McGowan, of New York City, lives with his father, who said that he expected him home shortly.

Reports from Washington, however, said the suspended priest presided at a meeting there Thursday night of the pro-Castro Ad Hoc Student Committee for Travel to Cuba. The committee, now under federal investigation, sponsored the visit of 50 Americans to Cuba in July.

A society spokesman at Maryknoll, N. Y., said McGowan was suspended in May when he went to Cuba after being told not to go.

McGowan is to be a featured speaker at a mass rally next Sunday at Town Hall, in New York City, sponsored by the student committee.



Americans Too Tall Now For Old-Time Standard Length Bed

NEW YORK (UPI) — The standard double bed is on the way out because Americans are growing bigger all the time. But togetherness will continue, according to bedding manufacturers, who have decided to replace the standard bed with people-sized beds.

The dimensions of the double bed were established more than 100 years ago, when a six-footer was a rarity. Since then, Americans, both male and female, have shot upward in height and weight. For instance, American soldiers today average an inch and a half taller and 78 pounds heavier than the doughboy of World War I.

This means that many modern Americans must either sleep in a crouch or dangle their feet over the foot board.

Two major obstacles prevented bedding manufacturers from increasing the size of beds when public demand for bigger beds first became apparent. First, available accessories such as sheets, blankets and bedspreads were too small for bigger beds, and second, the average housewife dread-

ed the thought of wrestling with a bigger, heavier mattress.

Linens and blankets for larger beds are now stocked in most department stores. The second problem has been solved by use of latex foam rubber mattresses that don't need turning, and a wide variety of special devices, such as hinged mattresses or twin mattresses placed under one headboard.

Customer acceptance of supervised bedding is growing steadily. The nation's largest mattress manufacturer reports that more than 25 percent of sales this year are in extra sizes.



Four Sanford Youths Escape In Car Upset

Four Sanford students en route to Orlando escaped serious injury at 7:10 this morning when their compact car skidded on the slippery highway and crashed into a parked automobile one-half mile north of Casselberry.

Oscar Perez and William Bassett suffered minor cuts and bruises. The driver, Ronald Fehd, and Paul Placek were unhurt.

Trooper J. L. Sides reported the four students were en route to school in Orlando when Fehd lost control and the car skidded off the highway, striking the parked car of Dale High, Orlando.

Sides said that Fehd was cited for exceeding the speed limit. The trooper also pointed out that Fehd and Placek, in the front seat, were using seat belts and escaped injury. Perez and Bassett, in the rear seat, were not using seat belts and were hurt.

Raises OK'd For 9,669 In State Universities

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The cabinet budget commission okayed pay raises for 9,669 employees in the state universities today when state salaries were not in controversy before the fiscal agency.

The decision will not affect pay raises proposed for 151 other employees and professors, whose cabinet members felt raises proposed by the board of control were too high.

In some instances the raises proposed ranged between \$300 and \$2,000. Those proposed salary raises were handed back to the board of control which started a new study of the pay schedules.

But budget Director Harry Smith said last week's action also had the effect of holding up raises for the more than 9,000 other employees about whose salaries there was no criticism.

For the controversial group, the board of control recommended salary increases totaling \$207,000 and Smith proposed raises totaling \$114,000.

Viet Nam Reds Ask Coaliti on

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — Viet Nam's Communist guerrillas appeal today for a coalition government on the order of neighboring Laos as a means of ending the fighting here.

The appeal was made by Nguyen Huu Tho, president of the Communist "National Liberation Front" in a letter to the United Nations broadcast by Communist stations.

It called for withdrawal of U. S. troops, the end of U. S. participation in Vietnamese affairs, and the establishment of a "national, democratic, peaceful, and neutral coalition government," presumably made up of Communists and anti-Communists.

Kelly Trial 'Horse Play'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Presiding Judge E. Harris Drew admonished Florida senators Monday to stop the "horse play" and pay more attention to impeachment proceedings against Circuit Judge Richard Kelly.

