Mrs. Parrott proposed an amendment to the Western proposal. The majority of the 58 nations in committee has favored approving the Western plan as drawn up by the majority of the 11-nation atomic commission.

Her amendment proposed that

the assembly "approve in substance" the majority report. India has fought consistently in this assembly to tone down the differences between the East and West on the atomic problem.

Vishinsky fought against a majority provision that the Atomic Commission resume its work where it was suspended last spring when the East-West impasse showed no signs of breaking.

(Continued From Page One) Jr. and Charles Lee, protested to the Commission about the flooding of their lands by water from the emergency ditch.

After considerable discussion, in which Commission Chairman Pope pointed out that the digging of the ditch was a private and not a County affair, it was agreed to request Mr. Wheeler to continue digging the canal-ditch as far north as the Curryville Road, and

the County will take care of the drainage from there northward. Water will drain into Mills Creek which will be widened and straightened by the County to permit exit of the water into Ee-nockhatchee Creek.

Engineer Hagen was requested to make a survey to determine the levels needed for the work. Much of the flooding of Lake Pickett, said Mr. Hagen, was due to the fact that Orange county had dug ditches draining into the lake in connection with Cheney Highway improvements.

On Oct. 5, B. F. Wheeler, Jr. informed the Board of the digging of the emergency canal and requested that a bridge be placed over the cut in the Ft. Christmas Road.

Another problem faced by the Commission was the request by Mrs. Prudence Bruno to have a ditch deepened to drain her land in the Casselberry section, comprising 17 acres. The Commissioners said that they would make a personal survey of the land today.

The Commissioners also promised personal attention today to the need of clay roads in the Prairie Lake section where more than 25 homes have been recently erected. The request for these improvements was made by S. F. Simpson, W. J. Wells, Jr. and Richard Van Camp.

In Eastern Europe, there was a different tone. The anti-vote for Wallace created consternation among people who had been told the Progressive Party would make a strong showing. Citizens of Moscow asked, "Why wasn't Wallace elected?"

Budapest newspapers, forestalling similar questions, explained that "tens of millions" abstained from voting, because they were "uninterested, being aware that in consequence of terror and fraud, Wallace had no chance this time."

In Canada, acting Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent pointed to President Truman's victory as a good reason why his own liberal government should be returned for a fourth consecutive time.

Truman Asks Cooperation Of Americans

President Returns To White House Amid Exciting Welcome; 500,000 Turn Out

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5, (AP)—President Truman, speaking from the front porch of the White House, asked today for cooperation of all the people in dealing with the nation's problems.

For himself, he pledged "to do the job to the best of my ability."

Mr. Truman spoke to thousands massed about the Executive Mansion. They and others like them had just given him a tumultuous welcome back to Washington and cheered him widely on a triumphal ride up Pennsylvania Avenue from Union Station. The happy President was ed and beamed.

Americans In Nanking Area Being Removed

Remaining Civilians Will Be Protected By Military Personnel, Gen. Barr Says

NANKING, Nov. 5, (AP)—All American dependents in the Nanking-Shanghai area are being evacuated as rapidly as ships become available. Maj. General David G. Barr, director of US joint military advisory groups announced today.

About 1,000 wives and children of Americans will leave the two great Chinese cities, which may be attacked by Communists before long.

At the same time, General Barr said US military personnel will remain at their posts.

Vice Admiral Oscar Badger, commander of US Western Pacific Forces, said the Navy has the intention of abandoning its China base at Shanghai on Shanghai peninsula. He said the Navy was prepared to evacuate Americans and other foreigners of friendly nations.

Admiral Badger said the fleet was in China to protect Americans and to support the existing departments of the US government. He said Marines may be landed at Shanghai in a protective force for the 3,500 Americans there.

Earlier Americans were urged to leave the two cities.

A notice was circulated among Americans here signed by Minister Lewis Clark, while a similar notice was put out by Consul General John M. Cabot in Shanghai.

"Military developments in North China," Clark's note read, "make it appear possible hostilities may spread further south with the result that normal transportation facilities between Nanking and its environs and the sea may be disrupted."

"Also, with the approach of winter and the increasing shortage of food, supplies, and fuel, it is suggested that unless you have compelling reasons to remain you consider the desirability of evacuation to some normal transportation facilities as soon as a chance."

The notices went out at a time pointed to a coming showdown in North China.

An estimated 400,000 government troops, most of them equipped as fighting divisions, were massed in the general area of Nanking. East China military headquarters 170 miles northwest of Nanking.

There they face the tough new force of General Chen, which is ready to strike at any moment in an unrelenting drive and isolate Nanking.

AMA Journal Says People Often Get Away With Murder

CHICAGO Nov. 5 (AP)—To the nation, "you can't get away with murder," the American Medical Association rebuffs.

"Several thousand each year," And it puts full blame on the coroner's offices in most cases.

It's simply that coroner's offices often don't recognize a murder victim when they see one, the journal of the AMA said in an editorial.

