





Recording Industry **Bracing For Scandals**

NEW YORK (AP) — The record industry is shuddering as reports surface of payola, drugs, an organized crime connection and misuse of funds

A federal grand jury and offices of district attorneys in Manhattan and Los Angeles are looking into the music business. One recording industry figure has fallen, and people in the field see troubled days ahead

"The reports say all record companies are being quietly investigated. I believe that is going to happen," said Herb Helman, head of public relations for RCA Records. "At this point, I think every company should take a very low profile.'

The payola scandals of the late 1950s rocked the music world with public revelation that record company promotion men used money, liquor and free vacations to convince disk jockeys to play their records. Such exposure can increase sales.

The record companies and broadcasters insist such practices have ceased. But some reports indicate they persist with a new twist: cocaine and marijuana are sometimes the in-

How widespread such activities are cannot be stated. But payola on a grander scale was reported this week by sources close to a federal grand jury meeting in Newark, N.J.

Those sources said David Wynshaw, until two months ago director of artist relations for Columbia Records, told members of a federal Organized Crime Strike Force that the company budgeted \$250,000 a year for payoffs to promote Columbia's stable of black pop and rock singers.

Eye On Cuba

The Bottleneck In Spain Slows Exiles

In sharp contrast to the economic success story of some 300,000 Cuban exiles in Miami and the rest of the United States is the story of Cuban refugees in Spain.

With the cutoff by the Cuban government of the U.S.-sponsored Freedom Flights between Varadero, Cuba, and Miami, Fla., the sole remaining regular escape route for Cubans is the twice-a-week flight between Havana and

More than 80,000 Cubans have exited their country by that route since 1961. But the problem they face is the official

bottleneck in Spain. U.S. visas have been issued only to about

54,000 Cubans in Spain in the last dozen years. Now there are an estimated 30,000 Cuban refugees waiting there. And, while 1,100 more fly in every month, only between 400 and 600 receive U.S. visas.

Appalled by the plight of those refugees, the Florida House of Representatives recently passed a resolution urging the U.S. Congress to speed up the entry into the states for the Cubans in Spain. A Miami representative who filed the bill stated, "Federal requirements that prospective immigrants wait two years in Spain is plainly discriminatory."

Whereas, Cubans who came to the United States directly from Cuba received immigration priority, Cubans in third countries, such as Spain, must comply with stricter regulations, the same as any other foreigner seeking entry into the United States to set up residence. Thus, the Cubans in Spain must go through red tape and await their visas.

More Fuel At Higher Prices

A New Energy Policy Emerges

The shape of a national energy policy for the United States of America begins to emerge in the series of proposals sent to Congress by President Nixon affecting our consumption of oil, gas and coal. Reduced to its simplest terms the policy might go something like this: our country can avert a serious engegy crisis if it is willing to pay a sub-

The price, moreover, will be reckoned both in dollars and cents and in reconciliation of our environmental goals with some inarguable realities stemming from our voracious Lifting quotas on oil imports will bring more foreign fuel

into the United States and help alleviate the prospect of a gasoline shortage this summer and another pinch on heating oil supplies next winter. However, it will not prevent an upward trend in prices. By the same token, removing federal regulations on the

price of natural gas pumped from new wells will spur development of new supplies of that popular clean-burning fuel, but the exploration and production costs will be reflected in prices the consumer pays to heat and light his Our domestic fuel production also can be increased

under the President's proposal to open more off-shore areas

for oil and gas development, but the step could only be taken

over the strong objection of environmentalists. Also, our

plentiful coal reserves can continue to supply fuel to power

plants, but only by postponing the achievement of air quality standards which demand a reduction in coal burning. Such steps all deserve serious consideration if our energy demands and our fuel resources immediately at hand are to be kept in balance. They remain, however, only a starting

point for a comprehensive energy policy. Such a policy must forcus equal attention on better conservation and management of energy, the development of alternate power sources, such as nuclear energy, and alternatives to the bus and private car as modes of personal transportation. The proposals now before Congress will serve as a basis for that broader attack on our energy problem simply because they carry an economic and environmental price

tag. They help nudge us away from the confortable assumption that energy will always be as plentiful and cheap as it has been in the past. As President Nixon pointed out, "the single most effective means of encouraging energy conservation is to ensure that energy prices reflect their true

There was a time when the American people could see such an abundance of fuel resources around them that they looked at a household appliance or a car more in terms of the cost of buying it rather than the cost of running it. The "true costs" of the energy we derive from fossil fuels is now confronting us and is destined to affect our lives significantly in

The Times, explained Mr. Rosenthal, believes freedom of the press to be essential to American society and regards political advertising as an integral element in

At least two other newspapers have printed the same or similar advertisements, but possibly because of its prestige - possibly as a test case? - the New York Times is the only one the Chinese have complained to. Now that it has been explained to them just how the American press operates, one hopes that in the interest of promoting understanding between the American people and themselves, they will drop the matter.