Quickie Hurricane Hits Texas, Flops

PORT ARTHUR, Tex. (UPI) — Howling Hurricane Cindy hit the Texas coast between Galveston and Port Arthur today, and showed immediate signs of weakening.

The eye of the storm moved through the tiny evacuated town of High Island between 7:10 and 7:40 a. m. CST. Winds of 60 to 70 miles per hour died as the eye passed but rose again as the back side of Cindy struck.

No casualties were known. This was a far cry from devastating Hurricane Carla which struck the Texas coast two years and one week ago today, killing at least 17 persons and leaving damage in the hundreds of millions of dollars.

Thousands of coastal residents had fled inland before the swift-developing power of Cindy. Many men stuck to their jobs at sea.

Tides rose almost five feet above normal. Cindy's highest winds were 80 mile gusts. Galveston recorded 74 mile-an-hour winds during the night. Those dropped to 45 miles an hour.

The Red Cross put up 2,000 in 10 shelters in Port Arthur and hotels in Houston, 50 miles inland, were crowded.

Torrents of rain thundered down. Five and ten inches were forecast for extreme east Texas and West portions of Louisiana.

Castro Hoodlum Leaders Escape CARACAS (UPI) — Nine pro-Castro terrorist leaders escaped early Monday from a prison in the western mountain city of Trujillo, apparently under cover of a guerrilla attack, it was announced Monday night.

A policeman was found stabbed to death near the prison's main gate, through which the fugitives apparently escaped. They included four ex-officers dishonorably discharged for participation in the abortive Cuban revolt, three guerrilla leaders and two unidentified civilians.

The prison break occurred a few hours after authorities here had rounded up Red leader Rolando Nino alias "Major Rafael," and four other Communists.

Nino, who fled to Brazil after participating in the hijack of the freighter Anzotegui, recently slipped back into Venezuela.

Witness Denies Kelly Active In Party

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The chairman of the Republican Party in Pasco County testified today that Circuit Judge Richard Kelly repeatedly had refused to participate in party activities since his election to the bench.

Otto Carlson, Zephyrills poultry farmer, gave his testimony to refute a claim of prosecutors in the Kelly impeachment trial that the judge had violated legal ethics by participating in partisan politics.

Carlson was called by the prosecution to identify a campaign contribution of \$500 made to the Republican Party in February, 1962, by the judge's wife, Lorraine.

He also was questioned about Republican activities in opposition to a move by 19 Pasco County lawyers to switch Pasco County into another circuit in an unsuccessful effort to get rid of Kelly.

Carlson testified that Kelly told him he could not contribute time or money to the party because judges must be non-partisan. But he said Mrs. Kelly was a close personal friend and the judge let her make a contribution.

He admitted under questioning by Rep. William O'Neill of Ocala, one of the prosecutors appointed by the House of Representatives after it voted impeachment charges against Kelly, that a petition opposing the circuit change was mimeographed in the judge's office at the courthouse. But he said the mimeographing machine and paper belonged to Carlson and the work was done by Mrs. Kelly.

Holdup Suspect Is Bound Over WILLIAM E. Smith, 43, of Waycross, Ga., charged with the hold up of the Fern Park branch of the Winter Park Savings and Loan Association, was bound to the federal grand jury Monday when arraigned before U. S. Commissioner James S. Byrd at Orlando.

Smith was remanded to Orange County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

He is charged with holding up Teller Doyle Ollman and escaping with \$828. He was arrested the same day when sighted by FBI agents while walking in Winter Park. Sheriff J. L. Hobbs said \$768 of the \$828 was recovered.

Adams Out Of Governors Race TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Secretary of State Tom Adams said Monday he has decided not to run for governor in 1964.

Adams, who announced for reelection as secretary of state several weeks ago but left the door open for a crack at the governor's chair, said starting a campaign at this late date "would require my full time and attention."

Mayor Reports On City's Action

No further action on its tentative approval of \$5,000 for the first six months of the 1963-64 fiscal year for the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce was taken by the City Commission in its final public hearing on the budget Monday evening.

