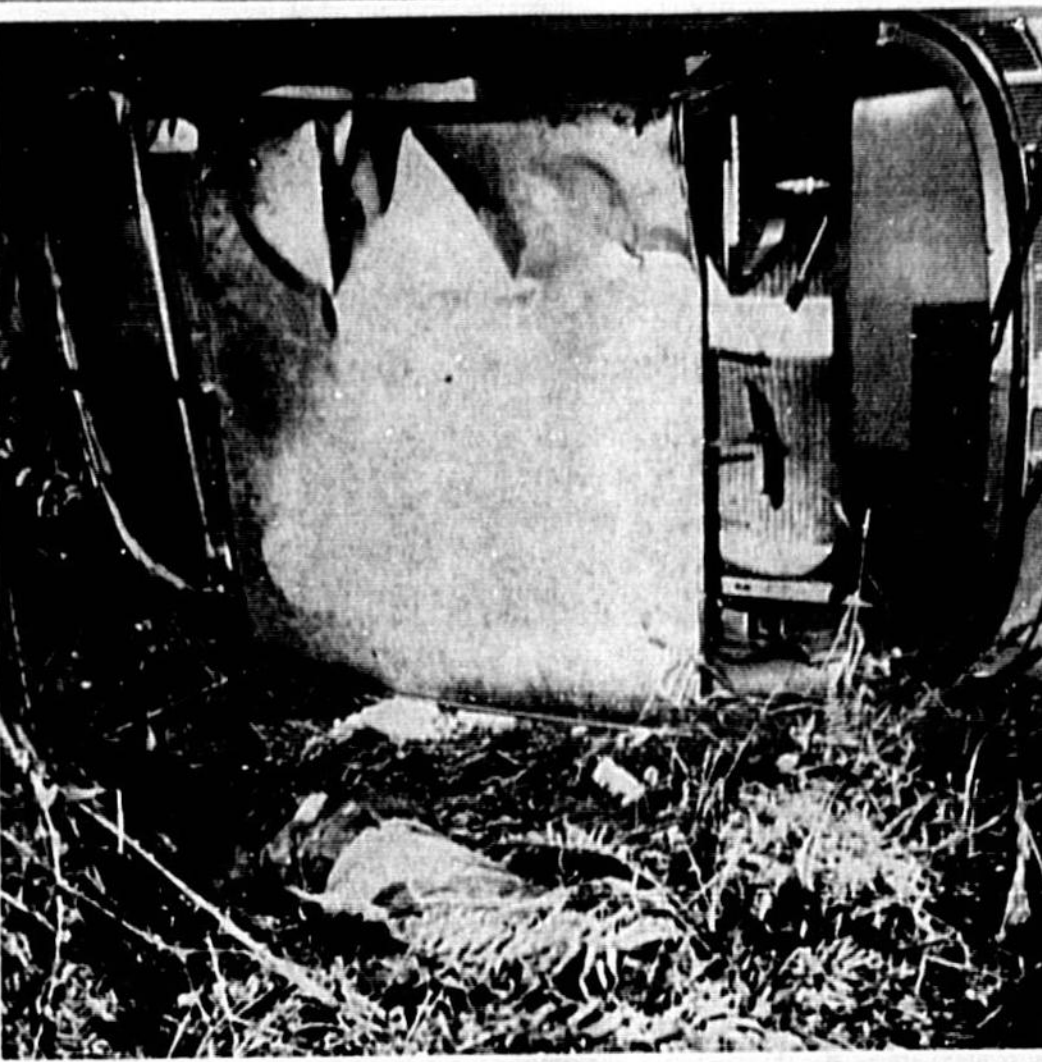


Wm. SEIBERGER Deputy Retires

Wallace Names Gen. LeMay As Running Mate

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Retired Air Force Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, who wants victory in Vietnam even if it takes nuclear weapons, was made George C. Wallace's vice-presidential candidate today.

"One of his outstanding characteristics that I admire greatly is his ability to speak his mind," said the former Alabama governor as he introduced LeMay to a full dress news conference.

"Gen. LeMay is a man of

peace," Wallace said. "He had dedicated his career to the defense and protection of his nation and the free world."

LeMay, who will be won the nickname "Old Ironpants" in both theaters of war in World War II, said Wallace has "proven to me that his every action is predicated on a desire to serve the United States of America. In fact, he is the only candidate who has been talking like an American."

"He is the only one who has spoken forthrightly on the issues and has expressed a willingness to take the necessary steps to win the war in Vietnam with honorable conditions," LeMay said.

"Some of my friends are surprised at my being here today," LeMay went on. "I am someone who has fallen by the wayside in a great victory over the communists."

