert about 65 miles west of Ogden. Utah.



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Famine Threat in Africa Again

The shroud of famine is again hovering over Africa. But, in contrast to three years ago, an emergency food-distribution system is in place and there is early warning. An estimated 1 million people died in the previous famine, in part because help arrived too late or not at all. To avert similar suffering, the affected countries and those with food to share need to act now to get food into the relief pipeline.

In two of the hardest-hit countries, Angola and Mozambique, civil wars are responsible for declining harvests and growing hunger. Although warfare also exacerbates problems in Ethiopia, a surprise drought has shriveled crops. Usually striking on an eight-to-10-year cycle, drought returned in July after only two years of normal rains. Ethiopians who fled to Sudan to escape famine or civil war also face food shortages as crops and food reserves shrink in their host country. In addition, grasshopper and locust plagues threaten parts of sub-Saharan Africa.

The key this time, relief officials say, is to provide help soon enough to keep people in their homes. If they are forced to seek help in huge camps, disease takes a terrible toll and they need more aid later to return to farming.

The three countries, joined by several international relief organizations, already have appealed for huge increases in food aid. But the response has been slow. Congress is working on legislation that would increase development aid for Africa, but has paid little attention to the impending emergency.

Rather than react to pictures of starving children which come too late, donors need evidence that Africa is not a developmental "basket case." Signs of progress are visible in several African countries such as Zaire. Zambia and Togo, which have begun reforming economic policies. Food aid, too, has been used in many areas to pay farmers for work on water systems, reforestation and other environmental rehabilitation. And more Afficial Southies are trying to slow population growth.

The political and economic problems in Ethiopia, Mozambique and Angola that expose their citizens to starvation deserve criticism and demand reform. But compassion, fatigue and cynicism are luxuries for people with enough to eat. When gifts of food can save many lives. Americans must dig deep into their pockets one more time.

Something Simple

Maybe something simple is being overlooked in the search for the Loch Ness monster.

"Operation Deepscan" failed to reveal anything new, and one of the world's oldest legends appears to be more famous and enduring than ever.

The stories have persisted for centuries. Yet what people claim to have seen doesn't add up with what scientists know or can discover, even with fancy electronics.

Despite the belief of romanticists in the Loch Ness monster, one question seems to beg for an answer:

is it mere conincidence that the reported "sightings" of the creature take place in the very same country which not only produces, but consumes copious quantities of Scotch whiskey?

It could be a question of scotch and water. If you drink enough scotch you're apt to see anything in the water.

Trade Deficits Aren't Disastrous

Poor America, it just can't compete anymore, can it? The July trade deficit reached a record \$16.5 billion, and the figure for August was not much better. Frightened investors aren't sure what to do.

Meanwhile, ever-vigilant Congress has whomped up legislation to protect us from those clever foreigners who make so many things we can't seem to stop ourselves from buying.
Where can a good patriot turn for solace?

Well, a trip abroad helps put matters in perspective. A few days after the year's worst trade figures were released. I happened to be strolling down a commercial street in Singapore. Just for sport, I started counting.

Here to my left was a Denny's restaurant. there a Burger King, now a MacDonald's, a Kentucky Fried Chicken, Hardee's, and two yes, two - 7 Elevens.

I could take a break at Pizza Hut. Swensons or Orange Julius. I could rent a car from Hertz or Avis. I could shop at J.C. Penny's and Toys R Un, do business at Chase Manhattan, Bank America or American Express, see a Hollywood movie, sleep at a Holiday Inn. Hyatt or Hilton.

Up above, billboards heralded Kodak film. Firestone tires. Sunkist oranges and even Marvel Comics.

Back in my hotel, the refrigerator opened to Budweiser, Coca Cola, Pepsi and 7-Up, among other beverages stocked by the staff. I hit the button on the TV and on came "Matlock."

Singapore, believe it or not, is one of those hard-working Pacific Rim countries that runs a trade surplus with us — an example to alarmed members of Congress of the competition we

Whatever should the people of Singapore fear. do you suppose? Or is it only Americans who must not allow their society to become polluted with foreign products?

