# Disabled Vet Proves Hero

A Korean War veteran with a bad leg pulled a Sanford woman out of Lake Monroe after her 1965 Rambler station wagon went out of control on U.S. 17-92, and plunged into the lake at the Sanford city limits Saturday night.

Jimmy Hess, 37, of New Castle, Del., was sitting on the seawall fishing when the car came off the pavement, hit a sign and plunged into the lake about 30 feet from where he was sitting.

Not knowing about how deep the water was and without realizing he might not be able to swim with his bad leg, Hess jumped into the lake and pulled Wanda Miser Cowart, 27, of 915 1/2 Maple Avenue through a window. By then, other people had stopped and they helped pull her up on shore.

With the woman hysterically screaming that there was someone else in the car, Hess made two more trips to the car, but he was unable to locate anyone else.

Lt. Charles Weber of the sheriff's rescue department was called to the scene and he dove around the area where the car went in. The car was finally pulled from the lake about two hours after the 10:45 p. m. accident.

Mrs. Cowart was charged with driving while intoxicated by Trooper P.E. Dixon. Sgt. William Vinton, of the sheriff's department, added an additional charge of disorderly conduct after the woman caused a commotion at Seminole Memorial Hospital.

According to officers, she locked herself in a rest room and they had to break in the door to get her out. She was lodged in the Seminole county jail on the two charges.

Hess is a construction worker at the new Seminole County courthouse, currently under construction.

## Girl Nicked By Bullet At Big Tree

A 12-year-old Longwood girl, one of several children and adults on a 4H Club outing at Big Tree Park Saturday, received a narrow escape when a ricocheted bullet, fired from a .22 pistol or rifle, left a small scratch after striking the girl on the neck.

Laura Leigh Morgan, daughter of Robert and Sara Morgan, was one of 15 persons, including three adults, at the park when a bullet apparently fired by nearby target shooters, hit Laura in the area of the jugular vein.

The youngster said the bullet stung, and, at first she thought someone had hit her with an acorn, but then "I felt it in my shirt collar."

She explained after producing the spent slug.

According to Laura's mother various area residents have reported hearing bullets in the area, and many junk cars along the roadway bear evidence of the illicit firing range, with numerous bullet holes.

Mrs. Morgan said other people has reported hearing bullets zooming about the area and advised that "Jim and Nell Lyles (other area residents) had reported having to dodge bullets on occasion."

Sheriff John Polk said today his office is aware of the problem and stated the shooting would definitely be stopped. "Arrests will be made," Polk added.

## County Move Fails

A motion to dismiss a \$6 million law suit filed by Stanley Gecosky, et al, against the Seminole County Board of County Commissioners has been denied by U. S. District Judge George C. Young in Orlando.

Gecosky is instituting the litigation charging intimidation in fair housing cases and violation of the due process clause of the U. S. Constitution in condemning real property without condemnation proceedings.

Gecosky alleged that the defendants and their agents denied the plaintiff's rights to park trailers on the land which he owns and for which he pays county taxes. Plaintiff also alleges the zoning ordinances are illegal.

Judge Young stated in his order that after consideration of the briefs and oral arguments, the motion to dismiss be denied. He explained this is not a ruling upon the merits of the case, in that the plaintiffs still have the burden of proving their claims. The ruling, the court stipulates, merely indicates that the claims are able to prove the allegations of a count of the complaint, they would have a claim upon which relief could be granted.

# President Campaigns In N.Y., Ohio And Ky.

With the election just two weeks and a day away, President Nixon today started the biggest week so far of his reelection drive. He will campaign in New York, Kentucky and Ohio.

Meanwhile, Sen. George McGovern said it would be ironic if a pre-election settlement of the Vietnam war hurt his chances of beating Nixon, although he would "rejoice along with all other Americans" over an end to the war.

