If any one thing stands out in the bloody struggle be-tween the rebels and loyalists in Spain, if any one thing more than another has been demonstrated by the fierce Civil War which already has developed into a little World War with Spain merely providing the local battlefield, it is the futility of trying to settle political differences, of trying to prove economic philosophies, by means of vio-

After six months of fighting the reliefs have not shown to the satisfaction of anyone who did not already agree with them that they are competent to preside over the political destinies of Spain. Nor have the loyalists proved that the socialistic doctrines and the anti-Christian beliefs which the government has fostered could make a better or a happier country. The issues are still unsolved and will remain unsolved as long as the fighting con-

All that the resort to violence has succeeded in doing is completely laying waste to a large section of a beautiful country, almost totally destroying many fine cities, and utterly demolishing magnificent huildings in many of which were housed priceless collections of paintings, tapestries, and other art treasures, and the wholesale slaughter of countless men, women and children.

This seeme is in decided contrast to the peaceful manner in which nearly fifty million Americans went to the polls last November and re-elected President Roosevelt deciding issues almost as involved and almost as wide as those which are causing all the trouble in Spain. It was the American way, just as people are saying today