Sometimes we forget how dominant our economy still is, how many of our companies continue to excel across the world. American trade names are no less ubiquitous in Japan. incidentally, despite our large trade gap with

This is not to trivialize the trade deficit or to downplay obstacles to selling our products in some countries. It is merely to insist that the

trade problem is more complex than often depicted. Many successful countries easily endure trade deficits. Singapore has run an overall deficit every year of this decade. Even fabulously dynamic Hong Kong recorded a deficit from 1960 through 1964, and is currently steaming toward another.

Britain will be one of the fastest-growing countries in Europe this year. It will also run up one of Europe's larger trade deficits.

There is simply no historical evidence tying trade deficits to poor economic performance. A fast growing economy is as likely to run a deficit as not. In comparison with many of our trading partners, U.S. growth has been impressive in recent years. Meanwhile, our economy has created millions of net new jobs - hardly a sign of terminal anemia.

Even so, politicians seem determined to foster the impression we can't compete. Rather than attack real problems for which they are responsible, such as the federal budget deficit, they toy with protectionist legislation.

Which **Beak Fits** The Bill?

NEW YORK (UPI) - In the 1920's a naturalist asked in an obscure science journal a question that would send zoologist Thomas Bates Smith to Cameroon in the 1980's.

Why was it that individual finchs of the same African species had either narrow bills or wide bills, but never bills of an intermediate size?

When I dusted off this journal and read that, I got really intrigued," Smith said in a telephone interview. "Polymorphism is very unusual, especially in a continent like Africa that has competition among the species."

Scientists have traditionally believed that a species develops optimum features throughout evolution that are shared by all individuals. Variations in size and color may exist, but things like beak size are a constant.

This evolutionary system creates strength in numbers, allowing a species to compete with other species feeding on the same food supply or threatened by the same predators, scientists say

Smith, a doctoral candidate at the University of California at Berkeley whose research was published recently in the British science journal Nature, discovered beak size among African finches was determined at birth. They were born with either large or small bills.

He also discovered all of the finches fed on sedge, an aquatic grass that grows abundantly in the marshy areas of Africa where they

The sedge, however, also comes in two varieties - a sturdy grass with large, tough seeds and a reedy variety with small, soft seeds...

After months of observation, Smith determined that finches with narrow beaks preferred to eat the soft, small seeds while the widebilled finches feasted on the larger, tougher seeds.

He concluded the finches had developed the two different beak sizes throughout evolution as a way to save the species in case of emergency.

"What happens if there is a bigdrought and one type of seed disappears." Smith said. "Then at least a portion of the species survives.

He said the two types of beaks also mean individuals of the same species have less competition among themselves for food, since some prefer the hard seeds and some the soft seeds.

Weeded Out Early

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A recent letter to The Washington Post said, By this time next year, all the Democrats and all the Republicans except George Bush will be out of the presidential race. Bush will rununopposed and lose."

So it might appear, what with the rash of involuntary departures from the 1988 presidential field and the outbreak of gaffes, goofs and gaucheries by the survivors.

But fear not, gentle voter, you will have a choice 54 weeks hence.

What is happening here seems to be the latest development in a changing process for selecting reasonably electable presidential candidates. In this, the press has a somewhat more prominent role than in the past

The way it used to work, political party leaders got together and decided among themselves who would be their best presidential candidate and then selected a group of deserving (and obedient) party members as national convention delegates to award the nomination to the person they chose.

The fun began when the party leaders disagreed and put forward two or more candidates for the nomination. Then came the multiple convention ballots - as many as 102 when the Democrats deadlocked in 1924 - and the deals cut in the smoke-filled rooms to find a consensus er a least a compromise candidate.

That system worked because (1) the political parties were tightly organized, especially at the state and local levels and had the firm allegiance of their members, and (2) because the means of both communication and transportation made it difficult for potential candidates to go over the heads of the political leaders to reach the rank-and-file party members.

