The Purchase Of

Watergate Flood Opportunities Big

The Watergate case has suddenly presented the Democrats with a windfall opportunity to make major political gains at the expense of a badly shaken Republican Party and White

However, the still-developing scandal appears to be moving into its most damaging stages at a time when the Democrats are still reeling from bitter dissensions and divisions that cost them the White House in 1968 and 1972.

In the 1972 debacle, organized labor, the South, some of the big city vote and large chunks of ethnic voters deserted the party by the millions to give incumbent Republican Richard Nixon one of the most overwhelming presidential victories in American politics.

George McGovern, the Democratic nominee, won only one state - Massachusetts and even in that liberal-Democratic stronghold was in serious trouble throughout the early and middle ballot counting.

The Democrats did, however, demonstrate major strength elsewhere, losing only 12 seats in the U.S. House when the Republicans had been expected to make big gains, and actually gaining two Democratic seats in the Senate.

They currently hold a 242 to 192 edge in the House, with one vacancy, and are in front 57 to 43 in the Senate. The party has also emerged with a 31-19 advantage in state governors and has control of both houses in 24 state legislatures, plus control of at least one house in five others.

Nevertheless, the divisions, wounds, emotional scars and financial problems opened up both by the Democratic nominating convention last July and the controversial candidacy of McGevern are still far from healed.

It has fallen to Robert S. Strauss, 54, a Texas-porn moderate-conservative protege of former Secretary of the Treasury John Connally,

China's Purges

Cultural Revolution Victim Back

HONG KONG - It is one of the remarkable things about the Chinese Communist leadership under Chairman Mao Tse-tung that officials who fall from grace often are given a

second chance. Although there have been numerous political purges in China over the last 23 years, there has been very little bloodletting of the kind that characterized the first quarter of a century of Communist rule in Russia.

The basic philosophy Mao has consistently followed even during the frenetic cultural revolution period - is summed up in the expression "curing the illness to save the

Simplified, it means that an official who admits, criticizes and corrects his mistakes will be given another opportunity to participate in the leadership. That that philosophy is applied and not merely mouthed is evidenced by the recent reemergence of former Chinese

Communist Party Secretary-General and Vice Premier Teng was the second-highest-ranking victim of the cultural revolution. He is by far the most important figure ever purged from the leadership to undergo reform and What makes his reappearance all the more intriguing is

that Teng, now 69, was severely criticized even by Mao when he fell from power in 1966. Addicted to bridge, Teng was accused of having developed bourgeois habits. Mao Tse-tung once commented: "Teng Hsiao-ping is deaf. When a conference opens, he takes a seat far away from me. For six years, since 1959, he has not made any

Counterfeit Americana

Newspapers Reprinting Nostalgia

Maybe it's the current obsession with anything nostalgic, but there seems to be, these days, an uncommon number of old newspapers unearthed - and, of course, offered to anyone interested, for a price. Most such finds are dredged up from an old trunk or discovered behind the wallboard in the

A rare find would be a copy of the Ulster County Gazette, dated Jan. 4, 1800. This is the paper that contains the account of the death of George Washington, and running across a copy, faded and crackling, in the bottom of an old chest of drawers, packs all the elements of the thrill of

The trouble is that any surviving copy of the Ulster County Gazette of that priod is a reprint. It is an exact reproduction, maybe even a better print than Ulster County readers enjoyed 173 years ago. But it isn't an original - it's a

Because of its historic interest, this issue of the Gazette has been reprinted, for souvenir purposes, 70

They were sold as historic

souvenirs during the Centennial Exposition of 1876, in Philadelphia, and again at a Centennial celebration in Kingston, N.Y., in 1877. Many reproductions have

flooded the market since. Since few of them added an imprint of explanation, the paper appears in its original form; and if, for example, it was one of those sold at Philadelphia in 1876, it is certain to be yellowed, faded, tattered, and old. The trouble is - it isn't an

Old newspapers are fun; even reprints of old newspapers are fun. And when somebody says -"I found this old paper in my grandfather's things, and it is really an old one. How much is it worth?" - it isn't easy to say that it isn't worth anything beyond its sentimental value, or the kicks it may provide a nostalgia buff.

