Claude Kirk Vows Race Against High

MIAMI (UPI) — Republican Claude Kirk said he'll tramp every main street in Florida in the coming five months and will win the governor's race with a united GOP and 300,000 behind him.

"There will be no character assassination or vilification" against Democratic nominee Robert King High of Miami, said the Jacksonville and Palm Beach businessman. "I'm going to talk about the issues."

In referring to character assassination, Kirk apparently spoke of the vitriolic race for Democratic nomination which ousted incumbent Gov. Haydon Burns by a 66,037-vote margin Tuesday.

Burns still has not tossed his support to High, and Kirk said he would like to see a GOP State Chairman Tom Fairfield Brown here said he would welcome the governor's support. But Kirk said he would make no formal request for it.

Brown said the "full resources" of the Florida Republican party would be thrown behind Kirk. He would have to devote some of his work to that end, he said, but he said he would do it because he believed in the man.

Kirk called the campaign a half-million dollar undertaking and said that national Republican figures would come to Florida to speak in his behalf. To win, the former insurance executive and now investment firm president, who lost in an attempt to unseat Sen. Spessard Holland in 1964, he must outpace Kirk and Scott Kelly of Lakeland.

Kelly, high in the runoff and construction days.

If he wins, Kirk would be the first member of the Grand Old Party to sit in the governor's chair since Robert Burns.

Hyacinth Eradication In St. Johns Opposed

PALATKA (SpI) — Methods to improve fishing and recreation along the St. Johns River and its tributaries were discussed here Wednesday at a meeting of the St. Johns River Valley Advisory Committee.

The group also expressed deep interest in the construction of the proposed Orange Indian River Canal from Sanford to near Oak Hill.

Committee Chairman Felix Salvador, of St. Augustine, said the committee absolutely is against eradication of water hyacinths in the river.

"The whole river is up in arms over the present program of eradication," Salvador said.

A program of hyacinth eradication currently is being carried out by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Opponents believe that it robs sports fish of coverage from predators and for feeding.

They also claim that loss of hyacinths along the shore results in erosion.

Chemicals used to kill the hyacinths also are believed to pollute the water and result in fish kills, opponents said.

Reid Diggers, of Jacksonville, spoke to the committee on the dangers of pollution and suggested a program to eliminate pollution in the St. Johns. Among his recommendations was formation of a regional authority to operate a campaign to stop industrial pollution, mechanical hyacinth control and eradication of harmful fish.

Art Marshall, of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service at Vero Beach, discussed the proposed St. Johns-Indian River Canal alignment with the committee.

Marshall said the original alignment of the canal was abandoned because of the fact it would capture water from the main stream and divert it to the Indian River. A number of conferences have been held, he said, on finding an alignment that would meet the interest of conservation and navigation and he was hopeful a revised plan would be forthcoming soon.

58% Of County Democrats Voted

Official canvass of Tuesday's election returns, plus a count of absentee ballots, revealed today that 58.7 per cent of the registered Democrats.

This bettered the May 3 turnout of 4,000 or 48.4 per cent of the total number of Republican and Democrat.

The official canvass revealed no major changes in the Seminole County returns.

The canvass and absentee count showed that Gov. Haydon Burns carried the county by a 1,008 vote margin over winner, Robert King High. Burns polled 5,331 to 4,323 for High.

The closest county-wide race that between Mrs. Kathleen Reynolds and Mrs. Sheila Roberts, who remained basically unchanged. Mrs. Reynolds won, polling 4,116 votes to 3,753 for Mrs. Reynolds in the race for State Democratic Commissioner.

Other officials figures: Public Service Commissioner — Joe Boyd, 2,980; Jerry W. Carter, 4,802.

State House of Representatives — Tom McDonald, 4,644; William J. (Bill) Thomas, 1,718.

County Commissioner, District 4 — M. L. Gary, 3,977; Robert E. (Bib) Parker, 5,282.

Democratic Executive Committee — Robert G. Petre, 4,459; Robert S. Brilmont, 1,296.

Paul Bates won the precinct in No. 14 with 214 votes to 102 for C. A. Wiles. Mrs. Roberts won in No. 27 with 228 votes to 199 for Mrs. Gladys Flowers.

Mayor Clarifies N. Orlando Stand

North Orlando Mayor George Fuller today issued a statement to The Sanford Herald for residents of the village to "clearly misinterpretations pertaining to council action on proposed building plans for the community and other areas of municipal government."

