Democrats Come Back To Power

Despite its defeat of Senator Butler, Mass., elected Governor Fuller, Republican, as their chief executive choice for another term.

In eight states some features of the dry laws was voted on in statewide referendums, but the wets and drys still were fighting over the incomplete returns today before announcing their deductions.

New York state voters in yesterday's election cast a wet majority of about three to one. The voters of Illinois, passing judgment on a similar proposal, apparently endorsed it likewise, by a substantial majority.

The defeat of Senator Butler in Massachusetts was claimed as a victory by the wets, his successful Democratic opponent, former Senator Walsh, having cast his lot long ago with the modificationists.

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The state ticket was headed by Governor John Hammill.

L. D. Housholder Given Big Vote in County

Republican Candidate for Congress Polls 229 Votes Against Congressman Sears

Seminole County elections yesterday furnished two surprises. In defeat of Lloyd E. Boyle by John G. Leonardy for prosecuting attorney, the unexpected strength shown by L. D. Housholder, Republican candidate for congress, and the unexpected strength shown by L. D. Housholder, Democrat, who was up for reelection, polled 229 votes in the county as compared with 547 votes for his opponent, Sears.

Housholder made a good showing in the two Sanford precincts, considered safely Democratic. He received a total of 158 votes to 157 for his Democratic rival, Lawson, candidate of a Republican faction, polled 99 votes in Seminole County.

The pressed amendment to the constitution providing for the appropriation of general revenue funds for the common schools of Florida was reported defeated in this county this morning.

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In the sister state of South Dakota, the entire G. O. P. state line-up, with the exception of Governor Carl Gusterson, came through handily, including Miss Gladys Pyle, for secretary of State.

NEGRO IS CAUGHT FOLLOWING AXE MURDER TODAY

Captured After 30 Minutes After Attack of Companion Near Lake Monroe at Noon; He An Equates Long Term

"I took an axe and smashed him before he could get up," J. E. White, a black and about 22 years old, nonchalantly related the details to officers at noon today of how he had split the head of Charles Richardson, 25, with an axe while the latter was sitting before a camp fire near Lake Monroe 30 minutes before Richardson, who died instantly, received a deep gash extending from the right of his forehead.

White did not show any concern over his deed. He laughed when telling the arresting officers of the incident that led up to the axe murder.

The negro reflected that if sent to the penitentiary for "99 years" he would be assured of his meals for the rest of his natural life. He expects to get a long sentence.

News of the crime was telephoned to the sheriff's department from a filling station at Lake Monroe by a negro who witnessed the crime. Deputy Sheriff C. C. Stephenson, Police Chief R. G. Williams and Detective J. G. Green hurried to the scene and overtook White a short distance from the camp fire. He surrendered and a long dagger was taken from him. White said he would have used it on the other men if they had interfered. He will be charged with murder in the first degree. The men are all employed in the turpentine distillery of L. P. Hagan at Markham, seven miles from Sanford.

Low Pressure Over South Causes Inclement Weather In This Section

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Pressure was low along the Atlantic Coast today with depression from New England to Florida bringing unsettled weather, said the report of B. J. Bennett, government meteorologist. Rain fell over the Atlantic and Gulf States during the past 24 hours. Another center of low barometer over Iowa caused rain or snow over the upper Mississippi valley. It was colder over the eastern states this morning except in southern Florida. Birmingham and Atlanta each reported freezing weather with killing frost, the first of the season.

It was warmer over the middle-plains states, but colder again in the Northwest. Snow fell in the Dakotas, but mostly fair weather prevailed elsewhere in the West.

WETS BELIEVE AMENDMENTS ARE SUCCESS

Results of Ballot in Many States Show That People Are Divided on Repeal of Present Prohibition Laws

Illinois Votes on Enforcement Act

Other States of Country May Vote to Force Issue From Public in Election of 1928

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The wet and dry issue went before voters of eight states in yesterday's elections in various forms and the results were equally varied. How much the results may be regarded as reflecting popular sentiment is not without dispute, for the drys declare that in some instances their people ignored the questions.

California's question was on the repeal of the prohibition law. Latest returns today showed that in 2,237 precincts of the 8,512, in the state, 104,525 votes were cast to repeal the law and 65,740 against.

Missouri's referendum was on the repeal of the state enforcement law. Such returns as were available today showed a majority of one hundred thousand against the proposal.