Technological advances after

World War II - specifically jet aircraft and television - accelerated the process of party distitegration that began with the growth of a new middle class that moved out of the ethnic neighborhoods of the old cities to the new suburbs, where the bosses and the precinct captains never got a footbold.

Finally, the two major parties themselves, by trying to move toward the political center, began losing the sharp identity differences they once had.

The upsurge of both social and political dissent, which at its most constructive grasped at popular democracy as a means to give voice to its concerns, all but finished offboss rule in American presidential politics

Wide open primaries and caucuses operating under strict guidelines of proportional representation in delegate selection replaced it in selecting candidates.

This system lacked one great advantage of boss rule; up-close and personal knowledge of the weaknesses and closet skeletons of would-be candidates that often acted as a filter to screen out the likely losers before they were presented to the public as the best the party had to offer.

Now, candidates' hidden psychological problems, sexual antics, financial irregularities and a long list of other potential embarrassments remain to be dug up by inquiring reporters with the help of "opposition research" staffs in competing campaigns.

For our competitive electoral system of informed selection to work best, somebody has to do the preliminary weeding out of phonics and sure losers. That used to be done privately by the political bosses; now it has fallen to the press to doit in public.

'Star Wars' Directive Published

WASHINGTON - A conservative U.S. senator and his former staff aide, in a soon-to-be-released book. have revealed the contents of a crucial, highly classified security directive from President Reagan concerning the "Star Wars" Strategic Defense Initiative.

Surprisingly, the book, "The Arms Control Delusion," was given official advance clearance by the CIA. Either the agency's reviewers overlooked the sensitive quotes. didn't realize how sensitive they were or knowingly approved the book's ad hoc declassification of a presidential document.

The book, scheduled for release Nov. 3. is co-authored by Sen. Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo., and Angelo Codevilla. Waltop was a sponsor of anti-missile defense programs even before Reagan's 1983 speech gave SD! momentum. Codevilla, an internationally recognized expert on arms control

and intelligence matters, is now a senior research fellow at Stanford University's Hoover Institution. The central thesis of the book is

that arms control advocates have sacrificed real U.S. security for the false security of arms control by insisting that the process survive at

Chapter Six, "The Reagan Administration. Sincerity and Arms Control." contains astonishing excerpts from what the book's authors identify only as "a lengthy." closely held National Security Council document" signed by Reagan.

White House sources, surprised by the document's inclusion in the book, identified it for us as the still-classified National Security Decision Directive 192, signed by the president in August, 1985. Our sources said it was written by NSC staffer Robert Linhard, However, it is written in the first person - as though the president himself were

Noting his recent re-examination of the U.S. Soviet Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty and its attendant negotiations, the directive states: "In the process, we have gained new insights into how this treaty can objectively be interpreted."

The president has said he would restrict certain SDI work, but the directive points out that the negotiating record does not require that the president do this. Here's the stunning, relevant paragraph: What our recent analyses have led me to believe is that while the anibiguities involved could permit the technical, legal debate to continue, our initial and unitateral assertions about what the ABM Treaty did restrict concerning advanced defensive technologies is not clearly demonstrable in the terms of the treaty as written, nor in the associated negotiating record." The document seems to be laying the groundwork to justify a looser interpretation of the treaty, to allow work to go ahead on Star Wars. As for the Soviets, the directive states:

"Our assertions about this portion of the treaty were not, at the time, shared by our negotiating partner. Rather, the record indicates that they were resisted by the Soviet Union. These assertions reflected more our hopes for what could result from the treaty ... than an objective assessment of what was achieved and mutually agreed by the signed treaty document." In other words, the Soviets favored a less-restrictive interpretation from the start, and the narrower U.S. "assertions" were not binding any-

Even so. Reagan's directive conlinued. SDI research has been "designed ... to conform to a more restrictive view of our ABM Treaty obligations." He acknowledged that this had been done at the price of speed, overall cost and "technical uncertainty," but insisted that the SDI program, "if consistently supported with the appropriate funding as requested, will permit us to achieve the goals set for it."

