SCSO investigates Blockbuster Video robbery

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating a robbery last week at the Blockbuster Video Store located at 3030 west State Road 436 near Altamonte Springs.

According to the clerks on duty, three suspects entered the store with guns just before 11:30 p.m. One of the suspects held the employees at gunpoint, while the other two went to the video game section of the store and started to remove video games from the rack.

The suspect, holding the clerks at gunpoint, then gained access to the cash drawers, removed money and stuffed it into his pocket.

All three suspects then fled the store and entered a gray two-door Oldsmobile. This vehicle was last seen east-bound State Road 436 after leaving the parking lot.

The suspect are described as follows:

- A black male, about 18-25 years of age, wearing a tan jacket, with a white cloth covering his face, except for his eyes. He was armed with a black semi-automatic handgun.
• A black male, about 18-25 years of age, wearing a camo jacket and white pants. He also had a cloth covering his face, except for his eyes. He was armed with a black semi-automatic handgun.
• The only description on the last subject was that he is a black male, about 18-25 years old, armed with a black semi-automatic handgun.

All three subjects were wearing blue latex gloves during the robbery.

Anthrax scare targets airport

FBI takes over cases after as many as nine threats occur in Central Florida

SANFORD — Public Safety officials Monday were dispatched to the Orlando Sanford International Airport in response to the latest Anthrax hoax to strike the Central Florida area in the past two-and-a-half weeks.

Units from the Sanford Police Department and Sanford Fire Department responded to the Federal Aviation Authority (FAA) building at the Sanford air facility when four employees came into contact with a mailed letter bearing an oily substance.

Inside the letter was a stamped message "You have been exposed to anthrax." The hoax was identical to the Jan. 19 incident at the State Attorneys Office in downtown Sanford and the Seminole County Public Safety Building on Bush Boulevard.

In the latest incident the four employees were isolated after opening the letter and were later evaluated by members of the Seminole County Health Department. Initial testing of the latest envelope for traces of Anthrax were negative.

Since the first hoax Jan. 19, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has taken over the case as the lead agency. Monday's incident was part of a larger scare in the region. According to Sanford Fire Department Public Information Officer Pete Tucker, while Seminole County officials were busy responding at the Orlando Sanford

Chamber plans 'Litter Critter' program for city

SANFORD — The Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce wants to clean up the city, and the organization wants students to help.

The Chamber's Civic Pride Committee is sponsoring a "Litter Critter" mascot contest for Sanford students in first

through sixth grade. To participate in the contest, children need to design a mascot that will serve as the ambassador for the committee's Project First Impressions campaign.

"We're starting from the bottom," Committee Chairman Julie Hartline said. "If children realize they shouldn't litter, they are going to tell their parents not to litter."

According to Hartline, the committee has already

approached several Sanford schools about the contest and entry forms have been distributed. The deadline for the contest is Saturday, Feb. 17, and the winner will receive a trip for two to swim with the dolphins at Sea World's Discovery Cove.

The winning design will be printed on car litter bags and represent Project First Impressions during its on-going

community campaign, Hartline said. Eventually, the committee would like to create a three dimensional character that will visit area schools to discuss litter control.

Ray sees redevelopment, public safety, as key issues

Editor's note: This is the third in a series of candidate profiles for Sanford's Mayoral and District 1 City Commission race.

SANFORD — Appliance store owner Dean Ray is one of four candidates seeking Sanford's Mayoral office in the March 6 election.

A Sanford resident for the past eight years, Ray, 41, is making his third bid for municipal office. Ray is married, the father of eight children and has been actively involved in a number of community organizations including serving as Chair of the Sanford Police Department's Citizen Advisory

Board; "Operation Clean Sweep"-Neighborhood Watch; Sanford Citizen Patrol; Nuisance Abatement Board for the City of Sanford; Board member

for Seminole Volunteer Enterprises; and Democratic Executive Committee.

He is a high school graduate and a 1996 graduate of the Seminole County Citizen Police Academy.

With his previous activism in public safety issues, it's easy to see why he considers law and

order a major part of his campaign platform.

"One of my first initiatives as mayor would be to propose a \$10 million bond referendum to build a 50,000 square foot state of the art police station," said Ray.