Illinois presented a question almost identical with that in New York. It was a proposal to petition Congress for modification of the Volstead act to permit states to make their own definitions of what constitutes an intoxicating beverage. In Illinois in 3,570 precincts out of 4,053 the vote was 625,983 for the proposal to 258,490 against it.

In New York, with some districts unaccounted for but the state generally represented the vote was 1,020,019 in favor of modification and 473,981 against.

Colorado's proposal was for a law which does not conflict with the federal law and repeal of the state law as at present. A little less than half of the state reported 64,401 against repealing the present law and 53,642 in favor of it.

Nevada's proposal was on denouncing the national prohibition law as a failure and calling a convention to submit amendments to the 18th amendment. The results were about three to one against the prohibition law.

Such returns as had been reported from Wisconsin showed a vote of 214,557 in favor of 2.75 per cent. beer with 97,362 against. In some cities the ratio was five to one for the proposal.

In Montana on a slight repeal to the state bone dry law, only 672 precincts of the state's 1,481 had reported today, but they stood 34,382 for repeal and 24,164 against.

NEW RESIDENTS OF STATE FAIL TO CHANGE POLITICS

Florida and Other Southern States Send Democratic Delegation Back to Congress; Small Vote Cast

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 3.—(AP)—The influx of new residents into Florida from the North during the past two years had not changed the state's political complexion, returns from yesterday's general election show.

Despite the smallness of the vote and the lack of interest Democratic nominees for Congress were sent into office with varying majorities.

Compilations from 248 precincts gave Senator Duncan U. Fletcher a vote of 13,927 to 2,868 for John M. Lindsay, State delegation Republican and 1,163, to W. R. O'Neal, regular Republican.

Senator Fletcher had a commanding lead from the first returns.

Congressman William J. Sears, who defeated Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, daughter of the late William Jennings Bryan in the primary for the Democratic nomination had almost a four to one lead over his two opponents. The vote from 136 scattered precincts in the fourth district was Sears, 8,448; W. C. Lawson, state delegation Republican 1,831; and L. D. Housholder, regular Republican 1,030.

The warmest Congressional fight was in the first district, where Congressman H. J. Drane in 88 precincts early today had polled 4,362 votes against 2,073 for O. E. Chapin, state delegation Republican.

T. Al Yon led J. H. Drummond, regular Republican, by a safe majority in the third district, scattered returns showed.

In the second district, Congressman H. A. Green was leading A. F. Knotts, regular Republican by a vote of practically 3 to 1.

FASCIST PARTY IS REVERED LAST SHOOT

Attempt on Life Mussolini Leader Black Shirt Murder and Plot

Socialists Are Attacked At Home

Famous Philosopher Home Wrecked Angry Naples

ROME, NOV. 3.—(AP)—Death or injury has been inflicted on many persons in a t i - Fascist tended throughout Italy by Fascist enraged over the latest attempt to assassinate Premier Mussolini.

Large numbers of persons also are under arrest and others are being watched.

Confirmation from Bologna of the attempt by Anteo Amadori to assassinate Premier Mussolini Saturday involved a far reaching plot instead of being merely the act of a deranged youth, has revealed an intensely hostile feeling against anti-Fascists. Only the heroic efforts of militiamen and carabinieri prevented great bloodshed yesterday.

Many peace officers were wounded when they attempted to hold back infuriated mobs who desired to sack residences of anti-Fascists. Wreck opposition newspaper offices, riotous demonstrations occurred in Cagliari, in Sardinia, and in Naples, Venice, Genoa and other places.

The home of the famous philosopher, Signor Croce was visited by a mob in Naples. In Cagliari the anti-Fascist deputy of the legislature was taken into custody and held in a "black shirt" prison.

Two Fascists and one socialist were killed in Genoa when some officers and carabinieri fired on bands of Fascists who were storming the residence of Signor Rossi, a socialist lawyer.

By decree issued by the prefect of police in Rome twelve opposition newspapers and two magazines have been refused permission to publish and the houses of several other organs were raided.

Ten persons have been arrested and a large number of manifestos seized in connection with the alleged plot against the government. At Siena seven anti-Fascist manifestos have been taken into custody.

Stringent measures are being prepared for the enforcement to discourage any further attempt on the life of Premier Mussolini. Criticisms against his policies.
