

Jones 'Despair' Note?

Guyana: Valise, 30 Lbs. Of \$\$

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (UPI) — A suitcase stuffed with money and stashed in a chicken coop put another twist today in the bizarre tale of the Rev. Jim Jones and the mass suicide of his 908 blindly loyal followers. The U.S. troops who stuffed the blackened, swollen bodies into green plastic sacks and sent them back to the United States in aluminum cases turned their possibly contaminated uniforms and prepared to return to their home bases today.

Meanwhile, in Washington, the FBI reported finding a short, handwritten note of despair on the body of Peoples Temple leader

Rev. Jim Jones. "The note was turned over to the FBI for examination in the FBI crime laboratory to try and ascertain who may have written the note," the spokesman said. "As of this point... we cannot say for a fact that Jones did or did not write it."

Handwriting experts were working to clear up the matter, but, the spokesman said, there was a possibility of Jones handwriting samples. The two-paragraph communication — "written from one person to another person" — could not be classified as a suicide note. However, the tone was described as one of "despair."

According to the Pentagon, the body retrieval operation cost U.S. taxpayers approximately \$9 million, which figured out to about \$10,000 per body.

Despite the end of the cleanup operation, there was a growing list of mysteries surrounding the stunning events that began late Saturday afternoon, Nov. 18, at the People's Temple jungle commune 150 miles northwest of Georgetown.

Tim Carter, who described himself as a public relations specialist for the cult, told reporters that he, his brother Mike and a third man were given guns and a suitcase con-

taining \$500,000 and walked past the death temple even as their friends were collapsing from cyanide poisoning.

Carter said he, his brother and Michael Prokes were told to take the suitcase to an unspecified embassy. The suitcase later was found to contain a letter to the Soviet Em-

bassy. For the record, the cold numbers were 914 members of the People's Temple sect dead. These included 908 Americans and one Guyanese citizen who died at Jonestown, three of them — including Jones — of gunshot wounds, and the rest apparently from cyanide.

The appalling toll appeared to have cleared up one mystery — the whereabouts of hundreds of sect members who seemed to be missing after the Guyanese government's initial, grossly inaccurate count of 499 dead.

But it was still unclear how Carter, 36, of Boise, Idaho, and his two companions obtained guns and escaped the mass suicide.

The Carter brothers and Prokes opened the suitcase in the commune chicken coop, Tim Carter said. They found 30 to 40 pounds of money and a letter to the Soviet Embassy.

The Carter brothers said they stashed the money in the coop. Guyanese authorities later confiscated it.

As Carter told his story to reporters on the veranda of a ramshackle hotel in the heart of Georgetown, Gerald Parks, 46, of Utah, Calif., who with his wife, two children and mother defected from the commune, overheard Carter's remarks.

Parks said Tim Carter, brother Michael, 30, and Prokes, 32, of Modesto, Calif., were "part of the leadership clique, part of the elite crowd" surrounding Jones.