Reagan Confers With Congress To Work Out Budget Compromise

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Wall Street's economic slarm has pushed President Reagan and congressional leaders to the bargaining table in a crash effort to resolve some partisan differences and cut the federal budget deficit.

One week after the worst stock market plunge ever, intensive negotiations were called to order today on an agenda of spending cuts, tax hikes and other measures capable of trimming the deficit by at least \$23 billion this

No easy solutions are in sight, and Reagan scheduled today's meeting with congressional leaders to set the tone for discussions prompted by shaken confidence in the economy and calls for stronger demonstrations of leadership from both ends of Pennsylvania Avenue.

Shultz: Arms Treaty 'Close'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Secretary of State George Shultz maintains the United States is not being "jerked around" by Mikhail Gorbachev despite the Soviet leader's surprising refusal to set a summit date with President Reagan.

Indeed, Shultz contends a treaty to eliminate intermediate-range U.S. and Soviet nuclear missiles remains "very close to happening" - and Gorbachev still could have a change of heart on the issue of a third summit with Reagan.

The secretary of state revealed Friday after a meeting with Gorbachev in Moscow that the Soviet leader had refused to set a summit date. Shultz said the Kremlin boss demanded a link to preliminary agreements that would limit Reagan's "Star Wars" project, the Strategic Defense

MIDLAND, Texas (UPI) - Jessica McClure underwent her three regular daily sessions in Midland Memorial Hospital's hyperbaric oxygen chamber to prepare her for a follow-up examination today of her right foot.

The 18-month-old girl was to return to the operating room today for an examination of her foot, injured during a 58-hour ordeal in a well 22 feet below the surface, that will determine if more surgery is needed, a hospital spokeswoman said Sunday.

6 Gulf Nations 'All For One, One For All' Against Iranians

MANAMA, Bahrain (UPI) - The six-nation Gulf Cooperation Council strongly denounced Iranian attacks in the Persian Gulf region, but stopped short of calling for an end to diplomatic relations with Tehran.

A communique issued Sunday by the GCC at the conclusion of two days of talks in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. also iterated that any attack on a member-state would be considered aggression against all members of the group.

The communique followed the bombing Saturday of a Pan American World Airways office office in Kuwait and renewed franian threats to continue attacks on the tiny gulf nation.

Last week, the pro-franian terrorist group Islamic Jihad, or Holy War, warned in Beirut that it would avenge U.S. confrontations with Iran in the Persian Gulf by striking American targets.

Pravda: Summit Hinges On U.S.

MOSCOW (UPI) - The official Communist Party newspaper Pravda says a superpower summit can still be held this year if Washington agrees to an agenda that would include limits on President Reagan's space-based Strategic Defense Initiative.

The Soviet position, outlined in an article in Sunday's issue of Pravda, explained why Secretary of State George Shultz left Moscow after two days of talks Friday without a commitment from the Kremlin on the third Reagan-Gorbachev summit.

It also endorsed the Kremlin view, stated repeatedly before the Shultz visit, that advances in SDI research would violate the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile treaty.

'Ivan The Terrible' Trial Resumes

JERUSALEM (UPI) - The trial of accused Nazi war criminal John Demjanjuk resumed today with lawyers disputing whether the defense could call an expert on Soviet intelligence to testify.

The trial of Demjanjuk, a former U.S. autoworker accused of being the sadistic Nazi death camp guard "Ivan the Terrible," was delayed indefinitely after a member of

the three-judge panel suffered a heart attack Sept. 2. Judge Zvi Tal, who heard testimony today, has recovered enough to hear half-day sessions, trial officials

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) - Opposition leader Kim Dae Jung today urged fellow oppositionist Kim Young-sam to withdraw from South Korea's presidential race, citing a weekend rally in which 35,000 people urged Kim Young-sam to quit.

The two Kims, both members of the opposition Reunification Democratic Party, are seeking the presidency and claim large followings.

