

Blizzards, Floods Smash Through North

Swirling blizzards and heavy snows have battered families from their homes in parts of West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Kentucky and Virginia in the wake of tornadoes that brought death and destruction to Dixie.

In the West high winds and blizzards closed roads in northern and eastern Wyoming.

The merciless March down-pour and rising flood waters forced many from their homes in West Virginia communities. An unidentified man drowned near Logan when he tried to swim across a flooded road and the body of a teen-ager who drowned was found in the wreckage of a tug boat.

Evacuation continued through the night at Glenville, W.Va., as the Little Kanawha River continued to rise. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at Wheeling, W.Va., said the Ohio River would crest at Wheeling Wednesday morning at 34 feet — two feet below flood stage.

At Weston, W.Va., National Guard units moved families from their threatened homes, while the Red Cross at Clarksville, W.Va., evacuated and housed 70 families by mid-evening.

At Ripley, W.Va., fire department dispatcher Don Brubaker told newsmen: "Our rescue teams were using hip boots, but we had to go to boats when the waters of Mill Creek kept rising."

More than 4 inches of rain fell in 24 hours in West Virginia. The rain-flood waters of the Powell River overflowed into a two-mile strip of Big Stone Gap's residential area in Virginia. Operations to evacuate about 100 families were in effect by the National Guard. The Miss Virginia sewing factory was reported moving out materials and two small business firms in the flooded area also were ready to move.

Flooding forced the evacuation of some homes and blocked roads in low-lying areas along the headwaters of the Ohio River as western Pennsylvania braced for a predicted overnight accumulation of 10 inches or more of snow.

Forecasters said rivers in Pittsburgh would crest at flood stage of 25 feet today and from 5 to 6 feet above flood stage at communities upstream. The snow followed a weekend of steady rain. Two suburban Pittsburgh families fled their homes when the rain and snow loosed a cascade of mud, trees and debris on five homes. No injuries were reported.

Rain drenched eastern Pennsylvania where the downpour started Saturday night. Philadelphia measured 1.45 inches at the International Airport. In the northeastern section of the anthracite belt — the rain changed to snow.

The western end of the Pennsylvania Turnpike and the northeastern extension of the turnpike were snow covered and that brought out the plows and the road-clearing crews. There were no reports of flooding in eastern Pennsylvania.

Heavy snow caused hazardous driving conditions in the mountains in the far western section of Maryland and the Weather Bureau predicted from 6 to 10 inches. The remainder of the state was doused with heavy rain.

The North Branch of the Potomac River crested just short of 17 feet in Cumberland, Md., Monday and flooded some low-lying fields. Small-craft warnings were up on the southern part of Chesapeake Bay.

Heavy snow warnings were in effect for much of upstate New York where as much as 6 inches was forecast in some areas. Temperatures were in the upper 20s and 30s.

Freezing rain and snow laced Ohio and highways were extremely hazardous. The snowfall at Port Columbus Airport measured 4 1/2 inches. The Ohio highway patrol said some roads in several counties in the east and southeast were flooded. A number of schools planned to close.

At Athens, Ohio, dormitories at Ohio University took on water in the basements as the Hocking River rose. That river was due to crest today at Athens at 18 1/2 feet. Flood stage is 17 feet.

Rising streams in the eastern part of Kentucky forced some families from their homes. Seven or more inches of wet snow fell on Louisville, Paducah and Henderson. Harlan, Ky., reported 46 to 50 families forced from their homes on the Cumberland River and its branches. High water and rock slides blocked a half dozen state and federal highways in eastern Kentucky.

Construction of the new 100 room Holiday Inn complex will start within the next 10 days, The Herald learned today.

The Rogers Engineering and Construction Co. of Orlando negotiated a bid for the project at an estimated cost of \$650,000.

An official of the engineering firm told the Herald that test borings on the site will be made today and construction will start not later than the end of next week.

The facility will be two stories, concrete block construction and, is expected to be complete by summer.

At the same time City Manager W. E. Knowles said that sewer lines into the project will get underway within the next two weeks. Water lines into the facility have already been constructed. Discussing the overall project, Knowles said the docks are being built in Jacksonville and would be down here around the first of April.

The dry storage facility construction is expected to get underway by March 15.