The Commission last Tuesday approved the \$5,000 for the first six months, adding it would consider another \$5,000 for the balance of the year "based on the future cooperation of the Chamber with the City of Sanford's activities and municipal park advertising."

The Commission for the last several years has given the Chamber \$10,000 annually.

This year the Chamber requested \$15,000. Mayor Thomas S. McDonald Monday evening read a prepared six-page report "from myself and not from the Commission" in which he concluded: "Removing the sensationalism of newspaper headlines, the true story is that the contribution proposed remains the same as the present fiscal year. The only difference is that the City Commission wishes to review the cooperative efforts of the Chamber with the City, on city projects, after the first six months of the coming fiscal year. This should never be too much to ask of any logical businessman or official in the taxpayers' money is involved."

The Mayor recounted many activities of the City government, such as including new industry to the area, seeking a barge terminal, endeavoring to have the new state university located here, street improvements, co-operating in keeping Sanford Naval Air Station here, negotiating for Sanford Naval Academy, etc.

"The City Commission," Mayor McDonald reported, "will continue to work with the Chamber and the businessmen to promote Sanford and Seminole County. The Commission feels that co-operative effort is a necessity that must work both ways. It is difficult for the Commission to work to improve and promote Downtown Sanford only to find the Chamber promoting a new shopping area on the east side of 17-92 south of Onora Road to relocate businesses outside the city."

While officers of the Chamber declined an invitation to attend Monday evening's budget session, five Chamber directors were present: Capt. James O. Mayo, W. A. Patrick, Robert Cronley, William Hemphill and George Touhy. Patrick and Touhy are past presidents of the Chamber.

Following the reading of his prepared statement, McDonald stated that by November or December and with cooperation from the Chamber "I would be most happy for the Commission to put up the second \$5,000."

Touhy stated that "only one side has been presented emphatically and you have been very fair and have indicated a willingness to co-operate. You should go down the same road. There should be better communications between the two groups."

"Mr. Touhy has hit it on the head," stated Commissioner A. L. Wilson. "It is lack of communications and complete misunderstanding which has brought on this situation."

It was understood the Chamber executive committee planned to meet this afternoon to consider McDonald's six-page statement and the Commission's tentative budget approval. Final approval is to be voted at next Monday evening's regular meeting of the City Commission.

New York Hires 22 Cuban Exiles MIAMI (UPI) — Twenty-two Cuban refugees, most of them lawyers, have been hired as social investigators in New York City.

Welfare Commissioner James H. Dampson of New York City flew here Monday and interviewed the exiles, selected from a group of 250 who took Civil Service examinations last May 4.

Dampson said hiring of the exiles filled two needs—"To find eligible candidates for hard-to-fill jobs in New York, and to help alleviate the refugee problem in Miami."

The exiles will deal with Spanish speaking applicants for welfare aid in New York City.

Dampson said New York is still looking for eligible Cuban candidates for a host of other jobs.

Commission tentatively approved the budget, with a few minor changes, as drafted by City Manager W. E. Knowles and Finance Director Henry Tamm.

One of the major items was a pay increase for city police officers ranging from six per cent for patrolmen, five per cent for sergeants, four for lieutenants to three for captains. Most other city employees receive a two per cent pay increase.

Commissioner A. L. Wilson, at his first meeting Monday since hospitalization, won a partial victory in his drive for a full "Kelly day" for firemen. Knowles had explained it would require two additional firemen to give fire employees a full free day every two weeks. They now receive a half-day every 20 days. Other Commissioners Monday evening authorized one additional fireman and instructed Knowles to try to arrange for a full "Kelly day."

Commissioner J. H. Crapis lost out Monday evening in his attempt to have police pay increased to 10, eight, six and four per cent instead of the approved six, five, four and three per cent.

In the four-hour session which closed at midnight, the Commission discussed the controversy over selling Municipal Stadium for high school football games. No decision was reached but a proposal that the City offer to lease the stadium to the County School Board for \$1 annually was discussed.