Federation, RSVP Keep Seniors Active

(This is the third in a series of any destination in the country. articles featuring social service agencies in Seminole County that receive funding from United Way. This year's United Way campaign runs through Thursday, with a Seminole County goal of \$667,000.1

It is lunchtime at the Casselberry Senior Center. The room is alive with laughter and conversation, for these are interesting people. They have witnessed the era of the horse and carriage and the age of space travel. They have known the joys of grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Four wars and the great depression have left scars and taught hard lessons.

Each senior citizen at this luncheon has brought to Seminole County a unique set of experiences and knowledge. Imagine the resources available to this community if our nearly 40,000 seniors remained active and involved.

With this vision in mind, two local United Way agencies provide programs to help seniors stay independent and productive. One agency is the Federation of Senior Citizens. The second is the Rettred Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP)

The Federation of Senior Citizens offers a variety of services. the most popular being the Congregate Meals described above. These gatherings provide a hot meal and a friendly social forum at lunchtime each weekday. Staff and volunteers serve nearly 1,000 lunches every week at seven meal sites around the country.

For housebound seniors who are unable to prepare meals, the federation offers Meals on Wheels. After a professional evaluation of need, each elient receives a hot lunch on weekdays and a "weekend bag" every Friday. A mostly volunteer staff prepares and delivers 175 meals a day. "We always need volunteers for this," said Federation Director Fay Kalteux. "I could use 50 more today!"

A vital component of the federation's program is its Transportation Service, Six vans are in perpetual motion, carrying seniors from their homes to

Two of the vans are reserved for medical appointments. This service is in great demand, so reservations should be made two days in advance.

Other services provided by the federation include an employment service, legal assistance, homemaker and chore assistance, and respite care. All these services are provided without charge to the users, but the federation needs and encourages donations to cover its costs. Funding comes from various government and private sources and the United Way.

Seminote County is unusual in that most services to seniors are offered under one umbrella at the federation. The federation's new Helpline will ensure that those in need are directed either to a federation program or to another agency such as the Red Cross or Community Care for the Elderly. The Helpline number is 831-HELP. The federation is located at 211 N. Mattland Ave.

The second United Way agency serving seniors is the Retired Senior Volunteer Program, or RSVP. Anyone aged 60 or older with some time to share is eligible to volunteer through RSVP. This past year 568 RSVP participants logged 103,435 volunteer hours at Seminole County schools, government offices, healthcare facilities and non-profit agencies.

When an individual decides to volunteer, an RSVP staff member interviews her or him to determine interests, skills and experience. Some volunteers choose to work in an area of former employment, while others decide to try something new. The volunteer may visit several suggested sites and choose the one that seems the most interesting and rewarding.

If transportation is a problem, the volunteer is driven to and from the worksite in one of three RSVP vans. Director Joan Madison considers this transportation service to be "the heart of the RSVP program." Many senior citizens are unable to drive and can become isolated and lonely. The van service allows them to get out and be productive. There is never a charge

for van transportation.

Though volunteers must be at least 60, there is no upper age limit. The oldest volunteers are 93 years old. And although RSVP hopes that volunteers will give at least four hours a week. many give far more. This year the highest number of hours was logged by Edith Nielsen. coordinator of the RSVP respite program, who donated 1,828 hours, or 41 full work weeks.

Local sites that utilize RSVP volunteers include the Adult Literacy League, Seminole County Schools, the Grove Counseling Center and the Meals on Wheels program mentioned

above. Some volunteer positions enable a senior to utilize a

special skill, such as the art of fine handwriting taught by a volunteer in a Seminole County school. Some positions have training programs which allow 13 the volunteer to acquire new knowledge and skills. Examples of these are the Guardian Ad Litem program of the Juventle 14 Court and the docent program at 4 the Central Florida Zoo.

RSVP receives some funding h from the national agency AC-in-TION, but the majority of its budget comes from local sources such as Seminole County, the la school system and the United in Way. The RSVP office, located at !" 673 W. State Road 434 in Winter Springs, can be reached at ...

