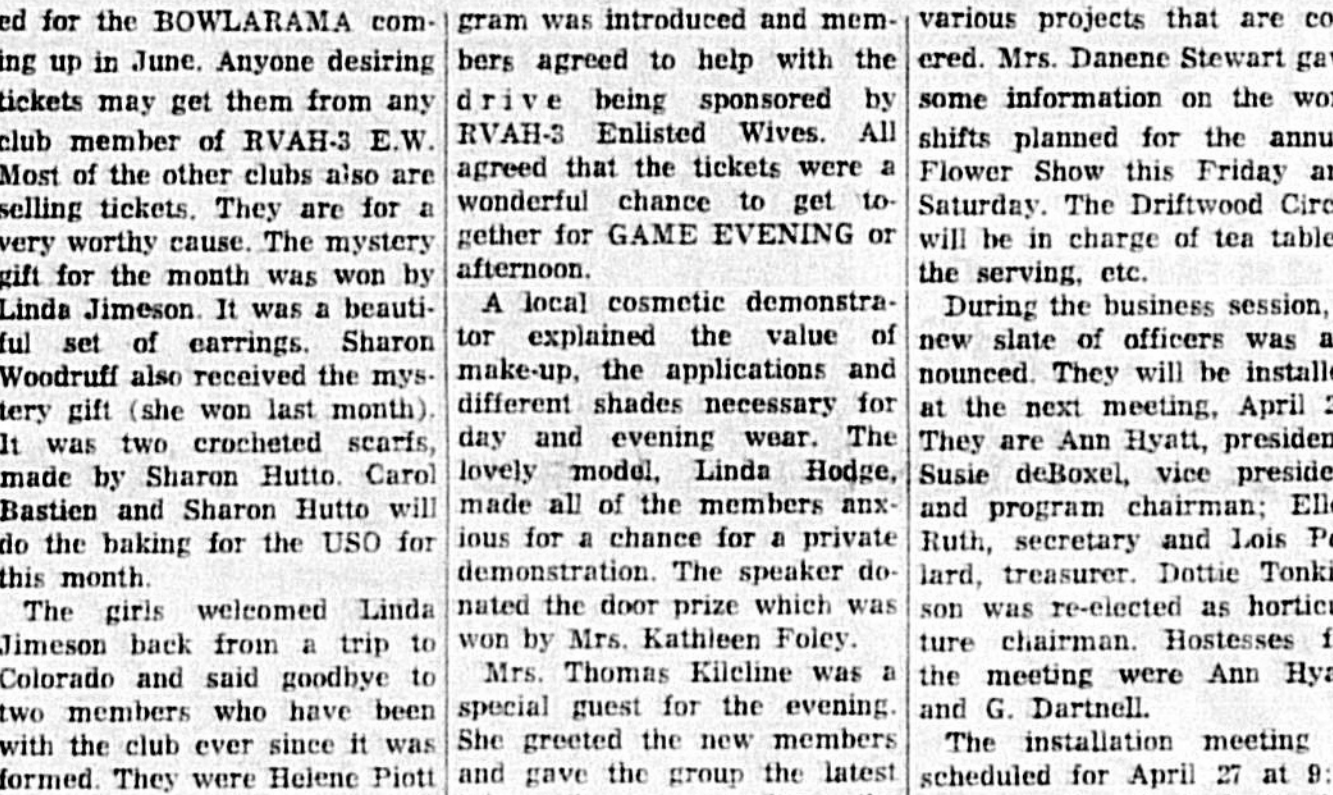

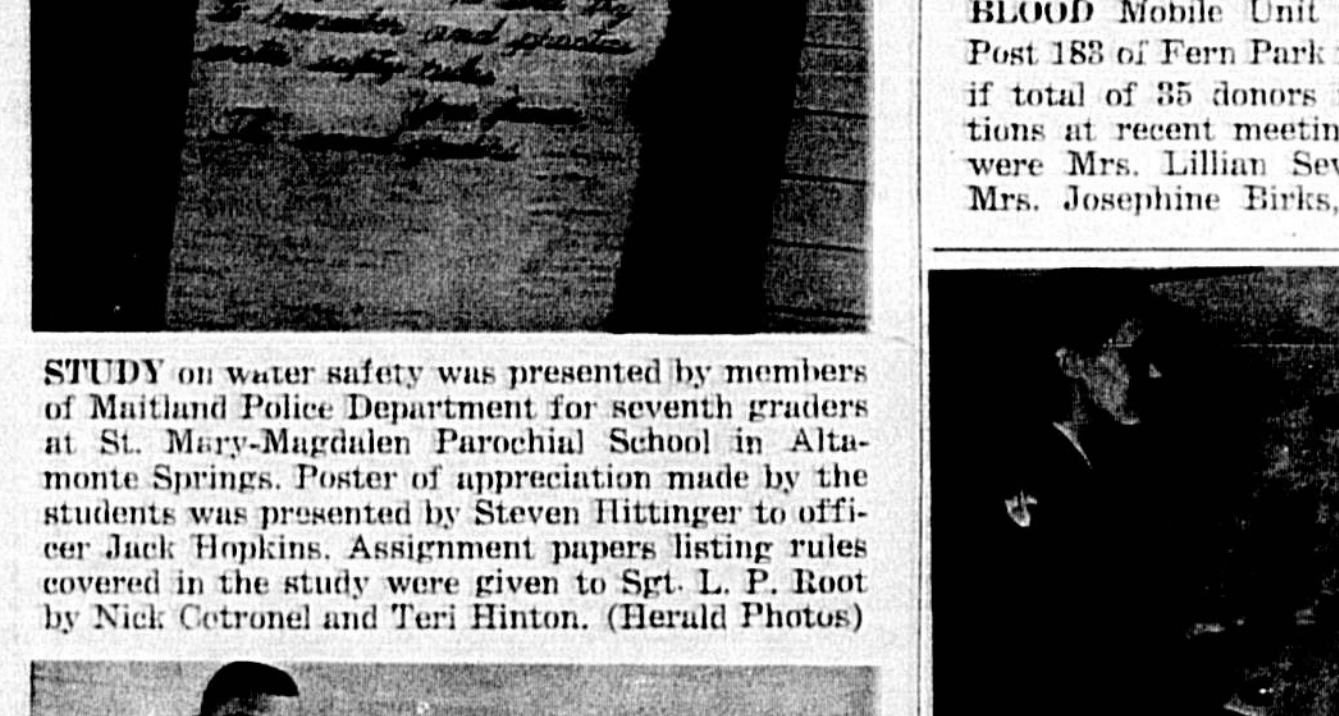

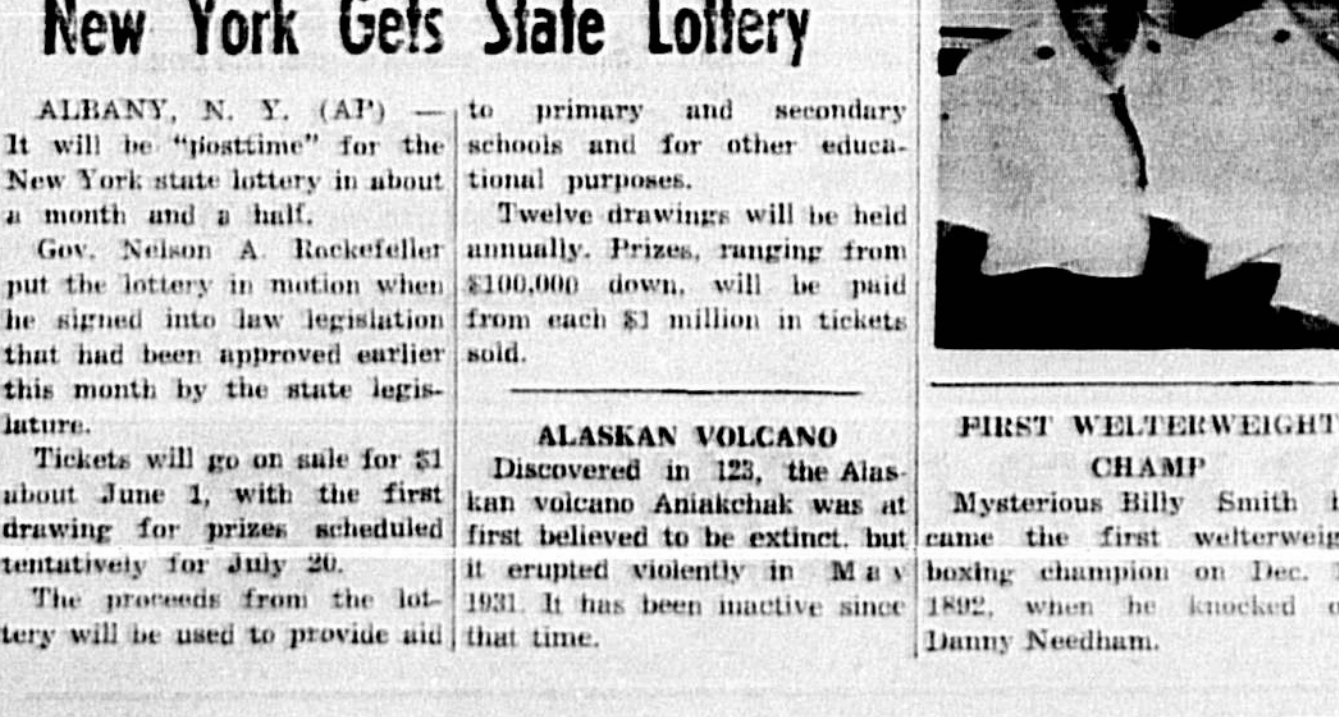

**Field Day Set Friday At Lake Mary School**

Field Day, a day planned for all children to participate in competitive track and field events as part of the total physical education program for the year, will be held Friday at Lake Mary School.

No child is eliminated because of lack of certain physical skills. Every child, regardless of abilities, is entered in events for this day to compete on his grade level.

The result is a fun-packed day with all evening the possibility of winning ribbons — the trophies for this modern day elementary school olympic!

Fourth, fifth and sixth grades compete in such events as high jump, relay sack race, 100 yard jump. This year a new event is on the agenda — the "fire hop scotch." Some fifteen are lined up in a row. The object is then to see who can make it to the end without losing control or getting out of co-ordination hopping in and out of the tires hop scotch fashion! Then a race for speed determines the tire hop scotch blue ribbon winner! Second and third place ribbons also are awarded in each event.

First, second and third grades compete with a few changes depending on the grade. First and second grades compete in 50 yard dash, broad jump, eraser shuttle, tug of war and relays. The first grades have a special pony relay and this year for the first time a torch relay, symbolic of the ancient Greek Olympic race.

The third grades will have a tire relay where the children must cross over tires, a double row of tires, three tires in length.

Kehrle spoke before the club on behalf of Ed Walz, who was unable to be present due to illness.

