



### PROFESSOR SEES ROOSEVELT REAL LEADER OF MEN

#### Describes President As Man Who Sees Necessity For Action

BOSTON—One factor only is responsible for the present change in the economic outlook of the United States, and that is that leadership has taken the place of disintegration, according to Dean Wallace B. Donham, of the Harvard School of Business Administration.

"Government is in the hands of a man who knows how to handle other men," he said. "President Roosevelt has great political skill. Furthermore, he is a man who realizes not only the necessity for action, as in quite apparent, but the necessity for that action to be directed primarily in the home area. International activity must be postponed until such time as the framework of this country has been straightened out to the point where individual initiative and ability might again begin to function."

Dean Donham recently brought out two books, "Business Adrift" and "Business Looks at the Unforeseen," which attracted a considerable stir. Though not a planner as implying an admission to rigid social controls, he takes the position that the United States can most quickly recover from the business emergency by emphasizing domestic mechanisms. In order to accomplish this object, he believes that high tariffs should be maintained so that established social groups in the United States should not be unbalanced.

"We cannot even understand, let alone control, a situation that is world-wide," he said. "But we can hope to understand and set up controls of domestic problems, and every single mechanism at home should be harpooned to the task. In that I most definitely include the tariff. The essence of our problem is the recovery of stability or equilibrium. Prior to Mar. 4 we had lost it, and were simply sprawling along—new that we are within measurable distance of that much desired object, it would be folly to throw out of the window one of the means for procuring it, namely the tariff."

He advised that in an individualistic society such as the United States only the government could lay the new foundation of equilibrium. "This might seem a contradiction in terms, but it is true, nevertheless," he said. "Here we have a nation of active minded business men, desirous of functioning as individual units. It is the government, and the government alone, that can refashion the ties that bind all these individualists together, helping them again to function by giving them a new framework for their purpose. And it has to be done quickly, as President Roosevelt has recognized by his actions."

By "first things first," Dean Donham said he agreed with Mr. Roosevelt's order. The President was confronted with a banking crisis. That had to be solved in order to put confidence in the place of fear which had been enormously fostered by banking troubles. He was now trying to maintain confidence in his leadership and in the financial stability of the government, and at the same time to settle an urgent problem with a program of farm relief.

"Business men," Dean Donham said, "have still to realize completely the important business problem which is presented to them by farmer impoverishment. Forty-six million people are flat on their backs. If they can be assisted back on their legs, as the government should assist them, then there would be a great increase in employment in the factory. For several years the farmer has been out of business as a market."

Dean Donham refused to comment on the Roosevelt farm program until such time as it has taken shape. "All an expert can say is that the program is good," he added. "The problem is, however, it is to relieve the farmer from the bankruptcy which has been forced upon him by his dependence upon an empty market for his products. We have not to separate the issue of farm relief from that of our other groups, such as expert, or international, who are to take more equitable action here, and to see that the only possible remedy is to be applied to the market."