The editor of the Republican party newsletter "Monday" acknowledged that he helped other Democratic candidates try to defeat Sen. Edmund M. Muskie, D-Maine, during the presidential primary in New Hampshire. It was a "justifiable campaign tactic," added John D. Lofton Jr.

Both Vice President Spiro T. Agnew and his Democratic opponent, Sargent Shriver, were campaigning today. Agnew planned to be in Missouri, Idaho and Utah, while Shriver had stops in Ohio and Illinois.

President Nixon headed for the New York City suburbs. His schedule included a motorcycle through Westchester County, a reception at the Tarrytown home of Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and rallies at Uniondale and Islip on Long Island.

He will return to Washington tonight, but has other campaign trips planned to Kentucky on Thursday and Ohio on Saturday.

Sen. McGovern, who takes his campaign for the presidency to Philadelphia and New York today, said he expects to win "by a narrow margin" on Nov. 7. He said he has two aides working on appointments and other immediate problems he would face if elected.

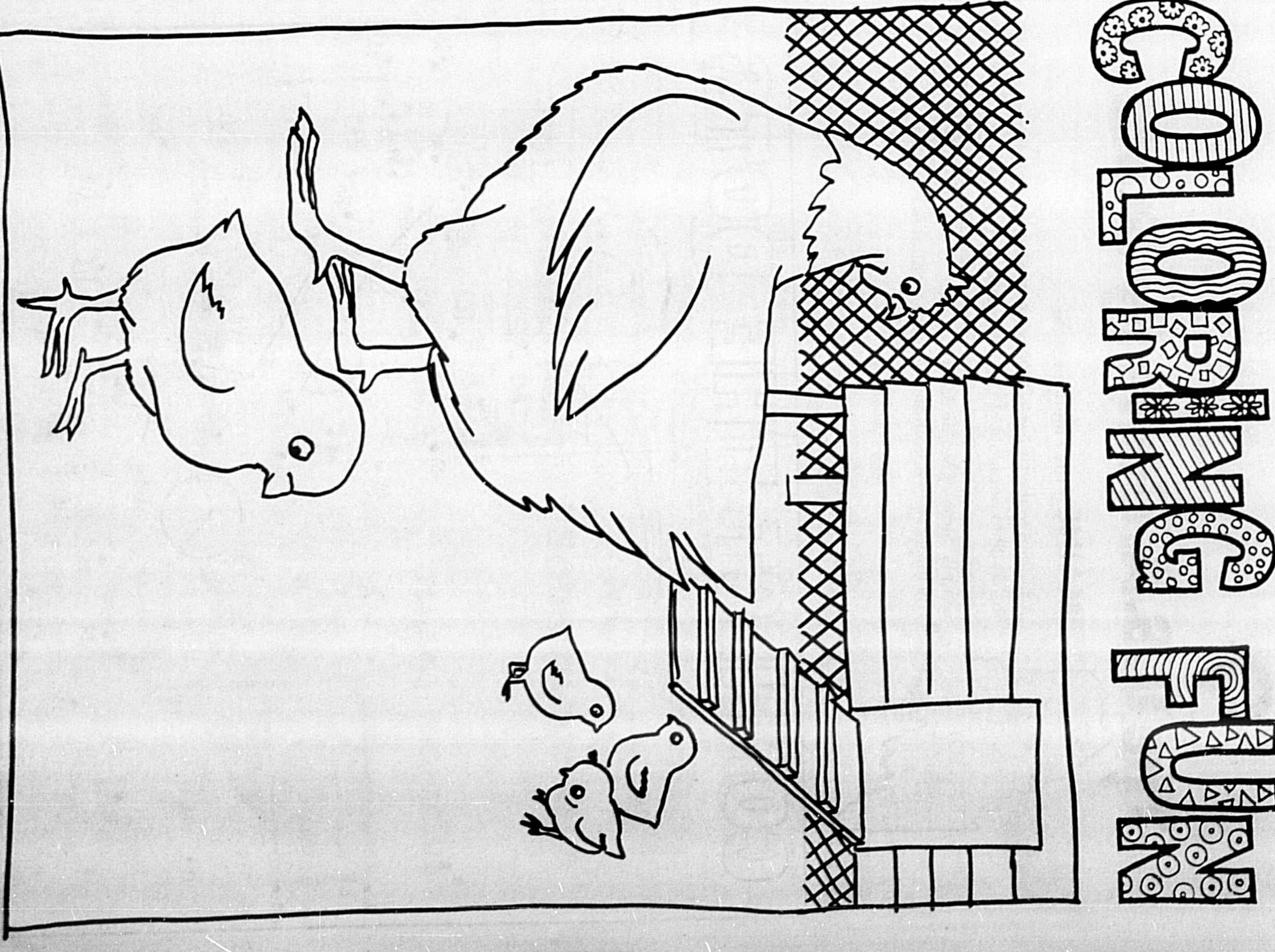
## Developer Proffers To Purchase Lot

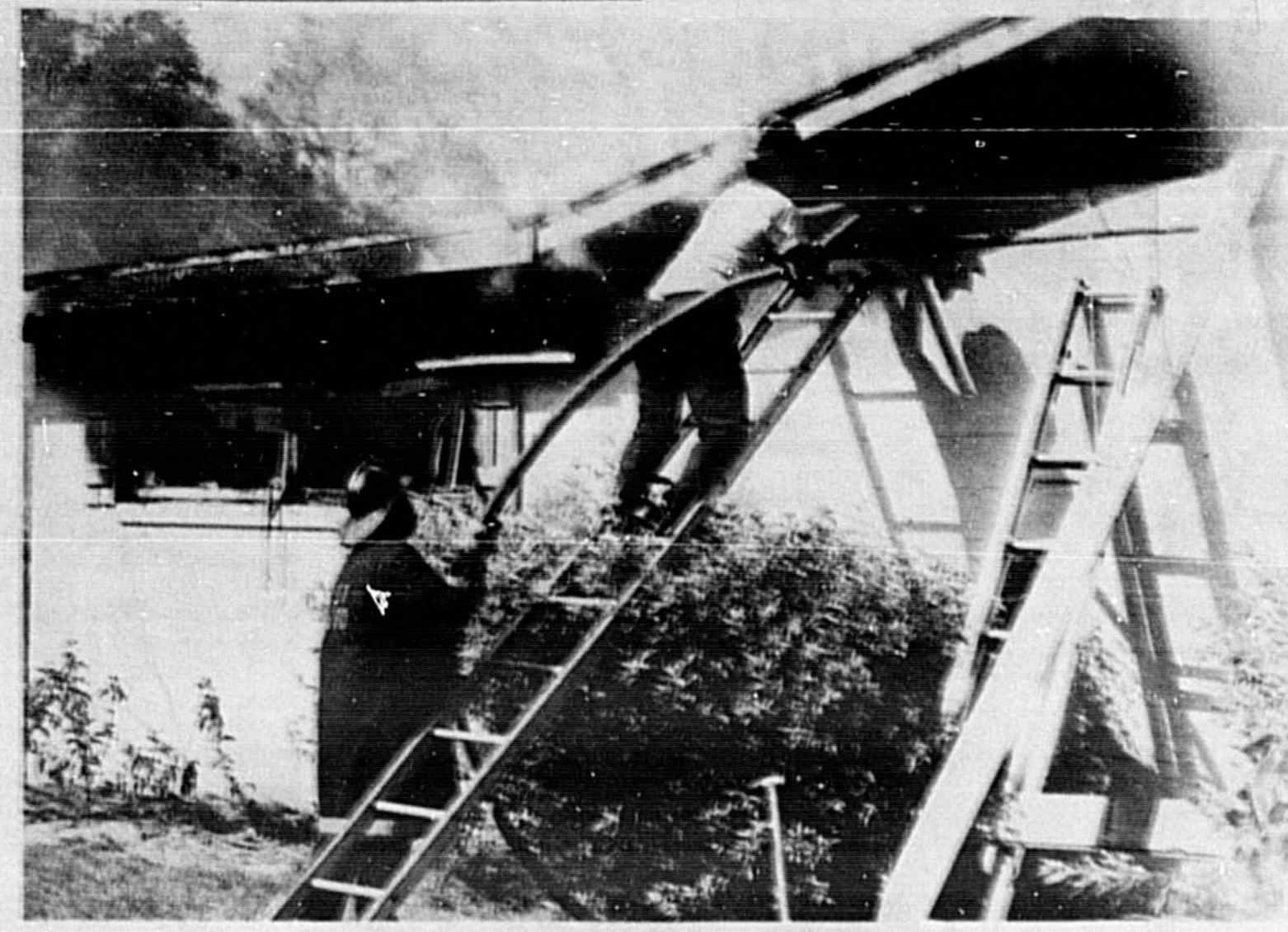

Dr. Hickman has asked the commission to set a value on the lot which he wants to purchase.