He is also in favor of returning police dispatch back to the Sanford Police Department, reversing last year's move to transfer dispatching over to the Seminole County Sheriff's Department.

He agrees considerable progress has been made in reducing crime in Sanford over the past two years and would seek to hire an additional 20 officers over the next four year

New wound care treatment at CFRH

Thousands of people over the age of 50 suffer from hard to heal diabetic and venous leg ulcers everyday.

These deep ulcers deteriorate the skin and can hinder a person's ability to walk or maintain a normal, healthy lifestyle. Until recently, little therapy has been available to completely cure the ailment.

A new approach to wound treatment, known as Apligraf, is now available at the Total Wound Treatment Center at Central Florida Regional Hospital can provide a cure to

these ulcers. The new cure was developed by Pharmaceutical corporation Novartis, specifically to heal the skin around lower leg ulcers and is the first technological advance over standard therapy in more than one hundred years.

Russel Shaw, M.D., who specializes in treating wounds, administered the first procedure performed at Central Florida Regional Hospital. The patient suffered from the ulcer on the bottom of her left foot for nearly eight years and had a medical history of diabetes and periph-

eral vascular disease.

"This procedure gives new hope for patients who have been unresponsive to other therapies," Dr. Shaw observes. "The patient has had a full recovery and resumed a normal lifestyle."

During the administration of an Apligraf, the surgeon places the piece of skin over the existing wound, holding the new skin in place with dressings or sutures and compression bandages. Normally, several weeks

According to Vinson, the show's producers found out about the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Operation Right Track program through the Internet as well as through various publications. The girls were selected through various court-ordered programs.

Although no specific telecasting date has been determined, it is expected the show may air in late February.

Seven days of celebrating laughter

The week of Feb. 7 through Feb. 14 has been declared "Love May Make the World Go 'Round, but Laughter Keeps us from Getting Dizzy Week." To put it simply, it's Laugh Week.

The medical profession has long told us that laughter is healthy. It makes the blood flow better, which makes our brains more alert, and thereby gives us more energy. Some have also said that it takes fewer muscles to smile than to frown.

The organization which sponsors this laughter week, the HUMOR Project Inc., in Saratoga Springs, N.Y., cites several famous lines.

Comedian/Platist Victor Borge said, "Laughter is the shortest distance between two people."

Joel Goodman commented, "Seven days without laughter makes one weak." Nick Pfeiffauf has often said, "Did you hear the one about ...," but his children generally say they have heard it before, many times, so I don't tell it. But on the inside, I often laugh at recalling my own jokes.

Of course, caution is needed. Many jokes should remain untold, such as those which cause ridicule to others have racial or ethnic connotations or otherwise may offend people.

I have been known as a good joke teller. Very few have I ever made up myself — I have sources for most of my jokes — and you would be surprised at who some of them are. Many are government officials who realize that being stern at times is good, but having a good laugh from time to time is good for the soul.

I have admired many comedians over the years on radio, television and movies. George Burns and Victor Borge are my favorites. I have several video tapes of Victor Borge concerts and I can watch them over and over and laugh every time, sometimes even before the punch line, knowing what is coming.

But there are a few people I don't like, even though they are rated as tops by many people. The Three Stooges for example. While their slapstick comedy is considered as unparalleled, I don't see where Moe slapping Curley and Shemp around is funny. The same holds true for comedians who apparently don't believe they can tell a joke unless it has foul language every other word.

Years ago, I took two semesters of college courses in stand-up comedy. The first was writing comedy, the second was telling comedy. Our final acts were held in a comedy club in Daytona Beach, where the instructor had pre-planned hecklers in the audience, and we were judged not only on how we told jokes, but how we handled and audience. I got an "A" for both courses.

The reason I took the classes was not to be able to become a stand-up comedian, but to assist myself in being able to make public appearances which I was doing a great deal of at the time. I consider the courses most helpful.

But laugh I do, and laugh I suggest you do. You don't have to laugh at one of my jokes. As my offspring will tell you — they are old. But there are many things to laugh about and many occasions when a chuckle or two are needed for your own well-being.

If you find it difficult to laugh, try a smile. It is also refreshing to yourself as well as others.