Approval was given for the purchase of a new tractor for land fill purposes from the State Tractor and Equipment Company on its lay but with trade-in of \$15,010.

Discussion was held briefly with Warren Hammitt, of St. Petersburg, an eligible reappraiser of all city property for tax purposes.

Today's schedule, beginning at 3 p. m., EDE, was confined to the formal opening by bearded Assembly President Muhammad Zafrulla Khan of Pakistan and the election of Carlos Sosa Rodriguez of Venezuela, who has no announced opposition, as his successor.

East-West Talks To Be Resumed UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The United Nations General Assembly opens its 18th session today with an agenda crowded with 81 items, but its debates were expected to be overshadowed by Big Three foreign ministers talks on the sidelines.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko will resume his talks with Secretary of State Dean Rusk and British Foreign Secretary Lord Home on ways to ease the cold war.

The ministers last met in Moscow after the signing of the partial nuclear test ban.

Interest in the assembly centered on President Kennedy's speech Friday and the address of Canadian Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson, a former assembly president, Thursday.

Nearly Severed Hand Rejoined To Arm

WINTER HAVEN, Fla. (UPI) — The nearly severed left hand of a 61-year-old saw operator was rejoined to the arm in a five-hour operation here Aug. 22, it was revealed today.

Doctors said James A. Brown will lose the tips of three fingers and possibly one complete finger, but that the wrist "looks good."

Brown, a saw operator for a furniture manufacturer in nearby Lake Wales, almost severed the hand two inches above the wrist in an on-the-job accident.

He was rushed to the hospital here where emergency examination revealed the severing of the limb except for a portion of soft tissue about an inch and one-half wide and a tiny sliver of the radius bone. All major blood vessels, nerves, muscles and tendons were severed.

A team of staff doctors, including an orthopedic surgeon, rejoined the bone, major blood vessels and muscles.

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One doctor said today that although it is not positive the hand will be saved, he is optimistic "that the salvage rate could be significantly worthwhile."

Doctors said today that minor gangrene was noted in the tips of three fingers about 10 days after the operation.

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River Of Ideas

Not all the listings fall under the "gadget" classification, of course. There are also such things as a design for a full-size airliner, a new type of internal combustion engine and a coke oven.

A lot of the ideas will never see the light of day again, but some of them are going to make fortunes for their inventors. Some of them may even change our way of life.

Peace Corps Tribute

More than 1,300 Peace Corps volunteers are working in 11 Asian countries. Evidently their work is effective, for Asian leaders are honoring them, and another 600 trainees are being prepared for duty in the Far East.

When Peace Corps director Sargent Shriver went to Manila in late August to receive the Ramon Magway Award for International Understanding, he stood in for all the Americans doing this job.

The Manila Evening News placed the tribute on their shoulders:

"What millions of dollars in machinery and foodstuff and other material gifts had failed to accomplish, the Peace Corps workers achieved in less than two years—an understanding with Asian peoples that promises to ease all hosts."

The corps volunteers labor in nations which stretch in an arc from arid Afghanistan across the Indian subcontinent to Southeast Asia and the Philippines. Mostly they are teachers, but many assist in health, agriculture and community development programs.

Here and there teachers in the corps are placed at important colleges and universities. Generally, however, they are found in secondary and elementary schools in rural sectors.

The Philippines leads all Asian lands, with 474 Peace Corps workers, nearly all of them teachers. It seems fitting, therefore, that the award

to Shriver in the corps' behalf was created in honor of the late Philippine President Magway, known throughout Asia and the world for his integrity, humanity and devotion to freedom.

Other Asian nations with large contingents are Thailand, with 226; Malaya, 189; India and Pakistan, about 115 each; North Borneo and Sarawak with just under 100 altogether.

The corps' development work in the Asian countries includes a wide range of projects, not least flood control and irrigation work and the plotting of roads which will open up vast reaches of trackless jungle on the island of Borneo.

Communist cries of "Yankee Go Home" greeted the mere 17 volunteers who came last May to Indonesia to teach physical education. But that country's leaders offered re-assurances, and the workers are still there.

