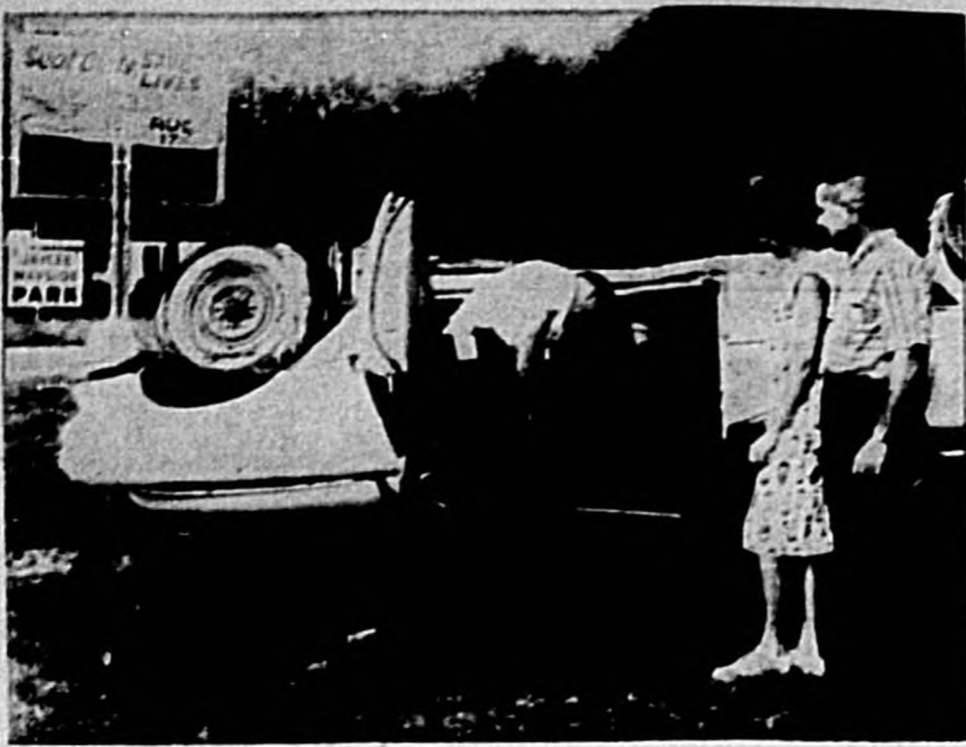

Economic Education Called A 'Must' Today

The tremendous changes in the American economy and in world economy which have taken place in recent years makes economic education of prime importance, Kiwanians were told Wednesday.

Dr. Harold Kastner Jr., executive director of the Florida Council for Economic Education, told the club that it is a major challenge to teach today's students to understand the complexities of our economy.

Using charts, Dr. Kastner pictured the economic structure as being divided into two basic parts, Individual and Business Units. From the individual comes productive service which is exchanged for wages, salaries and dividends and from the business units come consumer goods and services which are exchanged for sales receipts and money.

Dr. Kastner, a graduate of Seminole High School, Florida State University and the University of Florida, was introduced by his father, Harold Kastner Sr.

"We feel that we can begin in the first grade to teach students the rudiments of economics," Kastner said, "going on up through the 12th grade with the study of demand and supply in social studies, industrial arts, commercial law and consumer economics courses."

"We want our students to develop a critical and analytic concept of human and natural resources, communication and transportation, land, labor and capital and the inter-relationship of these economic facts," he said.

Chilly Weather Lingers In Parts Of Nation

Chilly weather lingered in parts of the nation today after setting records and offering harbinger of autumn.

The temperature was in the 40s in Pennsylvania and Michigan early today and in the 50s in such widely scattered places as Boston, Mass., St. Louis, Mo., and Seattle, Wash.

The Weather Bureau said cool to mild temperatures would persist in the East with a return to seasonably warm weather from the Appalachians to the Rockies.

Light frost formed in the Wisconsin cranberry bogs early Wednesday, where Wisconsin Rapids recorded an un-

official 28 degrees and Phillips 34. A 44-degree reading at Madison, Wis., tied the low temperature record for Aug. 11.

New lows also included New York City, 55; Indianapolis, Ind., 49; Wichita, Kan., 56; Dubuque, Iowa, 50; Peoria, Ill., 51; Pittsburgh, Pa., 51; Nashville, Tenn., 59; Cairo, Ill., 61; and Chicago, 55.

At the other extreme, the temperature hit 92 at Los Angeles for the highest reading of the year. The mercury finally leveled off at 109 at Needles, Calif.