"In most states the coroner's office is so incompetent in the acquisition and interpretation of medical facts that only when murders have been witnessed or when bodies bear wounds regarded as being obviously homicidal are the deaths likely to be reported as murders," the journal said.

The journal made these points:

One death of each five in the United States—approximately 300,000 each year—is known or suspected to have resulted from violence or occurred unexpectedly from obscure causes. In this group, 13,000 murders are officially recognized.

"In regions where competent medical investigations of such deaths are conducted, in 10 per cent to 25 per cent of all murders, the crime appears to be unwitnessed and the body does not display external wounds that can be regarded as indicative of homicide," the journal said.

"With reasonable certainty it may be said that several thousands of murders pass unrecognized each year in the United States because of the absence of a competent agency for the acquisition of medicolegal information."

The journal said rights of these persons unjustly accused of murder also were sometimes endangered by the functions of "the archaic office of county coroner."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—One man just says "kiss it," the other wouldn't get his hair mussed.

That was one of the chief differences between the campaign of President Truman and Dewey's Dewey. And it's one of the things that may have cost Dewey the election.

Dewey, with all the public opinion polls and the experts telling him he was rich to win, was assigned as if he believed it. And if he was such a cinch why bother making specific promises, or at least very many of them?

He didn't act like a man in a fight. It was as if he already had the prize. He never gave off much heat. And he didn't come down off the mountain to slug it out with Mr. Truman.

He talked mostly in generalities. Mr. Truman decided him for talking about "home, mother, and efficiency." True, Dewey might not have wanted to make too many promises for fear his great, even though controlled by his own Republicans, might break him.

The President campaigned the other way. It was an uphill fight for him and, when he talked, he talked meat and potatoes.

He was for something, or against it. You might disagree with him but you never had to wonder where he stood or what he'd try to do if elected.

He stated the things he thinks need doing. He said he was kept from doing them by the 80th Congress, controlled by Republicans.

If he'd still do them if the people re-elected him, threw out the Republicans, and gave him a Democratic Congress. The voters did just that. In 1946 they were lots of ways of looking at the election results and

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Rats Are Said To Be More Dangerous Than Most People Realize

How many rats are you supporting?
Even if there are only a few, you should take steps to get rid of them. Rats are far more expensive and dangerous than most people imagine. Some years ago, it was estimated that a single farm rat consumes or spoils \$2 worth of feed or grain in a year. Now, with prices so much higher, the cost of feeding a rat is probably two or three times as great. And if your farm has, say, 200 or more of the pests, their presence becomes extremely costly.

Rats-Kill Chickens
In addition to eating on spoiling feed, rats have been known to kill baby chicks and damage farm buildings with their teeth.

One of the first things you should do to get rid of rats is to eliminate all rat hideouts. Such precautionary measures as plugging holes in buildings or using metal strips on walls at places where rats might gnaw an entrance will be helpful. Get rid of junk piles or other heaps of refuse in which rats would be likely to make a home. Take particular pains to rat-proof your feed storage rooms or buildings.

From now until next spring, rats will be even more destructive than they have been during the warm weather months.

Rats start moving indoors in the fall, when grains are harvested and stored away, and prefer to live in places where food is available. This is the season to crack down hard on our rat enemies.

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Your Child Needs Your Helping Hand

By DAVID TAYLOR MARKE AP Newsfeatures "I sometimes wish all parents would hang upon the wall, where they could see it, a framed sampler bearing the legend 'The Child is Helpless,' says Honora W. Overstreet, noted author, lecturer and adult educator.

Writing in the magazine National Parent-Teacher, she explains that the extent to which parents raise this fact and respond to it, will largely determine the child's later capacity to handle life. Parents need not, of course, be reminded that the child cannot provide its own food and shelter. This is ancient parental knowledge. What we have only begun to realize, however, is how helpless the child is in satisfying its own emotional needs; how precarious its psychic condition is unless the parents provide a steady, reassuring diet of love.

It was long believed, says Mrs. Overstreet, that the love babies, and even the toddler and growing child, lived in a blessed world of its own, immune to the problems of grown ups. Psychiatrists have made short shrift of this happy illusion. On the basis of clinical experience, they are agreed to insist that even the smallest infant is "aware"—in however vague and dispersed a fashion—of any emotional tension in the environment upon which it depends for its security.

When infant Kenneth, for example, becomes suddenly unable to digest his food he may be experiencing, at second hand, an anxiety or irritation communicated to him by his mother. Or the cause may lie in a haunting fear bred in him when he overheard a violent quarrel between his mother and father.

Two parental attitudes must probably share the blame for most of the stowed-up, unconscious guilt feelings that distort the lives of children, and of the adults whom these children become, says Mrs. Overstreet. The first attitude is whimfulness. Where moods are unpredictable and rules erratic, a child cannot work out any way of behaving that will reliably insure his parents approval and affection. Never being sure what is wanted, the child is continuously subject to a sense of failure and guilt.

The second attitude, she says, is irrational severity. When a child cannot live up to what his parents demand, he may suffer such guilt feelings that his chances of ever becoming a happy, emotionally liberated adult will be sadly diminished, and society may suffer a real loss.