Fuller said: "The North Orlando Village Council approved the new coverage given them by The Sanford Herald but do not state that statements of what the council is doing or going to do come from the council and not from bystanders."

"The council states it does not intend to build a building costing \$20,000. There has been no price quoted yet. The estimate is in the neighborhood of \$20,000. If a call for the fire department is not included, it will be for less than that."

"There has never been any talk about an \$8,000 jail. There is nothing in the plans for a jail of any kind. We have an established police department. We do not need a desk sergeant or a jail keep and we are getting along without a full time clerk."

"The council has never proposed to buy a fire truck. In the first place, the fire department is an independent organization. The fire department expects to receive a truck from the Forestry Service."

"The council has had reports that roads the school buses travel are in better condition than they have ever been. If you pay taxes, you must know that the population does not make your taxes less, and you can take any community around us, and they are all much larger, and in North Orlando at the present rate or after the suggested change."

"We are an unpaid council, trying to do something for a community that failed to do anything in six years. We are just pushing a movement that started under Mayor Tilton and we thought it very good and are trying to carry it through."

Teacher, Daughter Just Left

TAMPA (UPI) — An Air Force jet fighter crashed into a home on Davis Island and burst into flames today just minutes after the two occupants of the house had left for downtown Tampa, about two miles away.

Police said the F4C jet based at nearby MacDill Air Force Base crashed into the home of Mrs. Gail MacIntosh. The home was completely destroyed by fire.

Police said no one on the exclusive residential island in Hillsboro Bay was injured.

Mrs. MacIntosh, a school teacher, told police she and her seven-year-old daughter Martha, had left their home for school and were about a block away when they heard an "explosion" and looked around to see their home engulfed in flames.

Among the most widespread and persistent myths shared by college students is that which claims that the grades and the employment that will be more important to the first employer after college than any other single factor—especially, mere grades.

A closely related myth regards there is a significant connection between the specific courses we take in college and the employment that will be more important to the first employer after college than any other single factor—especially, mere grades.

The most concrete information we have relating to college achievement and performance outside of college is reflected both in the college grades and in business success.

Academic excellence closely correlated to success with Bell Telephone. Those who had ranked high in their classes were found to be receiving the highest salaries in the Bell System.



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

A rainbow of budding states High and Main streets of Georgetown, capital of the crown colony of British Guiana.

The Duke and Duchess of Kent are there to lend pomp to a circumstance that can only bring a sigh of relief from the British colonial office.

Also there is the Soviet representative to neighboring Brazil.

An efficient British colonizer, with similar experience in Africa, oversees last details of ceremonies that today will see British Guiana become the newly independent state of Guyana, pronounced "Guy-An-Uh."

Historically, British Guiana once belonged to the Dutch who lost it to the British. It was moved to the east of British Guiana in Surinam, an autonomous state within the United Kingdom of the Netherlands, traded to the Dutch by Britain in exchange for New York's Manhattan Island.

Next to Surinam is French Guiana, established by the French as a penal colony and shortly to be used as a site for rocket tests.

Together they represent the last colonial footholds on the continent of South America. The road to Guyanese independence has been a rough one, both for the British colonial office and the population of some 600,000 composed of 25 per cent of East Indians first brought over as indentured labor, and 25 per cent Negroes whose ancestors came as slaves.

Prime Minister in the new government is Forbes Burnham, a Negro lawyer who replaced Jagan. With American and British help, the country under Burnham in the last year has seen an eight per cent increase in national income. Burnham has promised to bring more East Indians into government.

The new country's motto is "One people, one nation, one destiny."

It remains to be seen.

Johnson Pledges Aid To Africans

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Johnson, in his first major policy speech on Africa, has pledged the full support of the United States to the drive for self-determination and racial justice "in every quarter of the globe."

The Chief Executive told a group of African diplomats at a White House reception Thursday, the foreign policy of the United States is rooted in its life at home. We will not permit human rights to be restricted in our own country. And we will not support policies abroad which are based on the rule of minorities or the discarded notion that men are unequal before the law.

Johnson specifically singled out white-ruled Rhodesia, but he appeared also to be talking about the Republic of South Africa, with its apartheid policies, and the Portuguese colony of Angola.

Guerrillas Run Over Loyalists

SAIGON (UPI) - About 1,000 Communist guerrillas overcame a 30-man South Vietnamese battalion in a day-long battle which was the strongest attack the Reds have made since the start of the war.

The South Vietnamese reported the position later. It was not certain immediately whether the attack marked the start of the offensive.