What the Weather Bureau called an "unusually intense" storm touched off heavy rain-

falls. During six hour periods, 1.67 inches fell at Panama City, Fla.; 1.27 inches at Houlton, Maine; 1.25 inches at Limestone Air Force Base, Maine; and 1.29 inches at Alma, Ga.

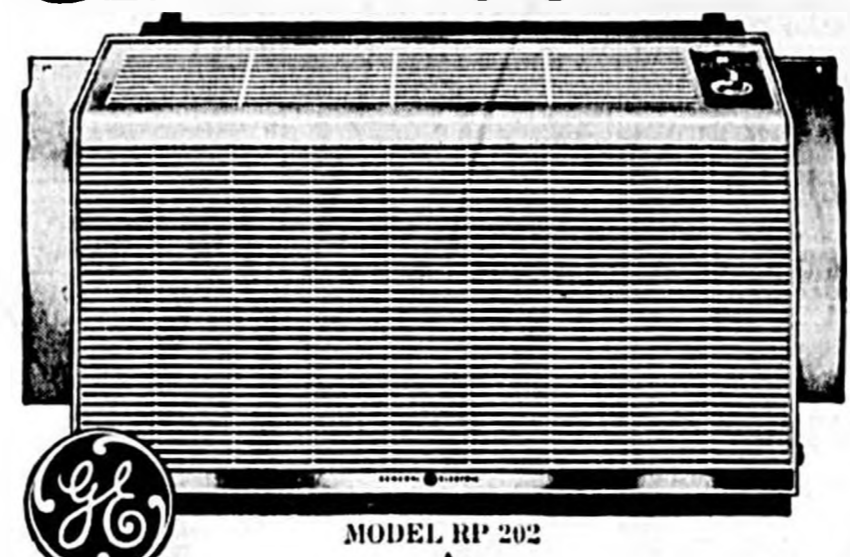

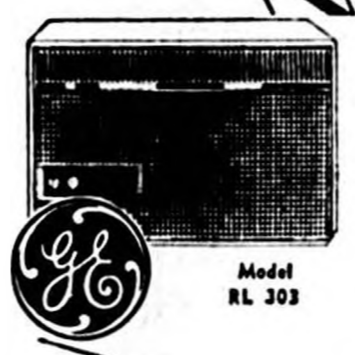

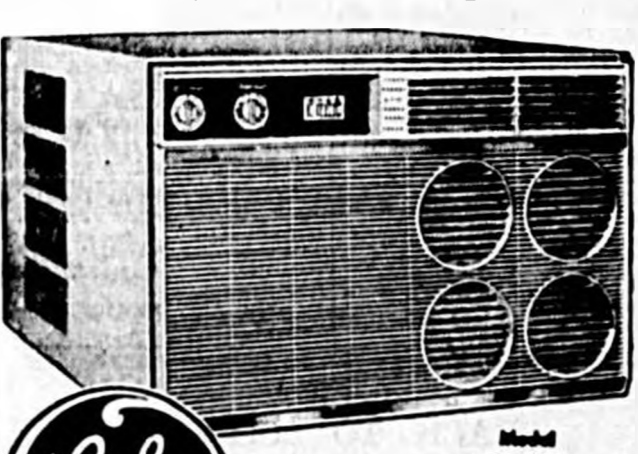

2. Do you always study your teacher as well as his course?
3. Do you know how to answer essay questions when you don't know the right answer?
4. Do you know how to take a multiple-choice test, so that the structure of the test works for you?
5. Do you know how the structure of history differs from that of physics and how to adapt your studying to each?
6. Have you ever tried to

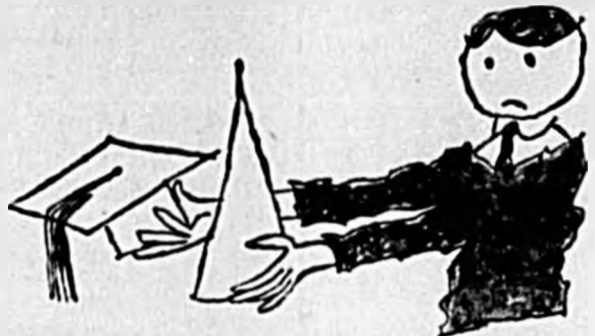


figure out the best way for you to memorize?
7. Do you know how to take notes at a lecture—or do you write down everything that you can?
8. Do you know how to exam scientifically?
9. Can you get the main idea out of a textbook chapter in just a couple of minutes?
10. Did you read the last couple paragraphs of this article before you started to

There might be some shortcuts you haven't found.