Voter attraction Bush must change his own party to gain black support

Stubbornly determined to lure black support, President Bush is courting black preachers, teachers and lawmakers. Recently, the president attended Sunday worship service at Lincoln Park United Methodist Church, which has a predominantly black congregation. Later, he met with the Congressional Black Caucus, a group so suspicious of Republicans that J.C. Watts, the lone black Republican in Congress, has never sought to join.

There is something admirable about Bush's refusal to concede the African-American vote, though he attracted only 8 percent in his presidential bid. He is a little Clinton-like in his desire to make people like him. But that may be just the problem. Black Americans don't reject Bush based on his personality but rather based on his policies. More to the point, African-Americans roundly reject the Republican Party because of its positions — four decades of policies, campaign strategies and practices that are hostile to black interests.

Ever since Barry Goldwater ran a "states' rights" campaign in 1964 that gave aid and comfort to Southern segregationists, the GOP has grown closer to the hearts of those Southern whites uneasy about civil rights and increasingly alienated from blacks. Bush's kinder, gentler conservatism notwithstanding, that hasn't changed. A pointed illustration of continued GOP insensitivity to black concerns came in the successful effort to change the Georgia state flag. Though a handful of Republican legislators united with Democrats to give Georgia a new flag, the majority of Georgia's GOP legislators stuck by the old flag — despite its association with Confederate sympathizers and opponents of desegregation. Even two phone calls from national GOP stalwart Jack Kemp urging a flag change failed to sway his former aide, state Sen. Rusty Paul, former chairman of the Georgia Republican Party. The decision of state Republican leaders to stick with the mossbacks and reactionaries was stunning, a prime example of a squandered opportunity.

Their votes recalled Bush's own cowardice on the flag issue last summer. As South Carolina struggled with a controversy over its flying of the Confederate battle flag, Bush, then campaigning in the state's GOP presidential primary, was asked whether the Confederate emblem should be removed from atop the state Capitol. He punted, saying the issue was a state matter. (So did then-GOP presidential candidate John McCain, who later admitted that he should have called for the flag's removal.)

It is no accident that the GOP's Southern wing is on the ascendancy, with Mississippian Trent Lott as Senate majority leader, Texan Tom DeLay as House majority whip, and North Carolina mossback Jesse Helms as head of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. The GOP draws some of its most enthusiastic support from conservative whites in the states of the Old Confederacy.

To keep that support, the Republicans have believed it necessary to play the race card, whipping up fears of black crime (Willie Horton), portraying the welfare system as overwhelmingly benefitting blacks, rejecting affirmative action, downplaying the need for diversity and generally ignoring the aspirations of African-Americans. That has become known as the "Southern strategy."

In the debate over the state flag, Georgia Republicans followed that playbook exactly, making the cynical calculation that they could pull yet more conservative whites away from the Democratic Party.

Bush seems sincere about attracting black voters. But if so, he is starting in the wrong place. Instead of going to visit black churches, he needs to hold an old-fashioned "come to Jesus" meeting with leaders of his own party. They're the ones who need to atone for their sins and mend their ways.

The battle for the Supreme Court

The battle for Senate confirmation of John Ashcroft as attorney general prefigures the struggle that is bound to break out, and soon, over President Bush's first appointment to the U.S. Supreme Court. Mr. Bush has had remarkably smooth sailing in his relationship with the senatorial Democrats during these first few weeks of his administration, but that is bound to end with a thud when he sends the name of his first court appointee to Capitol Hill.

The problem is that Mr. Bush is unambiguously pro-life and has made it clear that he is not satisfied with Roe v. Wade, whereas the vast majority of Democratic senators are firmly "pro-choice," or (to be blunt about it) favor abortion on demand. For years the Democrats made do with insisting that Republican presidents must not make opposition to abortion a "litmus test" for nominees to the Supreme Court. But Senator Patrick Leahy, the ranking Democrat on the Senate Judiciary Committee, has made it clear that from now on that won't be enough: Any Bush appointee will have to guarantee that he or she will not vote to overturn Roe v. Wade — or will face all-out opposition on the Democratic side of the Senate.

Just what that "all-out opposition" is likely to amount to was foreshadowed by the ordeal of John Ashcroft. The nominee presumably will not have a "paper trail" of judicial decisions

and/or articles that would be difficult to defend, and will in all likelihood decline to take Senator Leahy's "litmus test" — protesting, as past nominees have, that he cannot compromise his judicial independence by pledging to vote a certain way in future hypothetical cases.