In fact, it is difficult to place a monetary value on an old newspaper, even if it is an original. Most papers have their files, either in bound form or on microfilm; so do many libraries. Sometimes a library or a historical society will accept a printed relic as a gift, but collecting old newspapers is not an investment hobby, like stamp collecting. Taking a practical and realistic

view, it should be obvious that a newspaper printed in 1800 could not survive to this day without special preservative measures. Think of the pains taken to keep our national documents such as the original Declaration of Independence and the Constitution from going to pieces!

Growing Welfare Is Self-Defeating

While the hot news item is President Nixon's decision o dismantle OEO, the anti-poverty agency, a far more important story is the unintended damage to the poor resulting from the little-understood cumulative impact of, ironically, much bigger programs of public aid designed, of course, to help.

The President has puzzled some observers, understandably, by offering fresh commitment to welfare reform but not promising a specific plan and not including any money for reform in his new budget. In fact this represents partly a judgment that its higher cost doesn't fit the country's present anti-spending mood and partly the view that Congress, having dallied ineffectually for three years with his 1969 family assistance program, wouldn't do anything anyway. The sad thing is, the need for change appears greater than ever. It rolls easily off the tongue to say, of the tax structure, welfare, and probably other realms, that 'the whole thing needs reform from top to bottom." But a pretty convincing case can be made that it is pitterly true today in not just direct welfare aid itself but the entire, varied array of assistance programs aimed at bettering the condition of the nation's poor. The man who makes the case well, though it is hardly heard in the din over OEO's evidently impending demise, is Henry Aaron, in his document on reform

written for the Brookings Institution. In a previous report I drew attention to Aaron's point that most of the huge growth in public aid programs has come in just the last dozen years. But the bigger meat in his study is the conclusion that these programs, taken together, add up to a massive disincentive to work - to a discouragement of the kind of self-effort that would produce more earnings and help strongly to reduce the number of Americans (presently 25 million) living in poverty.

In 1960, Aaron notes, few households got help from more than one kind of aid program. Today the story is sharply different, and the consequences for poor families who move up in income can be devastating. A prime example is "Medicaid," a program offering largely free health care for the medically indigent. All but one state has the program, and the participating states get some federal financing. Virtually 100 per cent

of the people on the major welfare program-aid to families with dependent children - are also on the Upwards of 50 per cent of recipients of this main arm of welfare aid likewise are beneficiaries of the increasingly costly food slamp program. The overlap with people who benefit from school lunch programs is 60 per cent. On distribution of surplus farm commodities, the overlap with welfare recipients is 15 per cent. On

public housing, 13 per cent. Aaron points out that these comparisons don't even mention the overlap in such other assistance programs as Social Security, unemployment insurance, veterans' pensions and other benefits.

The trouble with all this seemingly helpful buildup of aid is that the key programs have cut-off points. Earnings beyond specified levels take the beneficiaries either off the rolls altogether, or - at intermediate stages - reduce the amount of assistance allowed. The net effect is a sweeping disincentive to work and thus lose public benefits. The important thing is that the effect is interactive. Loss of welfare benefits ultimately is reinforced by loss of nearly all other help.



EDITORIALS New U.S. Export Field Is Medical

Foreign doctors have long been a familiar sight in American hospitals. Most Latin American physicians, for example, receive advanced training or serve internships in the United States or Europe, where they become familiar with modern medical technology.

The problem, notes Dr. Irving Gray, a Georgetown University biology professor, is that this same technology is not available to them when they return to their home countries. The health support systems of the developing nations have not kept up with the development of their physicians. Thus a little over two years ago, Gray and a group of other U.S. scientists formed a firm called Omni Research,

Omni has submitted a proposal to the Puerto Rican government to set up a medical history data bank system throughout the island. Negotiations are also underway with Honduras to establish a central laboratory in Teguci-

"One of the services we are trying to sell these countries," says Gray, "is to go in and set up a lab for them, train their people and run it for a reasonable period. Then it would be their lab."

More and more U.S. companies are beginning to realize that the field of medicine offers an opportunity not only to aid developing countries but to help counter the U.S. trade deficit by exporting something the United States still does best-high technology. In fact, the market potential outside the United States

for high-technology equipment is three to four times as great as in North America, says Jim Whidden, a divisional president of Electro-Nucleonics, Inc., of Bethesda, Md., a leader in the medical and scientific laboratory field. Two of this company's most important products are a highly sophisticated centrifuge and a computerized blood analysis system called Gemsaec. The latter is one of about 50 high-technology blood analysis systems, most of them American, seeking customers in this new and burgeoning world market.