But before you start discussing specific study techniques, you should develop some basic attitudes and points of view that are indispensable to effective studying.

The first point of view you have to develop works this way: stop and think about your courses—all your courses. What are they getting at? What are you learning in school? Think about it for a minute. Are you learning to reason better? Are you becoming more receptive to ideas? The courses you're taking this year—will they help you think more clearly? (For instance, algebra and Latin.) Will they help you express yourself better? (Any foreign language will help you understand your own.) Will they help you understand the forces that are shaping your world? (For instance, physics, sociology, and history.)

The point is, do you just endure your courses, or do you really try to get something out of them? If you start with the attitude that school is unpleasant, you'll be right—it will be. But if you make an effort to see what your courses can do for you, then school can be a real pleasure.

The next step is to start to develop an approach to each one of your courses in particular.

35 Teachers Added To Faculty

Behind the teacher's desks in Seminole County's 22 schools there will be 35 new faces September 3 as school instructional personnel is expanded to meet the rising population.

Most of the principals have continued their work all summer and all teachers will return to school Monday to begin their two-week pre-school preparation.

On Tuesday, the Florida Education Association will hold a closed circuit television meeting with all teachers watching in their respective schools.

On Wednesday there will be a tour of the county and orientation day for new teachers.

The ETV telecasts will continue through the two-week period with special pre-school

telecasts in U.S. history, fourth grade science, sixth grade science, fourth grade Spanish and fifth grade Spanish.

School will begin for the 14,500 students on Sept. 3, the day after Labor Day, with the first Teacher-Parent Conference Day set for Oct. 23.

Thanksgiving holidays will begin Nov. 28th for four days and school will close for Christmas on Dec. 20, opening again on Jan. 6.

A second conference day has been set for March 13, with spring vacation from March 27-30 and another holiday for the pupils April 24, as teachers attend the

state conference of the FEA. Closing date for the school year will be June 4.

Two special teachers have been added to the county staff to give assistance and aid to exceptional children. This brings to five the number of instructors in the county now working in this field.

30 Million Enrolled In Adult Education Courses

School bells are summoning 30 million youngsters back to classes — and reminding 30 million adults that summer is over and it is time for them to hit the books harder than ever. That's how many Americans over 21 are enrolled in adult education courses, attend school full-time, or study at home, according to a recent national survey.

The most common reason for this "knowledge rush" among adults is as close as your pocketbook. Spare-time study has always been popular among the ambitious who seek swift promotion. But suddenly, voluntary vocational training is becoming a must for hundreds of thousands today and millions to-morrow whose skills are being made obsolete by automation and other forms of technological progress. The pay you take home from the job—and the job-related course you study at home — are becoming more closely related every day.

Of the nearly 10 million engaged in independent study, those generally ranked most serious about it, and often the most successful, are the three and a half million correspondence students in the United States. They report to "school" after a full day on the job, with 85 percent studying material to help update or up-grade vocational skills.

It is not easy to get back in the swing of good study habits if you've been out of school for five years. Let alone 25 as some people have. For this reason, International Correspondence Schools, the nation's largest home-study school, with a current enrollment of over 100,000,

has issued a new study guide for correspondence students. Written by Dr. John Walsh, head of research, the chapter on "How to Study" contains valuable suggestions for students of all ages.

First, the place you study — it is important to have a definite spot all your own whether it is a regular study in an attic, a basement or aboard a ship. Studying in the same place, Walsh says, encourages concentration. Also, he advises sitting in a straight chair, since a sofa or easy chair is too relaxing for the average person after a busy day.

Start out by keeping a chart to organize your study time each week, with hours planned in advance. You will gain more by studying at least an hour or two each night than by skipping a study period and trying to study twice as hard the next time to make up work. If your family and friends know your study schedule, they can avoid arranging conflicting social activities.

Walsh also includes tips on "study reading" when you are reading to retain information rather than sheer enjoyment. It involves three steps. First, scanning the assignment to get an overall idea of the main points. Then start reading as rapidly as you can and still understand each word, reference or question each word, reference or illustration. Putting a question mark in the margin should difficulty arise. Ask yourself questions on the material as you go. Take notes on key points. Finally, review the text at a normal pace, being sure you grasp any parts not clear to you initially.

These three readings Walsh says, may actually take less time than one slow reading and they will cut down on time spent later in reviews.