But that won't satisfy the Democrats, and war will be declared. The usual organizations devoted to liberal causes — the pro-abortion groups, the anti-church zealots, the ultra-feminists, the environmental extremists, the gay lobby, etc. — will descend on Washington loaded for

bear. The truly vicious mud-guns in the Senate's Democratic caucus, like Senators Kennedy and Boxer, will hurl totally false accusations of racism, homophobia and Lord knows what else at the nominee. The liberal media will join in the borking with howls of simulated rage.

And it is precisely here that the Ashcroft precedent becomes relevant. Eight Democratic senators joined all 50 Republicans in voting to confirm him. But 42 did not — and it takes only 41 to defeat any attempt to kill a filibuster. Senator Kennedy threatened to filibuster the Ashcroft nomination, but a few of the 42 who voted against Ashcroft (including, oddly enough, Senator Leahy) indicated that they would not support a filibuster. Kennedy backed down, and Ashcroft was confirmed.

But could Senator Kennedy persuade 41 Democrats to



oppose cutting off a filibuster against a nominee who refused to promise to support Roe v. Wade? (Note that they wouldn't have to join it, or even necessarily oppose the nominee — just oppose ending the filibuster, perhaps on free speech grounds.) The Ashcroft precedent certainly suggests that he might, although much might depend on whether the nominee was (say) Hispanic — the first Hispanic nominated to sit on the high court.

If the Republicans couldn't amass the 60 votes needed to end a filibuster, it would be up to Majority Leader Trent Lott to put the Democratic stratagem in the proper light: as the effort of a desperate minority to prevent a straight up-or-down vote on the nomination. Personally, I would favor forcing the Democrats to go through the actual motions of filibustering — by talking interminably — rather than merely

signaling their readiness to do so. Then, after the public has watched the Democrats obstructing all business in the Senate for three or four weeks, the nomination could be withdrawn — to be followed promptly by another, which the Democrats could then be invited to filibuster similarly. Unless I am much mistaken, this combination of vicious borking followed by filibuster would soon cease to be a very appealing strategy for the Democrats.

But there seems to be no way to avoid a bruising battle over Mr. Bush's first nominee, unless he disappoints conservative expectations and nominates some wimp who will agree to toe the Democratic line on abortion. Thus far it's been a very mild winter, politically speaking, but there are storms ahead.

Native Azaleas produce unusual colors

Azaleas belong to the genus *Rhododendron* and are among one of the most popular flowering plants in central Florida.

Evergreen species are native to eastern Asia, and deciduous species are native to North America.

Native azaleas are naturally hybridized in nature, resulting in many intermediate forms with unusual flower colors. In Florida, azaleas bloom from February to April, depending upon variety characteristic or climatic conditions.

Azaleas are easy to grow, but like any other plant, there are certain conditions required for growing this plant successfully.

Light
Azaleas grow well under partial shade, but dense shade will reduce growth and flowering.

Soils
Organic, well-drained soils with a pH of 4.0 to 5.5 are best for azaleas. At higher soil pH, some micronutrients, especially iron, become less available to the plants and can produce nutrient deficiencies that will interfere with the normal

growth of the plants.

Organic amendments such as peat, compost or pine bark increase water and nutrient

holding capacity while lowering the soil pH. A soil test for pH should indicate if soil amendments are necessary to correct the soil reaction. The Cooperative Extension office will do the test for a small fee.

Fertilization

A general fertilizer such as 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 can be used for azaleas. There are many "azalea fertilizers" available in garden stores which usually take care of the guessing game of fertilizing azaleas. On sandy soils, it is recommended to make frequent but light applications of fertilizers.

A general rule of thumb for fertilizing azaleas is to apply a double handful of fertilizer per plant (1/2 pound to a mature size plant). Use 2 to 3 pounds of fertilizer per 100 square feet of plant bed. Micronutrients should be applied with the complete fertilizer in the soil or to the foliage.

Planting

Azaleas should be planted at the same depth they had in the

container or nursery. The hole should be about 12 inches wider and as deep as the root ball.

Organic amendments such as peat, compost or pine bark can be used in the back fill soil at a rate of about one third of the total volume.