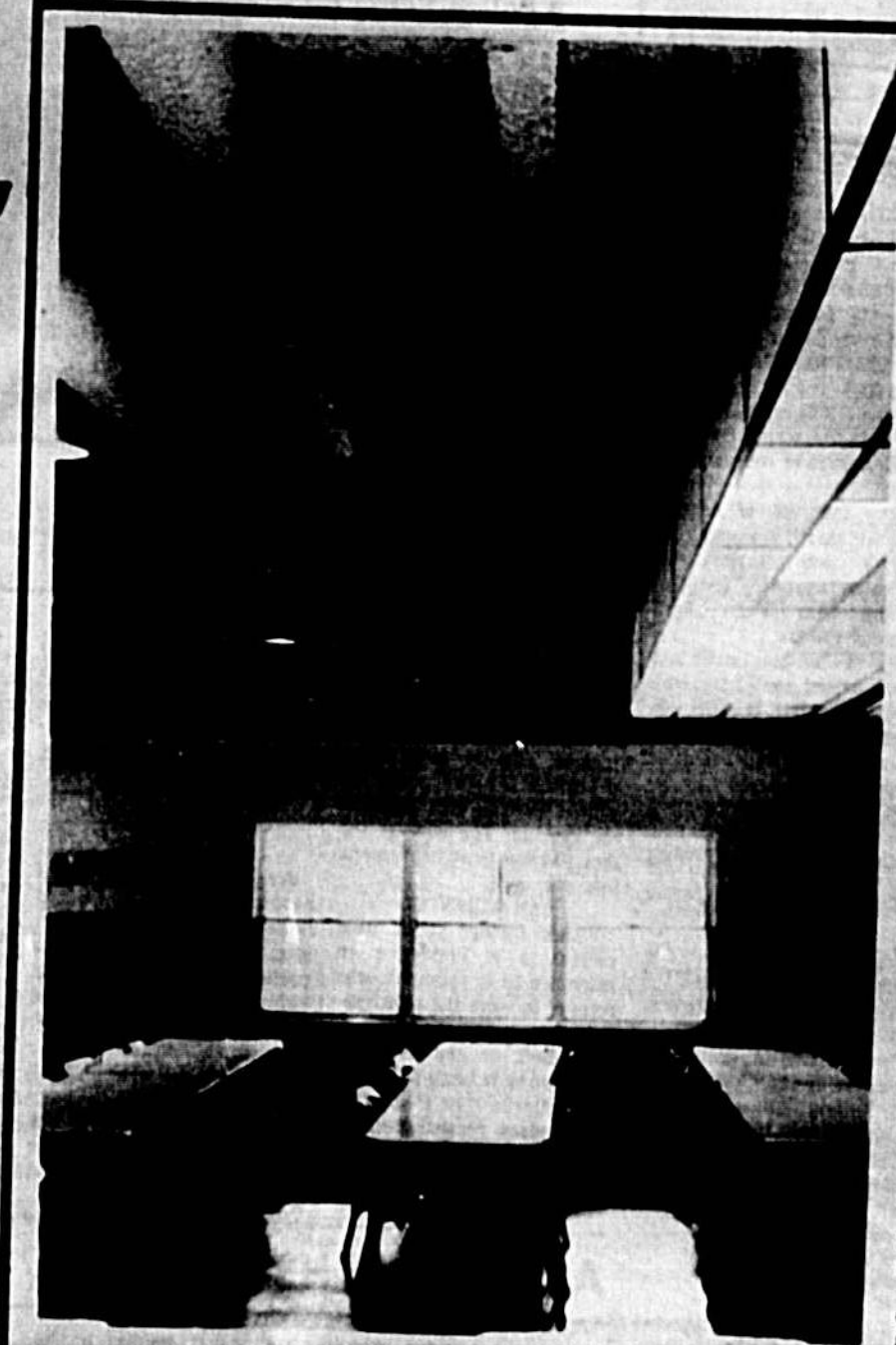
"It seems funny," Parks said, "that we had to escape with our lives at stake, and these three guys walked out with \$500,000 and guns."

Parks was the husband of Patricia Parks, who was killed with the American congressman and nun at Port Kaituma.

"How did you get guns when we couldn't get guns?" another survivor of the suicide spree shouted at the Carters today. "Tell me that! You're lying!"

Asbestos? Ceilings Tested

Seminole County school officials are taking no chances. Work will soon begin to replace the ceilings in 12 schools which may contain possible cancer-causing asbestos.

In two recent tests conducted on the ceilings one showed there was a possibility of asbestos, but further tests were needed while the second test was inconclusive, according to Hugh Carlton, director of auxiliary services for the school district.

The 12 schools are: Crosson, Chesham Elementary, South Seminole Middle School, Bear Lake Elementary, Sanford Middle School, Lavin Elementary, Jackson Heights Middle School, English Estates Elementary, Goldshore Elementary, Mirve Middle School, Midway Elementary and Ponce de Leon Elementary.

The tests were conducted after the Florida Department of Education recommended all school districts check their ceilings for asbestos.

An architect has already been selected for the \$60,000 project and work is expected to begin within the next six weeks, Carlton said. The \$60,000 is state, health and safety money, Carlton said. Carlton said the first test was conducted at Sanford Middle School by Traverses Insurance Company. "They said it had some type of fibrous material but more tests needed to be done. But, instead of saying whether it is or isn't asbestos, we thought the repair would be the best route to follow," he said.

The new ceilings are being installed in various areas of the schools including libraries, auditoriums, cafeteria and classrooms depending on the school, Carlton said. All of the affected ceilings were installed about 12 to 15 years ago.

Carlton noted that plaster ceilings also "accumulated a lot of dust and other particles and after a substantial buildup it would start to chip off and filter down."

In the cafeteria this could be a health hazard because the chipped off material could fall into food and be eaten, Carlton said. In other areas of the school the dust particles could filter down and be inhaled by students or faculty, he noted.

In addition to alleviating the possible asbestos problem the new ceilings will also provide acoustical and energy benefits. "The new ceilings will help cut down and limit excess noise because they will be lower than the original plaster ceilings and because the tiles are especially made for this purpose," Carlton said.

