Samuels contract renewal denied

A Seminole Community College administrator ended his seven year career at the school today after his contract was not renewed.

Keith Samuels, vice president for instruction, was told about a month ago by SCC president Earl Weldon his contract would not be renewed. Samuels helped transform the vocational education department into a high tech program.

SCC public relations director Craig Orseno said Samuels was employed on an annual contract basis at the discretion of SCC President Dr. Earl Weldon.

Orseno said the four academic deans will fill in while a search for Samuels' successor is conducted. Several options are available according to Orseno. The job might be filled from within the college's ranks or the vacancy advertised.

That's up to the president, Orseno said. I don't know what he plans to do. He said the vacancy is expected to be filled by Aug. 21 when the faculty returns for the fall semester.

Holiday closures

With Independence Day falling on a Sunday this year, government operations will be observing Monday as an official holiday. As a result, all governmental operations will be closed, including all city and county facilities.

Seminole County School Board and summer session at the schools will also be closed on Monday.

While some businesses will be open as usual, a number of them will be closed for the holiday, including banking institutions.

The Central Florida Zoological Park will be operating as usual.

Post offices will have their lobbies opened for box holders, but only express mail will be delivered. All other services will be closed for the holiday.

Group plans anti-tax campaign

TALLAHASSEE — Service station owners will launch an advertising campaign urging Floridians to request a vote on any local gasoline tax increases, an industry group said Thursday.

We believe that before any new local option gasoline taxes are levied, the people should be advised of current taxes and how the money is spent, said Rick McAllister, executive director of Florida Food and Fuel Retailers Inc.

A new Florida growth management law that took effect Thursday entitled county commissions to add up to five cents a gallon to gasoline taxes.

Adding tax would require a "supermajority" vote of the commission — a majority plus one. The law says the public can be allowed to vote on the tax, but a referendum isn't required.

They should be given the right to vote yes or no, McAllister said.

The group's ad campaign, featuring television spots and placards on pumps, is expected to begin in one or two weeks. It will point out that Floridians already pay nearly 40 cents a gallon in gasoline taxes, he said.

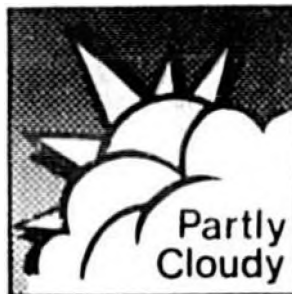
That includes 14 cents in federal taxes, 11.8 cents in state taxes, 11.3 cents in county road taxes and 2.5 cents in state and federal environmental and inspection charges.

Ex-cop's sex trial

Testimony about alleged on-going liaison with boy not admissible

SANFORD — A judge's ruling Thursday in a pre-trial hearing for a former Sanford police officer accused of having sex with a teen will keep testimony focused on specific incidents in the criminal case.

Guy Brewster, 36, is scheduled to go on trial July 12 for at least one sexual assault and engaging in sexual activity with a child.

As the result of the ruling by Seminole Circuit Court Judge Alan Dickey, prosecutors may present testimony on the specific incidents charged but not generalized details of an alleged on-going relationship.

Brewster's attorneys, Jeff Deon, had filed several pre-trial motions seeking to identify the specific

circumstances of the alleged assaults in order to prepare his defense.

Brewster was suspended with pay from the city police department shortly before his arrest on the sex charges in October 1991. He was fired by chief Ralph Russell last month after the state board probable cause to remove his police certification. Brewster requested a postponement of a hearing set for this morning to review his dismissal until the criminal case against him is resolved.

Deon claims the allegations that Brewster engaged in the alleged sex acts are totally untrue.

This is a figment of somebody's imagination, Deon declared outside the courtroom following the hearing. Nothing happened, Guy Brewster never did anything.

Field trips to benefit more kids

SANFORD — The Seminole County School Board is fine-tuning its field trip policies. School officials believe the changes will be of benefit to more students.

Board Chairman Jeanne Morris said, "What we will be doing is re-evaluating the field trips that schools have been doing in the past, in such a way as to offer a continuation of the trips, but without any disruption in the schools."

The School Policy Advisory Committee has been studying the issue of field trips for many months, and had recommended that the policy be revised to exclude middle school students from participation in overnight field trips.

Naturally, Morris said, we will honor those trips which have already been scheduled, but what we want to do now is have the trips set up to be done during the intercession periods when year-round schools are out for three week periods every 12 weeks.

One of our biggest outings, she explained, is to the camp where students have a hands-on opportunity to learn about conservation, nature and the outdoors. They stay in dormitories for several days at a time, and the experience is both enjoyable as well as educational.

Normally these trips have been done during the school year, and the district then had to provide for replacement teachers during the

Lake Mary OKs sewer lines along boulevard

LAKE MARY — With the widening project on West Lake Mary Boulevard now complete, efforts are underway to begin work on the boulevard east of the city, to U.S. 17-92.