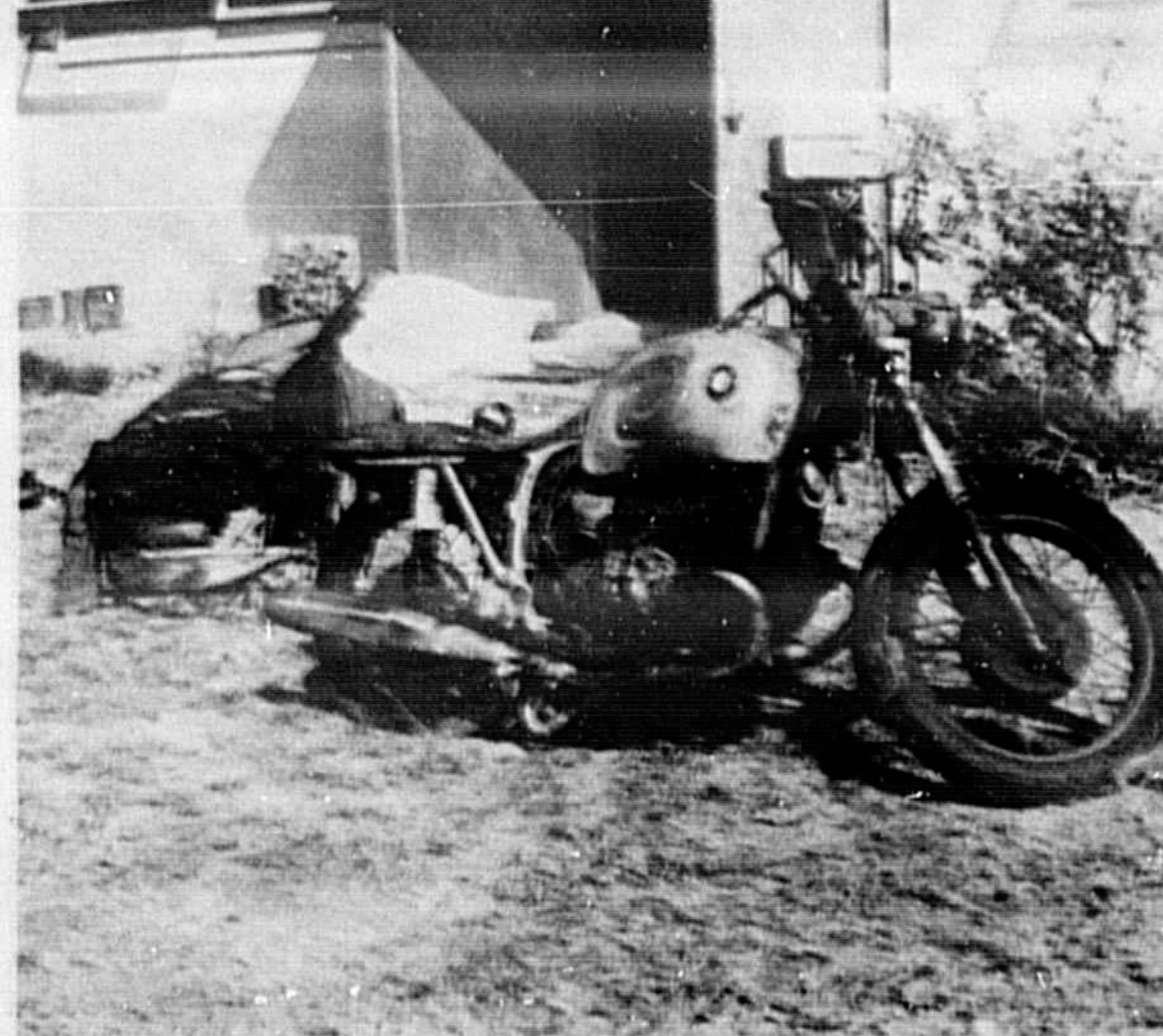

OAKLAND (AP) — Cheering and chanting "We're No. 1," an enthusiastic crowd of 25,000 Oakland Athletics fans clogged freeway