If not, then other newspapers, especially those who have also made application to open bureaus in Peking, as well as wire services and syndicates, should make it clear to the Chinese that if one American newspaper's journalists are barred because of a failure to tailor editorial policies to suit Peking, then all will consider them-

Public, Union Members 'Aye'

A recent survey by the Opinion Research Corp. of Princeton, N.J., disclosed the not-so-surprising fact that 83 per cent of the general public, as indicated by a nationwide probability sample, favors a law that would require a secret ballot before workers go out on strike.

Among union members, however, the figure was 86 per cent in favor of such a law. The survey was conducted for The Business Roundtable, an organization of business executives which seeks, among other things, to improve labor-management rela-

Union members were also just slightly behind the total U.S. public-81 per cent compared with 83 per cent-in favoring a law requiring a secret ballot to find out if workers want to stay out in a strike that has not been settled after 60 days.

WASHINGTON (NEA Information reaching here is that officials of the governments of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Jordan recenty came away aghast from high council meetings of the

Their collective opinion, as relayed here privately, was that Egypt's Anwar Sadat had firmly determined on a resumption of war (though probably limited) with Israel and that there was virtually nothing that could be done

Yet cold military logic convinced these conservative

Arab leaders that Egypt's army, air force and navy could have no chance against the Israeli and that any new fighting would therefore end in disaster for the Arab bloc. These pragmatic men want to get on with the build-up of their own lands, not be diverted by ruinous gestures. There is reportedly more than a suspicion among them that their countries, which have much to lose in any resumption of the war, are being sacrificed to Egyptian

The Soviet Union, China and North Korea, meanwhile, Sadat's forces. Soviet officials are noticeably coy about doing anything to cool the situation. The Kremlin, however, has increased only slightly the number of military advisers on the spot in Egypt.

Despite Sadat's evident determination and the Russia-China-North Korea aid, the thinking here is that any new fighting that comes will be limited to the Suez Canal area. American experts foresee no Egyptian try at bombing Israel's major cities. They expect no Israeli attempt


Middle East specialists in the Nixon administration believe Sadat is fully aware of Egypt's weakness. But, they believe, he is up against such heavy pressure from young military officers and other activist groups that he may have no alternative left.







Jse These Pointers To Patch Wallboard

By POLLY CRAMER

DEAR POLLY-Mrs. J. S. wanted to know how to patch a large hole in wallboard. Cut a piece of screen wire 1 to 11/2 inches larger than the hole. It is flexible. will bend and can be positioned back of the hole. Run a string through the middle four ways and firmly tape to the outside of the wall. Mix patching plaster and very gently apply a light coat over the screen wire and let four-inch hole. I did this 15 years ago and it still holds. No one but me knows where the patch is. Each buildup of plaster has to dry thoroughly and this is done until it is even with the wall surface. The screen wire is the secret.-PEARL


DEAR POLLY and Mrs. J. S.-The first thing to do when preparing to patch a hole in wallboard is to buy a pre-mixed spackling compound and read the directions very carefully. Be sure you understand them. Get a piece of cardboard two inches bigger around than the hole and then make a hole in the center of it. Run a string through the hole with a knot on the back, insert the cardboard back of the wall hole and pull the string until the cardboard is tight up against the hole. With a putty knife fill the hole with the compound, doing about 4-inch thickness at a time. If too much is put on at once the compound will shrink and fall out. You will have to start over. When the hole is filled even with the wall at either side, cut off the string, sand the surface, prime the bare area and paint to match the walls.-RONALD

Wilbur also said more than 53 per cent of the prisoners came back with worms that led to malnutrition and anemia. He said the men would be advised and watched for five years to try to avoid a repetition of the high violent death rate experienced by some U.S. POWs after World War II and

Wilbur said the Vietnam prisoners have experienced "a lot of difficulty in moving back into their families." He said the returned prisoner often found that his family had been "getting along pretty well without

While still involved in a capital fund drive, Canon Hay began engaging faculty and admitting students. "It all was an act of faith," Canon Hay recalls. Next year, Trinity will graduate her first class in which many of the students have gone through Trinity the full six years. "All we had to show those first students was a flag pole in the midst of a sea of sand. Even then, the beauty of the campus was apparent, with its two lakes providing over a mile of lakefront."




Mrs. William McCreery, one of Trinity's first Trustees, gave the initial \$25,000 in cash which allowed the school to secure an option on the land. Mr George S. Witmer, who had been an engineer on the Panama Canal, gave us \$100,000 toward the science building. In the process of raising money all of the major banks and utilities of the area contributed generously to capital fund needs, as they continue to do. The school is not financed by the church, but by capital fund gifts from a great host of individual persons who recognize the importance of education with the context of a Christian environment.

Dr. R. Wilson Geldner says, "I doubt if there is any school in the country that can match what Trinity has accomplished in interscholastic sports in so short a time." When ground is broken in the fall for the Field House, Trinity will be continuing her remarkable growth of a new building each year.

Presently, the school has 368 students, grade seven through twelve. This coming year, she will move to 400, which is an anticipated desirable number.

Trinity students have gained admission to most of the major colleges and universities of the nation. From a beginning faculty of eighteen, this coming year, Trinity will have a full time faculty of forty-one. From a graduating class of one in 1969 to a graduating class of fifty-three in 1973, is the history of Trinity Preparatory school of Florida.