An organic mulch with a depth of 2-3 inches will help in conserving water and control weeds. Plants should be spaced 3 to 5 feet apart.

Irrigation

Newly transplanted plants need to be watered frequently to insure proper moisture around the root zone. During dry periods, transplanted azaleas may need watering twice a week but established plants will only require watering every 10 to 14 days.

Pruning

Established azalea plants should be pruned shortly after flowering and before the flower buds set for the next season. Spring flowering azalea buds are formed in July and pruning, at this or before the new flowering period, will reduce the number of flowers produced per plant.

Propagation

Evergreen azalea cuttings are

usually rooted when taken after the spring growth has hardened or matured, around the month of June. Cuttings about 3 to 4 inches long are considered best for propagation. Deciduous azaleas are propagated by seed or layering because their cuttings are difficult to root.

Diseases

Azaleas have a shallow root system and do not grow well in poor soils, make sure that water drains well because they are susceptible to root rot diseases.

Mushroom root rot often kills azaleas especially those planted in sites with tree stumps or buried organic debris.

Pests

Lacebug, white fly, spider mites, scale and the azalea caterpillar are some of the most important pests affecting azaleas in Florida. Use oil and soap based insecticides to control them.

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

Ray said he would also like to establish four Special Tactics Units to fight crime, operating one in each of the city's districts. He also sees a need to have the police station manned 24 hours per day, seven day per week, and to keep pay scales for city police and firefighters comparable to other municipalities to promote stability in staffing levels.

Ray said he would be more active in encouraging members of the City Commission to bring initiatives for their respective districts to the table.

"I would empower each district commissioner to work with city staff and citizens on all projects being proposed in the districts and ask commissioners to hold quarterly community meetings and bring the results of those meetings to workshop sessions," Ray said. "Also as Mayor I would hold town hall community meetings twice per year."

Ray said he would be open to the idea of developing grants or tax incentives for redevelopment in Sanford but not for new development.

"It makes more sense to provide incentives for those who would come in and do things like redevelop the vacant K-Mart building and other buildings like that."

He added that the city should look at the idea of "grandfathering" in some of the older buildings, especially in the downtown area for redevelopment.

"City codes change a lot over time and it doesn't make sense for someone to have to spend a million dollars on a \$100,000 building to bring it up to current codes," he said.

In addressing the issue of city codes enforcement Ray said he feels the city should work with citizens to educate property owners about code enforcement and to give violators time to come into compliance. He said he feels police should work with code enforcement officers and the Nuisance Abatement Board to solve some of the code problems.

"Often times, property with code problems are owned by out-of-town landlords who may not even know there is a problem. They should be notified, given a chance to correct it, and fined if they don't," Ray said.

With new business and commercial development coming into the city, Ray said he felt it was necessary to hold the line on tax millage rates.

"It's been reduced a little in each of the last three years so anytime tax rates aren't going up they are going in the right direction."

He said he would like to see fewer large apartment complexes built in the city because roads and schools simply can't keep up with the impact.

"I would try to limit apartment complexes. It makes no sense to have the school district build a new school based on projected growth and then have to turn around and put portable classrooms at the school a year after its built."

He added that the wrong type of development on SR 46 means people will be pulling into traffic every 50 feet.

"Right now we have nine traffic accidents per day in Sanford and for a City of 37,000 that's pretty high," he said.

Ray said one of his biggest reasons for running for office is that he wants to help people.

"If I'm elected I'll go out of my way to make good honest decisions with no hidden agendas. I like this community and I'm devoted to making Sanford my home."

Ray was defeated in his initial bid for public office in 1996 when he ran for Mayor, and he lost last June when he ran in the special election to fill the seat vacated by Mac MacLanahan. In November, Ray pulled 42,000 votes but still lost to incumbent County Commissioner Daryl McLain in the District 5 race.

He said he is serious about his bid for public office, and he expects heavy support from Sanford's black community, which he predicts will account for about 35 percent of the total voter turnout during the March 6 election.

International Airport, Orange County officials simultaneously responded to five similar incidents including scares at the Orange County Convention Center, Sheraton Twin Towers and Universal Studios.

"This was identical to the first letter that showed up a couple of weeks ago," confirmed Tucker. "This type of incident gets to be like some bomb scare pranks. Ninety-nine times out of 100 it is a hoax. But it's that one time you have to be very concerned about."

