

Kissinger Defends His Role In Wiretapping Of Aides

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger says he never questioned the legality of wiretaps directed against his closest aides in 1969 and that instead he relied on the assurances of former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and late FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Kissinger said the wiretaps on the telephones of his aides were personally ordered by President Richard M. Nixon to stop news leaks about the war in Indochina and strategic arms talks. Kissinger's account of his role in the wiretap program

appeared in answers to written questions posed by lawyers for Morton Halperin, once an aide to Kissinger on the White House National Security Council. Halperin is suing Kissinger and other government officials for civil damages in connection with the wiretap which Halperin contends was illegal.

NY Police Disarm Bomb

NEW YORK (AP) - Police found and disarmed a bomb early today that had been placed in front of the Iraqi mission to the United Nations. The same group that took responsibility for placing the bumb claimed to have planted three other bombs found Monday in a subway tunnel beneath the U.N. library building.

The bomb found at the Iraqi mission was made of two propane cylinders and a timing device and was timed to go off early this morning, police said. They estimated that damage would have been extensive to the mission, on Manhattan's upper East Side about two miles from the

An anonymous telephone caller told The Associated Press that the propane bomb had been planted by the "Jewish Armed Resistance Strike Unit in association with the Jewish Defense League."

Agency Budgets Untrimmed?

Mansfield says U.S. intelligence agencies have undergone sizable cuts in manpower, but are receiving as much government money as ever.

Mansfield, D-Mont., said in an interview Monday that the total number of persons working for the CIA and other intelligence agencies has dropped from 142,000 in 1969 to 80,000 today. Despite the 43 per cent cut in manpower, "there's been little or no constriction of funds" appropriated to the agencies by Congress, he said. Meanwhile, it was learned that former CIA Director Richard M. Helms is retaining a top trial lawyer to defend him against possible charges stemming from a 1971

Palestine Committee Named To Draft Mideast Resolution

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - The Arabs have named a five-member Palestine Committee of moderates and radicals to draft a resolution for the Security Council's debate on the Arab-Israeli dispute.

A. Esmat Abdel Meguid, Egypt's delegate to the United Nations, said the committee members named Monday night were Egypt, Syria and Jordan, all of which border on Israel; Libya, the current Arab member of the Security Council; and the Palestine Liberation

Egypt and Jordan were expected to exert a moderating influence on the militancy of Syria and the PLO and to act as a counter-weight to Libyan radicalism.

Coalition Proposal Rejected

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - Both Protestant and Roman Catholic militants today rejected the British government's proposal that they try again to agree on coalition rule of Northern Ireland. Both warned that the violence will continue, and the Protestants said it would The Protestants were angered because, as expected,

the government refused Monday to bow to their demand for the return of majority - meaning Protestant - rule to The Catholics of the Irish Republican Army's

Provisional wing, fighting to reunite Ireland, said the British proposal for a resumption of negotiations would "prolong the agony of the Irish people" because Britain refused to withdraw from Northern Ireland.

African Summit Deadlocked

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP)- The African summit conference on Angola broke up in bitter deadlock early Tuesday, and all three Angolan factions said they planned to continue their civil war.

A spokesman for the Organization of African Unity (OAU) announced that the chiefs of states and government heads from 46 African nations decided to adjourn after three days of debate. He said OAU officials would continue to study the problem of the war in the former Portuguese colony.

Another OAU summit six months ago created a sevennation conciliation commission that visited Angola but fuiled to achieve a casse-fire.



The Lesson Of LaGuardia

The bombing at La Guardia airport prompted President Ford to call some of the top federal transportation and law enforcement officials to a meeting at the White House. We can expect, as Mr. Ford promises, an intense federal effort to find out who was responsibile for the act of terrorism at La Guardia and to head off any other incidents of the same kind.

There is a question, however, over how intense that effort can be, given the present mood in Congress. The representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who met with the President comes from an agency that is already being raked over the coals for the vigorous way it responded to the wave of terrorism that accompanied the antiwar movement of the late 1960s. Yet the intelligence network of the FBI is our best, if not the only, weapon against the kind of terrorism represented in the La Guardia bombing. And the Central Intelligence Agency, which might enter the picture if the bombing had a foreign

the FBI about its mandate and its powers. John W. Gardner, the chairman of Common Cause, was commenting the other day about the kidnaping of oil ministers in Vienna by Palestinian proaching in that type of political blackmail. The United States, he said, needs an intelligence ser vice capable of monitoring terrorist movements and he added: "When the stakes are high, wouldn't mess around."

The stakes are high indeed, and for the past year, when there have been recurring incidents of terrorism both here and abroad, our Congress has done nothing but mess around with our domestic and foreign intelligence services.

The telephoned threats received by 10 other airports around the country after the La Guardia bomb went off suggests there may be an organized group behind such crimes. It was the effort to follow up similar suspicion about anti-Vietnam bombings that led the FBI and the CIA into surveillance of radical organizations once before. The use of paid informers, wiretaps and mail covers. may be repugnant to our sense of civil liberties, but when dealing with people who are willing to plant bombs in crowded airline terminals it is folly to

play by the Queensbury rules. It is not a question of giving either the FBI or the CIA a blank check for covert operations. It is a question of getting those agencies back into the business of protecting national security with public support and the powers they need - subject to proper monitoring from above. The scope of the human tragedy and disruption of vital services which terrorism can bring has been demonstrated vividly at La Guardia airport. It's time we work up to the fact that our defense against any terrorist underground lies in those law enforcement and intelligence agencies which are seeing such a rough time in our own Congress.





First, however, the delegates must vote on whether to establish a so-called "super" division, which would tentatively include 91 institutions - seven major conferences plus 21 independents. And such a division would not take effect until Aug. 1.

Ms. Taylor, who police identified as a former girl friend of White, and six small children in the car, were unharmed, officers reported. Groceries were in the rear of the auto and police weren't immediately able to determine where White got into the car. Patrolman Joe Dillard said he had been to Ms. Taylor's residence twice earlier in the morning after she complained that White had entered the apartment and later returned and damaged the windshield of her auto with a bottle. Dillard reported White had been told to leave the area and not to return. Dunn said a black man came into the pawn shop on Second St. about 10:45 a.m. and looked at pistols, saying he would come back.