Because the ceilings will be lower it will also reduce the space in the particular area and thus have a smaller space that has to be heated or air conditioned, Carlton said. According to Carlton, the work on the ceilings should be completed by the end of the school year.

Plane Crash Engine Test May Be Moved To Bartow

Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) officials will decide today if they should move the engine of a plane that crashed into the roof of a house near Mayfair Country Club about five weeks ago. The engine has been stored at Air Engines at the Sanford Airport since the crash awaiting equipment to test it.

Air Engines and the FAA had been waiting for Wood Engines of Miami to send four mounts to hold the engine in place while it is revving, according to Russell Turry, FAA inspector. However, when the mounts were installed today, two of them were the wrong size and could not hold the engine in place.

"I've never had so many disappointments over one thing in my life," said Turry today. "We'll probably have to take the engine out of there and move it."

The engine would be moved to a testing facility in Bartow, according to Turry.

"I've about got to move it," said Turry. "Because it has taken so long to get those mounts from Miami and it would take too long to get the correct ones. It's nothing Air Engines has done, it's the man in Miami."

engine is the only thing that is keeping him from concluding his report on the crash.

The report will be forwarded to the National Transportation Safety Board in Miami, according to Turry.

"We don't list any conclusions on the probable cause of the crash," said Turry. "The board will review the facts in the report and make a determination on the probable cause from that."

The board has 30 days from the time they receive the report to make the determination and forward it to the National Transportation Safety Authority in Washington.

The running of the engine is designed to see if the engine is "completely operational," according to Turry, or if it has defects that may have played a part in the crash.

If the engine is moved, Turry speculated his report could be in the hands of the board one week from today.

The accident occurred Oct. 30 when a Cessna 337 piloted by Mike Morgan, 37, of 1200 Forest Drive, Sanford, lost power and crashed into the roof of a house at 168 Par Place near the Mayfair Country Club.

Morgan was hospitalized about one week following the accident suffering a broken leg and several cuts.

OSOTA Planning Director: Sanford Bus On Schedule

One week from today — December 1 — bus service provided by the Orange-Seminole Transportation Authority (OSOTA) is to begin operating in Sanford.

The service will begin on schedule, said Douglas Madden, OSOTA director of planning development, and final details are being worked out this week. Madden said bus stop schedules are currently at the printers and will be available for the general public on Wednesday both from the merchants at the Sanford Plaza and from Laura Fortel, planner in the office of county development in the courthouse. Madden said contact will be made with Chiles Scott, Seminole traffic coordinator, to furnish him with a list of the bus stops. Scott said within two days after being furnished with the list, the bus stop signs will be erected at the more than 30 stops designated along the routes.

Two 45-passenger buses are to be used on the two routes each of which are eight miles long. Each round trip will take about one hour, Madden said.

Bus fares, set by the county commission, is 50 cents each way. John Percy, director of county development, said the Sanford bus route has been under consideration by the county commission for the past three-to-four years.

The county also subsidizes a bus route from the Altamonte Mall through a portion of Altamonte Springs and Casselberry. Currently a Seminole County bus rider can get on a bus in Brantley Square in Altamonte and ride all the way to Orlando. Madden said it is difficult to estimate the ridership on the bus in the Sanford operation because there has been no previous service upon which to base an estimate. — DORNA ESTES

Many Heart Attacks Occur Painlessly

DEAR DR. LAMB—I would like some information on a blocked artery in my heart on the left side. My doctor found that I had a blockage a few months ago when I had an electrocardiogram. I've never had any pain or sign of any heart problem.

I am 70 years old. I am 5 feet 5 and weigh 125 pounds. I feel fine.

I am now taking Perstatine. My blood pressure has been real good so far, only 134-76. My doctor didn't say I should be on any strict diet but just to cut out the fats and avoid egg yolks and use low-fat milk. I have eaten an egg each morning as long as I can remember and my breakfast isn't complete without it. I wonder if I should have one of your health letters on what I should and shouldn't eat. I have been tested for cholesterol and its OK.

DEAR DR. LAMB—It's pretty hard to be certain that a person has a blocked artery on the basis of changes in the electrocardiogram alone. Sometimes the wave patterns that doctors see on an electrocardiogram which resemble an old heart attack can be caused by other things as well.

