# EVIL PUT REWARD HERE

**Story Mrs. McPherson's**

**LOS ANGELES, Sept. 29.—(AP)—**Alma Temple McPherson today will witness the introduction of the first detailed documentary evidence in the third investigation of her kidnapping story which opened in Municipal court here today.

While the role of defendant to a charge of criminal conspiracy has been added to that of evangelist, the Angela Temple, pastor watches the accumulation of state evidence, with some apparent apprehension, but refuses to her part in the evening in a buoyant mood to accept encouragement from her followers and in turn ridicule her accusers.

Stenographic records were introduced yesterday in an attempt to prove that the evangelist spent part of the five weeks she was absent from her Temple at Carmel in a cottage leased by Kenneth G. Ormiston, her former radio operator.

The records comprised purported conversations between Howard C. Benedict and Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman Sielaff. Benedict is the owner of the cottage at Carmel where Ormiston spent 10 days with a begoggled woman whom he has designated as "Miss X," and who the state contends was Mrs. McPherson. Mrs. Sielaff is the confessed perpetrator of a hoax to produce a masquerader for the role of Miss X.

Shorthand statements were taken during the two meetings between Benedict and Mrs. Sielaff and during which she had attempted to convince him that she had been the radio man's companion at Carmel. Benedict branded the woman as a "monumental faker" in testifying to his conversations.

After calling numerous witnesses from Carmel, several of whom identified the evangelist as the woman who occupied the cottage, District Attorney Asa Keyes, indicated his intention of introducing documentary evidence today by instructing Milton Carlson, handwriting expert to be prepared to take the witness stand.

Carlson will be called to give expert testimony regarding the handwriting on two grocery slips found in the Carmel cottage. The slips and exhibits of Mrs. McPherson's handwriting contained in her sermon notes picked up on the beach at Ocean Park after her disappearance, will be handed to the expert for comparison.

He will also be asked to identify the handwriting of a telegram received at the Temple from Oakland, several days after Mrs. McPherson disappeared, stating she was safe.

At the request of Mrs. McPherson, several attaches of Angela Temple who have been subpoenaed by the state will be placed on the stand today in order that the work of the Temple staff may not be unduly interrupted. These include Mrs. May Waldron, Temple singer. J. Arthur, assistant pastor of the church and Miss E. A. Schaffer, private secretary to Mrs. McPherson.

As the hearing progresses, the nation-wide search for Ormiston continues with no positive information as to his whereabouts. Several telegrams have been received by Keyes purporting to come from Ormiston.

Yesterday the evangelist's attorney received a letter with the radio man's signature attached. The letter was forwarded through Edward H. S. Martin, Chicago attorney, and stated Ormiston would reveal the identity of "Miss X." Ormiston is named with the evangelist and five others in the conspiracy complaint.

The manager had contemplated a flying trip to the bedside of his mother in Austin, Texas, that would have kept him out of the first two games starting here Saturday. The mother who had watched from an invalid's bed for the past 11 years, the steady march of her son to baseball leadership, died yesterday. Her son was informed of her last wish that he stay with his team. Then he announced he would do as she desired.

A telegram to Mrs. Rogers Hornsby from Austin had much to do with his decision. It was signed "The Folks," and said: "Stay with Rogers. He needs you. All is done here."

The spirits of the Cardinal players, downcast at the news of Mrs. Hornsby's death and the possibility that their leader would be out of the lineup, lightened a little after his decision to stay was made known.

They spent the morning and early afternoon in practice at the Yankee stadium, while Hornsby remained in his hotel room attempting to decide between conflicting calls to duty. The men learned of Mrs. Hornsby's death when they returned from the field and after a silent evening meal, expressed their sympathy to the manager.

Sorrow over the death of Hornsby's mother was also expressed by Miller Huggins, manager of the Yankees; John Heydler, president of the National League and Commissioner Landis.

"Hornsby" Landis said, "will have one of the hardest fights a man ever had to get hold of himself. I am deeply sorry for him."

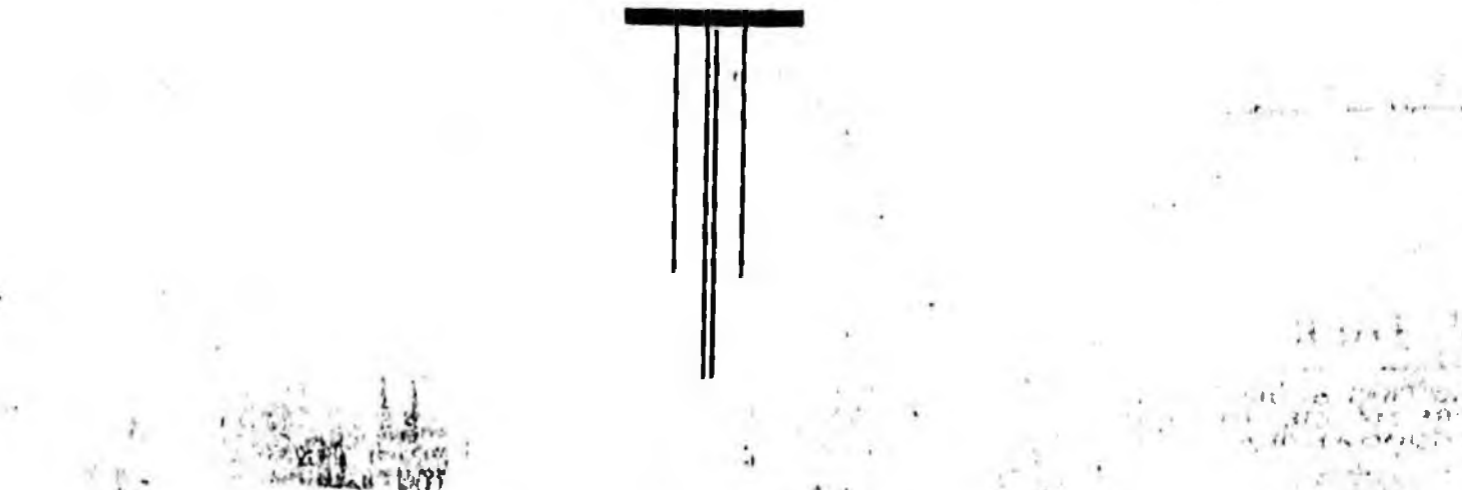