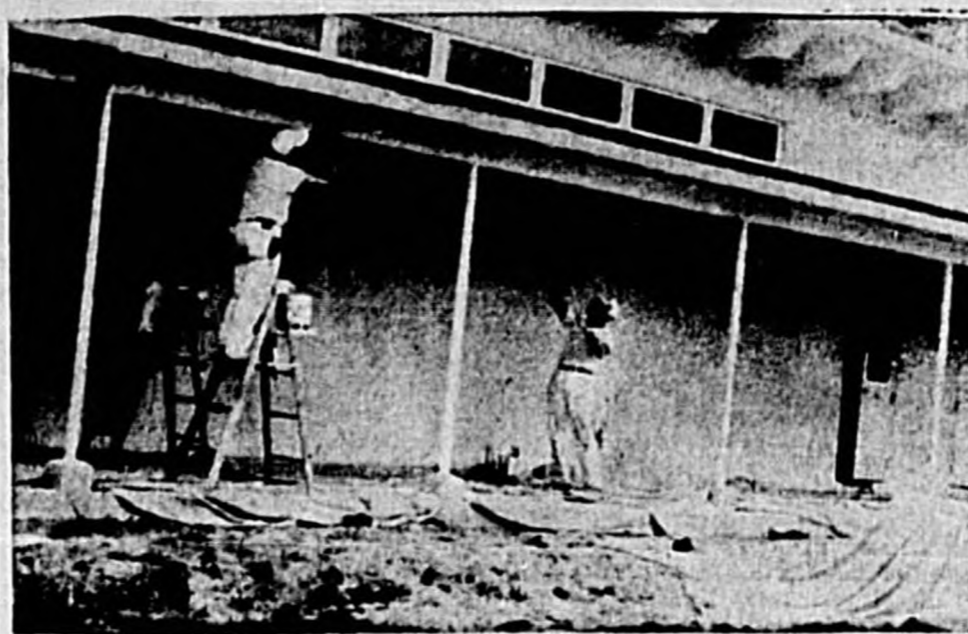

Seminole County schools offer high school students the Diversified Cooperative Training program that is planned to guide them into future careers.

The program gives the student an opportunity to show aptitude for his work and gain fundamental knowledge of the job while still attending class. The successful results in placing qualified students in career fields is praised by employers.

Students who are at least 16 years old may enter. They must be able to graduate with their classes, and still maintain a satisfactory position for nine months.

Training agencies are available in secretarial, mechanical, banking, record shop, credit work, bookkeeping, women's apparel, men's shops, automobile shops and other business firms.

The boys and girls work after school and some times on week-ends. Four hours are spent in school and four on the job, netting three credits a year for DCT work.

The program is in its sixth year at Seminole High School.

Good Eating Programs Vital To Youngsters

In the rush of back-to-school days, don't let your youngsters lapse into the bad eating habits that cause almost half the nation's teenagers to suffer from malnutrition in the midst of plenty.

Dr. Evelyn B. Spindler, nutritionist for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, estimates six out of ten teenage girls and four out of ten boys have poor diets and serious nutritional deficiencies. Poor eating habits among these youngsters result in lowered resistance to illness, frequent colds, skin eruptions, irritability, lack of energy, and unusual fatigue.

What are the reasons for this, and what can be done about it? Dr. Spindler blames teenage undernourishment largely on skipping breakfast and filling up on snacks made up mainly of full of sugar, fat, and starches, but very little protein, minerals and vitamins.

A good way to encourage your teenagers to adopt better eating habits now that school is back in full swing is to keep your refrigerator well stocked with nutritious foods and beverages. If your present refrigerator is already overloaded, you'll need one of the roomy new electric refrigerator-freezers to hold nourishing snack-time extras.

You'll find that the nutritious foods you keep in your electric refrigerator - freezer for afternoon snacks will disappear just as quickly as the "empty calorie" ones like cookies, cake, candy and soda pop. Nutritious substitutes to have on hand include hard-boiled eggs, cold cuts, hot dogs and hamburger meat, ice cream, cheese, fresh fruits, and crunchy raw vegetables.

For health-giving drinks, provide lots of milk and a variety of juices such as apple, prune, grape, tomato, orange, and grapefruit.

Instrumental Music In Education Favored

Many important educators have climbed on the bandwagon for instrumental music in basic education, a major reason why the number of school-age musicians has increased more than 300 percent during the past 15 years.

According to the American Music Conference, school-age musicians are growing in number at a rate five times the rate of the total school population. . . and now total 10,500,000.

Dr. Maxwell Rafferty, superintendent of public schools in California, is one of music making's strongest supporters. He says, "The Greeks and Romans believed music instruction was a basic academic subject, and so do I. Music itself even helps with simple arithmetic."