Teamsters Not Seeking Shield Against Feds - AFL-CIO Chief

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) - AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland says the return of the Teamsters to the labor federation involves "no shield or cover" against a reported federal effort to place the scandal-plagued union in trusteeship.

in a move predicted to strengthen labor's hand at the bargaining table, the AFL-ClO's Executive Council voted unanimously during the weekend to readmit the Teamsters, which was ousted from the AFL-ClO in a corruption scandal 30 years ago.

The Justice Department is reportedly preparing a suit to place the 1.8 million-member union under a government trustee. But Kirkland said of Saturday's readmission vote. "There is no shield or cover involved in this. Their affiliation does not change our position . . . We'll oppose (the civil suit) by whatever means are available."

The AFL-ClO's 35-member Executive Council in August condemned the possible suit.

21,000 Pounds Of Pot Seized

MIAMI (UPI) - A Coast Guard cutter escorted two fishing boats carrying 21,000 pounds of marijuana from the Windward Passage to Miami where they were handed over to the Vice President's task force, Coast Guard officials said

Both vessels were seized during routine boardings by crew from the cutter Chase. Coast Guard Petty Officer Luis Diaz said.

The vessels, marijuana and 13 crewmen were turned over to the cutter Cape Gull, which arrived at the Coast Guard's Miami Beach station late Sunday

The first, the 40-foot vessel Coral Reef, carried about 15,000 pounds of marijuana.

Accused Sex Killer 'Incompetent'

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI) - Prosecutors may have to drop charges against a 40-year-old mental patient police called one of the worst serial sex killers in the city's history if his condition does not improve enough to stand trial. officials said Sunday.

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

Stock Normalcy Predicted

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The New York Stock Exchange chairman, predicting a return to normal trading hours Wednesday, maintains investors across the country are reasonably confident in the future of the rollercoaster market.

Speaking a day before the market resumed abbreviated hours this morning, John Phelan Jr. assumed an upbest attitude as Wall Street traders. worked a long weekend cleaning up the paper deluge unleashed in the worst week on record.

"I think the individual investor as well as the institutional investor is reasonably optimistic," Phelan said.

BAA Ash

"I think if given a period of quiet, they will assess what's going on: they will look for value," Phelan told his interviewers on the Sunday talk show that the exchange would look at ways of regulating institutional program traders, who have computers handle huge blocks of stock in an effort to profit from the difference between the cash value of stocks and futures contracts based on those stocks.

Economiats said the exchange's decision Tuesday to impose sharp restrictions on program trading helped the market regain some equilibrium from the stunning 508-point plunge in the Dow Jones industrial average Monday.

Wholesale Gas Prices Up

LOS ANGELES [UPI] - Gasoline prices showed virtually no change in the last two weeks. but dramatic changes in wholesale prices may portend a rise in the near future, a leading

oil industry analyst said Sunday. The national average price of a gallon of gasoline as of Friday was down only .014 of a penny from the week of Oct. 9., said Trilby Lundberg, who conducts a biweekly survey of 13,000 gasoline stations nationwide.

Wallace said that Saturday morning he con-tacted both the FHP and the Seminole County Sheriff's Department to see if the 1976 Buick Skylark he had just bought had been towed. He was told that it had not been and at about 11:30 a.m. Saturday reported to sheriff's deputies that the car had been stolen.

Monday morning a sheriff's investigator told Wallace his car had been towed and he would have to contact the FHP to get it back. The sheriff's investigator pointed out the car had a license tag which was not assigned to that car.

Wallace said he told the investigator that he had explained to the first deputy that he talked to about his car that the man he had bought it from had put an unassigned tag on the car so he could drive the vehicle before he would be able to change resistration on Monday. Wallace said he had proof of insurance for the car, a bill of sale and the car's title.

When he called the DeLand Florida Highway Patrol office Monday to confirm that they had towed his car he was told by a dispatcher that the car had been towed and that he would have to wait until Davis, who had put a hold order on the car, returned to work at 10 p.m. Tuesday.

Wallace said he talked to a couple of Highway Patrol supervisors in DeLand and was told that no one could help him but Davis. Meanwhile, his storage charges for his car were adding up.

