Nasty Little War To Grow

President Johnson returns from his peace mission to Asia with the clear and unmistakable word that the Viet Nam war will continue to grow. This nasty little engagement will become bigger before it goes away.

The fact which identified this peace mission with increasing war was word from Gen. William C. Westmoreland that he needed more troops and the President's assurance that they would be provided. Westmoreland said he would be in Viet Nam. The Manila Conference statement of basic policy conceded that the war must continue and that its size, intensity and duration depend wholly on Hanoi. Hanoi seems not to budge from

waging hotter and bigger war. The Manila Conference declaration is at least a vibrant statement of man's nobler aspirations. No American should continue to believe in the commitments to social, industrial and governmental revolution in Viet Nam. If these commitments are not met, American people will find themselves over-committed. This is as foolish and hazardous for a great nation as it would be for you or your next door neighbor.

President Johnson has promised too much. Some or all of our Far Eastern friends are likely to be disappointed. LBJ perambulates and treats instinctively to a bank American em-

tion. That emotion is to pet, warm and cuddle the sick puppy, the sick child, the sick ghetto, the sick nation. You name it. The American people cannot expect too much from the U.S. government. There are no 2nd and 3rd positions or division chief spots in selected agencies.

Communists would use control of appropriate sections of the foreign affairs office to bring in squads of foreign Red advisers and technicians.

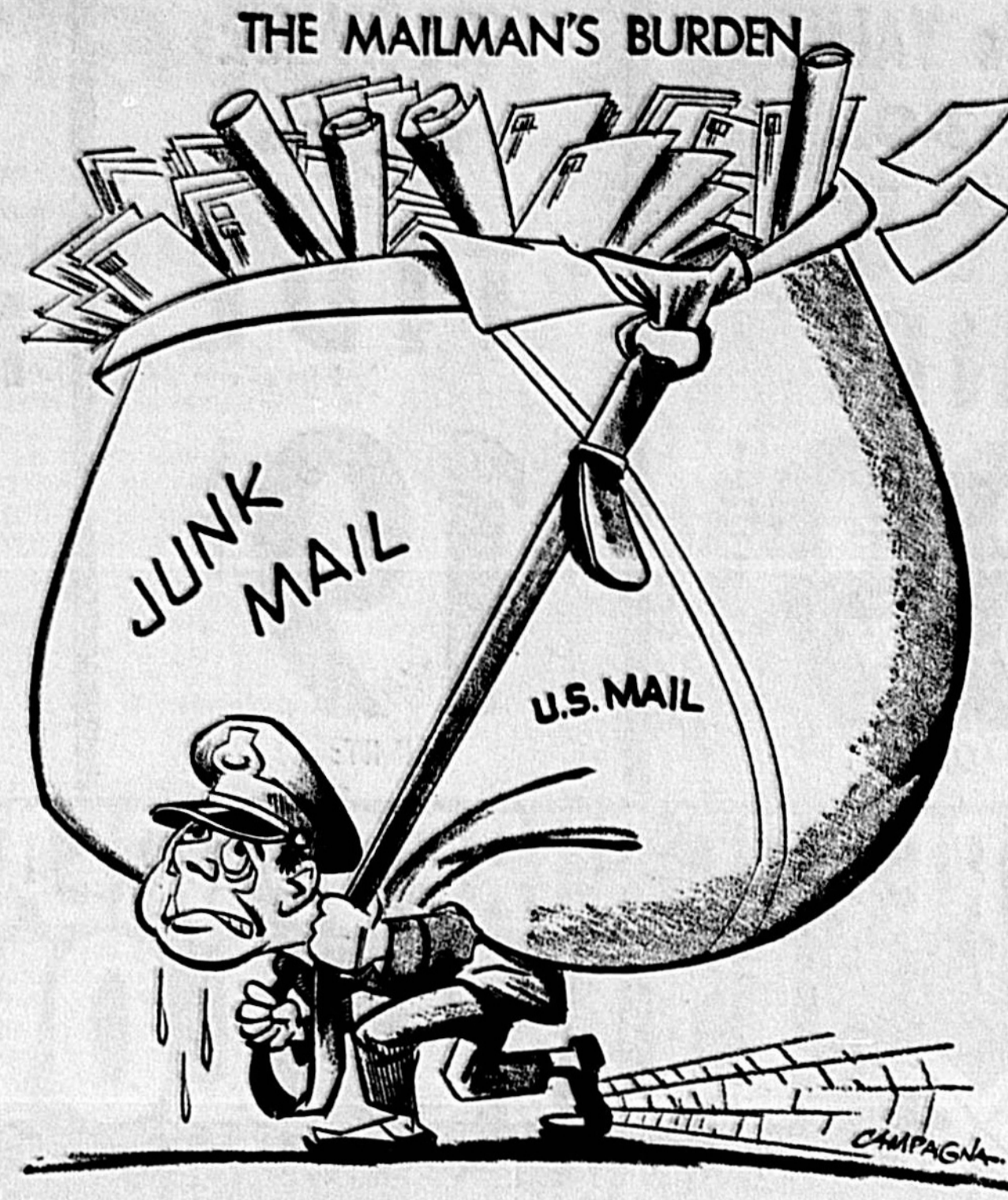
Second—The Viet Cong seek in such a "peace" agreement a great deal of local autonomy for provinces in which the Red underground is powerful.

