College Professors Seeking For Radium

LUBOCK, Tex., Jan. 14. — College professors recently turned detective to find ten milligrams of radium lost in a sanitarium here.

Dr. E. E. George and two other members of the Texas Technological college faculty located the radium, lost when a nurse let a platinum needle containing the valuable substance slip through her fingers, with electroscopes. The needle was imbedded in lint between the coils of a radiator eight feet from the spot where the object fell.

Leaves of the electroscope, charged with static electricity, collapse rapidly when the instrument approaches a radio-active substance. The needle of radium, less than half an inch long, is valued at \$1,000.

Professor Believes System Develops 'Cream Of Crop'

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 11.—(AP)—American political science's new baby, Nebraska's one-house legislature, will take its first steps Jan. 8 under the personal guidance of Dr. John P. Senning and Godfather George W. Norris.

Forty-three members will meet in the \$10,000,000 state capitol's 100-seat house chamber and use its 83-seat senate hall as a committee room.

Nobody knows what to call them, because the law forgot a title and they have not christened themselves yet. Some want to be known as senators, others representatives, still others merely legislators.

One Nebraska newspaper thinks that by May the state will want to call them home. But Dr. Senning, state university professor, declares the 43 "its" are "the cream of the crop—the higher type."

Party monickers (22 are Democrats, 21 Republicans) mean little because they were elected on a non-partisan ticket.

Georgia, Vermont and Pennsylvania had legislatures a century ago that were one-house except for boards of censors empowered to sit with them and pass on their actions. Those experiments were abandoned.

Nebraska first considered the idea in 1913 but shelved it aside by a tie vote in the 1919-20 constitutional convention.

Senator Norris slumped life into the idea three years ago, and in 1924 all but 75 of 2,929 precincts voted for the necessary constitutional amendment.

Political Pediatrarians Senning recommended there be 43 members, after the amendment provided for between 37 and 67. The former 100 representative voted for 50, the former 33 senators favored 30. Dr. Senning drew maps districting the state for every possible number, then showed house-senate conferees there would be the least "spread" between the city-sprinkled eastern third of the state and the lightly populated western two-thirds if 43 were chosen.

Proponents of the plan contend it will:

- Responsibility more directly on individuals.
- Cut salary and incidental costs.
- Simplify procedure and abolish conference committees.
- Attract better men.
- Opponents deem it:
- A step toward state dictatorship.
- A blow to farmers' representation.
- Un-American because non-partisan.
- Destructive to the system of checks and balances.
- Of the 43 "its" elected after the field of 283 aspirants had been cut to 86 in a primary, 75 have had previous state legislative experience.

Yuma Laying Plans For Speeding Up Marriages

New Justice Moves Residence, Will Burn Lights All Night; Hollywood Fleeing Couples Sought

YUMA, Ariz., Jan. 14. — (AP) — This western Gretna Green is starting the new year with "right now" service for altar-bound Hollywood couples, fleeing California's "gin marriage" law.

Constable Ed Winn, who exchanged his gun for a Bible to succeed Earl A. Freeman as "marrying justice" of the peace, has a head full of plans for speeding up things. His program calls for moving his residence from the old airfield to the middle of Yuma, and burning the lights all night as a guide to couples.

"These folks who want to get married in a hurry and go to the expense of chartering an airplane

to bring them to Arizona aren't going to hunt all over a strange town for a justice of the peace," Winn says.

The easy-going, horse-trading former Texas plans to be ready at all hours. Through years of experience as a peace officer, he has learned to awaken easily and clothe himself quickly — there'll be no long waits on his front porch, he promises.

Some nights Yuma's thriving wedding business brings as many as 20 couples knocking at the doors of the justice.

Freeman, who is retiring after "spiking an estimated 25,000 couples, says a decade of this sort of life has made his hair gray and broken his health.

Recently, these night-time visitors included John Barrymore and Elaine Barrie, who arrived at midnight in a chartered plane. Justice Freeman "had the knot tied in the blink of an eye."

Winn doesn't anticipate much trouble getting used to so many marriages, even though a lot of his customers will be "mighty important people." He has been watching Freeman for four years

and has "picked up a lot of pointers."

He is pleased with his new job, but not excited. His election came about through a "gentleman's agreement." Freeman, deciding not to seek re-election, supported Winn.