approaches to Oakland International Airport and spilled onto the runways in a wild welcome to their World Series champions. 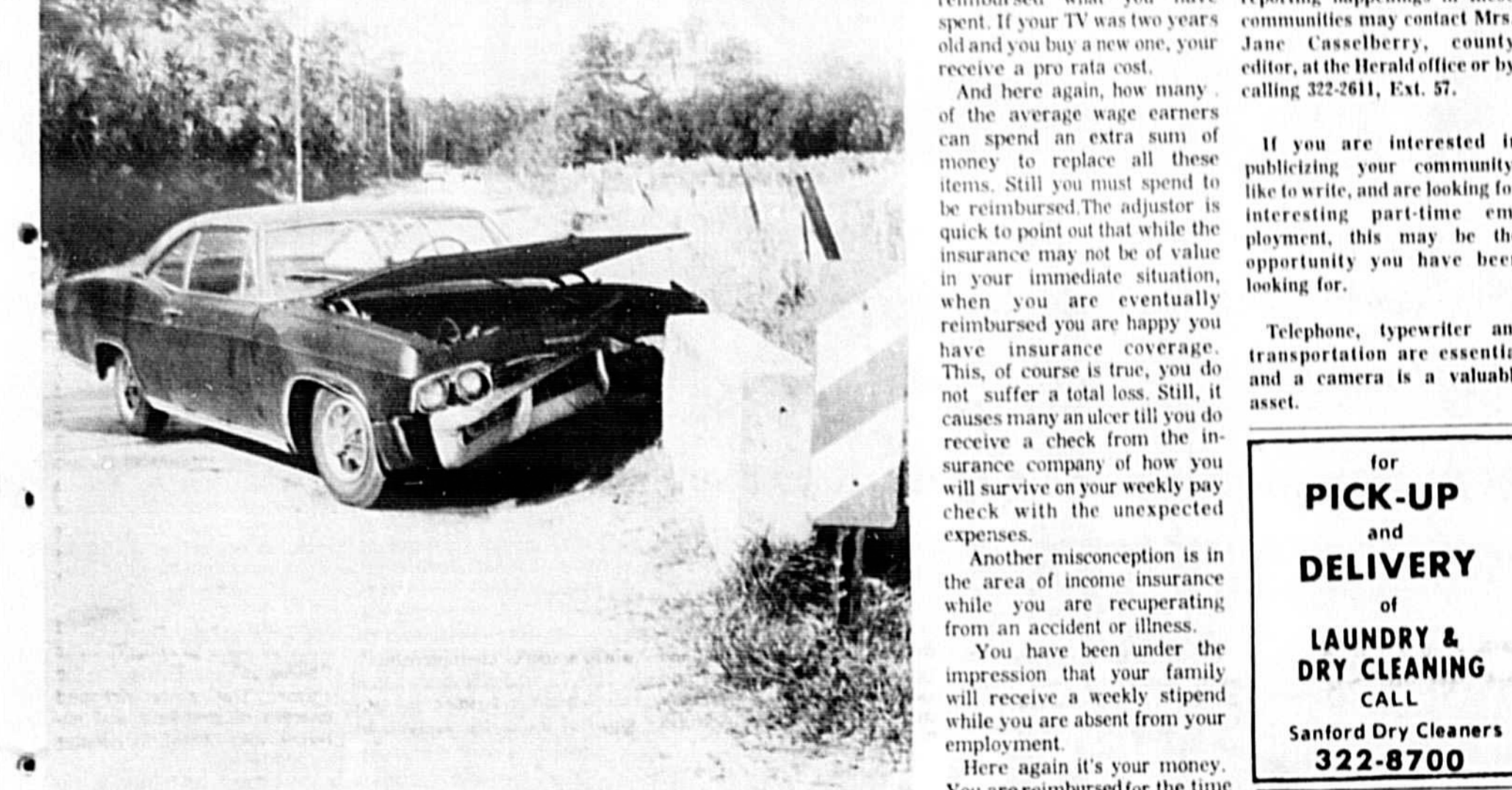