Board To Name Schools Architect

An architect for three new proposed schools in the county will be named by the school board at its regular meeting Thursday. Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee reported.

The three schools are Sanford Junior High School, Ovidio and Lyman schools. Last week the state announced that Seminole County would receive some \$1,223,000 from the sale of capital outlay bonds to help finance construction of the three schools.

However, indications are that to complete the three facilities a local bond issue will have to be passed. Estimated construction of the three schools has been set at \$6,000,000.

In other business, the board is expected to award bids for two shop buildings at the junior college site at an estimated cost of \$40,000 and award the bid to modify the heating system at Sanford Junior High School. Estimated cost is expected to exceed \$10,000.

Word has been received here that Pfc. Michael J. Drake, U. S. Army, 17-year-old son of Mrs. Orpha D. Drake of 900 Maple Avenue, was killed in action March 3 while on combat operation in Vietnam.

Drake was a member of Company C, Second Battalion, 503rd Infantry, 17th Airborne Brigade. He was born June 13, 1949, in Peachburg, Miss., and lived in Sanford since January, 1958. He attended Sanford Junior High and Seminole County vocational school. Drake was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survived with his mother, are two brothers, Stanley and William, and two sisters, Lisa and Kerrie, all of Sanford, and his grandparents, Sgt. and Mrs. Paul Keene, Walter Reed Army Hospital, Washington, D. C.

Funeral and burial arrangements will be in charge of Brison Funeral Home on arrival of the body from Vietnam.

County Launches Study On \$3 Million Bond Plan

The County has launched an extensive study into the possibility of floating a \$3 million bond issue to obtain funds to build roads needed now, Commission Chairman John Alexander told The Herald today.

The study to be a complex one may take as long as six months, Alexander said.

The problem facing the county is that after pledged payments on outstanding bond issues each year, only \$380,000 remains to purchase rights of way for state primary roads and to construct and buy rights of way for secondary roads, he explained.

Estimated cost of primary rights of way and secondary construction and rights of way for the program for this year submitted by the Board of County Commissioners to the State Road Department yesterday totaled more than \$5 million.

"We are not going to get into the board on estimated to Seminole County unless we can buy the rights of way for primary roads," Alexander declared. "And we can't buy rights of way for the primary roads or proceed with purchase of rights of way and construction of secondary roads without immediate funds."

If the board decided to proceed with planning for a bond issue the first step would be to have Sam Draper, revenue project director for the State Road Department, supply a computed schedule of pay-offs, and revenues, Alexander informed.

From this schedule the board could determine which projects would be considered in the issue. The district engineer would report to the board on estimates of costs for considered projects.

Complete compliance with the recommendations contained in the report of the state auditor done last year was recommended by John Fitzpatrick, Longwood City auditor, at a meeting with the council finance committee and the mayor Tuesday evening.

"You paid \$3,000 for this jewel and should heed its recommendations," Fitzpatrick said as he pointed to the audit report.

No Road Curbs, Seminole Told

Seminole County road construction by the state during the fiscal year will in no way be curbed under the State Road Department's new policy, Road Commissioner Willard Peebles said today.

Peebles said that county commissioners were advised at a Tuesday meeting to "present more realistic budgets" in the future.

He explained that in the past it has been the policy of the department to adopt a budget of 150 per cent of the funds available, and in some instances more than 150 per cent. He added that this permitted flexibility in accomplishing programs.

Counties now may submit whatever budgets they may desire, Peebles stated, but under the state's new five-year program the department will adopt "realistic" budgets which will permit accomplishment of desired work where counties have the necessary rights-of-way and the funds are available.

Peebles concluded that "this does not mean there will be less construction. It does mean we are taking a more realistic view of submitted county road budgets."

Pleads Guilty To Manslaughter

Mrs. Ludonna Sue Hupp of Route 1, Longwood, pleaded guilty to manslaughter in Circuit Court yesterday and has been remanded to custody. Her bail has been set at \$2,000.

Mrs. Hupp was to have been tried on a charge of second degree murder in the death of her infant son but entered a plea of guilty to the lesser offense of manslaughter. The judge also ordered a presentence investigation.

