



# LBJ Would Up Trade With Reds

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Johnson administration plans another attempt early next year to persuade Congress to ease restrictions on trade with the Soviet Union and Communist nations of Eastern Europe. The Soviet government apparently favors removal of East-West trade barriers, according to four congressmen who conferred with Soviet trade officials.

"They indicated a very real interest in expanded trade with the United States," Rep. Thomas Ashley, D-Ohio, told a Moscow news conference Sunday.

"The Soviet view as presented to us is that trade between this country and the United States could increase a great deal if it were not for artificial barriers put up by our side," Ashley said.

The administration asked the 90th Congress to lift present restrictions on East-West trade but the legislation died in the House Ways and Means Committee. Present plans call for its reintroduction after the 90th Congress convenes Jan. 10.

The legislation would end existing tariff discriminations which averages 50 per cent but reaches 60 per cent or more on some items, on imports from Communist countries except

Poland and Yugoslavia.

It would give the President discretionary authority to grant "most-favored-nation" tariff treatment to the Soviet Union and the Communist countries of Eastern Europe. Under this, a nation pays the lowest tariff the United States has granted to any one country.

The President first raised the idea in his 1966 State of the Union message, but Secretary of State Dean Rusk did not submit the bill until May. Speaking about the "winds of change" Rusk argued that the legislation would be "an important element in our balanced strategy for peace" which, he said, calls for resistance to Communist aggression combined with peaceful relations with the Communist world.

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## Casselberry Couple Dies In Crash

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)—A Colombian airliner crashed short of the runway while landing in heavy fog Sunday, killing 18 persons, nine of them from Florida. The plane was carrying 27 passengers and five crew members. The Floridians killed were from North Miami, Coral Gables, Miami, Casselberry and Fort Lauderdale.

Besides the Floridians, the aircraft had five Colombians living in the United States and four other Colombians.

The airline said in Miami, Fla., where the flight began, that the Super-Constellation carried 24 passengers and six crew.

One survivor, Kay Tuttle, 23, of Crestline, Ohio, said passengers were told as they neared Eldorado Airport that the plane would land despite thickening fog.

She said the plane struck what she believed was dirt and swayed wildly from side to side. "People started to scream and call for their children and the plane went into total darkness," Miss Tuttle said. The aircraft "seemed to break in two and many people were able to escape. I jumped out through an emergency exit."

"If the plane had caught fire we all would have been killed," she said.

The plane had been leased from Passat Ltd. of Miami, which also supplied some of the crew. Airport officials said the aircraft hit before reaching the runway while making an approach. The injured were taken to Bogota's military hospital.

Aerocor said the dead included James Powell of North Miami; his Colombian wife, Maria, and their son, Richard. Their daughter, Ann, survived.

The airline said other Americans killed were the pilot, Capt. Bob Taylor of Coral Gables; the copilot, T. H. Guthrie of Miami; the flight engineer, J. E. Engle of Miami; Juanita M. Bridge and William D. Bridge of Casselberry; Flora Biller of North Miami; and Kathryn Lee Keeler of Fort Lauderdale.

The airline's general manager, Capt. Gustavo Lopez was also killed.

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# The Faces Of Jesus - 1 Jesus Was A Carpenter Of Nazareth

IN A STEADY RHYTHM, the axe rose and fell, biting into the base of the tall sycamore. Every two strokes, one swinging sideways and the other coming down, sent a fat chip flying. He rarely missed.

It was an instinctive skill, born, shaped and seasoned into him by upbringing and years of toil. He was a "naggar," as his native Aramaic termed it, a joiner, builder and worker of wood.

Breathing hard, Jesus stepped aside as the tree swayed with that slow, cracking groan, as if in a final desperate protest against the gnawing at its heart, and then it fell with a roar and lay splintered on the ground.

The sun rose low, past the eighth hour. He trimmed off the limbs and lifted one end of the log, levering it on its bare back until he got it balanced across his shoulders behind his head, and then he started home.

It was good timber, cut after the autumn's last growth when the sap was down. A craftsman respected his material. That was far more than the oppressors of Israel did for their people, even when they were pliantly submissive.