The award citation to Shriver appeared to sum up much Asian feeling about all this. It said:

"In reaffirming the essential community of interest of all ordinary people, regardless of creed or nationality, the Peace Corps volunteers belong to the small but growing fraternity who by their individual efforts do make a difference."

Hardly an American at home could be anything but immensely proud that their countrymen's efforts abroad have merited such appreciation.

Drug Inquiry Debated

WASHINGTON — A Senate Subcommittee is in fierce debate with itself over whether to go ahead with an inquiry that might lead to drastic reduction in your drug bills.

Before his death, Estes Kefauver, as chairman of the Senate Anti-Monopoly Subcommittee, had begun to investigate charges that a number of large American drug manufacturing companies were collectively engaged in blocking a low cost drug program being tried out in Latin America by the largest U. S. drug wholesaler, McKesson and Robbins. Last year the Pres-

ident of Colombia asked the McKesson and Robbins company to help his impoverished people by marketing life-saving drugs in his country at reduced prices. Such drugs, he said, were "priced out of the reach of more than 80 per cent of the Colombian people."

McKesson and Robbins agreed, bought a half interest in a Colombian drug firm and started to cut prices on drugs sold by their generic names. The price of anti-biotic pills, for example, was marked down from 29 cents to 3.6 cents each. The cost of pred-

nisolone, used to treat arthritis, fell from \$18 for a month's supply to \$2. Vital drugs were available for as little as one-tenth of the customary cost of "trade-name" products, and according to the president of McKesson and Robbins, the company still made "a reasonable profit."

Word of what was happening in Colombia naturally caused a commotion among McKesson and Robbins' competitors back in the United States. The entire drug price structure was involved. There was talk in the State Department of encouraging such low-cost programs in other underdeveloped countries in Latin America. Finally this would certainly affect drug prices at home.

Word reached Congress that the drug industry had gone into action to stop the Colombia experiment before it went any farther. The president of McKesson and Robbins, Herman Nolen, reportedly told a closed session of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in June of concerted activities by companies interested in trade-name products to drive the low-cost generic drugs off the market in Colombia. Drug manufacturers were said to be urging retailers to boycott the generic drugs. Colombian doctors received literature from the U. S. and elsewhere attacking generic drugs. Mr. Nolen reported pressure on Colombia medical journals to refuse to sell advertising to McKesson and to run articles and editorials critical of generic drugs.

To get at the truth of the charges, Sen. Kefauver had subpoenaed the books and records of seven major drug firms for delivery by Sept. 18. Democratic Sen. Philip Hart of Michigan, who succeeded Kefauver as Anti-Monopoly chairman, strongly favors proceeding with the investigation as planned. His committee, however, inclines to favor the argument of the drug companies who insist that questions of patents and profits in their industry are none of the government's business. Last week the committee voted to extend the subpoena date to December and meanwhile to re-examine the whole question of whether or not it will open up the subject of drug pricing.

But for some special reason, she had developed a fit of intense obstinacy which would probably have let her die of a severe beating before she'd give in to the driver.


Grandpa was quite correct, therefore, in saying that all she needed was to have this impasse or crisis bypassed by any diversionary strategy.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Echoes are still bouncing around on the 30-day imprisonment of former Harvard Law School dean James M. Landis for failure to file tax returns for five years.

Tax experts recognize there is an important moral principle here, as well as a legal question.

The successful functioning of the American voluntary income tax assessment system is based on the assurance of people who do pay their taxes that those who evade payment are forced to pay up and given just punishment.

Landis' excuse for not filing returns from 1956 through 1960, when he had average income of over \$70,000 a year, was that he was so busy with his clients' business he didn't have time to take care of his own. Also, it was brought out in court that he was under psychiatric treatment.

When formal charges were filed against the former high government official, he admitted guilt, paid up \$94,000 in back taxes, penalty and interest due in full. So the government lost nothing in the long run.