Pre-sentence investigation by James Lee, probation officer, has been ordered by Circuit Judge Volie Williams Jr. Mrs. Hupp was taken into custody last Nov. 25 following the death of her four-week-old son. Autopsy at that time revealed the child died of a fractured skull. His body also showed bruises and abrasions.

King Winter Grips North

Winter tightened its icy grip on a large part of New England and the upper Mississippi Valley today and gave no sign of spring was less than two weeks away.

Flooding continued in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Kentucky, although some rivers were receding.

There was nine inches of snow on the ground when Gov. Edward T. Breathitt visited Providence, Ky., Tuesday, but the people still wanted to know what the state was going to do about salt marsh mosquitoes, the cause of a long standing complaint in that area.

In some parts of New England there were 20 inches of snow on the ground when Tuesday's storm. After the storm blew out to sea temperatures plunged into the 20s.

Some snowplow operators in Maine found themselves unopposed because they plowed in driveways of residents. Melvin Roast of Portland, Maine, said one man drove a plow into the cabin of his plow and he had dumped a pile of snow in the man's driveway. Edward Jordan of Scarborough said another man — similarly outraged — charged his plow with a shovel and started beating the blade of the plow.

In Massachusetts Robert E. Carlsen, 29, an employee of the Port Authority was drowned when he fell into the water while in the cabin of a snow melting machine at Logan Airport.

Temperatures near the zero mark around dawn in northern New York. Tuesday's snow up to 15 inches in the Catskills — blocked some rural roads in eastern counties but main highways were open. Some trucks were stalled.

Winter hung on over most of Pennsylvania but loosened its grip somewhat on the Philadelphia area. Up to 15 inches of snow fell over western and central Pennsylvania, Tuesday. More than 3 inches of rain fell on the southeastern section of the state since Saturday.

At Fort Washington, Pa., on the Pennsylvania Turnpike, passengers on a stranded bus climbed onto the bucket of a front-end loader which was brought to the rescue after a lake flooded on the highway.

Flooding was reported all over Pennsylvania. The Schuylkill River poured over its banks and flooded parts of the East River and West River in Philadelphia. The Dymally Belle, an excursion steamer, was torn from her moorings in Norristown and swept over the Norristown dam. Twenty-five homes in Middle Township in Bucks County, Pa., were evacuated because of the high waters of Nesquehony Creek.

The Cooper River in Camden, N.J., overflowed its banks and closed South Park Drive. At

most all other creeks and streams flowed out of their banks and brought discomfort to persons living nearby. However, the Delaware River — the area's largest — was expected to crest below flood stage.

An army of volunteers went to work in eastern Kentucky Tuesday to clear debris from a flood that lost most of its punch. About 100 families were evacuated before the swollen Cumberland and Kentucky rivers and the Lewis Fork of the Big Sandy River returned to their banks.

Heavy snow posed flood dangers Tuesday night for eastern and central and southern Ohio counties and authorities planned evacuations as rivers rose in the area. Many schools were closed and scores of roads were blocked by swollen streams.

The swollen Monongahela River receded today south of Pittsburgh as scores of families spent the night on cots in public buildings and churches converted into emergency shelters.

Payson City, Belle Vernon, Monongahela and Charleroi along the river. Further north in Pittsburgh and the Allegheny Mountains region up to 15 inches of snow fell. At least five persons died of heart attacks while shoveling snow.

Schools were closed throughout the Pittsburgh area.

Activities at Greater Pittsburgh Airport were reduced because crews could keep only one runway open. Some trees and utility wires were down.

Guerrillas Hit Twice; Six GIs Die, 25 Hurt

SAIGON (AP) — Communist guerrillas made two attacks on U.S. forces in the Mekong Delta before dawn today, killing six Americans and wounding 25. One other American was missing.

A 15-month mortar barrage of 80 rounds hit the first major American base established in the delta about 2 a.m. catching most of the soldiers asleep. The barrage killed two and wounded 23 at the 8th Infantry Division's Dong Tam camp some 40 miles south of Saigon.

It was the first shelling of the camp since 8th Division Infantry troops moved into it in late January. The camp is about one mile square, on ground dropped from the Mekong River, and is surrounded by paddy land largely controlled by the Viet Cong at night.