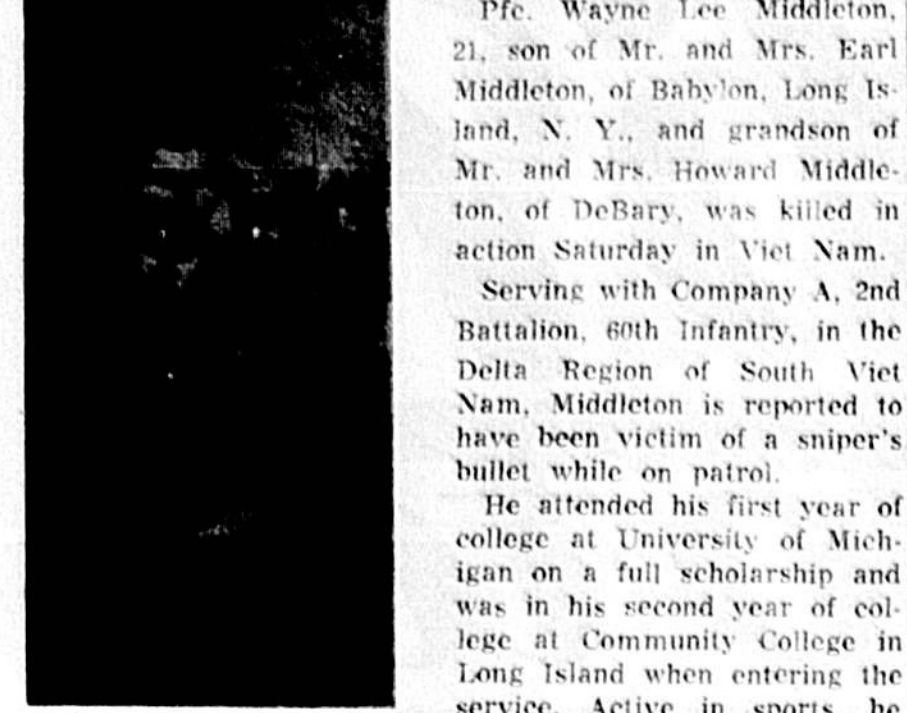

**\$40 Million Bud Plant For Jax**

JACKSONVILLE (AP)—Florida will be the first state with two Anheuser-Busch breweries when a \$40 million plant is constructed in Jacksonville.

The company announced plans for the new facility Tuesday, scheduled to have a capacity of 1.5 million barrels of Budweiser, Michelob and Busch Bavarian, each year and employ 300.

Its Tampa brewery, built in 1966 with a 500,000 barrel capacity and now enlarged to 1.1 million barrels annually, is unable to keep pace with the demands, Anheuser-Busch reported.

The St. Louis based company also has plants at Newark, Los Angeles and Houston and has one under construction at Columbus, Ohio.

In 1966, Anheuser-Busch sold 12.5 million barrels of beer compared to 6.1 million in 1957.

Gov. Claude Kirk, who came to Jacksonville to take part in announcing plans for the new brewery, joked that this left him torn between orange juice and Budweiser.

"When you're out of Bud, you're out of Jacksonville," he added in a takeoff on another beer company's commercial.

The Jacksonville brewery probably will go into construction in mid-summer, said Jackson Freeman, Jacksonville counsel for Anheuser-Busch.

Daytona Beach, unlike many Florida resorts, attracts more visitors in summer than in winter. The city is crowded each summer with sportsman enthusiasts who come to watch automobile speed tests and races on a 2.5-mile sand strip.

**Jungles Seen  
As Answer To  
World Growth**

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Peru's president sees the jungles of South America as one answer to finding more land to meet the hunger of exploding populations. It can be done, President Fernando Belaunde Terry says, by making the most of such things as a new highway skirting the western fringes of the Amazon basin. He considers this a top priority project in what he calls the task of our time — development of the "South American heartland" on the east side of the Andes.

He was bound to push this idea, whenever he got the chance, at the summit meeting of hemispheric chiefs of state week in Punta del Este, Uruguay.

The new road, called the carretera marginal or marginal highway because of its route, will connect with similar highways in Ecuador and Bolivia.

The Andes Mountains, some of their peaks dwarfing anything in North America or Europe, run virtually all the way down South America's west coast. They extend inland about 200 miles, and have been a barrier to commerce and development in the tropical interiors of the three countries.

Belaunde, in a statement to The Associated Press, said the highway will help create on the east side of the Andes "a new environment, rejuvenated by modern medicine, energy and transportation."

"Along the east side of the Andes," Belaunde said, "from Maracabo in Venezuela to San Joaquin in Bolivia, energy, fuel and oil for industrial purposes, refrigeration and desiccation are assured by large water resources, natural gas deposits and oilfields."

"This is the area which will be tapped by the marginal highway."

Peru's 1000-mile link in the highway is scheduled for completion in 1970. The planned cost of \$172 million is being put up by the U.S. Export-Import Bank and the Peruvian government. Peruvian officials say expenditures are constantly rising and the final cost will exceed the original estimate.

While emphasizing the highway, Belaunde finds that air transport should be promoted in underdeveloped areas initially.

Under the philosophy "the airplane before the truck," the Peruvian leader observed: "First, we build an airstrip in the jungle."

"Around the airstrip we create a viable economic base by taking out products by plane and bringing in tools and machines needed for expansion."

"Later, when a road is connected with the airstrip, the trucks will come and everyone will realize new riches."

Belaunde said that tropical regions of the world are "changing from unhealthy areas to places for mental and physical rest and relaxation."

He singled out Miami, Fla., where he once lived. As an example of a "swampy and uninhabitable area at the turn of the century" that was transformed into a garden spot.