Winn says marriages will be conducted "on the same high level." The fee will remain the same, "customarily" \$5. Movie stars usually pay more, but seldom above \$25. On this basis, it is estimated the office has paid Freeman about \$150,000 in marriage fees alone.

Freeman, who plans to practice law and help run his wife's dairy, says he will still be available to any couples he has married, should they need a divorce. But he added that "more than 99 per cent" of his marriages have been successful.

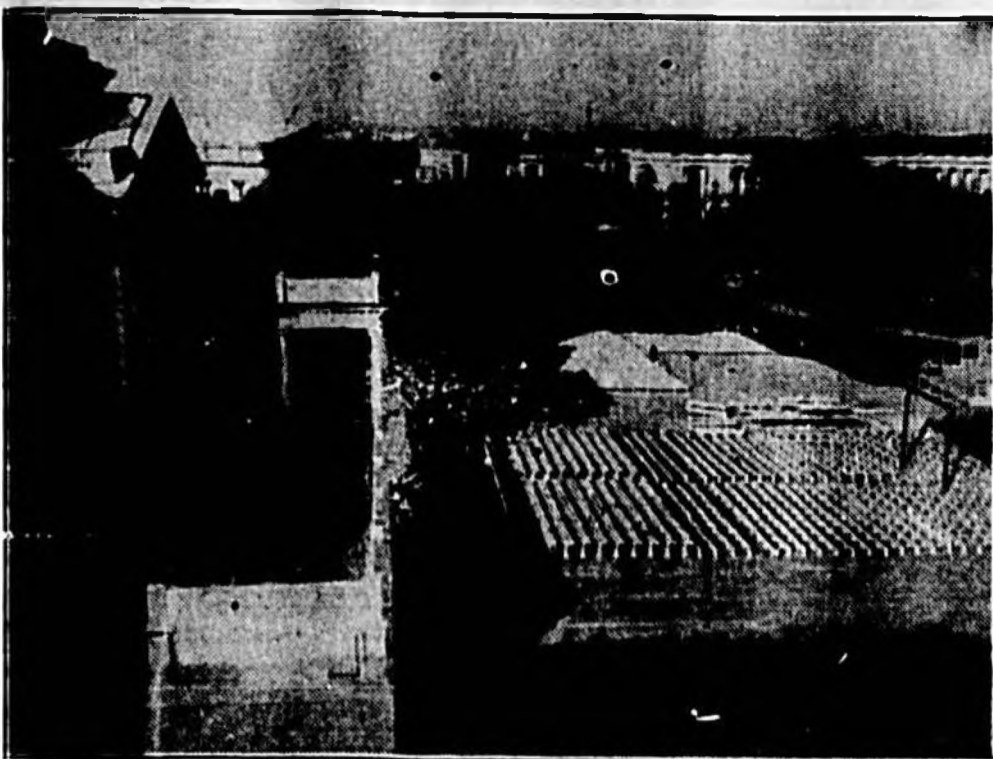
Marriage is a business in Yuma — a mighty good one, the citizens admit. About 6,000 licenses are issued annually — which would average about one to each person in town.

Plea Of Hawaii For Statehood May Get Hearing

Florida Representative Asserts Favor Of Proposal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. — (AP) — The chairman of the House Territories Committee, Representative Robert A. Green, Democrat of Florida, said yesterday he favored a new congressional study of Hawaii's claim to statehood.

He said he approved a proposal of Delegate Samuel W. King that a joint Senate-House committee be sent to the Pacific Island territory to study the claim in "a broad, comprehensive way."

"The people of Hawaii are practically ready for statehood," he said. "The chief obstacle to granting their request for a war in the flag, as I see it, is that the territory is composed of islands and is not contiguous to the rest of the United States."

"Hawaii possesses considerably more wealth and pays more taxes than many of the States. Instead of their present population of just under 400,000, the islands can reasonably care for two or three million people, provided their destiny is properly worked out."

King said he would introduce a resolution calling for a \$10,000 congressional appropriation for expenses of the inquiry, and "anticipated" the Territorial Legislature would add double this sum.

Green said he favored a joint

committee composed of members of the Military, Naval, Territorial and similar committees of both branches of Congress, including Ways and Means and Finance. The group would hold hearings in the islands this summer, under the proposal.