Living Cheap But Good War Plan

Do your lips still pucker from the taste of "lemon" merchandise you bought or from the sting of overpriced repairs? Remember, ever since the Declaration of Independence, demanding a fair shake has been part of the American tradition. Whenever you've got a beef about shoddy products or scrvices, follow my cheap but good advice. Justice will triumph!

When your new Snazzing falls apart, old car was "over repaired," or case of chianti pours sour, try first the Gentleman (woman)ly Complaint Approach. Telephone, then visit in person, the storekeeper, sales manager or service manager of the place where you bought or brought your goodies. Don't torture the poor mechanic, salesman or counter-girl: they can't and won't help you. Instead, gently insist upon seeing the person in charge. Be calm and doggedly persistent. It's easier for an executive to solve your problem than to contend with your nagging presence. The squeaky wheel strikes paydirt!

If your problem's not been solved in ten days, send an unemotional, bare facts letter of complaint, explaining again what you want done, to the head of the store or repair shop. Enclose photocopies of receipts, warrantees and estimates. Keep a copy of your letter. Now, relax for two weeks. If then, after all Gentlemanly Complaint Approaches have brought no real solution, gear up for Poriss' Five-Pronged-Consumer-



Complaint-Battle-Plan. The Five Prongs: (1) Have three neighbors write postcards to the business you're battling. 2) Complain to

the media (especially to the radio-television stations or newspapers that carry advertising for the product or company that did you wrong. 3) Initiate Small Claims Court proceedings. 4) Enlist the support of local politicians. 5) Phone your state Attorney General's consumer protection office for help. Begin all Five Prongs on the same day. Sure, it'll take you about three hours, but the Five-Prong- Plan

When contacting the media, don't just phone. Clutching a written story of your consumer headache, go visit the news editor of your local newspaper or radio-TV station. Small Claims Courts are for you and me: plain folk who can't afford an attorney. Contact your District Court Clerk to file suit (a 3-minute job). For about \$2, you get to tell all to a judge. He'll make a quick decision and, if you're found to be right, you'll stroll out singing praises to Small Claims Courts. the best invention since ice cream. (Small Claims Court will handle only a couple of hundred dollars' worth of problems. If you're in a bigger ballpark, call Legal Aid or the local or state Bar Association for advice on how to play the game.

Equal Rights—and Risks

If the Equal Rights Amendment fails to be ratified this year, it will be as much the fault of females who are afraid of this across-the-board equality, as male chauvinists jealously guarding their power.

In the early days of the women's liberation movement we could gripe about being oppressed females, perhaps get our husbands to do the dishes or change a diaper with greater ease, and still not have to face the challenge of actually changing our own lifestyle Now that men in 30 state legislatures and countless

private homes have seen the rightness of the liberated position - many of them coming around rather quickly as oppressors go - a number of women are frightened of the new freedom and the new responsibility they will have if they are indeed treated as equals. With some men now saying, "Come to think of it, why

don't you go to work?" many women are saying, "Just a minute. Do I want the awesome problem of supporting my family? Do I want to face the pressures of career competition, the small humiliations of swallowing pride, compromise my ideals to hold the job, to keep the boss

Of course the Equal Rights Amendment, which has six more years to win the support of the additional eight states necessary for ratification, would not force women who are housewives and mothers to go out and work. It might even put a higher premium on child-bearing and

But the passage of ERA and the change in attitudes toward male and female roles that it would codify, would force choices on women who previously had a familiar. if not always fulfilling, path to follow. A so-called housewife whose children were in school most of the day, who was not investing a full-time effort

in her home or family, could no longer enjoy the luxury of society's support. Whether at home or on the jo women would be expected to be productive. After studying the Exodus portion of the Bible in Sun-LOWERING PHICK IN C.

I told her that slaves, because they have never been allowed to design their own lives, become accustomed to following orders. They must obey if they are to survive. Even when they are freed from bondage, they would find it difficult to make decisions, to assert their opinions, to ight for their existence, to win. So the 40 years would allow a new generation to grow up, born in freedom, with a belief in their own worth. The men and women who have grown up with the more