LeMay said he had been a Republican all his life, but had

now lost confidence in the party and was seeking the same thing with no promise of effect. Wallace, he said, "is the only man who has been talking like an American."

"I look at the Democratic party and this is what I see—over the past few years the stature of the party has deteriorated our moral values and the characteristics which made this country great have fallen by the wayside," LeMay said.

Editorial Comment

Collins For US Senate--The TV Debates

Now that the second and final TV debate between the candidates for the United States Senate between former Gov. Leroy Collins and U.S. Rep. Edward Gurney has taken place, there are at least two conclusions that seem valid. One is that such debates, while helpful in bringing about face-to-face confrontation, do not provide substantial guides for the conscientious voter.

While this can be applied to all elections—especially to the presidential—it is certainly a need in this contest between a veteran, experienced Democrat—Mr. Collins and a more recent entrant into the political scene, attractive, confident Republican—Mr. Gurney. We have watched the campaign of each aspirant. We have looked at the record of each man. We recog-

nize that the office that is at stake is one of the most prestigious in the world. But we also are convinced that the best interests of our nation and of our state would be served if the Florida voters look hard at the records, weigh the proved capacity of each man in terms of action and send former Governor Collins to Washington.

That they are helpful we would be the last to deny. But that they can be used in this form or even in an extended way to take the place of the political rally or the prime decision voters of Florida can make with their own eyes and ears is another matter entirely.

Pushme-Pully!

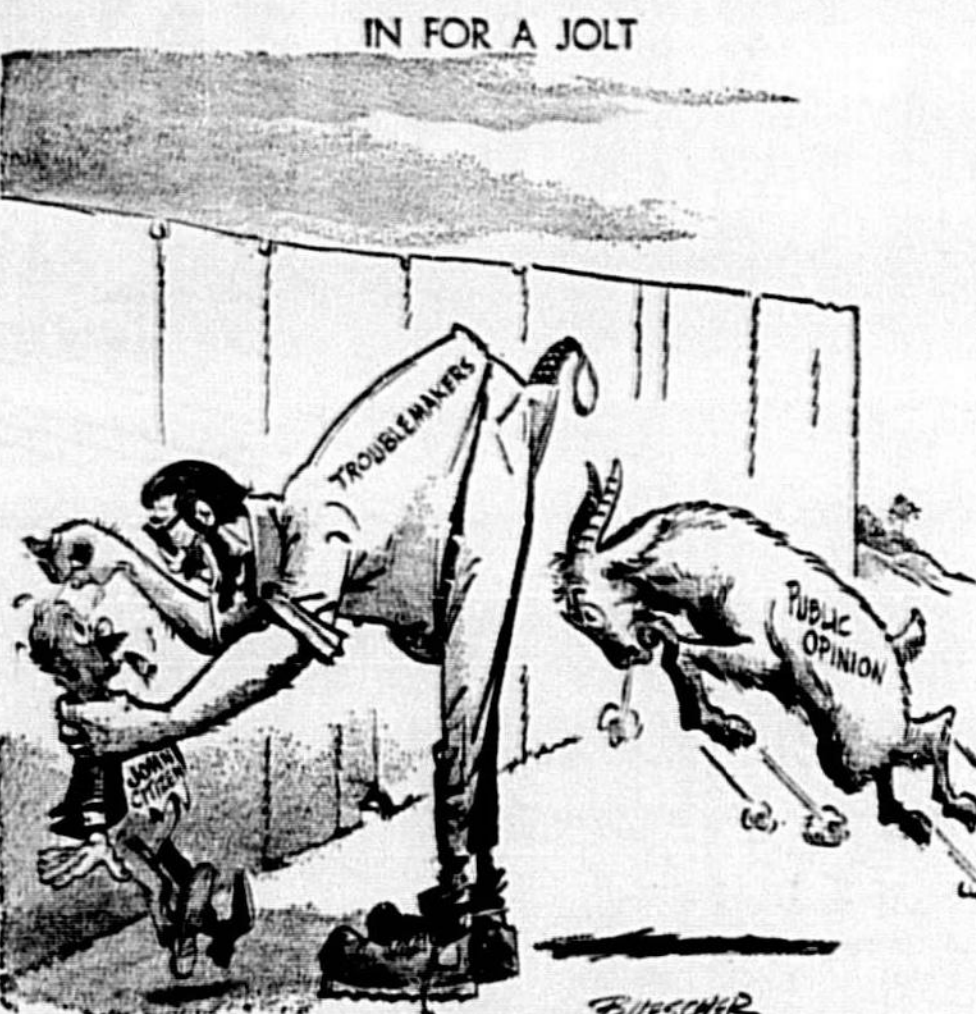
There's a mythical animal called a pushme-pully in the Doolittle book. This creature has two heads at opposite ends of its four-legged body and frequently has difficulty in making any movement because the two heads cannot agree on which direction they should go.