During last night's City Commission meeting steps were taken toward finalizing the city's

portion of the county widening project.

The city voted to authorize the mayor to execute an interlocal utility construction agreement for a water main extension/sanitary sewer project.

"We had planned for most of this," said City Planner Matt West, "but the sewer system was not formally proposed. Now the commission has voted to add that to the project."

The city, at its own expense, will construct water and sewer utilities along the right of way, as part of what is listed as Lake Mary Boulevard Phase II.

The amount will be officially determined once contracts are approved.

Seminole County will be putting the construction project for the eastern boulevard area out to

Gunman kills 8, then self

SAN FRANCISCO — A man with two pistols strapped to his suspenders, a gun in one hand and a bag of bullets in the other walked into a law firm's high-rise office and opened fire. He killed eight people and wounded six before committing suicide...

The San Francisco Chronicle and San Francisco Examiner today identified the gunman as Gian Luigi Ferri, 55, of Woodland Hills, a suburb of Los Angeles. The San Francisco police and medical examiner refused to comment...

The gunman and six of his victims were found dead inside the sleek glass skyscraper at 101 California St. In the downtown financial district, Mayor Frank Jordan said. Two others died at San Francisco General Hospital...

The assailant put a gun under his chin and pulled the trigger when he spotted police approaching him on a stairwell, a little more than an hour after the shooting began, Jordan said...

Nancy Ashill, an attorney at Pettit & Martin, the law firm on the 34th floor where the gunman began his rampage, was in the bathroom when the man started shooting shortly before 3 p.m.

"We heard the fire alarm," said Ashill, visibly shaken. "We thought it was a fire drill. Then we saw the bullet holes and smelled the smoke. We ran out."

Authorities believe the shooting spree was planned because the gunman was so heavily armed. "We think the individual must have known someone," Jordan said...

The gunman's weapons were semiautomatic and he had a black canvas bag stuffed with "hundreds and hundreds of rounds," Jordan said...

Bodies were found on the 34th, 33rd and 31st floors, police spokesman Dave Ambrose said. The gunman's body was found on a stairway between the 29th and 30th floors...

Wayne Jeffries, a lawyer at Pettit & Martin, said the gunman had been at the firm earlier in the day — a deposition — but details of the case were not immediately known...

The man was identified by police as a heavy-set, middle-aged white male dressed in dark slacks, a white shirt and suspenders. He carried a California driver's license, Jordan said...

Roy Eaves was watching TV news coverage when he realized his wife, Deanne, a court reporter, worked at the building. Mrs. Eaves, 33, was hit in the arm by a ricocheting bullet...

"I was a little shocked, like it couldn't happen to me," Roy Eaves said. "It's scary. You never know it can hit home to you until it happens."

When he got to the hospital, his wife told him she was taking a deposition inside a glassed-in conference room when the gunman burst out from behind a curtain and began spraying bullets through the glass walls...

Safety first for the Fourth

It happens every year. A careless moment by a child or an adult during a July 4th celebration results in a serious injury or has fatal results.

Many organizations across the country are seeking to prevent holiday mishaps by sending out words of caution. Unfortunately, people will still encounter problems, and give the excuse that they didn't know of the dangers.

"Fireworks are not toys," says the Central Florida Chapter of the National Safety Council. In all age groups, in this area last year, fireworks and/or sparklers caused 58 percent of the injuries.

Most fireworks are prohibited for public use by state law. Yet many residents, during a vacation, purchase the explosives in other states where restrictions are more lenient.

This is not an indication that they can be considered safe.

The same holds true for sparklers which can be purchased in Florida. Using them within a home is dangerous. Sparks can cause irreparable damage, especially to the eyes.

Many people may also have a tendency to toss sparklers into the trash once they have finished burning. The lack of sparks is not an indication that the heat has stopped. It could still cause a fire.

It is unfortunate that a holiday such as the 4th of July must be prefaced with somber words of warning. Yet, it is necessary.

When it comes to fireworks, parents should refrain from putting on their own displays. Children must be taught the dangers of all types of devices.

A short time spent being cautious may prevent a lifetime of misery.

Practice safety first for the Fourth, to remain healthy.

Does violence ever have a purpose?

The date, June 22, won't trigger any mnemonic shock waves around the country, but the names of two Detroit citizens, Joe Louis and Coleman Young, will.

Joe Louis, authentic American hero and master of the sweet science, was honored with a postage stamp issued on June 22, an exqu岸ely appropriate date for the "Brown Bomber" and for American pride. He knocked out Jimmy Braddock on June 22, 1937, to become heavyweight champion.

One year later on the same date, Louis avenged a humiliating defeat by swiftly dispatching Max Schmeling, a touted symbol of Hitler's doctrine of Aryan supremacy, into unconsciousness.

"Your father gave us hope," the son of a German concentration camp victim later told Louis' son, Joseph Jr. "It proved to us that the Nazis were vulnerable."

On the same date this year, Detroit's first black mayor, Coleman Young, made history again by announcing he would not run for a sixth term as mayor.