This was accomplished, he said, in a climate "not superior to our high South American jungle."

With modern advances in technology and medicine, Belaunde declared, "the phenomenon which occurred in the 'magic city' of Miami can and must be realized in all tropical regions of the world."

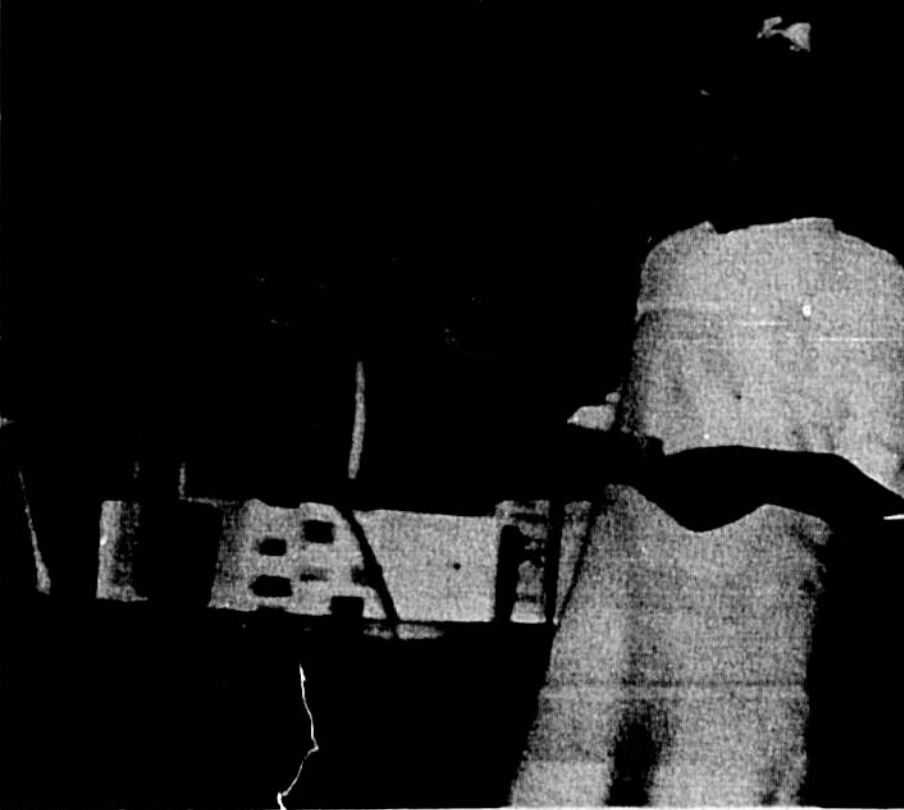

Investigating officers of the Sheriff's department were Deputy James Conrad and Deputy Ronald Vaino.

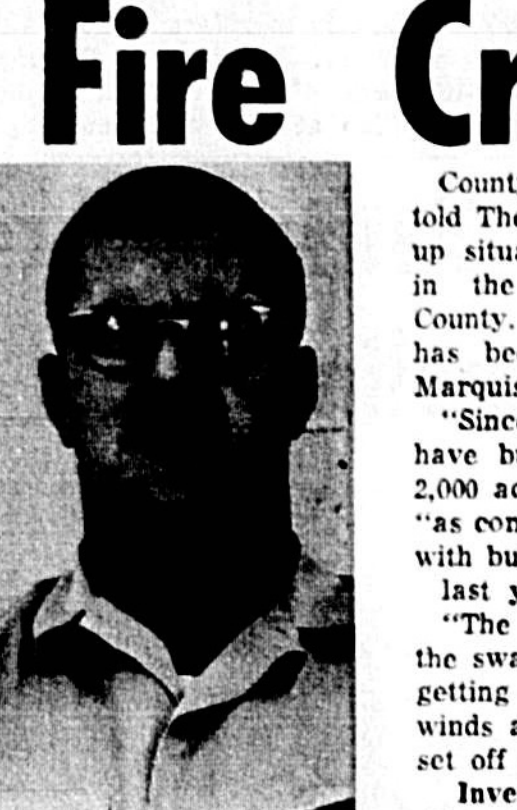