"If they do this when the wood is green," he would later observe, "what will happen when it is dry?" When he did come, Caesar would crush it with massive destruction. Already many had died, and thousands more, including children, had been shipped to Rome as slaves.

Tradition says that for about 20 years, from the time Jesus became a son of the Torah in 13, until He was 35, He had worked at His trade, handed down to him by his woodworker, Joseph, who had died shortly after the young man's bar mitzvah, his coming of age.

He evidently had taken over support of the family, including His mother Mary, and it was hard but worthy labor. They were of the "caste," as she once described it, poor but devoutly responsible.

Under pressures of making ends meet, He watched against waste. In later days, Scripture notes that He twice had His men gather up scraps of food "that nothing may be lost."

He was a saver, in the deepest sense.

He was familiar with patched clothes, pointing out that the patch ought to be shrank like the garment or it would rip loose.

He also understood the necessity of having to borrow bread from a friend's house to feed an unexpected hungry guest, even though the hour was late and it troubled the friend to have to dress and come down to unbar the gate.

Nevertheless, "Ask, and it will be given you," Jesus advised. "Seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened unto you."

From the valley, sinking now in shadows, it was a long, hard climb up the mountainside to Nazareth. He struggled along under the weight of the tree trunk, its bark digging pits across His sinewy back, gnats swarming about His face.

Sometimes, a prebably he snaked the logs up the mountain by burro, or hired cutters for it. In subsequent remarks, He showed keen familiarity with an employer's duty to laborers, and of the forthrightness essential to construction contracts.

"For which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost...? Otherwise, when he has laid the foundation and is unable to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, saying, 'You gotta go in,'" said the son of comedian Jerry Lewis after signing. "If you have any animosity toward Army life it can be your downfall."

A spokesman said the 21-year-old draftsman earned \$350,000 a year as leader of "Gary Lewis and the Playboys."



Streamlined Constitution Touched Up

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Floridians may vote at age 18, the Legislature will meet every year and communities can largely run their own affairs if the newly revised state constitution wins the approval of the lawmakers and the public.

The streamlined, 12-article document is now undergoing final touches. Time will tell how the revision fares, but its framers and some legislators feel it will ably replace the constitution which has been Florida's basic body of law since 1885.

Highlights of the revision include changing of the present biennial sessions of the Legislature to annual sessions, for more up-to-date government.

Home rule provisions are included to let cities and counties function without having to flood the Legislature with local bills.

It specifically charges the courts to reapportion the Legislature if the lawmakers themselves do not carry out this task, made necessary occasionally by shifts in population.

It lowers the minimum voter age from 21 years to 18.

It provides for an auditor to keep tabs on state financial affairs, streamlines the courts and contains a "self-starter" clause to insure new constitutional revision 20 years from the date the present revision takes effect, if it does.

Republican Gov.-elect Claude R. Kirk's stand on the proposed new constitution will be one factor affecting its acceptance or turnout. The Constitutional Revision Commission is scheduled to report to Kirk and the Legislature Feb. 3.

House and Senate leaders say they believe Florida lawmakers will make some changes, but probably not major ones. The leaders say it's too early to make solid predictions.

House Speaker Ralph Turleton of Gainesville said, "I don't know that the Legislature will make many substantive changes."

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## Burns-High Feud Flares

MIAMI (AP)—The Burns-High feud flared up again in a remark by Miami's mayor that he heard Gov. Haydon Burns came close to being indicted in his home county of Duval.

Mayor Robert King High said "there is a report going about that the one-time high ranking public official in Jacksonville would have been indicted along with the others but for fear Florida would have been embarrassed."

Burns, once mayor of Jacksonville, rejoined that "High's rantings directed at me personally are of no concern to me, the people of Jacksonville or the state as a whole."

Burns called High's charge "an unmitigated lie."

High's statement followed Burns' comments about the Duval County (Miami) grand jury indictment of a Miami police official on a bribery charge.

"Once again, justice has prevailed over politics," Burns said.

Before the November election, Burns said the Duval County grand jury was sitting on an indictment to keep from embarrassing High, who ran unsuccessfully for governor after defeating Burns in the Democratic primary.