Unlike Louis, a disciplined executor of legitimate violence, Young has been a loudmouth bully whose brazen divisiveness helped nurture a syndrome of wanton violence. During his four terms as mayor, Detroit constantly vied to be America's murder capital.

Halloween became an annual event for urban renewal by arson, while Detroit police achieved a distinction that eluded even the brutish Los Angeles police force: Eyewitnesses accused a group of publicly beating a man to death.

But the difference between the two prominent Detroit citizens is defined by two questions that have always plagued civilized society: What is the difference between legitimate violence and illegitimate violence, and who authorizes those differences?

Let's try a couple of examples. Violence is legitimate when it takes place in self-defense, boxing, hockey, football and a nationally declared war. Violence is illegitimate when any

group of persons, unauthorized by law, attacks individuals or destroys property.

Paradoxically, people erupt into fits of violence in moments of supreme ecstasy; after winning a national sports championship, for example. Hockey fans in Montreal, football fans in Dallas and basketball fans in Chicago and Chapel Hill went on rampages this year.

But none of these urban convulsions ever reached the destructive levels of the riot that followed the first Rodney King verdict, the Detroit and Newark riots of 25 years ago, or the current "ethnic cleansing" savagery in Bosnia, Somalia and the Sudan.

In his teen-age years, Joe Louis was virtually the only authentic national hero for black kids. He was Michael Jordan, Charles Barkley, Bo Jackson, Muhammad Ali, Mike Tyson and Magic Johnson all rolled up into one magnificent machine.

When Louis won, blacks kids in Atlanta, Houston, Harlem and Chicago's South Side would pour into the streets out of their homes, cheering and reliving the Brown Bomber's golden moments with delirious pride.

Today, a victory celebration is an excuse for destruction. That's because neighborhoods are breeding grounds for drug-inspired crimes. Police abuse is endemic in many cities.

Private pilots unwitting victims of the drug war

WASHINGTON — Oklahoma-based pilot Tom Quinn is an unlikely candidate to be caught in the cross fire of South Florida's war on drugs. But thanks to a federal undercover drug operation, he and other pilots have discovered that the friendly skies can sometimes be life-threatening.

Two federal grand juries in Miami are hearing evidence from pilots like Quinn that hundreds of private planes may be flying with

defects that could pose serious safety risks. The grand juries also have heard evidence that deaths have resulted from these defective aircraft. As part of a two-year investigation, the FBI has been investigating charges by numerous victims who claim they've been defrauded by federal drug informants working out of small aviation shops in South Florida.

In many cases, according to sources close to the probe, U.S. law enforcement officials may bear re-

sponsibility for planes having unsafe parts, bogus identities and inaccurate flight logs.

Quinn stumbled upon the undercover operation in 1991, as he was searching for a seaplane to take around the world on a promotional flight. He soon found out about a refurbished 1954 Grumman Albatross aircraft being sold in Florida by a Miami businessman. Looking the plane over, he bought it and took off for Oklahoma.

After a few hours in the air, Quinn noticed his left engine rapidly losing oil. Minutes later, he was forced to make an emergency landing at a remote airstrip in Arkansas, narrowly averting disaster.

Later, Quinn discovered that the propellers and engines didn't match the ones listed in the plane's maintenance records. The engines were filled with faulty parts — none of which were noted in the documents that came with the plane. After complaining to the seller, he learned that the businessman had never flown the plane since buying it from a small, fixed-base operator at Miami's Opaloka Airstrip in 1989.

When Quinn went to the shop to learn what became of his engines, he discovered that they were installed in another Grumman Albatross that was sitting on the runway. The engines, he found out, had been swapped before the sale. Neither he nor the Miami businessman were told about it. He passed on this information to the FBI and local police, and the plane was tagged for seizure.

A few months later, Quinn got some surprising news: The people who swapped the engines were paid informants for the Drug Enforcement Administration and U.S. Customs Service. He also discovered that the plane bearing his stolen engine was used to fly covert drug missions for customs. Informants who worked in the operation also claimed that federal drug agents knew about the swap.

Quinn has since sued the federal government over the incident, and customs is fighting back in court. In a letter to Quinn last June, customs officials wrote that their own internal probe had found "no wrong or improper act on the part of any customs officer."

This incident might have gone unnoticed if it wasn't part of a larger problem. In late 1991, an FBI search warrant reportedly turned up 300 sets of documents indicating fraud and illegal aircraft repairs by shops that were doubling as undercover drug fronts at one South Florida airport.

Uncle Sam and a smoking ban

WASHINGTON — Do federal workers and their guests have a constitutionally protected right to smoke on the job, or should the federal government, in recognition of the damaging effects of secondary smoke, ban smoking in all government work places? That is the current debate going on in the House of Representatives.