In the light of this record, the question being discussed now is whether the sentence handed down by Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan in New York district court was fully justifiable, too heavy or not heavy enough? And is it comparable to sentences handed down to others found

guilty in similar cases? Internal Revenue Service enforcement officials say frankly they don't know whether the Landis decision has any precedents or not. They don't keep their records that way. Neither does the Department of Justice, which does the prosecuting. Nor do the courts keep records nationally.

Every case of delinquency, fraud or other evasion of federal tax liability taken to court is tried before one of 400 district judges. Circumstances and amounts involved in each case vary and so do the judges who hear them. There is no uniformity in the decisions they hand down, except those imposed by the limits of the law.

In 1961 Department of Justice recommended the first judicial seminar in Boulder, Colo. The purpose was to get judges, in closed sessions, to come to some agreement among themselves on sentences they hand down in various types of cases.

IRS Commissioner Mortimer Caplin's report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1962 — last one available — shows that 1.5 million tax delinquency investigations were conducted. Taxes, penalties and interest brought in from 935,000 of these probes totaled \$165 million. But the average was only a little over \$176 on each return.

Last year IRS had to handle about 350 million pieces of paper. It can't check this

much business manually. On the 96 million returns filed, information indicating fraud, delinquency or other civil or criminal violation of the tax laws was obtained on about 125,000 cases.

The 125,000 cases were reduced to about 15,000 considered the most important. About 4,000 of these were then investigated in depth by the 1,750 special agents of the IRS Intelligence Service. Of the 4,000 only 1,200 were recommended for prosecution.

This situation is going to be completely changed when the IRS automatic data processing—ADP—if fully operational, in 1968. It will then be possible to check every return and catch every delinquent. This will make possible more uniformity in tax law enforcement.

Burroughs said he thought Rozelle's reprimand was a "little stiff" but added "I'm really, really sorry, humbly and sincerely sorry."

"Sometimes players react emotionally and get carried away," he added. "That's what happened to me, I suppose."

3 Cheers For Football Cheering Sections

NEW YORK (NEA) — While the great Knute K. Rockne was building the Notre Dame football dynasty in the early 1920s, he used to say:

"Football is 5 per cent coaching, 20 per cent material and 75 per cent enthusiasm."

A lot of people didn't believe The Rock. They suspected he had something up his sleeve. But by now the more intelligent football people know he spoke the truth. And things haven't changed a great deal through the years.

As the colleges prepare for another season, coaches know that games again will be won by the teams with the most desire and enthusiasm. Talent is now pretty well distributed. No school has a virtual monopoly on good playing material. Most major schools have the horses, although some always will be deeper in reserves.

Darrell Royal, the young Texas coach, warns against the alarming tendency to stray away from the old basics of blocking and tackling, kicking and avoiding mistakes.

"Football is growing entirely too complicated for its own good," he stresses. "After the ball is snapped, football is simply a process of reacting. A player doesn't have time to think. He must have automatic reaction to all situations. You must play aggressive football to win. You cannot be aggressive and confused at the same time."

Royal points out that trick psychology doesn't work on the sophisticated kids of today, yet doesn't believe that today's players, for all their worldliness, are any harder to stir up emotionally.

"One reason why performance is better," he says, "is the vastly increased interest. There is wider coverage by television, broadcasting and reporting by newspapers. There are more people in the stadiums, more prestige to winners, more national honors and recognition."

In an excellent new book, "Darrell Royal Talks Football" (Prentice-Hall), the 1962 Coach-of-the-Year gives the readers a multidimensional view of the college game as it is played today.

With three cheers for cheering sections he puts his finger on what made American football the greatest of all games.

"Several of us may sometimes forget just how important are those cheers and the accompanying enthusiasm," he says. "If you want to see an emotionless game, take away the band, the twirlers and the cheering sections. Take away newspaper coverage, television and radio, take away the crowds and tell them to have at it."

"You would see the darndest mess of pushing and pulling and a complete absence of people pursuing and whacking each other. It would be duller than an amateur wrestling match between King Farouk and Elsa Maxwell. It's hoops, batons, drums and headlines that prompt real go-getter efforts."