Anthrax is an infectious disease transmitted by wild and domesticated animals. It can be contracted by humans through skin pores or inhalation, causing fever, chills, nausea, vomiting, and black skin ulcers. If inhaled and left untreated it is almost always fatal.

U.S. Postal Inspector Dan Cortez said the Postal Service is working closely with the FBI in trying to develop leads.

"Our utmost concern is for the safety of our carriers and the safety of the public," said Cortez.

He added that most mail is machine sorted into trays with little human handling. Most carriers pick up packages of mail for specific delivery routes.

Cortez added that the Postal Service is working on a continuing daily basis to keep mail distributions aware of the continuing problem. Even as Cortez was commenting he acknowledged there were additional mail packages with Anthrax scares delivered the the Central Florida attractions area and in Winter Park Tuesday.

Outdoor recreation creating boon to economy

Outdoor enthusiasts spent twice as much money last year in Florida on hunting, fishing and wildlife viewing as Florida lottery players did on tickets.

According to a recent study conducted by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) hunting, wildlife viewing and saltwater and freshwater fishing annually generate approximately \$5.5 billion in retail sales resulting in an economic impact to Florida of \$7.8 billion.

In addition, the study revealed sales tax benefits to the state are estimated at \$336 million, and 138,210 jobs are directly associated with Florida's fish and wildlife-related recreation. "The sheer scale of the economic benefits provided by fish and wildlife to Florida's economy is one reason for maintaining wildlife populations and habitats in a healthy state," said Dr. Allan L. Egbert, executive director of the FWC.

By way of comparison: Florida sales tax revenue from hunting, fishing and wildlife viewing is more than the annual tuition paid by 34,000 in-state university students.

More than one out of every five state residents are wildlife viewers and spend an average of \$696 annually on trip-related and equipment expenditures. "Our strategy for maintaining abundant wildlife populations is to remind decision makers that Florida's wildlife resources should be considered economic assets as well as natural assets to be conserved and managed for the benefit of all Floridians," Egbert said.

The FWC recently completed the economic study of Florida's fish and wildlife-related recreation in 2000. The study was based on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's National Survey of Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife Associated

FISHING FORECAST

Bass action is great in the river. Puzzle Lake and south is as good as it gets. The water is extremely shallow in Puzzle Lake itself, but the bends, deep banks, and sand bars to the south are loaded with bass in the 1-to-5 pound range. A small spinning outfit with six-pound

test and a tiny Rapala is absolutely deadly in this area. Large shiners are still accounting for many bass over the five-pound mark.

Big flounder, small snapper, a few snook, redbfish and trout round out the action at Sebastian Inlet. Large live shrimp or finger mullet are top baits.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports spotty offshore action. Pleasant days are few and far

between, and anglers are reporting dolphin and king mackerel catches on the better days.

Inside the Port, look for sheepshead and flounder. Trout and redbfish are slow in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet has a wide variety of action with sheepshead, drum, redbfish, jack crevalle, bluefish, and a few flounder. Live or dead shrimp is the top bait. Trout and redbfish are slow to fair in Mosquito Lagoon.


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Seminole boys continue surge toward playoffs

On Saturday, Seminole moved closer to a high seed in next week's district tournament at Satellite, as Marcus Robinson scored 14 points and pulled