The House Public Buildings and Grounds Subcommittee has jurisdiction over the federal government's building construction, remodeling and leasing program. Its new chairman this term, Rep. James Traficant Jr., D-Ohio, is vehemently against smoking. He introduced into his subcommittee a bill that was both simple and sweeping. It would have banned smoking everywhere in any building owned or leased by the federal government.

"Smoking is a killer. That is no longer an issue," says Traficant. "Secondary effects of being around people who are smoking are clearly a health hazard. We owe it to federal workers and to citizens who enter federal buildings to conduct business to provide them with the healthiest environment possible."

To say the proposed ban is controversial would be a major understatement. The bill was bitterly opposed by the tobacco industry, by members of tobacco-state delegations and by federal employee unions. The still-powerful smoking lobby went into high gear.

Currently, smoking is allowed in all federal buildings except in "public areas" such as hallways. On Capitol Hill, members can set smoking policy for their own offices. In hearing rooms, smoking is allowed at the discretion of committee chairmen. It is "temporarily" banned in public spaces in the House, but not in the Senate. Smoking is not allowed on either the House or Senate floor.

In the past there have been enough powerful members of Congress from tobacco states, or who themselves smoke, to block consideration of most federal anti-smoking measures. But, in recent years, their numbers and influence have waned.

A recent survey by the Capital Hill newspaper, Roll Call, showed that only 43 members of Congress smoke, and only 20 of these admit to smoking cigarettes. Already 239 members of the House and 59 senators have banned smoking completely from their offices. Many others have set up policies, some surprisingly complex, that amount to partial bans. According to the survey, only 21 House offices and five in the Senate allow unlimited smoking, and in some of these — like Sen. Jay Rockefeller's, D-W.Va. — no one smokes anyway.

But the pro-smoking forces still have enough power to make passage of Traficant's ban very difficult. So, a last minute compromise was

worked out.

Traficant agreed to amend his bill to allow smoking on military bases, in VA hospitals and in all private residences owned by the federal government. Then, in a broader compromise, he agreed to allow individual agency and department heads to allow smoking in specially designated areas so long as those areas are separately ventilated from the rest of the building and the air in the smoking areas can be kept to a standard in excess of any prevailing federal indoor-air-quality standard.

But the pro-smoking forces were not done. On behalf of tobacco interests, Rep. James Clyburn, D-S.C., who represents a tobacco district, introduced an amendment that would have changed Traficant's ban into a six-month study that would have required, among other things, a General Accounting Office review of the methods the Environmental Protection Agency has used to determine that secondary smoke is a health hazard.

Traficant reacted emotionally to the introduction of this delaying tactic by the tobacco lobby, saying: "I am against this amendment. The time has come to act to save lives."

The bill was passed, 8-3, with assurances by Traficant that some of the studies called for in Clyburn's amendment would be done in the interim before his bill takes effect. It is expected to win overwhelming approval on the House floor.

All this leaves Rep. Bill Emerson, R-Mo., very unhappy. Virtually a chain-smoker, Emerson has fought hard for "smoker's rights."

"This kind of ban is undemocratic and un-American," Emerson said during debate. The Missouriian, who does not exactly cut a avette figure, also asked sarcastically, "What's next, a ban on obesity in federal buildings?"

The Traficant bill carries a 180-day waiting period, after enactment, before it becomes effective. Realistically, it will take another three to six months to get it through the Senate and enacted. Therefore, it likely will be nine months to a year before the modified ban — smoking only in designated areas — becomes effective.

Safety Commission report, approximately 11,000 persons are treated for fireworks-related injuries each year.

"Fireworks usually cause burns to the eyes, face and hands," Walsh said. "Most often they happen when a firecracker

either explodes in someone's hand, is dropped on a foot or explodes in a pocket."

The Florida Society of Ophthalmology has also issued a warning against eye and facial damages caused by fireworks.

Citing the same statistics as the NSC, the FSO reported 1,300 of the total injuries last year were of a serious nature, and of them, one in three lost their eyesight as a result.

Both organizations have put out lists of safety precautions. Included were the following, taken from suggestion lists:

- Do not allow children to use fireworks without supervision. If possible, use safety glasses. Never put firecrackers in cans, bottles or clay pots. Do not throw sparklers in the air or wave them in a person's face.

Sessions demanding to stay until successor confirmed

WASHINGTON — Embattled FBI Director William Sessions has agreed to resign, but is demanding he remain at his post until a successor is in place, a process that could take months.

The demand has complicated the negotiations over when and under what circumstances Sessions leaves as FBI head, although his 10-year term is only half completed.

The Justice Department has not responded to Session's latest conditions under which he would be willing to depart.

If Sessions were allowed to remain until a successor were chosen and confirmed by the Senate, he likely would not depart for months. The Senate Judiciary Committee already has a busy schedule, including consideration of Ruth Bader Ginsburg's nomination to the

Supreme Court.

New York federal Judge Louis J. Freeh is considered the leading candidate to succeed Sessions, according to reports published today in The New York Times and Los Angeles Times.