Three teams were tied for first place in the All-Star Bowling League following opening play last week. Each had two victories and one loss. This left three teams tied for second place with one win and two losses.



Jacoby On Bridge By Oswald Jacoby

There are two main versions of Stayman, forcing and non-forcing, respectively. In forcing Stayman the bidding must continue to two no-trump or higher. In non-forcing Stayman it may stop anywhere from two diamonds on up. Jacoby-Stayman is strictly of the non-forcing variety. The two club response is artificial as in all forms, but the opener must respond as follows:

- a. Two spades with four or more hearts.
b. Two hearts with four or more hearts and less than four spades.
c. Two diamonds with any other holding.

Playing Jacoby - Stayman, North has no problem in responding to his partner's no-trump. He bids two clubs and plans to pass irrespective of his partner's answer.

East and West can make three clubs, but it is rather difficult for either of them to get into the bidding against the opening no-trump.

Today's Question. You bid five no-trump and your partner bids six diamonds to show one king. What do you do now?

JFK Calls For More Exporting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy today urged American businessmen to promote export markets for their products to help stem the flow of dollars abroad and improve domestic economic conditions at the same time. The Chief Executive spoke at the start of a special conference called by the White House and the Commerce Department to explore methods of export expansion.

Sen. Symington Defends Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Stuart Symington, (D-Mo.), the nation's first Air Force secretary defended the nuclear test ban treaty today on one of its most debated points — the ability of U. S. missile sites to survive atomic bombing.

Symington, who had access to secret military testimony before two committees on the treaty, said in a speech prepared for Senate delivery, "The evidence is that the Soviets know no more than we do about such vulnerabilities." He challenged one of the principal anti-treaty arguments, saying, "The evidence is that they have not conducted any large-scale tests of this kind."

Two Escorted Into Library

ANNISTON, Ala. (UPI) — Two Negro ministers accompanied by white community leaders Monday used facilities at the public library here for the first time.

One of the ministers, the Rev. William D. McClain, was one of two Negro churchmen attacked and beaten with chains in an integration attempt at the library Sunday.

The Rev. N. Q. Bellmott, the other minister, received more serious injuries in Sunday's beating by whites and did not return.

A large group of police watched as McClain and the Rev. G. E. Smitherman entered with a city commissioner, two library board members and the chairman of the local Human Relations Council.

The two Negroes each checked out two books. City Commission offered a \$1,000 reward for arrest and conviction of anyone responsible for Sunday's attack on the ministers.

Loses Prize Cow

SWINDON, England (UPI) — The Royal Air Force sent a helicopter Monday to help Arthur Stevens, a farmer, search for Emma, his missing \$5,000 prize cow.

Members of the Cabinet, including Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon, Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, and Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges, together with Kennedy's chief trade negotiator, Christian A. Herter, also spoke. "I know that all of you — and many other American businessmen — recognize the need for a more aggressive export policy and are resolved to meet it," Kennedy said. "You recognize that, for almost any American business, life can begin anew at the ocean's edge."

Malay Youths Stage Protest

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (UPI) — Rioting Malaysian youths today burned and stoned Indonesian diplomatic offices in retaliation for attacks on the Malaysian and British embassies in Jakarta, Indonesia, Monday.

At the same time, the new Federation of Malaysia broke off diplomatic relations with Indonesia and the Philippines, its neighbors who refused to extend it recognition when it came into being Monday.

The Malay, Chinese, and Indian youths burned a picture of President Sukarno of Indonesia and then stamped on the charred remains in front of the Indonesian Embassy.

The howling mob shouted anti-Sukarno slogans and threw rocks and fire crackers at the embassy building. They burned one consular office in a nearby building and damaged three other offices.

The Senate took the parliamentary step when it agreed unanimously to accept the actual text of the treaty without amendment and begin consideration of the separate ratification resolution.

UF Kickoff Set For Monday

The United Fund of Seminole County will kick off its 1963 campaign Monday morning at the Florida State Bank Lounge with a "office and doughnut" eye-opener with the largest goal ever, \$48,425.