This is always a difficult problem for the doctor when such a pattern shows up in a person like you, who has no history of any pain or, as you say, no sign of heart problems. I can tell you, though, that a third of the heart attacks that occur are painless or at least they have caused so few symptoms that a person doesn't even recognize that anything serious has happened to him.

In your age group, you undoubtedly do have some changes in your arteries and it is prudent of your doctor to manage you along these lines. The Perstatine that you are taking is an unusual medicine in that it helps to increase the oxygen supply to the heart muscle without increasing the

Candidates Back Sanford Nude Law, But Attack Motive

With a packed house at Sanford's City Commission meeting, two candidates to unseat Commissioner A.A. McClanahan praised his proposed ordinance banning nude entertainment in establishments serving alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption.

However, his motive for proposing the ordinance was questioned.

The ordinance was approved unanimously on first reading by the commission. The second hearing on the ordinance will come Dec. 11, six days after the city election.

David Farr, 108 Larkwood, and Dennis L. Stewart, 108 Mayrose Drive, spoke in support of the ordinance, but were asked by Mayor Lee P. Moore to be seated when he determined their remarks became "political speeches."

Farr told the commission the ordinance will be needed in light of the city's growth. Then he raised the question of McClanahan's motivation for proposing the ordinance so close to election time.

"I cannot let this opportunity pass without questioning the timing of this ordinance," said Farr. "Commissioner McClanahan has been on the commission eight years. Why does he propose this now?"

McClanahan responded that the ordinance was modeled after one used in Lee County. He said he waited until November to propose the ordinance because the Lee County law was upheld by the state supreme court Oct. 5.

"I got this ready as soon as I could," said McClanahan.

McClanahan challenged: "Why don't you buy some TV time David?"

Stewart also voiced support for the ordinance, but suggested it does not go far enough. He said the ordinance should include ban on pornography motion pictures and homosexual bars.

Moore chided both Farr and Stewart for what he considered to be efforts to bring the campaign into the commission meeting.

"I have tried every election year to keep campaign speeches out of the commission and I'm not going to let it happen now," Moore said.

Stewart objected to Moore's position, commenting, "I don't feel I should be deprived of my right to speak just because I am a candidate."

Moore had earlier suggested the principles of the ordinance could be incorporated into city law by amending present city

ordinances covering indecent exposure. "You've got to have double kill," declared McClanahan. "You can't have too many of these ordinances."

Farr later called McClanahan's proposal a "political stunt." McClanahan labeled Farr's comments "political theater."

"I had to say it," Farr commented. "People have been talking about it and saying what I said all over town."

Reds Fire Manager Sparky Anderson

CINCINNATI (UPI)—The Cincinnati Reds today fired manager Sparky Anderson, who led the team to back-to-back World Championships in 1975 and 1976, and replaced him with John McNamara, former manager of the Oakland A's and the San Diego Padres.

McNamara, a coach with the California Angels last season, was signed to a one-year contract by the Reds.

Reds President and General Manager Dick Wagner flew to California Monday and met with Anderson at his Thousand Oaks, Calif., home to inform him of his decision. Anderson will be paid for the final year of his three-year contract.

"The decision we made was not a hasty one," said Wagner. "Our club won in 1975 and 1976 and by that I mean won it all. The past two years have been good ones by the standards of most clubs, but we are determined to set a higher standard."

"It is our decision that the move we have made is in the best overall interests of making the Reds a better team," said Wagner. "Sparky Anderson served us well."

Sims Wins Heisman

NEW YORK (UPI)—Billy Sims of Oklahoma, the nation's leading runner, today was named winner of the Heisman Trophy as the outstanding player in the country.

Sims became only the sixth junior to receive college football's highest individual accolade. Quarterback Chuck Fries of Penn State finished second and Rick Lench of Michigan was third in the voting of more than 900 sports writers and sportscasters from across the nation.

Sanford Approves Plan To Widen Sewage System

A plan to extend Sanford's lakefront sewage treatment plant to serve Lake Mary and the rural northern portion of Seminole County was unanimously approved by the Sanford City Commission Monday.

The plan was developed by a committee made up of representatives from Lake Mary, Sanford and the county. The plan will be forwarded to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for final approval, according to Paul Porter, engineering consultant with Clark, Diets and Associates.

The Sanford Commission was required to approve the plan before it was forwarded to the federal Environmental Protection Agency, because Sanford is the "lead applicant" for the plan. That means that Sanford is asking for approval of the plan in its name.

However, once expansion of the treatment system is complete, an authority will be formed made up of representatives of all the governmental entities involved to operate the system, said Porter. Formation of such an authority will require a special act