There's a modern day parallel in our federal bureaucracy which has become so large and unco-ordinated that some agencies are pushing in one direction while others are pulling the other way. A good case in point is the federal attitude on cigarettes. The surgeon general of the United States has actively campaigned to reduce smoking. The Federal Trade Commission has asked Congress to ban all cigarette advertising on radio and television. As justification for this, FTC says the airwaves should not be used to promote products that can be harmful to the public in normal use.

If the FTC wins the right to control cigarette advertising, which is aimed at making smoking less attractive and thereby cutting the number of smokers, it will be contrary to the goal of the Treasury Department. That agency now collects more than \$2 billion a year in taxes on cigarette sales and has set its sights on the treasury is looking for ways to raise tax revenue, not reduce it.

There's more absurd contradiction among the agencies. The anti-smoking campaign is being sponsored by the Department of Agriculture which has subsidized tobacco farmers since 1938 with price-support payments totaling \$80 million. There's also an export-subsidy program for tobacco which has cost \$25 million since 1965. And the Department of Agriculture subsidizes promotion of overseas advertising of American cigarettes with counterpart funds at the cost of several hundred thousand dollars.

This the taxpayers are supporting anti-tobacco and pro-tobacco campaigns at the same time.—Houston (Tex.) Chronicle.

Agnew - Nixon's Political Pupil

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The education of Ted Agnew will have to be one of Richard M. Nixon's major projects if Nixon is elected president. The Republican vice presidential nominee has brought together too much realism into the political discussion of 1968 and it won't do.

Of course, "soft on communism" is one of the unspoken issues of the 1968 campaign. Of course, the phrase law and order has a racial connotation. Of course, politicians do talk about the "Placid" vote. And, of course, politics was involved in the conditional retirement of Chief Justice Earl Warren.

Nixon, who has learned the lesson himself, will have to teach Agnew that more indirection is required and that telling it like it is has emotional limits on the national scene. Listening to the Maryland governor is an unmeriting experience. He has just that margin of knowledge of complicated subjects which seems reassuring to a point and then he stuns his auditors by calmly stating conclusions that speed the party guest in a huff.

The other guy the Maryland governor was in a huff over was the case for Earl Warren as a man and as chief justice until he arrived at his conclusion that Warren "knew everything to the Republican

another and he intends to remain above the strife. Who can doubt, either, that judges are appointed for political reasons and that some have been known to reveal their bias? But these are things talked about in decent political society only in the back room.

For every man who wished to "impinch Earl Warren" there was another who wished to delish him and to condemn as loathsome clouds those who questioned in any way the decisions of the "Warren Court."

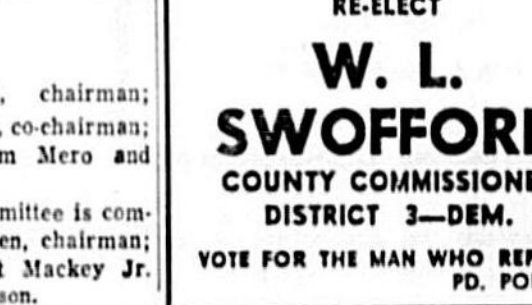

Sentinel Missile OK Seen

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate has virtually assured construction of the \$1 billion Sentinel antiballistic missile system by selecting the fourth attempt this year to block funds for the project.

An attempt failed 45 to 24 Wednesday to cut \$384 million in Sentinel funds from the \$71.9 billion defense appropriations bill. The defense measure, facing possible final vote today after action on an amendment by Sen. J. Lee McClell, D-Mont., to cut the bill by 10 per cent, is the largest single money proposal ever to come before the Senate.

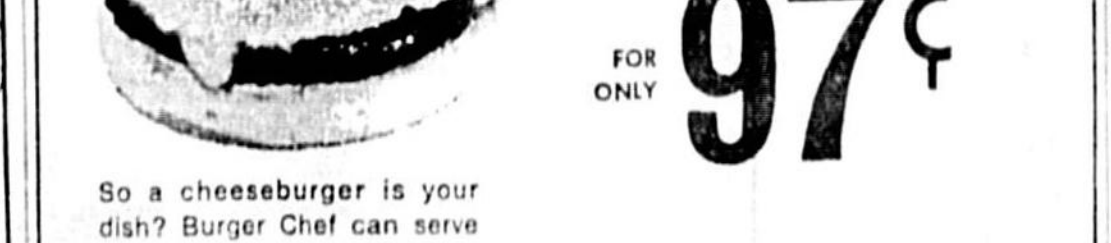

For Chief Justice Job LBJ Left With Three Choices

WASHINGTON (AP) — The withdrawal of Abe Fortas' nomination to be chief justice has left President Johnson with three choices.