General Chairman Paul D. Lewis Jr. states that a higher campaign goal reflects a growing community and a greater demand for the services of existing agencies. This year for the first time Good Samaritan Home will be included as one of the nine participating agencies. The other eight being the Boy Scouts, Children's Home Society, Family Counseling Service, Girl Scouts, Mental Health Assn., Red Cross, Salvation Army and USO.

Last year's drive brought \$2,500 which was less than the goal of \$30,000. However, earlier and more complete plans for the present campaign plus a large group of leaders promises success for the current endeavor.

Negro Leaders Ask Meeting

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The announcement came shortly after Negro leader Roy Wilkins urged the President to meet late Thursday with seven Birmingham Negro leaders on the new racial crisis there resulting from the church bomb-deaths of four children.

The Negro leaders, most of them clergymen, wired the chief executive Monday asking for "an immediate conference." The White House said today the meeting had been set up for 5 p. m. EDT Thursday.

Because Kennedy was busy preparing several major speeches, including one on tax reduction to be delivered to a nationwide television audience tonight, he was unable to set up the racial conference any sooner, a spokesman said.

The Rev. Fred L. Shuttlesworth, head of the Alabama Human Rights Movement; A. G. Gaston, Birmingham businessman whose home and motel were bombed recently; the Rev. J. L. Ware, Birmingham pastor; Dr. Lucius Pitts, president of Miles College; Bishop H. I. Murchison, and King's assistant, Ralph D. Abernathy.

A group of Republican and Democratic senators have appealed for a nationwide day of mourning and protest for the four children killed in the Birmingham, Ala., church bombing.

Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota led the group in asking President Kennedy to proclaim next Sunday as a day of national mourning for the young girls killed last Sunday.

At the same time, sponsors of the Aug. 23 civil rights march on Washington made plans for silent protest marches in scores of cities throughout the nation, perhaps on Sunday, with a possible assembly by one group near the White House.

A loose confederation of university students across the nation was in the making today to organize demonstrations against racial discrimination and "Justice Department inaction" in the South.

At last 67 persons were arrested in racial protests Tuesday in Northern cities and "sympathy" demonstrations were scheduled today in connection with a church bombing in which four Negro schoolgirls died Sunday at Birmingham, Ala.

The Birmingham bombing led the Student Emergency Coordinating Committee at the University of Illinois to plan a march on the FBI office today at Urbana, Ill.

Hundreds of saddened Negroes gather today in this violence-torn city for the funeral of three of the four children killed Sunday in the bombing of a Negro church.

The service was to be held at Sixth Avenue Baptist Church at 2:30 p. m. CST. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was to deliver the main eulogy.

Fred R. Wilson Law Library Is Dedicated

City and county officials, attorneys and other dignitaries filled the circuit court room this morning when a dedication ceremony was held for the Fred R. Wilson Memorial Law Library in memory of the late attorney.

Among those present were Mr. Wilson's children, Mrs. W. D. Leahy, of Guatemala City, Guatemala; Mrs. Dan G. Mitchum, Milwaukee, and Robert S. Wilson, New York City. Mrs. Mitchum presented to the library a portrait of her father which she, herself, painted recently.

The library, adjacent to the third floor court room, had been named the Seminole County Law Library but the 1963 Legislature, at the instigation of the local legislative delegation, passed an act naming the facility for the late city and school board attorney, A. Edwin Shishler, who had been closely associated with Mr. Wilson, traced the lawyer's life from the time of his birth at Irons, Ky., through his schooling and adult life. Mr. Wilson served as attorney for the city for 20 years and for the school board for 21 years. He had been a practicing attorney for more than 50 years.

Judge G. Vernon Mize Jr., chairman of the law library trustees, was in charge of the dedication. Kenneth McIntosh introduced the guests and dignitaries. Joseph M. Maraceo read the resolution naming the library and unveiled a bronze plaque dedicated to Mr. Wilson.

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
