AMA Journal Says People Often Get Away With Murder

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN CHICAGO Nov. 5 (P)-To the axiom, "you can't get away with murder," the American Medical

Association rebuts:
"Several thousand do each year."
And it puts full blame on the coroner's offices in most canes. It's simply that coroner's offices often don't recognize a murder victim when they see one, the journal of the AMA said in an editorial.

"In most states the coroner's office is so incompetent in the sequisition and interpretation of medical facts that only when murders have been witnessed or when bodies bear wounds regarded as being obviously homicidal are the deaths likely to be reported as murders." The Journal said.

The Journal made these points: One death of each five in the United States approximately 300,000 each year- is known or suspected to have resulted from violence or occurred unexpectedly from obscure causes. In this great pool, 13,000 murders are officially recognized

"In regions where competent medical investigations of such deaths are conducted, in 10 per cent to 2f per cent of all murders, the crime appears to be unwitnesa-ed and the body does not display external wounds that can be regarded as indicative of homicide," The Journal said. "With reasonable certainty it may be said that several thousands of murders pass unrecognized each year in the United States because of the absence of a competent agency for the acquisition of medicolegal in-

formation."





ample, becomes suddenly unable op digest his food he may be ex-veriencing, at second hand, an anxiety of irritation communicated to him by his mother. Or the cause may lie in a haunting fear bred in him when he overheard a violent quarrel between his mother

Two parental attitudes must probably share the blame for most of the stored-up, unconscious guit feelings that distort the lives of children, and of the adults whom hese children becomes, says Misverstreet. The first attitude is whimfulness. Where moods are undependable and rutes erratic, a child cannot work out any way of behavior that will reliably insure his winning approval and affecwanted, the child is continually subject to a sense of failure and

The second attitude, she says, is irrational severity. When a child ennot live up to what his parguilt feelings that his chances of ever becoming a happy, emotion-ally liberated adult will be sadly diminished, and society may suffer a real loss.