Chief Justice Earl Warren said earlier he'd stay on if Fortas weren't confirmed by the Senate, removing any need for quick action.

He will be on the bench when the Supreme Court opens Monday.

Warren said last July his open-ended retirement—which was seized as a major issue by Fortas opponents—would be a danger of 4-to-4 decision in the Supreme Court term beginning Monday.

Johnson could submit a new nomination before Congress adjourns, or make a recess appointment that would be subject to confirmation in the Senate's next session. And he could simply do nothing.

The men who spearheaded the opposition to the Fortas nomination and cheered its withdrawal Wednesday are for this last alternative. They promised to fight any attempt by Johnson to name a new chief justice.

"It would be the better part of wisdom for him not to send up a

new nomination," said Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., who started the drive against Fortas.

"We are on the eve of a decision by the people concerning new government," he said.

Asked if he thought Johnson would offer another chief justice nomination, Sen. Howard H. Baker, R-Tenn., said: "I very much hope he doesn't."

In 1966, Johnson as majority leader supported a resolution that Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., guided through the Senate opposing any recess Supreme Court appointments by outgoing President Eisenhower.

Warren told a news conference last July: "I am obliged to stay on. I suppose that under the oath I am obliged to perform the duties of my office. I neither expect nor hope that would be a fact." He said then

Courthouse Restricted For Safety

Sighs of relief that the ancient building has lasted another week can be heard from employees at the Seminole County courthouse each Friday after noon as offices close for another weekend.

The old facility, which has survived long after its sons and adequate life has ended, is now and perhaps will continue for some time to be the housing place of all the county's official documents and records.

"Is the courthouse a safe structure for people to be in," one time, but we can't even be sure that number is safe," Ferguson said pointing out that only two beams hold up the second floor.

Fire hazard in the facility is another problem Ferguson went into. "It is an old wooden structure. It's been rewired but a fire hazard always exists where you have papers."

The building purchased by the county after its creation in 1913 was originally owned by the Elks Club. The present courtroom was a dance floor at

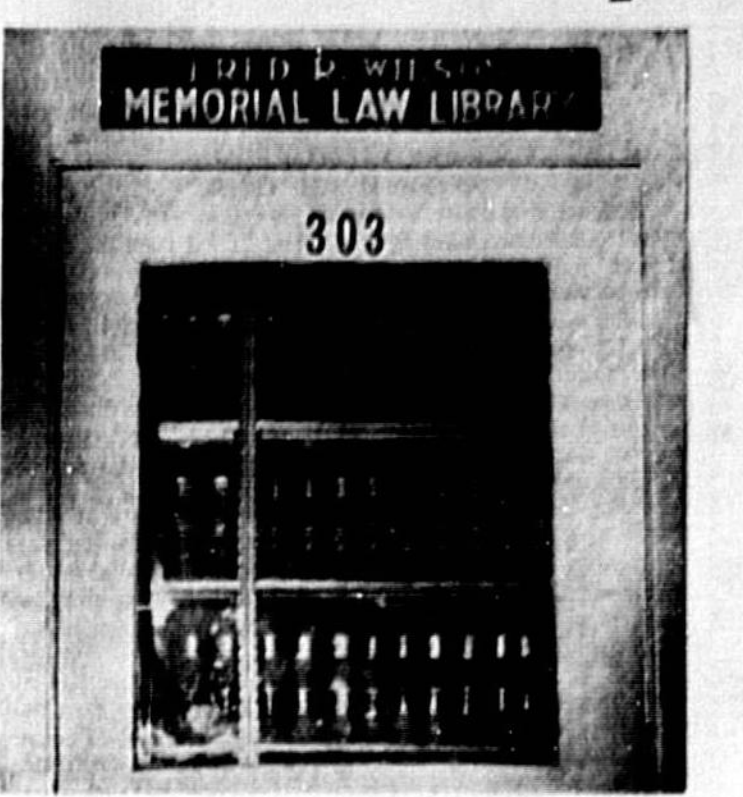
one time. Purchase price for the structure was \$33,000. Seminole holds the only county of the 67 in Florida which has never built a courthouse.

Latest remodeling of the facility was done in 1959 at cost of \$60,000.

Two years ago, John A. Burton IV, architect, in the courthouse facilities report prepared for the County Commission, cited the fact the "existing court house does not comply with the building code or fire laws and

should be abandoned and demolished as soon as practicable. If necessary to conserve current funds, the old building can be used temporarily for county offices in which the functions are such that loss by fire or otherwise would be less than a catastrophe."

At the same time, inspectors of the county zoning office have requested and committee of the Fred R. Wilson Memorial Law Library have headed the request that no additional law books be purchased for the li-