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Blackboard By Wire  
WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP)—An electronic "blackboard-by-wire" teaching system has sent voice communications and handwriting over telephone lines for a long-distance illustrated lecture.

The demonstration was sponsored by Purdue University and General Telephone and Electronics Corp.

James S. Miles, director of television at Purdue, said the system appears to have many applications in education, particularly for continuing education to sparsely populated areas distant from colleges or universities.

He said costs appear low enough to make such an effort capable of being done.

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## U. S. Ponders Florida Orange Juice Problems

LAKELAND (AP)—The U.S. Department of Agriculture opens a public hearing today on a plan to reduce the frozen concentrate orange juice market and help solve some of the problems of overproduction.

The plan, called the voluntary marketing agreement, would withhold up to 15 million gallons of concentrates from the market and increase the prices of the rest.

Much of the amount withheld from the market, industry leaders point out, will be bought by the federal government for use in the national school lunch program.

Secretary Orville L. Freeman announced Friday that the department would offer to buy substantial quantities to help stabilize citrus prices.

Without the marketing agreement, which Freeman must ap-

prove after the hearing, and school lunch plan, the industry faces about a \$50 million loss, said Robert W. Rutledge, executive vice president of the Florida Citrus Mutual.

Rutledge said he hoped the marketing agreement plan would be in effect by the first part of January. He estimates that removing up to 15 million gallons of concentrate from the normal channels would mean an additional 35 cents per box, on trees, in the grower.

Florida's orange production this year is estimated at 142 million boxes compared to 101 million last year and Rutledge says the industry is having trouble marketing the bigger crop.

Prices are down for growers from \$1.25 a box on the tree last year to between 35 to 50 cents a box now.

# Cooper Grabs Mayfair Pro-Am

Pete Cooper shot a sub-par round of 68 at the Mayfair Country Club this Friday, capturing the top spot in the Pro-Am Tournament, nudging Harold Rayburn's 71.

In addition to copying the number one spot in the Low Pro category, Cooper paired with Chuck Wynn to fire 65 and share high honors for the Pro-Am Class A group.

Cooper pocketed \$24 for the Low Pro title and shared \$26.15 with Wynn in the other category.

In the Pro-Am pairings, it was Cooper again in the winner's spotlight, this time with Joe Oliver. They covered the 18 holes in 66 strokes, three better than Jim Brown and Harold Rayburn, and Bill Marzan/Don Hibbitte who both had 69's.

Coming in second in the Pro-Am Class A competition, it was Cooper/High Grier with 69's, followed by Cooper/Dr. Dub Epps—67 and the same score for Harold Rayburn/J. Crocker—67.

High Grier and Jerry Crocker teamed their talents to win the Am Class A event with a 71 and took \$10 each in winner's earnings.

Crocker added another \$10.40 in prize money for winning the Low Am Class A with an even par 72.

In the Pro-Am Class B matches, a five-way tie developed between Cooper's score and J. Rowan, R. Hayes, M. L. Yowell, L. J. Feitel and Pete Kostyuk with 69's, worth \$12.40 to each golfer.

J. C. Stamper and A. McCormick golfed their way to the top of the Am Class B matches with their 73 and were awarded \$16.15 apiece.

McCormick also won the Low Am Class B title with his 75 score.

The name of Pete Cooper also appeared in the winner's circle for the Class C area as his score and J. H. Lengly's 67 was one stroke better than that of Cooper and Captain West with 68's. Third place went to Harold Rayburn and Don Donaldson, 70.

Two Baltimore players and another official finally helped Bergman reach his quarters after he had been struck on the head twice by bottles.

There were 12 penalties called against the 49ers and a total of 192 yards — in the fiercely played second quarter of the Western Conference. Four touchdowns passes by Johnny Unitas won it for the Colts, who'll meet Philadelphia in the NFL Playoff Bowl at Miami Jan. 8.