Frech, a 43-year-old former FBI agent, became one of the nation's youngest federal judges when he was appointed to the Manhattan bench in 1991. As a specially selected federal prosecutor, Frech headed the case that convicted Walter Leroy Moody Jr. in the 1989 mail-bomb murders of a U.S. appeals court judge and a civil rights lawyer.

Sessions' demand that he remain as director during the interim period is widely viewed as a ploy to keep the FBI's No. 2 official, Deputy Director Floyd Clarke, from heading the agency, even temporarily as acting director.

Sessions and his wife, Alice, have complained publicly about Clarke. Sessions has questioned Clarke's loyalty and Mrs. Sessions has alleged that Clarke was part of a group of longtime FBI officials who were trying to oust her husband.

Sessions has waged a dogged campaign to keep his job ever

since a report by the Justice Department's Office of Professional Responsibility accused him of ethical improprieties — all of which he has denied.

The ethics report accused Sessions, among other things, of misusing government airplanes and cars for personal trips; having a taxpayer-paid fence built at his home that did not meet security needs; using a "sham" to avoid paying taxes on his chauffeured transportation to and from work; and using his office to get a sweetheart deal on a home mortgage.

Sessions has met with Attorney General Janet Reno three times to discuss his future, most recently on Monday, while his representatives have been meeting with other Justice Department officials.

Throughout the talks, Sessions has argued he must be exonerated of the allegations against him in return for his resignation. Then came the added demand that he be allowed to stay while a successor is confirmed.

The New York Times first reported the new demand in today's editions, saying the new condition has caused negotiations between Sessions and the Clinton administration to break down.

Elders: Forget 'sex ed,' think 'health'

WASHINGTON — Don't ask Dr. Joycelyn Elders about sex education.

President Clinton's nominee for surgeon general may be known for her forceful advocacy of condoms and contraceptives, but the Arkansas health commissioner said the phrase "sex education" is not in her vocabulary.

"I believe in comprehensive health education. I don't feel that you can teach sex education as an isolated entity. I don't ever say sex education," she said Thursday after Clinton signed her nomination papers.

Asked what role she will play in the Clinton administration's delayed drive for health reform, Elders said in an interview: "I will be whatever the president wants me to be."

But the pediatric endocrinologist quickly ran down a list of the priorities she has championed both in Arkansas and as a leader among state health commissioners.

The surgeon general has an important role to play in helping "make the American people understand the importance of providing health care for all Americans," said Elders.

"I feel that every American should have a right to health care. We all have rights to lawyers, so we should certainly have a right to health care," she said.

"The other issue that has been

very close and dear to me is that I feel every child should be a planned, wanted child. We should do all the things we must do to help strengthen families," she said.

The best way to do that "is to start it as a family with two nurturing parents and as a planned, wanted child," she added.

Elders recently provided more fodder for her conservative critics on a television interview show when she suggested that prostitutes who trade sex for drugs should be given Norplant, the implantable, five-year contraceptive.

"There is no question I stand by that," she said.

It's tragic that women sell their bodies for drugs, said

Elders. "We are sorry that ever happens to any woman, but we certainly don't want them having unplanned, unwanted children."

"Yes, I would much prefer to make Norplant or contraceptives available for them so they would not have unplanned, unwanted children," she said.

Elders would succeed Dr. Antonia Novello in the post.

"We must focus on prevention," she said. "Tertiary care is already available for everybody. What's not available is primary, preventive health care."

"The other thing I've been about is teaching parents how to educate their children" as well as promoting male responsibility and comprehensive, school-based health services. She

pushed hard for Arkansas school clinics to dispense condoms, but only a handful of high schools did.

"Lastly I feel that it's important that we offer bright young people hope," said Elders. "When more young black men are in prison than in college and the average cost of prison is \$35,000 a year, I feel we need to offer tuition and books for bright young people who've done well in school and want to go to college."

"Those are the things I've been about. Those are the things I'll continue to be about," she said before heading back to Little Rock for the holiday weekend.

Politics and street signs: no 'Slow Children' anymore

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. — Is it a sign of the times? The last word in political correctness?

"Slow children" signs are falling by the wayside, not to mention from the roadside, across Massachusetts, as state officials respond to complaints of offended motorists.

This is true, said Charles F. Sterling, who is in charge of traffic signs for the state Department of Public Works. "A state representative sent a letter to our commissioner with a petition taking offense and contending the wording was insensitive to retarded and slow children."

Obligingly, the Highway Department commissioner at the time, James Kerastotes, wrote to each city and town recommending replacing "Slow Children" with "Watch Children." It cost towns about \$100 per sign.

John D'Urso, a spokeswoman for Kerastotes, now state Transportation secretary James Kerastotes, said cities and towns were told to post the "Watch Children" version only when installing new signs.

But "Slow Children" disappeared last.

"So far we have received reports from four out of five (department) engineers that their district has been cleared of 'Slow Children' signs," Sterling said. "The other is still checking."

"They did?" gasped John Driscoll, an aide to state Rep. Robert Hawke, R-Gardner.