## Altamonte Mayor's Statement Causes Discussion Of Insurance Coverage

Instances Cited Where Misunderstandings May Occur On Many Policies

Should the insurance company feel the cost to be prohibitive of the style to which you are accustomed, you are simply out of pocket for the rent. Also, few persons, other than the affluent, can afford to make their mortgage payments in addition to paying rent while their home is under repair. Another instance in which one can expect a "hassle" with the adjuster is in the realm of the living expenses. Any housewife is aware that there is a certain amount of staple items which are not replaced on a weekly work basis, such as cosmetics, etc. However, when you are burned out, it is necessary when you return to your home after repairs or replacement, to completely replace these items. This is also true of frozen foods and canned goods. The adjuster considers your weekly grocery bill might approximate \$60 weekly or less. If you, in replacing the items not on a weekly basis, submit a bill for \$100 you have some explaining to do, and the adjuster has the final word in accepting your explanation, which he rarely does. If your clothing and furnishings are destroyed, don't count on the adjuster taking your word for their contents and value. You must be prepared to prove the freezer you lost was almost new. Then too, the adjuster suggests that all household contents be inventoried. Very few long time homeowners have an itemized list of what may be over 1,000 items in their homes. But, a word of caution, you had better be well aware of what you have in each and every room. Also, in replacing your clothes, furniture, appliances, etc., again you must be prepared to account for your finances. Here again, be cautious, you may not be reimbursed what you have spent. If your TV was two years old and you buy a new one, your receive a pro rata cost. And here again, how many of the average wage earners can spend an extra sum of money to replace all these items. Still you must spend to be reimbursed. The adjuster is quick to point out that while the insurance may not be of value in your immediate situation, when you are eventually reimbursed you are happy you have insurance coverage. This, of course is true, you do not suffer a total loss. Still, it causes many an ulcer till you do receive a check from the insurance company of how you will survive on your weekly pay check with the unexpected expenses. Another misconception is in the area of income insurance while you are recuperating from an accident or illness. You have been under the impression that your family will receive a weekly stipend while you are absent from your employment. Here again it's your money. You are reimbursed for the time you are ill when you return to work. In the meanwhile, your family must survive as best they can even though you have paid each week thinking you will have peace of mind. Of course, when you are still the insured, you recoup your monetary losses, but what to do while you recover and you are the only source of income to your family? Lastly, there is the much touted no fault insurance. It is all it promises to be, with one exception. If you are the innocent party, you are still the one who suffers. For example, there is an accident in which you are waiting at an intersection for the green light. A car in back of you, impatient to

