Gov. Collins today accepted the resignation of David Gatchel and appointed Arthur Beckwith Jr. Clerk of the Circuit Court. Gatchel's resignation is effective May 15.

His office reported at 8 p. m. that the governor still had not made up his mind on whether to put Mrs. Mary Earle Walker back in as Seminole County tax assessor.

Half the officials of Seminole County were close to their telephones today after the office of the governor promised an announcement on the appointment of a tax assessor, but at 2:30 p. m. they still were waiting.

Collins said this morning he had not decided whether to put Mrs. Mary Earls Walker back in the office from which he suspended her last fall, but indicated he might.

The governor said he has a "great respect for the voice of the people." He referred to the big majority Mrs. Walker got in the May 8 primary election. Assessor Richard McCanna asked Collins last week to put Mrs. Walker back in office.

McCanna was back in the assessor's office today after leaving the keys last Friday and going back to his own business. He said he had expected action before now.

"I was assured by Mr. William Durden, the governor's assistant, that an early and prompt decision would be rendered regarding my resignation," McCanna said today.

County Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr., McCanna and others affected by the vacancy in the assessor's position were told by Durden this morning that an announcement was forthcoming.

The Herald has not been able to get Dusden on the telephone since last Thursday.

# **Ouster Revoked Effective Today**

Mrs. Mary Earle Walker was reinstated as Seminole County tax assessor today by Gov. LeRoy Collins and she was sent a telegram to report to work immediately.

An executive order by the governor revoked the suspension of Mrs. Walker after he studied the primary election results in which she won an easy victory over Richard McCanna, who had filled the office on an appointment by Collins,

McCanna resigned last Friday and asked that Mrs. Walker be returned to the job.

The governor said he lifted the suspension because "she has been reported as promising openly and publicly to basically accept the reassessment of property for Seminole County and henceforth that a competent and fair tax roll will be prepared and submitted by her in accordance with requirements of law."

The fact that the people voted her a large majority over McCanna in the primary was the key factor in her return to the office, it was pointed out. Collins said while studying the case that he has "a great respect for the voice of the people."

The governor's assistant reported that Collins wired Mrs. Walker to return to duty today. She was reportedly away from her Oviedo home and could not be reached for comment.

The revocation of the suspension last fall means that Mrs. Walker will be entitled to back pay for the time she has been out of the office since Sept. 28, 1959.

At the same time the governor wired Mrs. Walker of her reinstatement, he answered a telegram sent to him the day after the primary by J. Bralley Odham suggesting that she be put back in office and asking for public comment on a charge attributed to Mrs. Walker's attorney that "one man was responsible for her suspension and that was Mr. Odham."

Collins wired Odham confirming that her attorney had made that statement and said:

"I told him that it was not so and that I had not discussed this problem with you before the action was taken."

"I took the action," Collins said, "because the facts and circumstances left me no alternative. I am hopeful that the end result will be beneficial to the people of Seminole County."

The County Commission met this afternoon to approve the bond of Arthur Beckwith Jr., who was appointed Wednesday by Gov, Collins as clerk of the Circuit Court.

He succeeds David Gatchel whom he defeated in the May 3 Democratic first primary. Gatchel submitted his resignation effective Sunday night,






