With southpaw Eddie Lopat and righthander Allie Reynolds col-laborating in fine style, the Yan-kees whipped the Indians, 7-1, to increase their American League lead over the Tribe to 2½ games. New York has 11 games left to play and Cleveland 10. Although shut out 40 by the Cin-cimati Reds, the Dodgers were able to retain their three-game National League margin over the runnerup Glants when the third-place St. Louis Cardinals drubbed the New Yorkers, 14-4. The Brooks, Glants and Cards each have 12

Poison Pen Letter Writers

Many an innocent person's life has been wrecked by a lying, anonymous message out of the blue --- a poison penletter. All over the country, according to an article in the October issue of Pageant Magazine, a surprising number of seemingly normal men and women take a gruesome delight in the writing on envenomed, anonymous missives to friends, have become symbols of their neighbors or complete strangers who have somehow caught partles. their attention. Another 250,000, according to Broderick who is a member of the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, are obscene, running the gamut from men's room scribblings to detailed accusations of sex practices of every conceivable kind. Some 30,000 letters a year are mailed by racial, religious and political bigots. They are viciously against Catholics or Jews er Protestants or Masons or Democrats or vivisectionists or the British and occasionally a poison-penner is against all of them simultaneously.

The smallest group of poison-pen notes, according to the Pageant article, are the ones which include physical threats or attempts to extort money. They get the most publicity where the president of Pilot International but actually cause the least anguish, provided the recipient promptly gets in touch with the police and the postal authorities. If the letter includes a threat to kill, it automa-tically becomes an FBI matter; all others are Postal Inspec-tion cases. After handling hundreds of such cases, Brod-Mrs. V. C.