Driscoll said Hawke had just forwarded a letter of complaint about the signs from a Fitchburg State College professor. Hawke didn't take sides himself. Driscoll said and had no idea that it would lead to such a sweeping change.

Local officials say they have heard complaints about sign phrasing for years.

It's nothing new. And when a politician thinks they may get a few votes out of it they can't bring themselves to say no, said George Teso, who has overruled more than one trend suggestion in the 24 years he has headed the city of Cambridge's traffic and sign department.

Irvan edges Petty for Pepsi pole

DAYTONA BEACH — Eric Irvan wins a bit when he hears people call him the "king of the restrictor plate racers."

But he added to that reputation Thursday by outdueling Kyle Petty at Daytona International Speedway to take the pole position for Saturday's Pepsi 400.

Petty, the Daytona 500 pole winner in February, put up the target at 190.041 mph, but Irvan, who won the Daytona race last July, came up with a lap of 190.427 to earn his second pole of the season and ninth of his NASCAR Winston Cup career.

The time difference between the Irvan's Chevrolet Lumina and Petty's Pontiac Grand Prix on their last laps was 74 hundredths of a second.

Irvan has won three of the last four events at Daytona and Talladega. The two super speedways, where NASCAR requires the use of restrictor plates to keep the big stock cars from running over 200 mph.

Asked about being called the king of restrictor plate racing, Irvan, also the 1991 Daytona 500 winner, said, "It's probably a little too much for me to live up to. Every time you think about the king, you usually think about Richard Petty or Elvis Presley, not Eric Irvan."

He has won three out of four and it may be a long time until we win the next one. That king stuff is hard to live up to.

Irvan has won three restrictor plate poles, as well as adding victories at Talladega last July and this May to his Pepsi 400 win last year.

We've really picked this race car up a lot, he said. It's the same car that we won Talladega with in May.

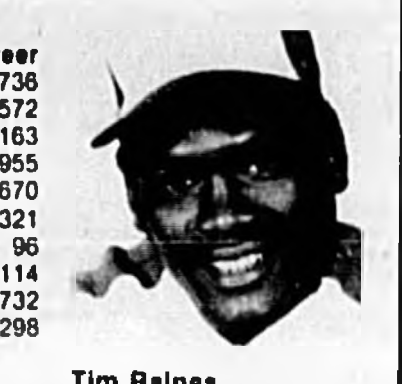

Special to the Herald. BARBERVILLE — The long-awaited opening of the 3/8's-mile dirt oval racing track at Volusia County Speedway will put five full classes of short track racers in competition in the first of a two-day weekend of celebrations for the Fourth of July weekend.

Tonight's the Mini Stock, Hobby Stock, Pro Stock, Mini Sprints and Pro Late Model divisions will kick off the weekend that will finish Saturday, July 3rd, with eight asphalt divisions, including the 100-lap Firecracker Spectacular Late Model feature.

Besides the second leg of the VCS Late Model Championship Series and a special visit by the Waxoyl Pro-4 Racing Series of Florida (mini modifieds) for 20 laps, the asphalt track will be running regular weekly divisions for the Late Model Stock (Winston Racing Series), Street Stock, Sportsman, Florida Modified, Mini Stock and Hobby Stock drivers.

The pit gate will open tonight for the dirt track at 5 p.m. with the grandstands opening at 6 p.m. Practice is scheduled from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. with racing starting with heat races at 8 p.m.

The Mini Stock, Hobby Stock, Pro Stock and Mini Sprints will run 20-lap features with the Pro Late Model division racing for a 30-lap grand prize. Schrader and Hendrick immediately appealed the decision, but Chip Williams, a spokesman for NASCAR, the stock car sanctioning body, said that due to the holiday weekend it would "be impossible to have the appeal heard" until sometime next week. He said that because of the delay in holding a hearing, Schrader will be allowed to attempt to qualify on Friday in the second round of time trials for Saturday's race and that the suspension would go into effect beginning with the July 11 race at New Hampshire International Speedway.

Williams said a panel made up of three of the 24 members of the National Stock Car Commission will be appointed to hear the appeal, which will likely take place next Tuesday or Wednesday. Any further appeal would go to Seamon E. Knudsen, the national stock car racing commissioner, who would make a final decision.

Neither Schrader nor Hendrick were available for comment. Schrader was seen leaving the NASCAR truck moments before announcement of the suspensions, but walked quickly to his personal car and drove away.

Schrader had qualified 15th with a lap of 188.045 mph. Two other Hendrick Motorsports cars, owned by Rick Hendrick, Joe's son, and driven by Ricky Rudd and rookie Jeff Gordon, passed inspection.

Gary Nelson, the Winston Cup director, said the NASCAR inspector who was doing the routine examination of Schrader's Chevrolet Lumina following Thursday's qualifying "noticed that people were acting a little funny and looked closer. It was well hidden."