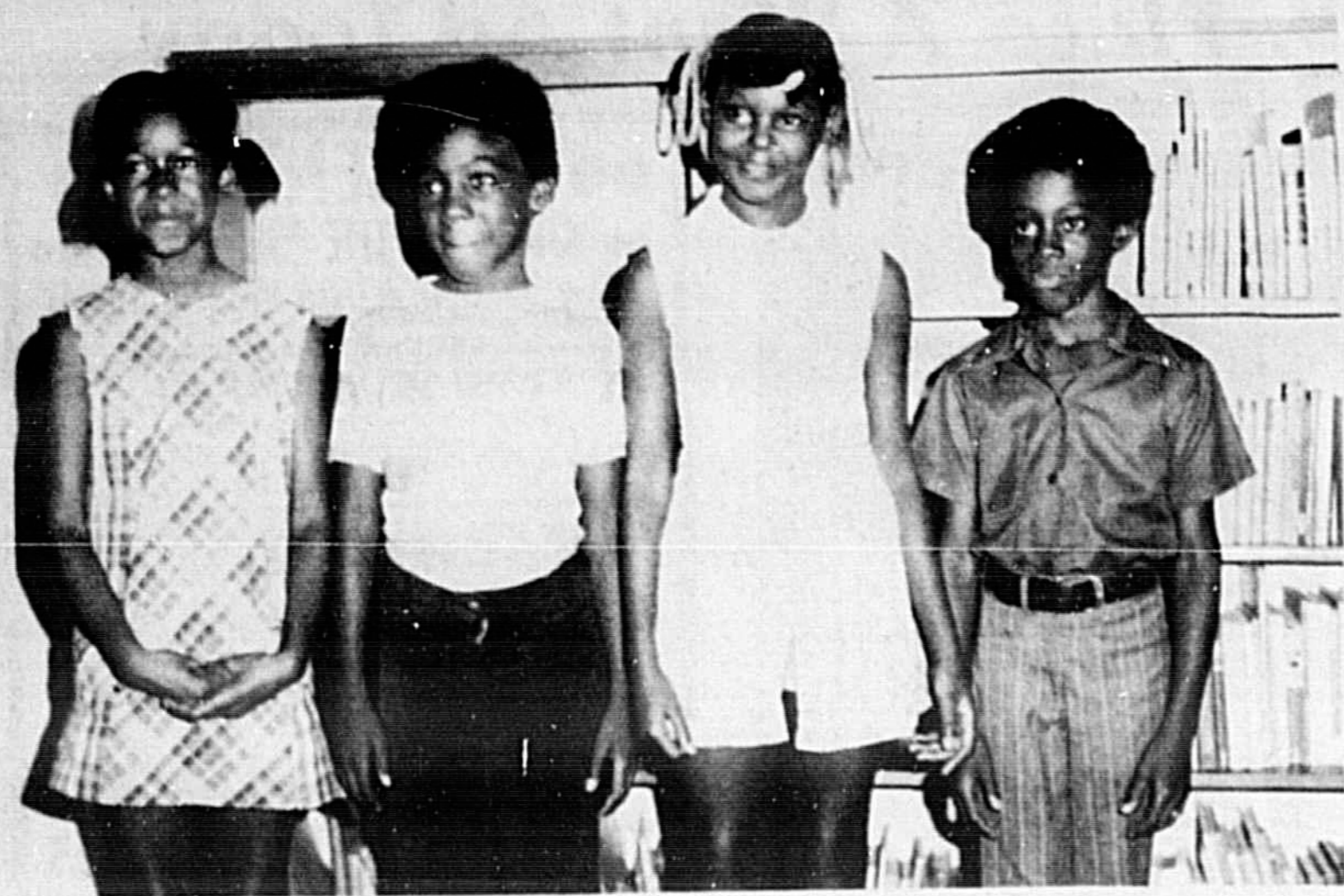