Meanwhile, the Cowboys, who clinched the Eastern Conference

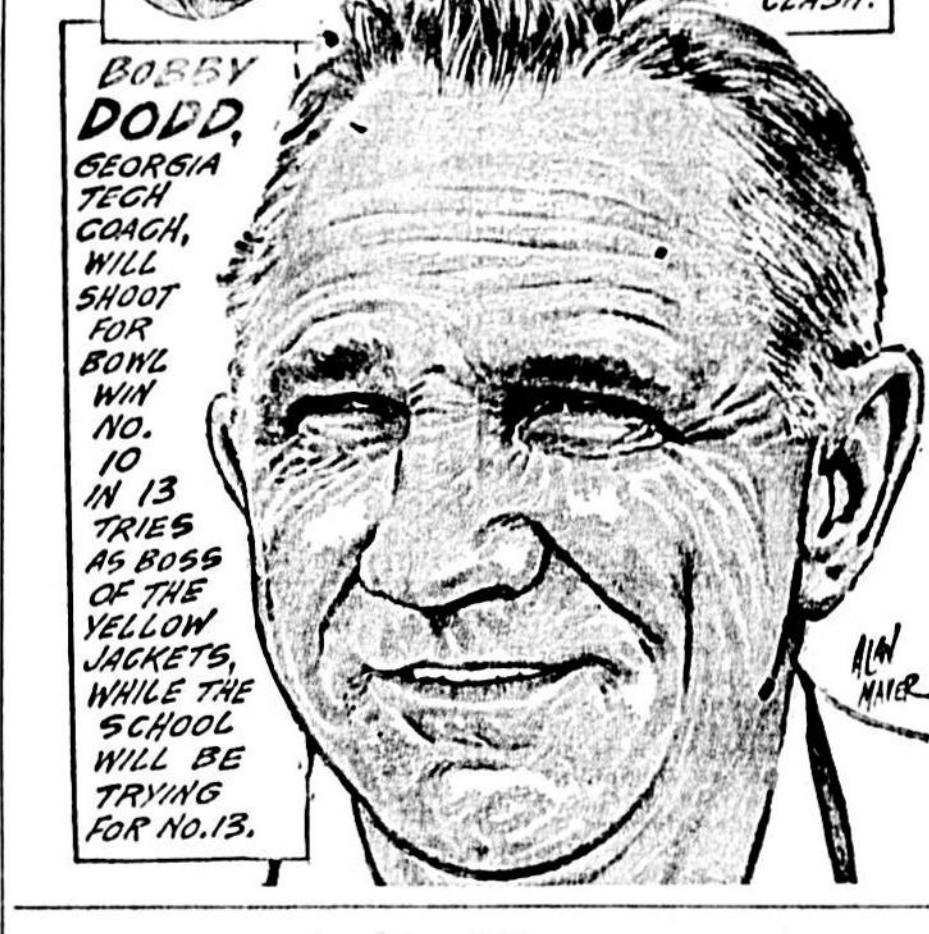

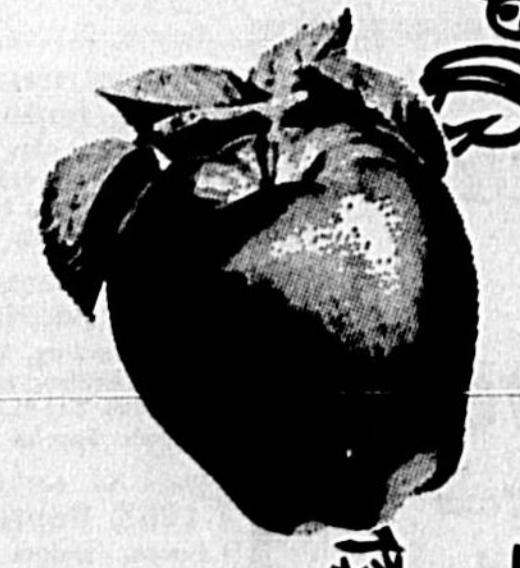

**Ninth U. S. Infantry Swells GI Total In South Vietnam**

SARIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — Gen. William C. Westmoreland's old outfit began arriving in Vietnam today, and the U.S. commander was on hand to greet the guerrilla-trained brigade of the 9th Infantry Division, American forces in the country rose above 372,000. As the first troops of the 9th Division's 3rd Brigade came ashore, ground fighting tapered off to small scale skirmishes. Over North Vietnam, U.S. bombers stayed away from Haiphong for the fourth day and concentrated most of their 92 strike missions Sunday in the southern panhandle. U.S. headquarters in Saigon reported American plane losses over North Vietnam had reached 450. This included four planes not previously announced. A U.S. spokesman said these had gone down out of sight of the enemy, indicating they had crashed in the Gulf of Tonkin or in Laos. The spokesman also announced that 144 American planes have been lost in action over South Vietnam. Vietnamese military headquarters reported the Viet Cong wrecked a new buildup by infiltrating North Vietnamese troops. Seven miles north of the demilitarized zone, the destroyers Madrox intercepted 20 cargo junks, destroyed three and damaged four with five-inch gunfire. The attack was part of the Navy's new Operation Traffic Cop against supplies moving by sea from North to South Vietnam. Four U.S. Navy "Swift" boats fought a short, close-range gun duel with an estimated company of Viet Cong soldiers in the Mekong Delta Sunday. A U.S. spokesman said Viet Cong opened up on the fast Navy patrol craft with automatic weapons, mortars and recoilless rifles at a range of 30 to 39 yards. The Swift boats returned the fire with their .50 caliber machine guns but broke away after an eight-minute fire fight. The first units of the 9th U.S. Infantry Division — the 6th Brigade — came ashore at Vung Tau, 46 miles southeast of Saigon, Westmoreland served with the division in Europe during World War II. # The Crucial Shortage

Such programs as Head Start, aimed at improving the educational chances of deprived children, has been an obvious need in this county for several years. We have known that too many of our youngsters have been coming from school without having absorbed adequate learning, or have been dropped out at an alarming rate.

But Head Start is only the complexities of change that is disturbing a once hopeful improvement in educating the young. It takes its place along with troublesome Vietnam as a drain for teacher talent in regular school classes. (John Evans, vice chairman of the County school board made the same statement several months ago.)

