Feb. 5-Al-though Japan has been consid-ered the most vulnerable from the viewpoint of supplies of raw materials steh as Iron and steel ecrap, it is now indicated that Japanese stockpiles of scrap are far greater than is generally re-alized, and are sufficient for arms production at peak rates for many months, according to a survey issued yesterday by "Iron Age." The magazine estimated Jap-na's pile of iron and steel scrap nt the beginning of the current year at about 10,000,000 tons. In the last 10 years it is point-ed cut, Japan received abot 11,-600,000 tons from the United States, a period in which the Japanese steel industry produced approximately 56,000,000 tons of steel ingot and castings and about 30,000,000 tons of pig iron. Among factors taken into account in making the survey are Japan's imports of finished iteel products as well as scrap and recovery of old metals from large-scale wrecking operations in China. in China.