The VC aim would be to undercut and take over these provinces by political and economic pressure combined with selective terrorism.

These communist enclaves would then be used as training and operational bases for underground infiltration of adjoining provinces.

Third—Recognition of the Communist National Liberation Front as a legitimate political party.

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Hal Boyle Says Ben Was A Piker

NEW YORK (AP) — There were very many men who could beat Benjamin Franklin at anything.

But as an almanac salesman, Ray Geiger, 56, a former altar boy and Notre Dame philosophy student, makes old Ben look like a piker.

Franklin usually sold only about 5,000 copies a year of his famed "Poor Richard's Almanac," published from 1733 to 1782.

But since 1934, Geiger has sold 50 million almanacs, more than any other man in history.

Geiger is making a name for himself as a Florida astronomer.

"We are kidded about them," said Ray, "but they often turn out to be surprisingly accurate. We have a good batting average."

"And children like an almanac because they feel it gives them a true glimpse of the old days."

This year Geiger has printed 2,750,000 copies of the 19th annual edition of the "Farmers' Almanac," which is distributed free to customers by banks, insurance companies and other firms. When he took it over in 1933, it was selling only about 100,000 copies.

He is also printing 800,000 copies of the second issue of "The American Farm and Home Almanac," which he founded only a year ago and is sold on newsstands.

Geiger, tall, blond and affable, heads a \$5-million-a-year advertising specialties firm in Lewiston, Maine. A promotion genius, he makes 125 speeches a year, travels some 100,000 miles.

The almanacs represent only a small fraction of his business, but give him the most fun.

"I peddle the almanacs to send my five children through school," he said smiling.

Almanacs were popular among the ancient Egyptians and Romans. Some 160,000 kinds flourished in early America.

Radiological Defense Aide Named To CD

John Keim was appointed radiological defense co-ordinator with the local county Civil Defense unit by the Board of County Commissioners at its meeting Tuesday.

The appointment was made at the recommendation of Herbert Johnson, Civil Defense director. Keim will receive no salary but will receive travel allowance and per diem to attend three CD schools during the fiscal year with expenditure for each school not to exceed \$100.

In other business, Harold Johnson, county attorney, reported that the county built a timber bridge across Howell Creek in 1961 under a Civil Defense agreement and has completely fulfilled its agreement.

C. D. Dodd, former county commissioner, appeared before the board last week and complained that no ramps have been provided by the county as approaches to the bridge, making the bridge unusable.

Commissioner Lee Gary, in whose district Dodd resides, stated that since the county fulfilled the original agreement of building the timber bridge, no further improvements are in order.