Another 9th Division post was hit by mortars and small arms fire for two hours later at Rach Kien, about a dozen miles from Saigon. The U.S. soldiers and two platoons of about 60 South Vietnamese soldiers were on outpost duty and were badly wounded in the two-hour battle.

A U.S. spokesman said the Americans had four dead, two wounded and one missing. A Vietnamese spokesman said the two South Vietnamese platoons suffered "heavy casualties."

The Viet Cong faded into the darkness when reinforcements came up, and their losses were not known. But their force was raked by artillery fire and gunship helicopters.

A U.S. naval task force operating off the North Vietnamese coast had one of their busiest days Tuesday since they started shelling coastal targets in the north on Feb. 26.

The U.S. Command said the cruiser Canberra and the destroyers Lamson and Ingraham bombarded 17 targets some 40 miles south of the port of Vinh. The warships were credited with destroying a coastal battery and a river port facility and with setting off a large secondary explosion indicating hits on munitions or fuel.

The targets included river port facilities, supply dumps, ammunition storage areas and transportation points. The headquarters of the Communist Party in Hon En Island, 41 miles south of Vinh, was also damaged. The ship which allegedly destroyed the target was damaged a nearby radar station.

A 31-foot U. S. river patrol boat was cut in two by the 12-300-ton British tanker Denby Grant at 1 a.m. today on a Mekong Delta waterway. The four American sailors swam to safety.

Man & Ex-Wife Die In Shootout At Pensacola

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — First came the boom, a pin pierced mannequin.

It arrived in a package which police opened because George Ash's estranged wife thought it might be a bomb.

"Next the 42-year-old Ash himself came back from California — to find his former wife, 30-year-old Roselyn, divorced and remarried.

Embarras county officers said Ash rented a car at Mobile, Ala., drove here Tuesday and fired five pistol shots into the lock of his ex-wife's trailer home. She returned the fire with a volley through the door. Ash ducked, reloading and charged again.

Deputies found the woman's body in a bathtub with four bullet wounds in the head and one in the shoulder. Her pistol was found beneath her.

Ash lay on the parlor floor with two bullets in his chest. Officers said he feebly pointed his gun at them but they stepped on his gun hand and found the weapon empty. Ash was dead on arrival at a hospital.

Medical Examiner Aldrich Northrup said Ash killed both his ex-wife and himself.

Roselyn's second husband, Nick Perling, was at work when the couple exchanged a total of 23 shots.

Officers recalled the gunshot toll that turned out to be not death, but a portent, four months ago.

It was an ordinary foot-long child's doll — but its forehead, arms and legs had been marked and a straight put the thrust through the body area corresponding to the location of the human body.

Officers asked Ash about the doll on a brief trip he made here but he said he had not brought it in San Diego, California, where he was living, and had it "thefted" in Mexico before sending it to his estranged wife.

Hotel Fire In Germany Brings Back Memories

KRONBERG, Germany (AP) — Fire raged today through a luxury hotel that once was the Tannus Palace of the dowager Empress Victoria of Germany and the scene of a sensational jewel theft after World War II.

Firesmen had to rescue 25 occupants by ladder from the upper floors but several cases of smoke inhalation were the only casualties reported.

The blaze took more than six hours to extinguish and cost \$225,000. When a fortune in gems belonging to the princely House of Hesse was stolen from the basement of the castle in 1946, it was serving temporarily as an American club. Jack W. Durant, a U. S. Army colonel, and the WAC wife, Capt. Kathleen Nash Durant, were convicted of the theft and sentenced to prison terms of 14 and five years, respectively.

"Kronberg Castle" was used as a rest retreat for American Army officers at the close of World War II, just outside of Frankfurt.

Fred Van Pelt, Sanford Herald managing editor, then was assigned to the German edition of the American newspaper, Stars and Stripes, and spent a number of weekends at the beautiful old castle. In fact, he slept in Empress Victoria's gem case, and "borrowed" a book of John Donne's poetry from her extensive library.

During his stays there, Van Pelt became acquainted with WAC Capt. Kathleen Nash before her marriage to Col. Jack W. Durant.