What was well hidden was four holes drilled inside the carburetor and four more in the intake manifold that were intended to allow the engine to breathe more easily with a carburetor restrictor plate bolted in place.

The plates, used only at Daytona and Talladega, restrict the flow of air to the carburetor, thereby reducing horsepower. The intention is to slow the cars at NASCAR's two fastest tracks in the interest of driver and spectator safety.

"The best way I can explain what they did is that passages were drilled through the carburetor around the restrictor plate and back into the engine," said Nelson, a former NASCAR crew chief. "It was very ingenious the way they did it. We just stumbled on it."

"I was able to reconstruct it on a bench in the NASCAR truck

and run a small wire through the holes into the engine.

"It's a very serious offense in all of our eyes. A team that bypasses the plate should be suspended and that's what the guidelines call for."

Team owner Junior Johnson and crew chief Tim Brewer were suspended in May 1990 for using an oversized engine in The Winston, an all-star race. Originally, the hearing panel suspended both Johnson and Brewer for 12 weeks, but Knudsen, saying that was excessive, reduced the penalties to four races. Driver Tommy Ellis, substituting for injured Geoff Bodine, was not penalized.

Receiving credit for Social Security

How marriage affects Social Security benefits: It's important for brides to notify Social Security if they change their name at the time they marry. For women who are working, this will assure that they receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who are receiving Social Security benefits, reporting the name change will ensure that checks and important notices are issued properly.

● If you're receiving SS benefits based on your own work and earnings, getting married doesn't affect your benefits. However, you should remember to report the marriage to SS to record a name change (if any) and to find out if your new spouse may be eligible for benefits on your record.

● If you're receiving widow's or widower's benefits, they will continue if you remarry after age 60 (or age 50 if you are disabled). However, if you are 62 or older and are eligible for higher benefits based on your current spouse's SS record, you can file for those benefits.

● If you're receiving mother's or father's benefits, they usually stop if you remarry.

● If you're receiving disability benefits on your parent's SS record and your benefits are based on a condition you have had since childhood, your benefits generally stop if you get married.

● If you're receiving benefits as a divorced wife or husband on your ex-spouse's SS record, your benefits usually will stop when you remarry. Your benefits will not be affected if your ex-spouse remarries but you

don't. In other words, more than one spouse may receive benefits on a worker's record.

● If you are receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits and you get married, your payments may be reduced or even stop. Your payments might change because your spouse's income and resources may affect the amount of your SSI benefits. Your payments could stop if you marry a person, who for example, owns several homes. That extra property could put you over the \$3,000 SSI resource limit for a married couple. If two persons who receive SSI payments get married, their combined payment will decrease because the SSI payment rate for a couple is less than the rate for two individuals. Reporting a name change is easy. Just call the toll-free telephone number 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. Or call or visit your local Social Security office. In addition to completing appropriate forms you will be asked to furnish a certified copy of your marriage certificate to verify your new name.

Alcoholism may run in the family

DEAR MARY: I know parents don't want to hear that something they are doing or have done may contribute to whether their kids mess with drugs, but let me tell you my story. I was widowed when I was 47 years old. I have three kids, all of whom became heavily involved with alcohol and drugs during their teens. I started going to Al-Anon when my oldest son was in treatment for alcoholism. While I was attending the meetings, I began to realize that alcohol had played a big part in my husband's early death, and while it had never occurred to me to use the term "alcoholic" for my father, he certainly had a drinking problem that caused all of us a great deal of pain and grief when I was growing up. My husband's father abandoned his family when the kids were young and became a classic skid-row type bum. Once we all realized that alcohol problems clearly "ran in our family," it helped me stop feeling like such a failure as a parent, and it seemed to give my kids strength and courage in their battles toward recovery. All of them are clean and sober now but none of us will ever have anything to do with alcohol again.

RUNS IN THE FAMILY
DEAR RUNS: You are absolutely right; if there is a history of alcoholism or alcohol abuse in the immediate or extended family, it should be considered a red flag. Furthermore, if there's alcoholism in the family, members may be more at risk for dependency on mood altering drugs such as tranquilizers, marijuana and cocaine. While there's no conclusive research, indications are great that children from families impacted by alcohol or other drugs are highly susceptible to all types of chemical dependency.

The original Declaration of Independence has faded, but its ideas, concepts, and words are burned forever in the souls of this nation and etched on the hearts and minds of persons for whom life is liberty and for whom freedom is more precious than life itself.

(Footnote: Revolution that produces freedom is never completed. Each day its reality must be maintained by those privileged to enjoy it.)

What do you do when the M.D. is stumped?

DEAR DR. GOTT: My brother has relapsing polychondritis. Numerous doctors have indicated nothing can be done to help him. His arms are black and blue, he's losing weight and has no energy. Any suggestions?

DEAR READER: Relapsing polychondritis is a fascinating and unusual disease that is often associated with other autoimmune diseases (such as lupus and rheumatoid arthritis). It causes recurring episodes of inflamed connective tissue (the tissue that holds organs together) and cartilage.

