VATICAN CITY, Doc. 24,— (A)—Pope Pine XII opened the 1966 Hely Year of the Roman Catholic Church today smild the Catholic Church today amid the Joyana ringing of church bella and the angry chatter of Communist-led disorders. Scarcely had the Pontiff unscaled the hely door at St. Poter's basilies with three symbolic atrokes of a silver hammer, when Communists ordered and then cancelled a general strike in Rome province.







Revealed In Cross-**Examination Of Spy** Trial Defendant

NEW YORK, Dec. 27, (41) The prosecution introduced in the Alger Hiss second perjury trial today a letter written by Him to Noel Field, former State Department official Of Lawmakers Who missing for some time in Europe.

Field's name was brought into the trial early this month when Mrs Hede Massing, former wife at the fugitive Communists Gerhart fire ler, testified she and Hiss connected for Field's services as a member of the Communist underground in 1935 in Washington.

The letter, written May 7, 1948, was placed in the record by assistant U. S. attorney Thomas F. donesia Murphy during cross-examination of Hiss, former high State Departnent official It replied to a note dowment for International Peace, colony for 300 years. of which Hiss then was president.