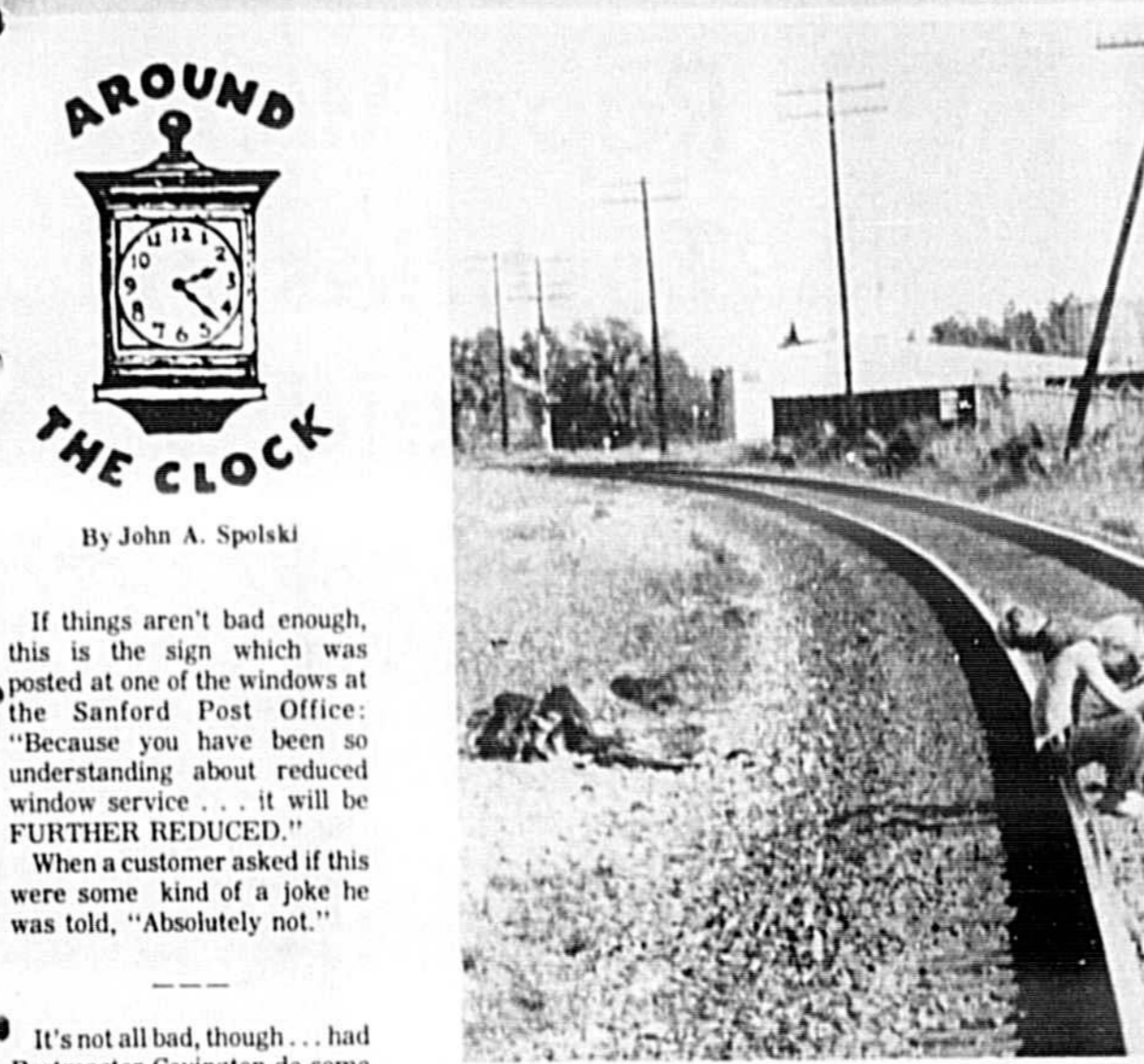