The most common initial complaint is pain, redness and swelling of the ears, often in conjunction with arthritis. The cartilage in the nose may be affected as well. Other organs that are affected include the eye, the larynx, the trachea and bronchial tubes, the arteries, the kidneys and the skin.

During each attack of inflammation (which lasts after a few weeks), more cartilage is destroyed, leading to "saddle nose," floppy ears and visual difficulties.

Even with treatment, patients eventually succumb to collapse of tracheal cartilage, aneurysms (swelling of arteries), heart-valve damage, or a diffuse and malignant form of arterial inflammation (vasculitis).

The pattern of repeated inflammation is characteristic; the diagnosis is confirmed by biopsy of affected tissue.

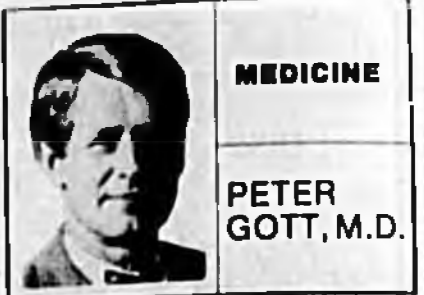
Mild cases are treated with aspirin and similar drugs. More severe disease requires the use of cortisone medicine or therapy, such as cyclophosphamide, to suppress the immune system. Unfortunately, there is no treatment to prevent the fatal consequences of relapsing polychondritis: 30 percent of patients die within five years.

Because this disorder appears related to lupus, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Lupus: The Great Imitator."

DEAR DR. GOTT: Here is a

simple solution for people who suffer rectal spasms. Fold a thin bath towel. Run hot faucet water over the towel until very hot. Wring it out and sit on the towel tucked against the rectum and up the lower back. If the spasm is caught in the early stages, it can be controlled in a very few minutes.

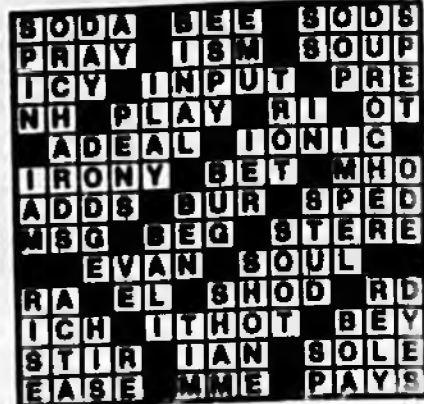

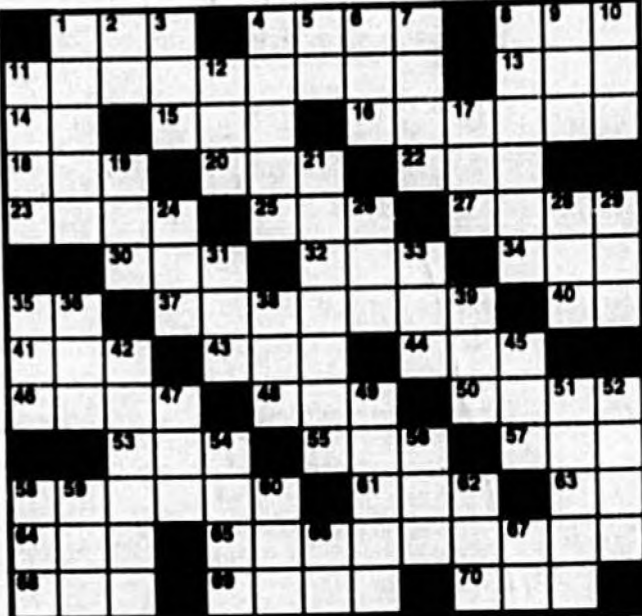

WIN AT BRIDGE

Confucius said that the cautious seldom err. This is certainly true at the bridge table. Those who think things over carefully at trick one will usually do much better than those who just plunge in without proper perception and preparation.

South showed 20-22 points with his opening bid, in the modern style. West naturally led the top of his sequence in clubs.

South won with the queen and exhibited good technique, ducking a diamond immediately. Yet when East won with the jack and continued with another club, South fell from grace. He won and played a diamond to dummy's king. East's discard was a bad shock. However South chose to wriggle, he couldn't come to more than eight tricks.

South started with eight top tricks: one spade, two hearts,

two diamonds and three clubs. Clearly the diamond suit provided the best chance for a ninth trick. But the key point was that South was looking only for a ninth trick, not for a ninth and 10th. After ducking a diamond and winning the club return, South should have ducked another diamond, keeping communication with the dummy and guaranteeing his contract.

Note that the defenders could have done better. East can switch to the spade six at trick three. If South ducks, West wins with the king and then returns the jack. If South wins the first spade with the ace, West unblocks the king. Both lines put the defenders in a position to cash a fatal number of spade tricks, so declarer can't afford to duck a second diamond. But if a pair defends like that against

you, pick easier opponents next time.