The nation is finding, with the opening of this school term, that it is suffering from the most severe teacher shortage in more than a decade.

One Midwestern state is desperately trying to recruit housewives to operate classrooms as it grapples with its worst teacher shortage in a decade. All states including Florida are in the grip of a competitive drive to fill in vacant posts.

But where do Head Start and Vietnam come in as a cause of teacher shortage?

Head Start and like federal programs are interesting teachers from the standpoint of challenge and money. For example, in one city a Head Start program pays instructors \$18 for four hours for a small class of pre-school children. Those instructors would be paid at the rate of \$20 for six hours before a class of rambunctious fifth graders who fill the room to capacity.

Vietnam is siphoning off classroom manpower as teachers, as well as business trainees face the draft as they emerge from college. Or resistance to the draft is causing many bachelor degree holders to reject the program, to attend graduate school, or rather than working for awhile before hand.

Then there is the annual problem of lower salaries for teaching than in other vocations. Business continues to recruit in the colleges at a faster pace to fill its needs.

When a young man can expect to start his career and family life at up-

WASHINGTON (MEA) — President Johnson's friends defend him today as always as just about the most knowledgeable man on government matters of any who ever held the presidency.

What is going to be sorrier today in 1967 and beyond, however, is not what he already knows but what he can learn.

To be exact, the measure will be put upon his capacity for growth. In the context of the presidency, this means more than simply soaking up huge volumes of new facts. It means showing a capacity to change as a man.

It is not any kind of news that Lyndon Johnson in the White House is basically a one-man band. People who worked closely with him in his 1960 campaign for the vice presidency privately foresee how he would be as chief executive. He could not keep his hands off any campaign problem, no matter how trivial.

What has happened since is reasonably well-established history. His grasping for all details, his secretiveness, his suspiciousness are legendary. Whatever his reliance upon certain key men, however much "advise" he seems to seek, it appears that in the end he trusts only himself to do things and to know what and when action will come.

This habit is portrayed constantly by his aides as the necessary caution of a conscientious president who wants to wrap up everything tightly before moving — since a move once made at so high a level can never quite be recalled or reversed.