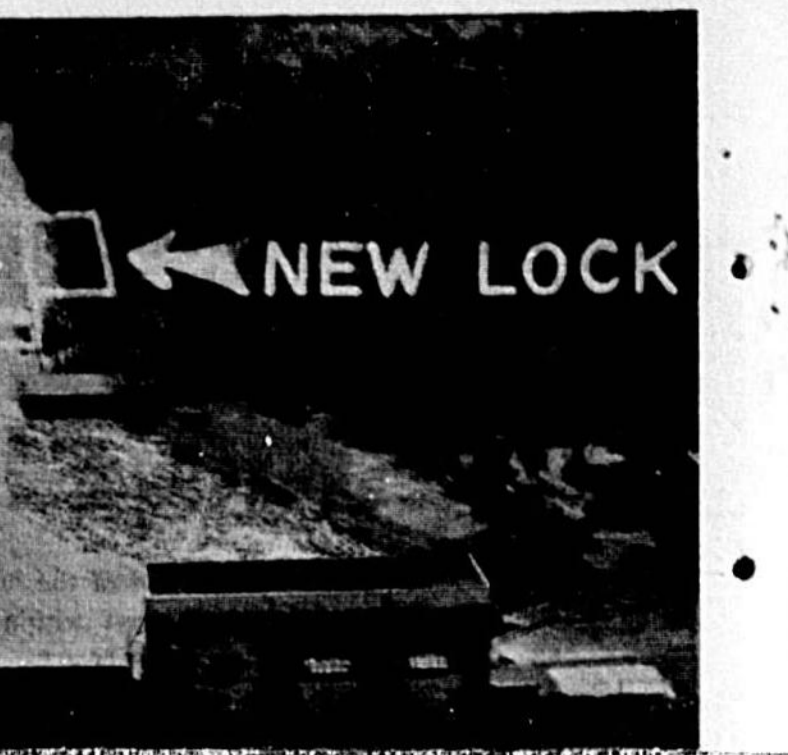

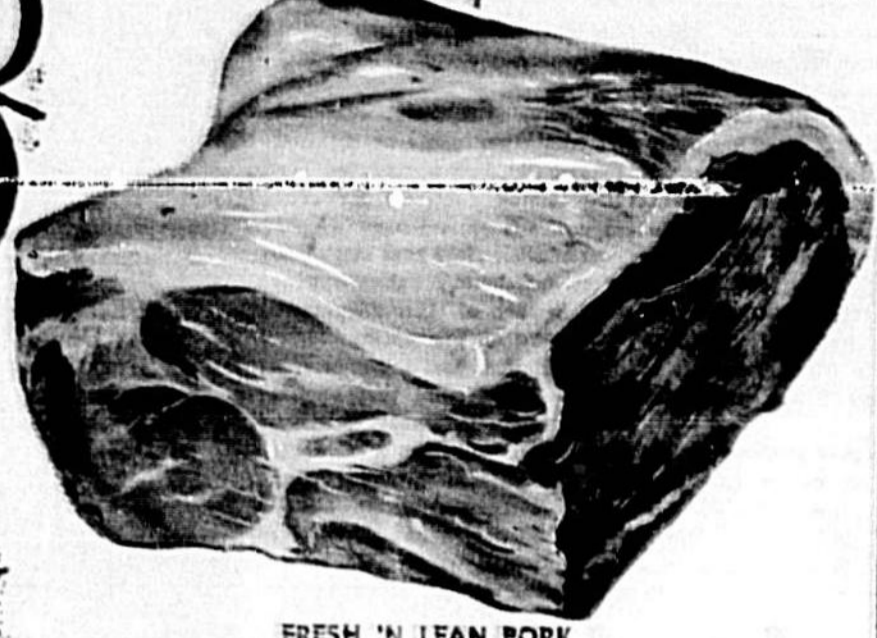

Street Repair Needs Studied At Casselberry

Casselberry City Council in continued session directed the Road Board Chairman James Birkenmeier to measure the length and width of city streets in need of repair and submit a priority list at next Monday's regular council session.

Council is considering contracting for the application of a slurry-coat (oil, water and cement) at 18 cents a square yard to preserve the streets in need of repair. The process was recommended by B. C. Conklin, consulting engineer, over sand and seal which he describes as being next to worthless, even on a temporary basis.

