Magnus Johnson Losing ST PAUL, Minn., Nov. 8.—Coolidge had a plurality of 82,976 votes in Minnesota when tabulation of unofficial returns from Tuesday's election ended tonight with 3,572 of the state's 3,607 precincts reported.

These precincts gave the President 419,321 votes, as compared with 336,345 for LaFollette and 55,707 for Davis. For Senator the precincts gave Schall (R) 381,532; Johnson (R. L.) 374,241.

After a short service Tuesday, at the home on First Street, the body, accompanied by Mrs. Lee, was sent to the birthplace, Terre Haute, for burial.

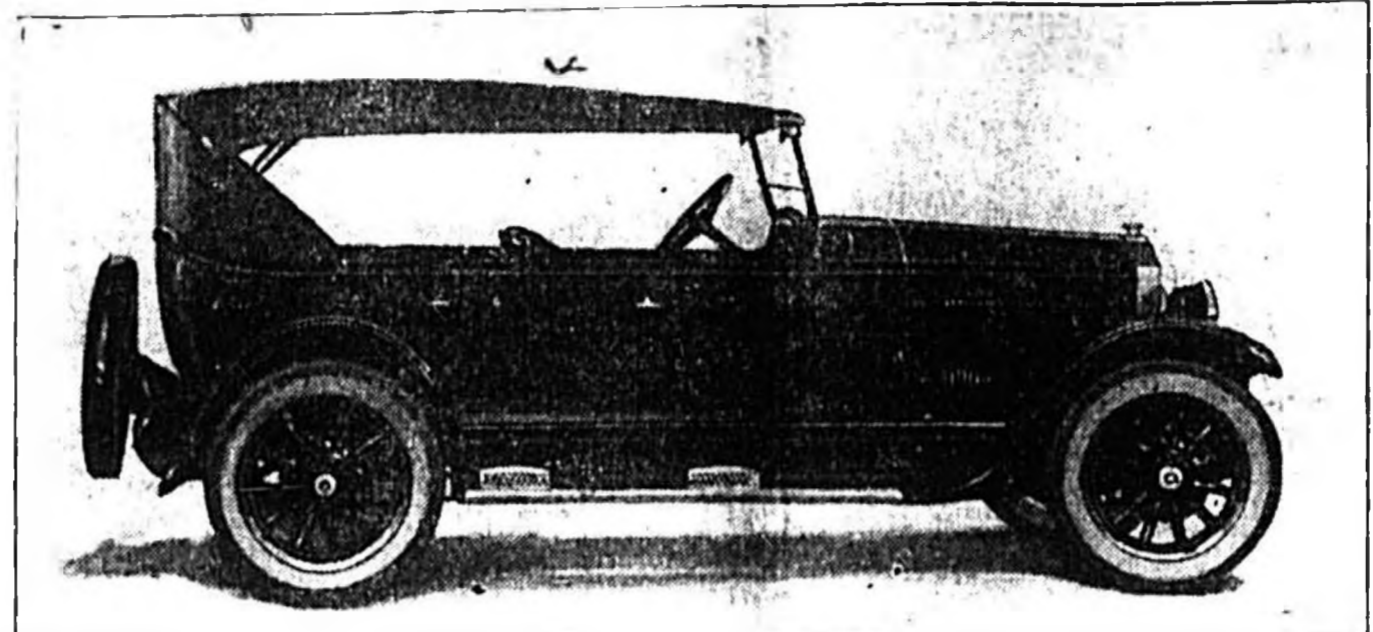
During his brief residence in Sanford, Mr. Lee made many friends, who will mourn this loss and who extend to Mrs. Lee deepest sympathy in her loss.

