

selves hemmed in on all sides water, mountains, or hostile nations and are at the same time too densely populated. Italy, for instance, has a population of 42,118,855 per-sons. All these people are jammed into the little boot which juts out into the Mediterranean Sea and is closed on the north by France, Switzerland, and Austria, Small wonder that Italy looks with greedy eyes scross the Adri-atic to the week nation of Yugoslavia which alone offers opportunities for expansion.

What over-population means to Italy may be better Hustrated by a comparison with the United States. Here Hustrated by a comparison with the United States. Here we have, in truth, more people, some 122,775,046, but we have also more land. Italy's area is 119,774 square miles; that of the United States, 3,026.789. What these figures mean to the density of population is shown by the fact that is Italy there are 351.7 persons to the square mile; in the United States, 41.3. In Florida there are 26.8.

In view of these facts, it is difficult to reconcile Musso lini's plea for bigger and better bables with his expressed desire for world pence.