At 5 a.m. Wednesday Wallace called the FHP and left a message for Davis, who returned the call and cleared the way for Wallace to get his car Wednesday morning.

FHP Lt. Randy Harper, from Orlando, said he checked with Davis on Wednesday and determined that Davis had arrived early Saturday at the scene of a reported accident and found Wallace's unattended vehicle which appeared to have been damaged in a crash into a ditch beside

Wallace, who was not at the scene when Davis was, said Wednesday he had not been in an accident, but had run off the road to keep from hitting a car that had made a sudden stop in front of his vehicle as he was driving east.

Wallace said his car had not hit a nearby fence. but he could not get it out of the ditch, so had left it to return for it about six hours later.

Harper said that Davis could not link Wallace to the car before it was towed, since it was not yet registered to him and since the license tag was also assigned to another vehicle. Davis believed the car had been in an accident and suspected it

might have been stolen, so he ordered it towed and held.

When Wallace called the FHP about the car. Harper said, troopers had no proof of his ownership, because of the registration and tag not being in his name.

That, Sanders said, has brought another change in FHP procedure. Now, when a trooper radios in to a dispatcher vehicle identification numbers, which the dispatcher determines are not consistant with the assignment to the vehicle in question, the dispatcher must immediatedly notify the trooper that there is a problem and the trooper will then order further checks to determine ownership of the vehicle. Before, the status of the vehicle was not reported back to the trooper.

Because of the unassigned tag being on Wallace's car and the fact that the car had not yet heen registered to him, although he had proof of ownership, Sanders said that FHP workers in the DeLand office on Monday had no way of knowing he owned the car. They also did not know why Davis had impounded it.

Harper said Wallace had to wait to deal only with Davis because it was required by the FHP that Wallace prove his ownership of the car to Davis, which he did Wednesday morning. Harper said only Davis could order the car released after placing a hold on it.

That's something else that has been changed. Now, when a trooper puts a hold order on a vehicle the trooper must leave a record outlining the reasons for the impound and identifying the owner if possible, at the FHP office, so other troopers the following day could release the car if the impounding trooper is not on duty.

Sanders said that because there were mistakes made on both sides, and because Wallace's bill for towing and storage, was so high - partially because the FHP couldn't release the vehicle on Monday - and because he did have proof of ownership. Wallace will not be charged for having an improper license tag on the car.

Wallace said he also has a bone to pick with Altamonte Towing, because he claims the damage to his car was not caused as he drove forward into the ditch. He said that the fact that the car's radio antenna and mirror have been twisted forward shows the car was drugged against the fence as it was pulled backwards out of the ditch.

Tracger said the company denies damaging the car. She said the only part of the car touched by towing equipment is the tires, and that no damage was done in pulling the car up out of the

Askew said the United States also misjudged its breconomic competition, particularly in Japan, and that the misjudgment was a reflection of prewar to economic thinking. Before WWII, the economy of the United States

was not too dependent on trade with other Countries, he said. But after WWII, the economy of the United States became enmeshed with that to of other countries.

So, when it came to post-war business "competition. American businesses were still "thinking of domestic competition whereas there was a significant and unconsidered competitive threat from foreign countries with lower labor

"This country did not adjust to the change in the nature of competition," he said.

Askew also said that governmental measures taken to protect U.S. businesses thwarted freemarket enterprise and in time hurt American businesses.

As by way of an example, said Askew. regulation of the domestic oil industry kept gas prices artificially low. As long as the price of gas was low, there was no need for American automakers to build a gas-efficient, small car. Thus, when gasoline prices were eventually forced up by OPEC, the American auto industry was caught in the locker room rather than in the race.

However, the consequences of higher petroleum prices and Japan's competition is that American automakers are now making better cars than they did 10 years ago.

Also holding back the country, economically, is the adversarial relationship between government and business, and business and labor, Askew " said.

Outrageous **Bear Stuns** Bucs, 27-26

TAMPA (UPI) - Jim McMahon lived up to his favorite expression — "outrageous."