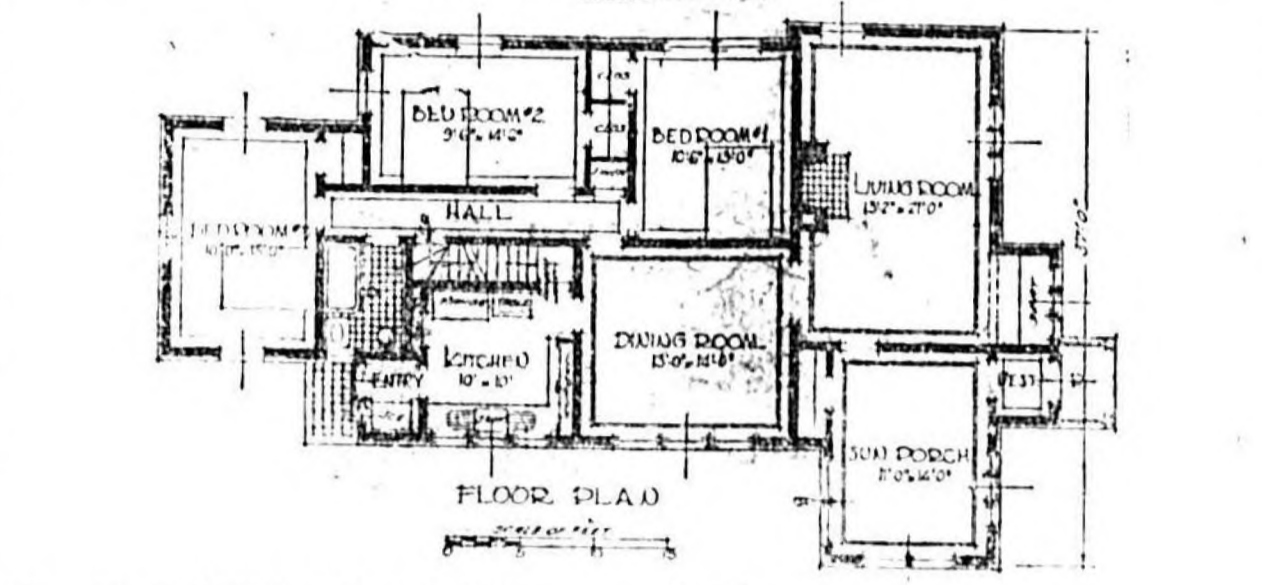
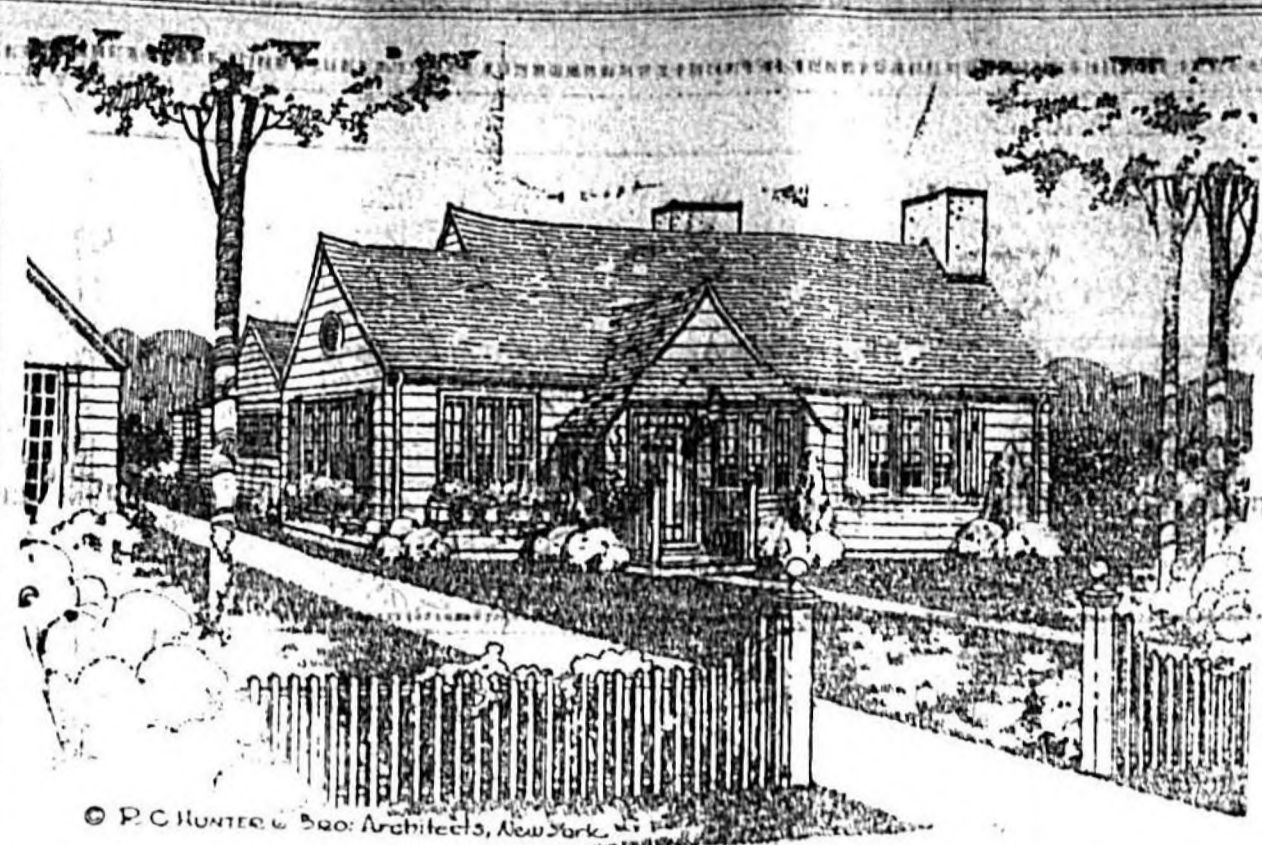
