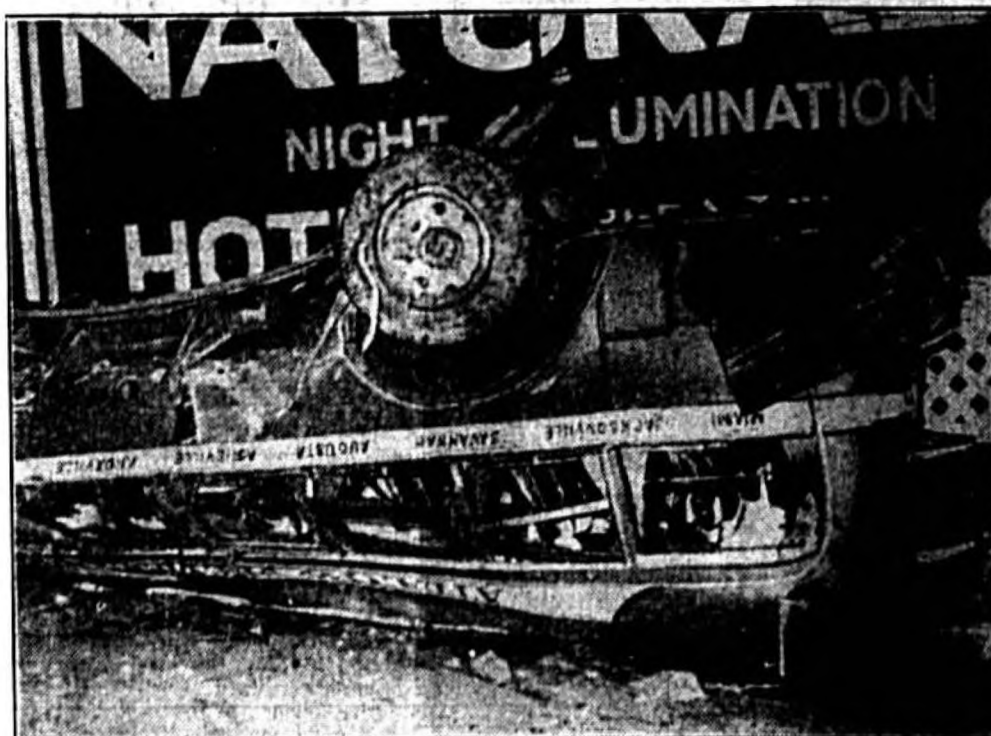

FIVE DIE IN BUS CRASH ON NATURAL BRIDGE



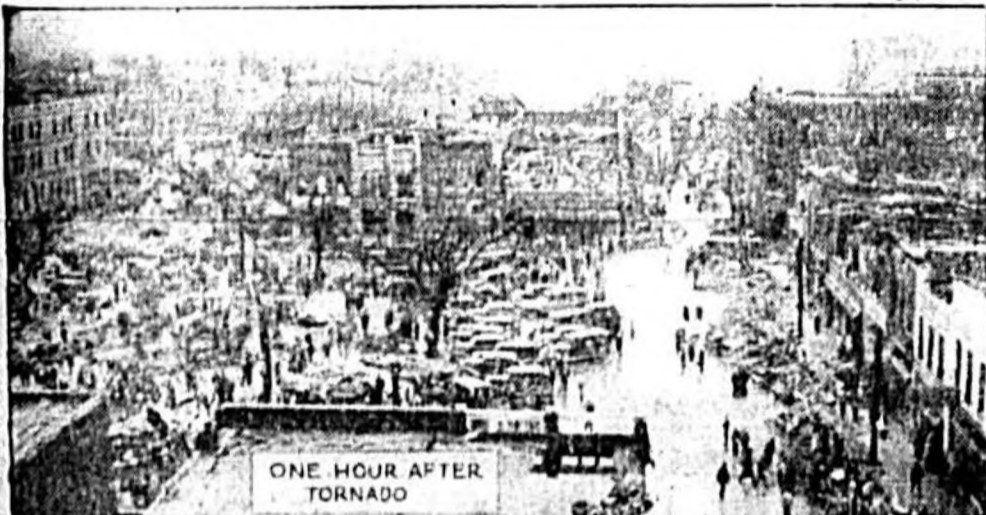