Chicago's injury-plagued quarterback has supplemented his football salary in recent years by hawking motorcycles on television. As the camers zeroes in on the Bears' rebel without a pause, McMahon utters the single word, "Outrageous," before resuming the fabricated cocky pose that has made him a hot item on Madison Avenue.

Making his first appearance since separating his right throwing shoulder 11 months ago, McMahon ran for one touchdown and hit Neal Anderson for the winning score with 88 seconds remaining Sunday in rallying the Bears to a 27-26 triumph against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

"The ideal situation would have been for me to come into the game with a lead and break things in slowly," said McMahon, who replaced Mike Tomczak to start the second half

with Chicago trailing 23-14. In the first game for regular players following the end of the NFL strike, Steve DeBerg helped stake Tampa Bay to a 20-0 lead with two first-quarter scoring

The Buccaneers, 3-3, had a chance to tie the Bears, 5-1, for first place in the NFC Central Division as a sun-drenched crowd of 70,747 gleefully welcomed back Tampa Bay's regular players. McMahon completed 17 of 24 passes for 195 yards, finding Anderson from six yards

out for the winning score. "It would have been easy to throw in the towel, but we didn't," said Chicago Coach Mike Ditka. "Jim McMahon did it on his own with a lot of help from his offensive line. He's a tough son of a gun. We're going to try and keep him healthy. Jim is our starting quarterback and will be our starting quarterback until something changes. McMahon started the winning drive at his own 29 with 2:44 left and one timeout remaining. He found Willie Gault for gains of 19 and 16 yards and hit rookie Ron Morris for 19 yards. On second and five from the 6-yard line. Anderson took a swing pass in the right flat and vaulted into the end zone for the final two yards as the Bears beat the Buccaneers for the 10th consecutive time.

"I admire McMahon more than any quarterback in the game," said Tampa Bay linebacker Scot Brantley. "He's not a follower. but a trend setter. They rallied behind him and he's their rally cap: he's like a linebacker in a quarterback's uniform."

DeBerg, who was sacked seven times, completed 23 of 38 passes for 249 yards. He threw TD passes of 7 yards to Calvin Magee and 28 yards to running back Jeff Smith off a flea-flicker. McMahon, Anderson Too Much For Tampa

TAMPA - Jim McMahon reaffirmed his position as the team's No. 1 quarterback and Neal Anderson returned to his home state in a blaze of glory as the Chicago Bears pulled out a 27-26 comeback victory over the hard-luck Tampa Bay Buccaneers Sunday before 70,747 fans at Tampa Stadlum.

McMahon, playing his first game since hurting his shoulder in November of 1986, replaced Mike Tomczak to start the third period and completed 17 of 24 passes for 195 yards, scoring on a 1-yard plunge with 5:31 remaining and finding Anderson from aix yards out for the winning TD pass.

"The ideal situation would have been for me to come into the game with a lead and break things in slowly," McMahon said. 'Unfortunately, that wasn't the case.'

After being bothered by a feroclous Tampa Bay pass rush much of the third and early fourth quarter, McMahon looked like the same man who led the Bears to the Super Bowl championship two years ago as he directed two impressive acoring drives.

The winning drive started at Chicago's 29-yard line with 2:44 left. McMahon found Willie Gault for gains of 19 and 16 yards. and connected with rookie Ron Morria for 19 yards. On second down at the Tampa Bay 6-vard line. Anderson took a screen pass to the right and vaulted into the end zone for the final yard.

DEAR READER - Meny pesticides, being toxic compounds, cause hair loss. Sometimes, pesticide byproducts can be measured in the blood; often they are either too difficult to analyse precisely or are quickly excreted from the body, after they have done their damage.
Your family's hair problems

could be related to distinon. However, your exposure was short-lived and your tests are apparently normal. Therefore, I think that it is safe for you to wait and see if - with time normal hair grows in. Of course, you will want to check periodically with your doctor to make sure that no other, more serious abnormalities develop.

In addition, you might want to contact the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to request further information. A survey of your home environment (to identify other compounds that could be causing your problem) might also be helpful; sak your town building inspector how to

go about getting this done.

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
