

Reds Threaten U. S. Arms Aid For French Defense

Thorez Directs Party To Sabotage Unloading Of Arms Ships

PARIS, Dec. 21—(AP)—Communists are hinting openly today they will try to sabotage the unloading of American arms sent to France under the Atlantic treaty.

American officials are optimistic that the Communist attacks will be limited to propaganda and demonstrations. Some French officials, however, fear violence in the ports when the first guns arrive.

Maurice Thorez, secretary-general of the French Communist Party, recently declared that "the most important question" facing the Party today "is the transportation and storage of American war material."

"Will the French people," he cried, "allow these engines of death to be unloaded and transported?"

Thorez told the Party's high command in effect that some Communists may get their skulls cracked by police in their campaign against the arms shipments, but that it should be fought out "without fear and regardless of the sacrifices required."

The Communist-dominated dock workers' union at Bordeaux promptly adopted a resolution refusing to unload American guns.

U. S. arms are due in Europe to help rebuild armies of the 10 nations which joined Canada and the U. S. in the North Atlantic treaty. Congress voted \$1,000,000,000 for the purpose, and treaties covering terms of the arms deliveries are now being written in Washington.

French government informants have stated that the arms shipments to France will be channeled entirely through the port of Cherbourg, built up during the war to a training allied invasion port.

Cherbourg, it was pointed out, is predominantly non-Communist. It is a French naval stronghold and employment among dockers has been slack in recent months. The last factor, it was believed, may forestall a possible strike since Cherbourg stevedores badly need the new arms shipments would provide.

(Continued from Page One) down, the same way if, God forbid, the free world should ever be challenged by anti-Democratic forces.

"For there is one thing we never will accept, and that is totalitarian slavery."

President Truman said that "if man could achieve self-government and leadership with his God throughout the world, peace would not be made in the constant dread of war."

"Mankind is exhausted from the ordeal of conflict. Mr. Truman went on: 'All men are sick of bloodletting and hunger, and weary of the troubles suffered for so many years. If we could mobilize world opinion among all men who walk the earth, there would never be another war.'"

"This we can not do alone. For the earth is deeply divided between free and captive peoples. There is no appeal to the brotherhood of men who live in daily fear of the concentration camp."

"Until the captive peoples of the world emerge from darkness, they can not see the hand we hold out in friendship. While they are made to respond to our handclasp choice but to stand ready in self-defense with a mailed fist, we have no defense."

The President said that by generous sharing of material goods the United States has restored to many peoples faith in themselves, in freedom, and in certain triumph of confidence over fear. He added: "Just as long as we continue to face our world responsibilities with the courage and realism we have already shown, we shall deserve the right to hope—and work—for lasting peace."

(Continued from Page One) "round-hull" fleet. Of the 14 ship U. S. vessels, 32 are light cruisers.

Sherman gave the Soviet fleet's known strength as three old battleships, 14 cruisers, 10 destroyers, and about 270 submarines.

In addition, he said, it includes a force of minor torpedo boats, submarine chasers, and inshore patrol craft in a certain number which exceeds the numerical strength of equivalent types in all other navies combined—including the United States.

"Our outstanding superiority over the Russian fleet lies in our carrier force," Sherman said. "The maintenance of our carrier force is essential to our uninterrupted use of vital sea communication. It is also essential to Naval support of the Army and the Air Force. It is the core of the offensive power of the fleet. It is the most modern and most powerful in existence."

At present, the United States Navy has 12 carriers, 10 cruisers, 10 destroyers, and 270 submarines.

Also in the trial record was an intimate warded letter from Hiss to his wife, Priscilla.

Meanwhile the long-delayed spy conspiracy trial of Judith Coplon and Valentin Z. Galtchey was postponed again today.

The ex-government girl and the Russian engineer were scheduled to go on trial Dec. 27 but Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan said a pre-trial hearing now in progress would prevent the trial's starting on that date.

Ryan did not immediately set a new date. The opening of the trial has been delayed before a long series of defense moves to get the case thrown out of court.

Archibald Palmer, Miss Coplon's attorney, has 81 witnesses that he wants to call in his effort to prove that the government's case rests on "illegal" wire-tapping and therefore should be dismissed.

Ryan said the hearing would recess Thursday night until Tuesday and that the trial—unless the case is dismissed—would begin two days after he rules on pre-trial motions.

Today's chief witness was Dr. Edward U. Condon, atomic scientist, Bureau of Standards.

He testified that information found by FBI agents in Miss Coplon's purse when she was arrested "has been in the public domain for at least 20 years."

The government contends that this information, concerning a device called a Geophone, was secret and that Miss Coplon copied it with the intention of giving it to the Russians.

The memorandum found in Miss Coplon's purse said the Soviet trading corporation, Amtorg, was a device for measuring the force of explosions.

At yesterday's hearing, FBI agents admitted listening to telephone conversations between Miss Coplon, a former Department of Justice employee, and her attorney, Archibald Palmer.

The government admitted that FBI men were assured by a card holder in the case to monitor Miss Coplon's telephone in Brooklyn and Washington.