Among streets mentioned as in need of repair at present were Lotus Lake Lane, Wilshire Boulevard, Hibiscus Road, Sunnyside Road and the 400 block on South Triplet. Amount included in the budget for the repair of streets is \$3,250.

Raymond Morris, resident of Sunnyside Road, complained that since the city leases the ballpark to the Little League, the street is the most heavily traveled in the city during baseball season. He suggested that the city direct its attention to repairing it. The street originally was built completely at the homeowners' expense, he pointed out.

Fiddling With Fiddler Crabs Rewards Youth

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hours of research with fiddler crabs was a Jacksonville (Fla.) boy the \$7,500 top award in the annual Westinghouse science-talent competition for high school students.

Award of the scholarship to Nevin H. Summers Jr., 17, was announced last night. The contest had more than 25,000 original entrants.

Summers, a student at Jacksonville Terry Parker High School, reported on his study of the processes involved in the hardening of the shells of fiddler crabs.

He wanted to see whether an enzyme he found in the crustacean's blood contributed to the hardening, and found that it definitely was involved, Summers said.

Cable Must Be in Good Repair
CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (UPI) — Visitors to Cape Kennedy frequently see an old freighter berthed at Port Canaveral. The ship does not carry ordinary cargo. Her holds contain huge coils of cable and tools to repair or replace sections of a 1,800-mile communications lifeline. Stretched between the cape and Antigua, West Indies, the cable lies on the ocean floor. It links several downrange stations with the cape's nerve center. The 188-foot ship, operated by Pan American as prime contractor on the Eastern Test Range, is skippered by Capt. J. B. Fitzpatrick. He has navigated the maze of islands, cays and treacherous reefs along the cable route through the Bahamas and Calcasieu Islands for the past seven years.

Citrus Industry Building 'Cautious Optimism'

MIAMI (AP) — Florida's citrus industry may be up to its groves in problems, but the average housewife isn't complaining. She's getting a free can of juice every time she makes a \$1 purchase.

The current price drop is a result of Florida's biggest orange crop in history. Growers are moving into the final months of a harvest which is expected to yield 142 million boxes of oranges — almost 42 million more than last year.

Although people within the industry have been gravely concerned over this glut, an air of cautious optimism has been rippling through citrus ranks since late February.

It hinges on recent lunch purchases, record concentrate sales and steady prices nudging the 20-year average.

School lunch purchases already total 4.3 million gallons — the equivalent of 3.3 million boxes — and the industry hopes the total will be 10 million boxes.

Sales of concentrate so far this year have maintained a high level, well above two million gallons in a week. And sales normally rise in spring months.

Citricultivist Fred P. Lawrence of the Florida Agricultural Extension Service says, "Prices are strengthening. I don't think there will be any further break. We're moving fruit very steadily and selling at a higher rate than ever before."

But he adds that current prices are "hardly the best of production to the grower. Nobody's making very much."

The current situation — unex-

pected until the federal crop estimate descended like a cloud last summer — has caused growers to exert pressure for several developments.

Some of them: Conversion to the "one-third more" standard; concentrate can; centralized marketing plans; more by-product; a break into secondary domestic and European markets; control of new plantings; regulation of market supplies and sell, sell, sell.

A popular grower refrain currently goes, "we're not over-supplied, we're underold."

They point to studies that indicate 70 per cent of the nation's families purchase no orange concentrate, 61 per cent buy no fresh citrus, and per capita consumption of citrus has actually dropped in the last 20 years.

citrus official recently put it. Regardless of the success the industry may or may not have this season, its mixed blessings extend far into the future: A 300-million box crop is anticipated for 1970 and a 340-million box crop by 1975.

The Florida Citrus Commission is spending \$10 million on advertising this season, which is expected to help keep concentrate sales up. But the national advertising's effectiveness has been questioned in the face of spotty distribution of the product.