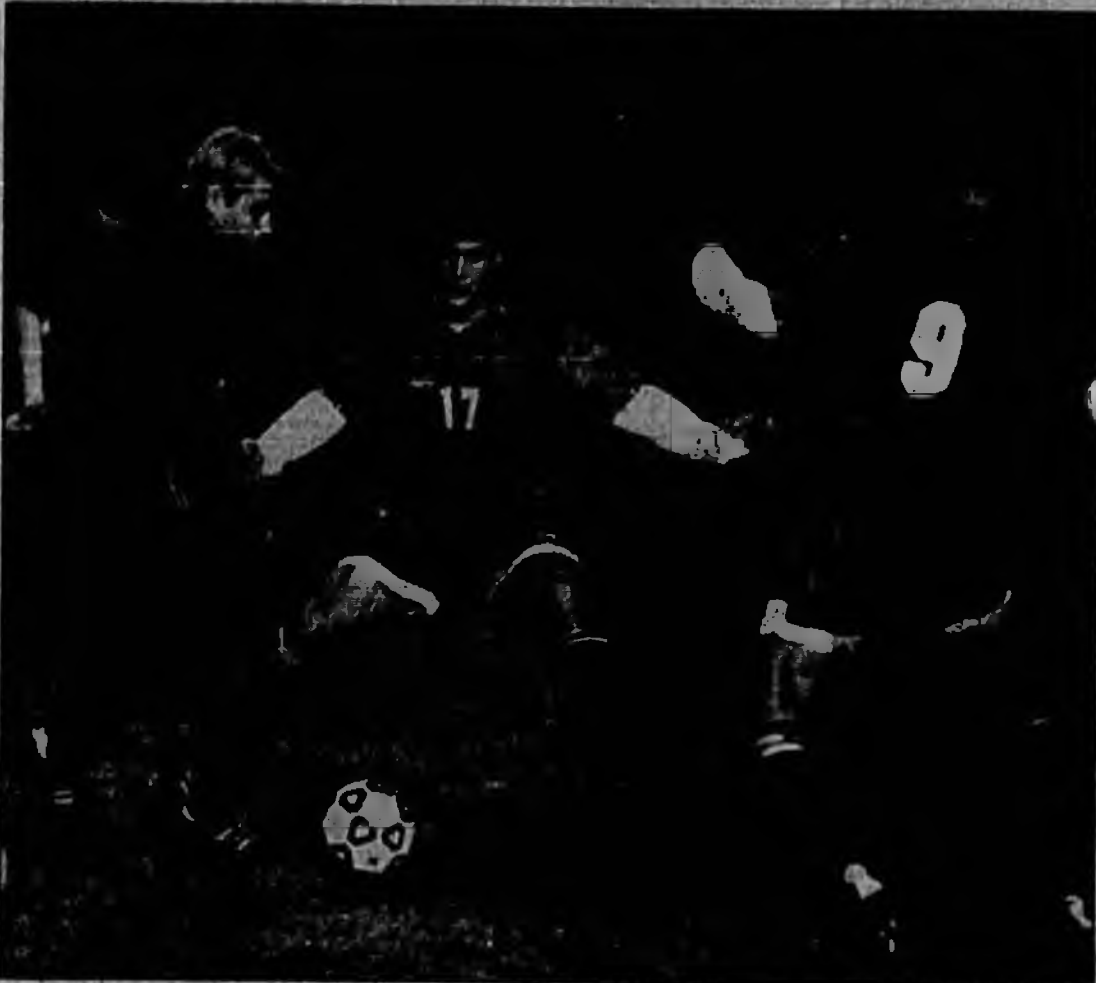

"That was our biggest victory in a long time," said SCC head coach Ken Patrick. "It was just a great game. I was an extremely emotional game and both teams played very well."

The victory was the 20th of the season for the Raiders against six losses, but more importantly, kept the local squad undefeated in conference play at 4-0. The win was also the second of the week for SCC over a nationally-ranked team.

On Wednesday, the Raiders had traveled to Ocala and knocked No. 25 ranked Central Florida Community College 63-56.

DBCC, ranked No. 17 in the nation, fell to 20-6 overall and 2-2 in conference play. The defending M-FC Champions find themselves in third place behind both Seminole and Central Florida and must now go on the road to face CFCC this Wednesday and then travel to Jacksonville to face a tough Florida Community College quintet on Saturday.

SCC will be idle until Saturday when it hits the road to face Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville. That game will be part of a double-header with the women playing at 6 p.m. and the men at 8 p.m.

Saturday's win should almost assure the Raiders of a state tourney bid as the conference will send three teams this year, but Patrick was not counting his chickens before they hatch.

"Only the conference champion gets an automatic bid," said Patrick. "The second and third place teams have to play FCC-J and Santa Fe in a playoff and all one of those teams has to do is pull off one upset and they go and you stay home. We still have a lot of work to do."

SCC built a lead of as many as 12 points in the first half behind Kindred, who scored nine of the Raiders' first 13 points. But the power forward from Douglasville, Georgia picked up two early fouls and spent much of the rest of the first half on the bench.