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Germany's Re-Education Program Termed 'Confused' By Educator

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 24. (P) — "Confusion, rather than orderliness, seems to characterize the re-education program now in operation in Germany," a visiting expert to that country said today. Dr. William J. Michaels, associate professor of industrial education at the University of Minnesota, made the report following a four-month visit in the country. The sharply critical, 16-page report to the State Department declared that "a policy of expediency in Germany, occasioned by our preoccupation with problems in the East, can readily produce a gargantuan in our own back yard, three, five, ten or twenty years hence." Dr. Michaels said there is "now an imperative need for our top policy makers to give the same type of concentrated attention to the problems of education as they have previously given to the economic phases of the reconstruction program." "We have shied away from directives. In their place we have put the watchwords 'observe, advise and assist,' only to find that the Germans themselves are ruling by decree, indirectly if not directly." Dr. Michaels said "one man is able effectively to resist all conscientious efforts at improvement." Numerous German teachers, weary of such actions, he said, but they are hesitant to act largely because of "a traditional acquiescence to the role of authority — a role which our top policy makers apparently encourage, or at least condone." Dr. Michaels urged that educational efforts be placed at the top of the list of major activities of this country. "In a very real sense our entire mission (in Germany) is one of education," he said. "Yet there is not a professional educator among the top level advisors to the high commission."

Water Shortages Nothing New To Old Mother Earth

By SHERRY BOWEN AP Newsfeatures Writer The world is having a flood of droughts. Water shortages are reported all the way from New York City to the jungles of Africa. Water shortages are an old story — millions of years old. The modern droughts mean serious losses to many people. But the chances are they will be no more than an inconvenience to you. On the other hand, if some of the long-ago droughts had not happened, you might not be here — or you might be two other fellows. One theory about why dinosaurs disappeared from the earth has to do with drought. Of course, temperature changes, mountain building and other things are in that theory, too. But some experts think that a key factor was that things got dry. The plants on which dinosaurs lived didn't grow any more and the animals starved to death. The mammals got their chance to develop. Of course all the dinosaurs and all the mammals did not live on plants. Some of them ate other animals. Your ancestor, one theory says, was a little beast that looked something like a rat and lived on insects. All this happened millions of years ago. But the earth didn't stop changing from wet to dry and back again either on part or all of its surface. Another theory hints there was another drought when your ancestor was an ape-like animal swinging by his hands through the tree branches. Drought killed the trees and the animal had to stand up and take a long step toward becoming a man. Even when he was a real man, theorists say, he didn't stop being pushed around by drought. One belief is that large parts of Asia and Europe began to get dry about 3,000 B.C. Later there were still other changes from wet to dry and dry to wet. The dry periods, it is thought, forced some peoples to move from their homes. The nomads who moved across Greece and much later created the golden age there may have moved there because their old homes dried up. The Hyksos who conquered Egypt about 1700 B.C. may have been on the move because of drought. Certainly, for example the Sahara desert was a well watered area of the thousands of years ago. Remains show that men lived there comfortably up to the late stone age. Again, when the Roman Empire was breaking up, many of the barbarians which came down against it in waves after waves may have moved out of Asia because of drought. Some of your ancestors may have been among them. So far, today's droughts are small potatoes compared with some of the old ones. They are like the dry years in ancient Egypt when the Nile did not rise high enough to flood all the land. The pharaohs staged great religious festivals when the height of the river in flood was measured. Tax rates were based on the measurements. Taxes were smaller when the river was lower. And sometimes the pharaoh fooled the people, pretending the river was higher than it was so he could get more taxes. Droughts today are also like those of the '30s when the Great Plains areas began to "blow" and dust darkened the sky as far as Eastern United States. And the "blows" of the '30s were also little things if you listen to the geologists. In the Mississippi valley, for instance, are deposits of rock and earth hundreds of feet thick called "loess." These are supposed to be the results of "blows" thousands of millions of years ago when the earth blew and blew and kept on blowing for centuries. Similar deposits in China and others other parts of the world tell of water shortages in the past. Then the earth got dry and rode on the wind.

Retired Bear In Denver Zoo Loses Ladylike Temper

But here's a new definition for it; security is a thing that keeps a polar bear from jumping a four-foot fence. This polar bear's name is Velox and back in her flapper days she used to climb ladders and balance her 500 pounds of ivory-furred charm on red-painted stools. Back then she worked for Ringling Brothers, travelling the country in a crate, her fur all gummed up with soot half the time, and there were always more towns ahead, more ladders and stools. Now, at 17, she's a quiet white-haired old lady with permanent residence at Denver's City Park zoo. She's almost blind and it takes her an average of two minutes to find a bright yellow jelly-bean thrown directly beneath her. But she's completely happy, living on the side of her concrete mountain, chomping up some 20 pounds of horseman daily and taking an occasional dip in her private moat. Zoo superintendent Clyde Hill, boss of the City Park animals for almost three decades, considers Velox one of the most remarkable creatures of his experience. "Polar bears can bound around like cats," he says. "But we hem Velox in with iron pickets four-foot high and she wouldn't climb them on a bet." The pickets are tilted inward. At one point a stone bridge crosses the moat and comes to a dead end against the fence. A trip over the barrier would probably cost Velox nothing more than an ounce of hide. Hill is certain, however, that she is not a captive in her own cowardice. He puts it this way: "Talk about security: she's got it. And she appreciates it. When she came to us in 1911 she was getting in slow for her circus act so she sold her to us. From the start I knew she was an educated, polite lady and I've treated her like one."