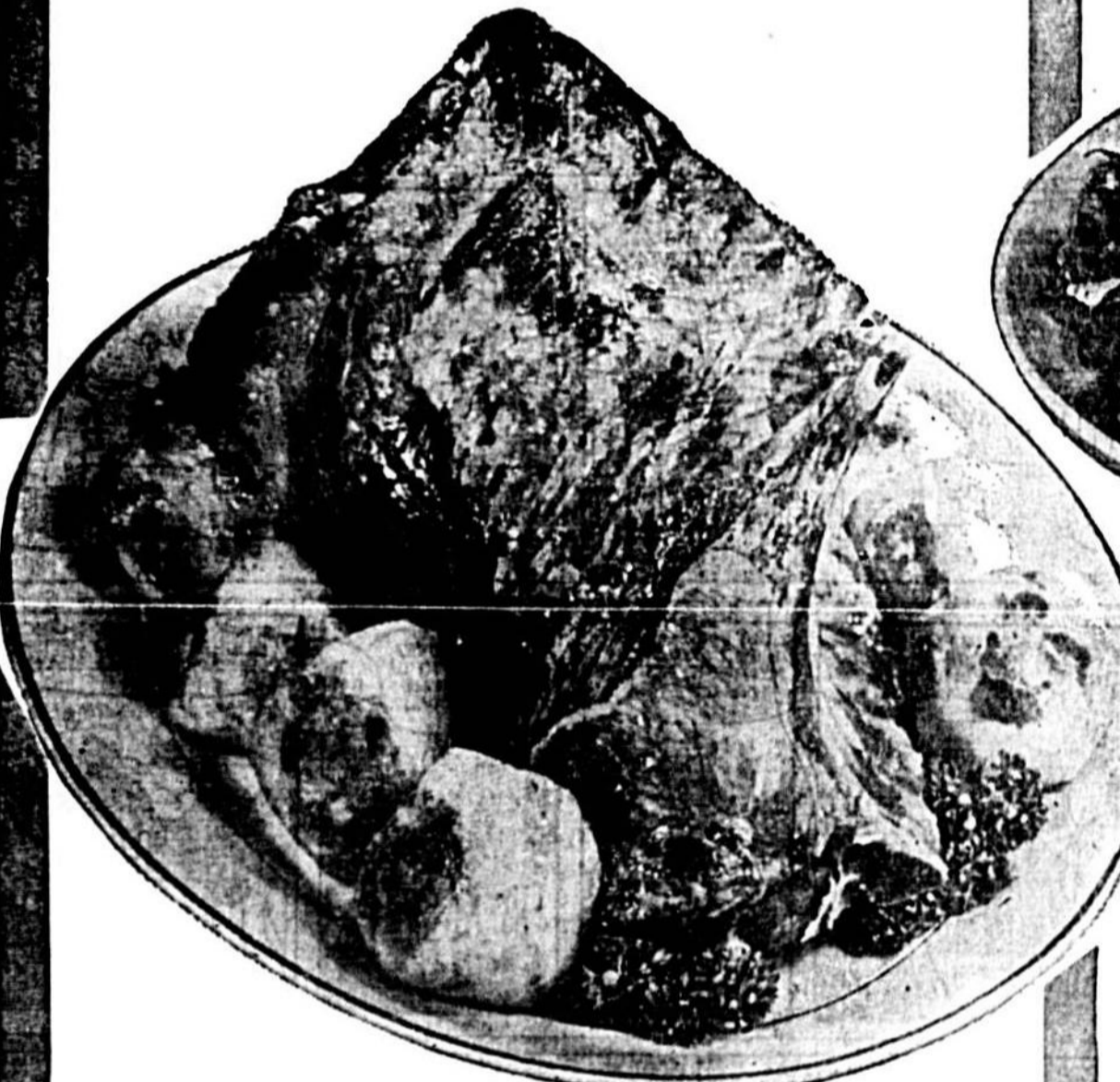

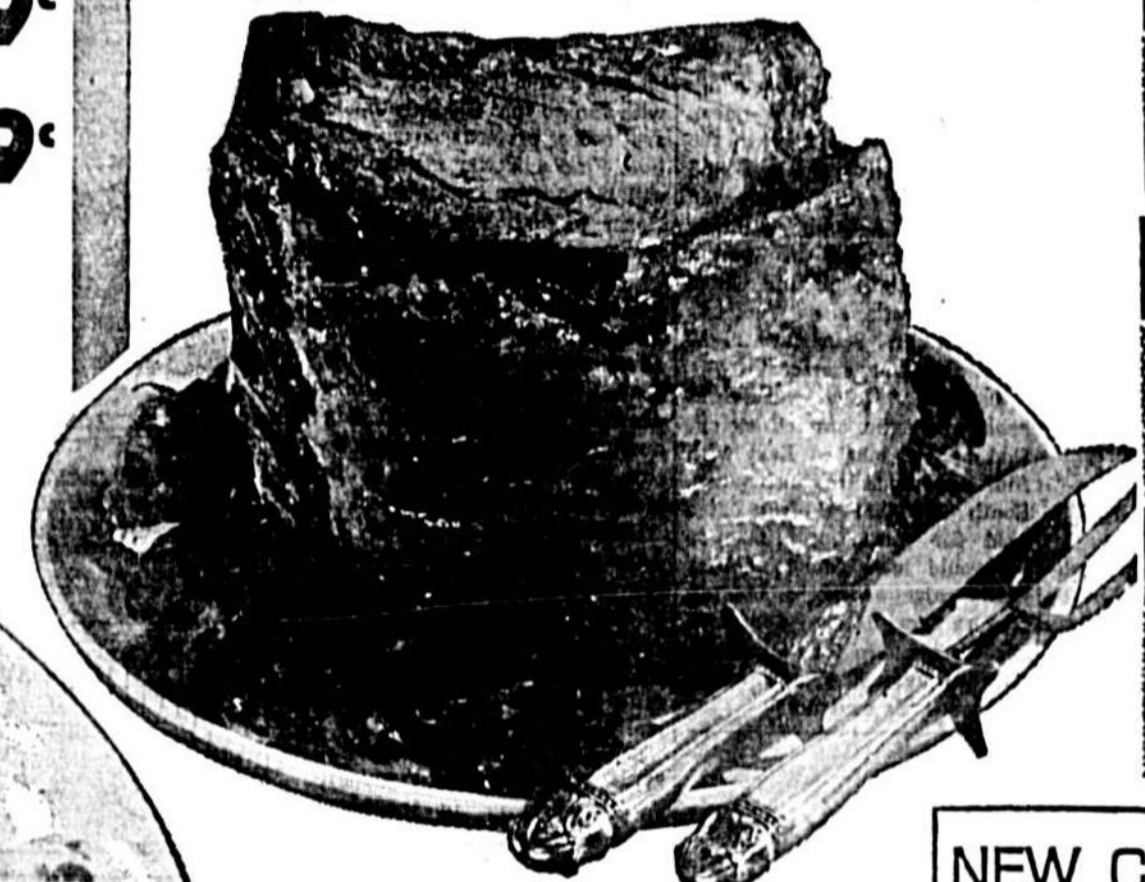

Hint Governor May Join Investigation

Opens Probe Of Humane Society Books

Under the cloud of a rumor that Gov. Claude Kirk is considering investigating the activities of the Seminole County Humane Society, the County Commission today laboriously questioned the president and executive director of the society and examined its records.

At the beginning of the two hour plus meeting, report was given by Kenneth McIntosh, county prosecutor, on progress of the investigation which is being conducted by his office into the society.

McIntosh reported "cursory" examination had been made by him of all corporate records, financial documents, adoption forms and other records. He further stated no information as yet received shows any "misconduct" by any individual.

Investigation by the prosecutor, however, is continuing. McIntosh remarked he is "examining every record I can get my hands on."

Attorney C. Vernon Mize represented Bonner Carter, president, and Paul Jenkins, executive director, at the meeting.

Mize informed Carter had been elected president at a general meeting of the membership in the past year and has only five directors despite the fact 15 are called for in the charter.

"Fees ranging from \$1 to \$15, depending on the quality of the animal, are charged to persons adopting dogs and cats," Jenkins answered to a question. He denied fees are demanded of persons bringing an animal to the shelter of the society, but admitted "we do solicit donations from them."

While Jenkins insisted such a donation would have nothing to do with whether a dog was accepted at the shelter he stated, "We just do not have enough money—some people bring dogs

in when we are overfull."

Jenkins remarked the society has four paid employees, including himself. "I think we have done a wonderful job," he said.

It was admitted by both Jenkins and Carter records have been kept in a rather "loose" manner, but this situation is being remedied by the new secretary-treasurer.