The board agreed with Gary's position with the exception of Commissioner Lawrence Swoford, who voted against referring Dodd's request.

It was decided that culverts will be placed under Dykes Road, as Dodd had requested, if Dodd will acquire the necessary easements for the county.

The board:

Passed a resolution proclaiming this week, American Education Week as recommended by Ernest Cowley, president of the Seminole Education Association.

Gave the Winter Park Telephone Company permission to install cable on SR 454 up Lake Jean Circle to Waukegan Springs Road on the county right-of-way with the work subject to approval by the county engineer.

Instructed the road superintendent to install culvert at Upsala Road near the ACL with participation of the property owners.

Granted permits to dredge in Lake Faith on lots 11, 12 and 13 of Block 9 of Oakland Shores with the requirements that the dredging be at least 200 feet offshore in at least six feet of water.

Instructed the road department to unplug the Bear Lake Gulley Road drainage.

Referred to the attorney a letter requesting copy of the minutes of a September meeting from Richard Maington of Miami, attorney for Beach South, who has announced his intention to sue the county and Seminole Memorial Hospital for alleged neglect in treatment of a 10-year-old tandem axle dump truck for net bid of \$11,185.84 and the low bid of Florida Equipment of Orlando for \$20,607.46 for a dragline.

Red Skelton's 'Clown Alley' Slated Tonight

AP Movie-Television Writer HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Red Skelton clings to a curious billing in his television and personal appearances. He is announced merely as "one of America's clowns."

No superlatives. No other description of his talents.

He explains his reasoning: "I don't want to be called 'the greatest' or 'one of the greatest' — let the other guys claim to be the best. I just want to be known as 'a clown,' because to me that's the height of my profession. It means you can do everything — sing, dance and above all, make people laugh."

Skelton will demonstrate his reverence for clownship with his first special of the season, "Clown Alley," which appears tonight on CBS, Domingo circus makes with him are Amanda Blake, Jackie Coogan, Audrey Meadows, Robert Merrill, Vincent Price, Martha Raye and Bobo Ryell.

"Everybody we asked to be on the show accepted," Skelton commented. "That demonstrates what I've always believed: Everyone has a secret desire to play a clown."

Skelton is one of the few comedy stars who actually did so. The son of a part-time clown and college teacher, he joined the Hagenback-Wallace show in 1929 when he was 16.

Clowns maintain a code that prohibits copying of another's makeup, and Red adopted the white-reclined look that his father had used. It is the same one he now employs as Freddie the Freeloader.

Skelton remained with Hagenback-Wallace for only one four-month season, but the experience was enough to invest him with the love of clowning — and a flock of superlatives.

"Clowns are the most superstitious people in the world," he said. "I picked up all of them — whistling in the dressing room, but on the bed, shoes on the table, stepping over the footlights, 13 in a bed."

Engineman Dies At The Throttle

DOVER, N.J. (AP)—Archibald M. Speer, a 67-year-old train engineer nearing retirement, was killed in his cab by a 200-ton runaway switch-engine unit.

"He must have gone through the tortures of hell when he saw that train coming," remarked a spectator as workmen began clearing the mangled wreckage of Speer's four-car passenger train and the double switch engine.

The others aboard the commuter train—two crewman and six passengers—were injured, none seriously. Authorities began examining the shattered engine unit to determine why it broke loose, rolled seven miles downhill and thundered into Speer's oncoming train.

Eric—Lackawanna Railroad officials and police gave this account of the accident: The two engines, coupled together, had been parked by a landing at the Port Morris terminal. Their engineer and conductor were not aboard when the unit began rolling.

Gaining momentum, the engines raced along the track at speeds estimated at between 50 to 85 miles an hour. They rolled through Dover before street-crossing guard gates could be lowered and at least one automobile was nearly hit.

At the Salem Avenue overpass, they slammed into the Westbound passenger train which was nearing the end of its run at the Dover station. Speer, of Clifton, N.J., a 45-year veteran of the line, apparently was killed instantly.