But veteran president-watchers, at the risk of being dubbed amateur psychologists, see in this Johnson trait a high quotient of intended self-protection.

This is a natural characteristic of politicians the world over. Those who lack it, generally do not last long in the trade.

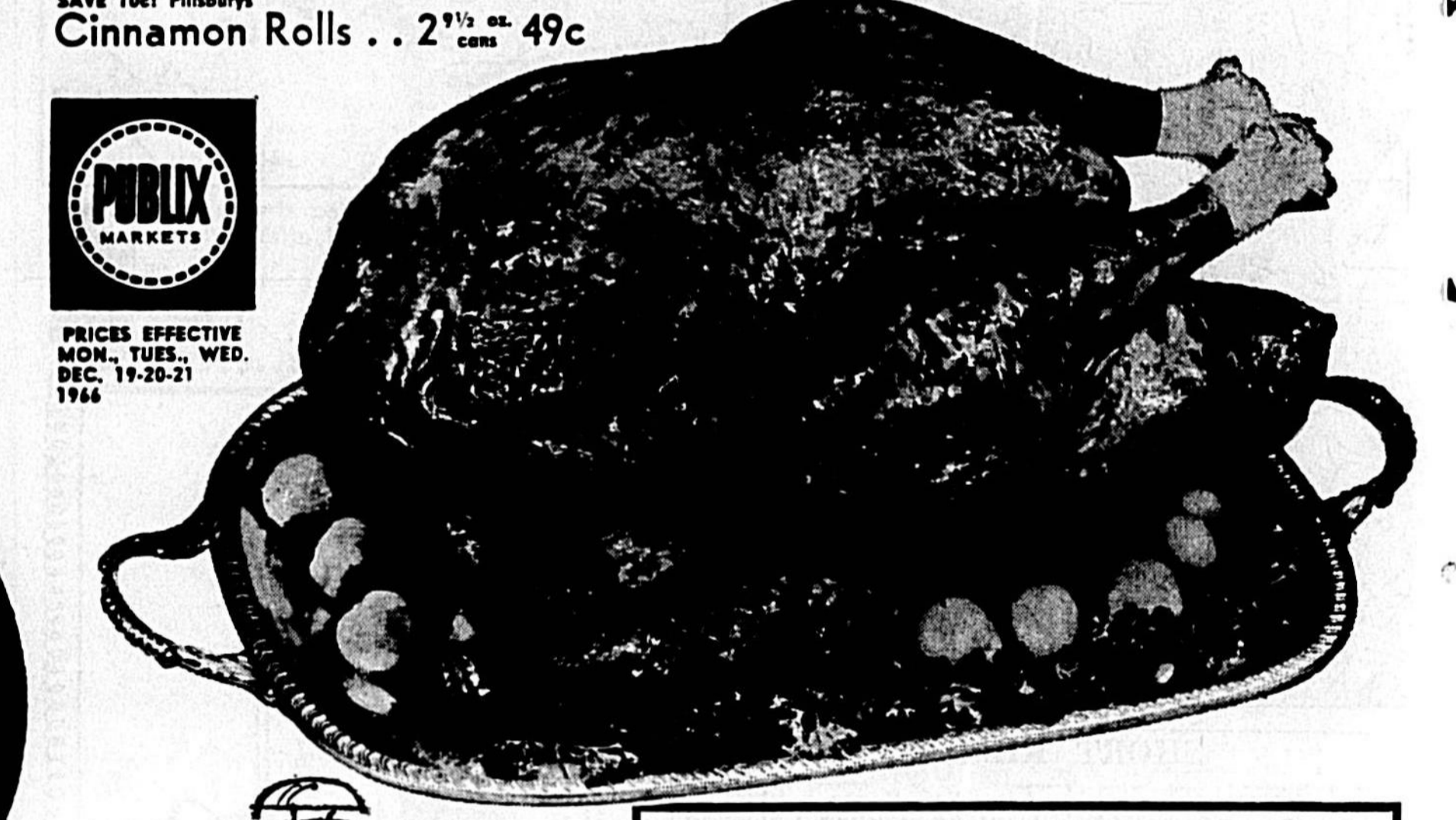