The inquiry would be the second of the kind in less than two years. In the fall of 1935 a House Territories Sub-committee of five, headed by Representative Eugene B. Crow, Democrat of Bedford, Ind., heard statehood champions — and a few opponents — for several weeks.

Two members, including then Representative — now Senator — Ernest Lundeen (F-I, Minn.), voted to report King's statehood bill favorably to the House, but three urged "further study" and the measure was pigeonholed for the session.

Statehood for Puerto Rico, as well as Hawaii, has been proposed in the present Congress, but many Puerto Ricans have urged independence from the United States instead. Hawaii, voluntarily annexed to the United States in 1898 and now a fully organized Federal territory, has had no independence movement.

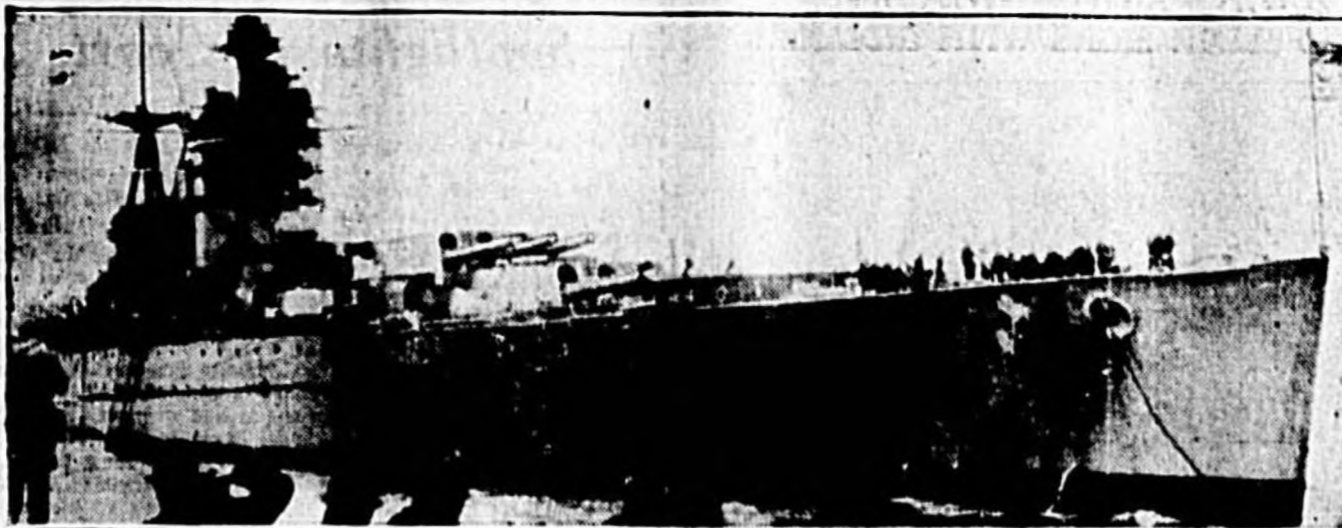

DIZZY DEAN'S KINSMAN SLAIN



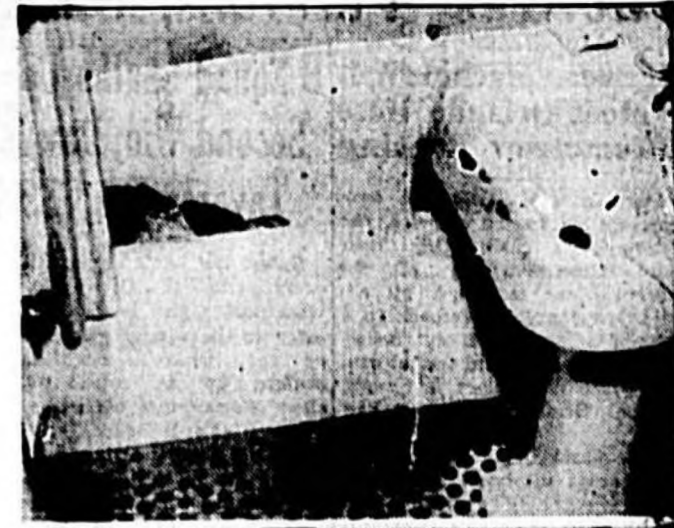