Instrumental music is generally recognized as a contributor of more than just pleasant sounds, particularly in areas of thought-discipline, mathematical precision, perseverance and cooperation.

Rev. Joseph Mytych, director of music instruction for the Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago, has said, "We have found in schools having a solid applied music program that achievement and I.Q. ratings are very decidedly elevated."

The phrase "full development of the student" is included or implied in most educator's endorsements of music's place in the curriculum. Dr. Ralph W. Lantz, assistant superintendent of

Los Angeles public schools, says, "The discipline children learn is transferable to other subjects, often making them all-around better students."

Interestingly, music studies in Space Age curricula don't end at the door to the music room. Sometimes they go right into the science lab, further emphasizing a link between science and music.

As part of a study of "sound waves, seventh graders in White Plains, New York designed their own music instruments. Guided by the science instructor, they learned the basic principles of sound and acoustics of modern orchestral instruments using, among other things, paper-tube trombones, glass and straw clarinets, and oil-can banjos.

A New Trier High School in Winnetka, Illinois, students became interested in the el-

ectronics of hi-fi equipment and sound production through a desire to record their own jazz sessions.

A survey of AMC of scientists and deans of technological institutes further emphasizes the compatibility of music and science: 32 of 46 respondents agreed that music helps lay a foundation for scientific thinking.

Training Means Higher Salaries

The increasing demand for highly trained men and women means vastly higher salaries for college graduates, according to the editors of The Encyclopedia Americana.

They quote a Harvard economist as saying that "college graduates can look forward to a lifetime income of \$250,000 more than non-college graduates."

Attache Cases Are 'Organizers'

The young executive's leather attache case has its counterpart on the campus where a student finds that it helps organize his papers, books and personal possessions. Slim and light, the attache case has an amazing capacity. Some cases have accordion files in one section and a roomy compartment in the other. Leather brief bags and zippered envelopes also help keep a student's papers and books at his fingertips in lecture section or laboratory.

Favorable masculine colors in leather luggage include sun-tan, ginger and black — both polished and matte finished. This year, olive and ivy-colored leather bags are making a smart appearance in ivy-colored halls.

Leading eye specialists, psychologists and educators are all agreed that contact lenses can give young people a tremendous psychological lift and enthusiasm for new interests.

Yet, headache and disappointment face hundreds of high school graduates each year when they find the doors of college closed to them. Student applications are increasing; the schools are overcrowded; standards are higher and competition is fierce.

Parents can play a vital role in providing extra help that may make the crucial difference in their child's college preparation. A home environment characterized by a love of knowledge, plus home study are important factors in steering a child towards college.

"Developing the encyclopedia habit fosters intellectual curiosity in young people," says Mrs. Lavinia P. Dudley, editor-in-chief of The Encyclopedia Americana. Readers who start by looking up a general article, will soon investigate other references. When children read about a news event in the papers, bear a reference to a public figure on the air, or are introduced to a new field of learning in school they can turn to the pages of an encyclopedia to broaden their understanding and appreciation of the subject.

Mrs. Dudley pointed out that the 1963 Americana contains 60,000 articles and more than 17,000 illustrations in all fields of learning. Over 4,000 pages are new or revised this year making the set of even greater benefit to school-age youngsters and their parents.

"Sound working knowledge of English and a large vo-

cabulary are perhaps the most important elements in college entrance tests," the editors note, adding that frequent study of a major adult encyclopedia helps build both.

Fido May Want To Go To Class

Now that the youngsters are headed back to school, there may be a lesson in store for Fido, the children's friend.

If he puts up a "yap" at being left behind, he'll need to be schooled in the ABC's of living close to neighbor's who won't appreciate the barking of your dog.

To correct him, Bob Bartos, Manager of the Friskies Research Kennels, suggests that you start leaving Fido alone even when there are people in the house. Keep him in a room alone for short periods and if he begins to bark or whine, a reprimand may work. If not, spank him with a newspaper while repeating sharply "quiet."

A little patience on your part in training the dog will keep him from trying the patience of neighbors.

Then rinse the stain out in warm water, and follow by laundering in hot soap or detergent suds.

Everyone passed and she made exactly three spades. "My score of minus 100 was tied for next to top. It seems that at most tables East wound up playing a doubled contract of either five or six diamonds. Of course, when West made the bid he expected to be set but the freak distribution made six diamonds a lay down."

As Mrs. Alesen points out, there is no defense against six diamonds in spite of the fact that North and South hold two aces, three kings and most of the high card strength. It just proves that freak hands produce freak results.