And when freshman center Brandi Davis, who has been a rebounding terror of late, picked up three fouls, SCC suddenly had no presence in the paint and the taller Falcons

started to make a comeback, eventually tying the game at 36-36 behind Takara Solomon, LaShanta Johnson and Trineca McCleod.

But the Raiders managed to take a two-point lead into the locker-room when Sheri Harrison grabbed a rebound and scored at the buzzer.

SCC continued to control the second half, leading by as many as seven points, as Davis scored nine points and was dominating the backboards. But the locals missed several opportunities to take a double-digit lead and take over the game completely, and when Davis fouled out, DBCC started to make its move.

McCleod, a freshman from Deerfield Beach, was virtually unstoppable, scoring 14 of her 21 points in the second half.

She, along with Johnson and Hodges, carried the Falcons attack as they fought back to take a three-point lead in the final minutes.

Kindred hit a step-back three-pointer that stymied a DBCC run, but McCleod and company kept coming.

The Raiders' very nearly let the game slip away at the free throw line, missing four straight free throws, including two by Kindred with 14-seconds left that would have sealed the victory. The Falcons were not any better, missing all six of their free throw attempts in the second half, including the front end of a one-and-one that would have given the visitors the lead with just over a minute left.

Following Kindred's second miss, Hodges grabbed the rebound and drove to the top of the key, where she banked in a long three-pointer to tie the game at 69-69 with 10.7-seconds left.

After a time out, Narie Berggren beat the DBCC press and found Kindred, who was fouled trying to make a layup with 4.4-seconds showing.

Kindred missed the first shot and the large crowd was start-

ing to feel the game slip away. But Kindred calmly made the second, giving her squad the lead.

Hodges managed to get off a clean shot and the ball looked like it was going to go right in, but somehow it rimmed out and SCC had the victory.

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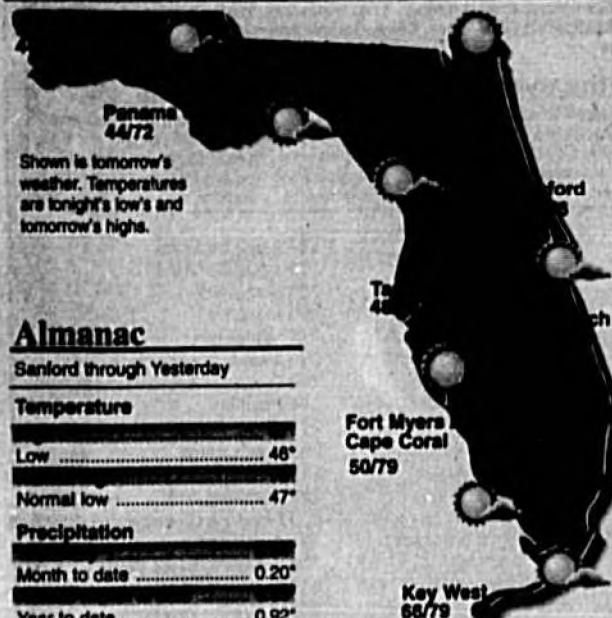

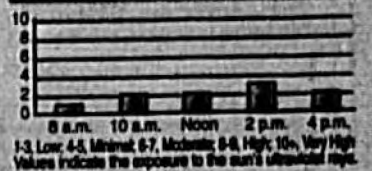

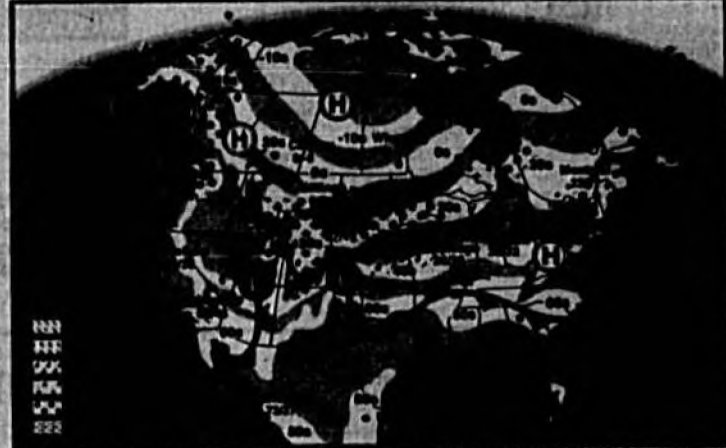
