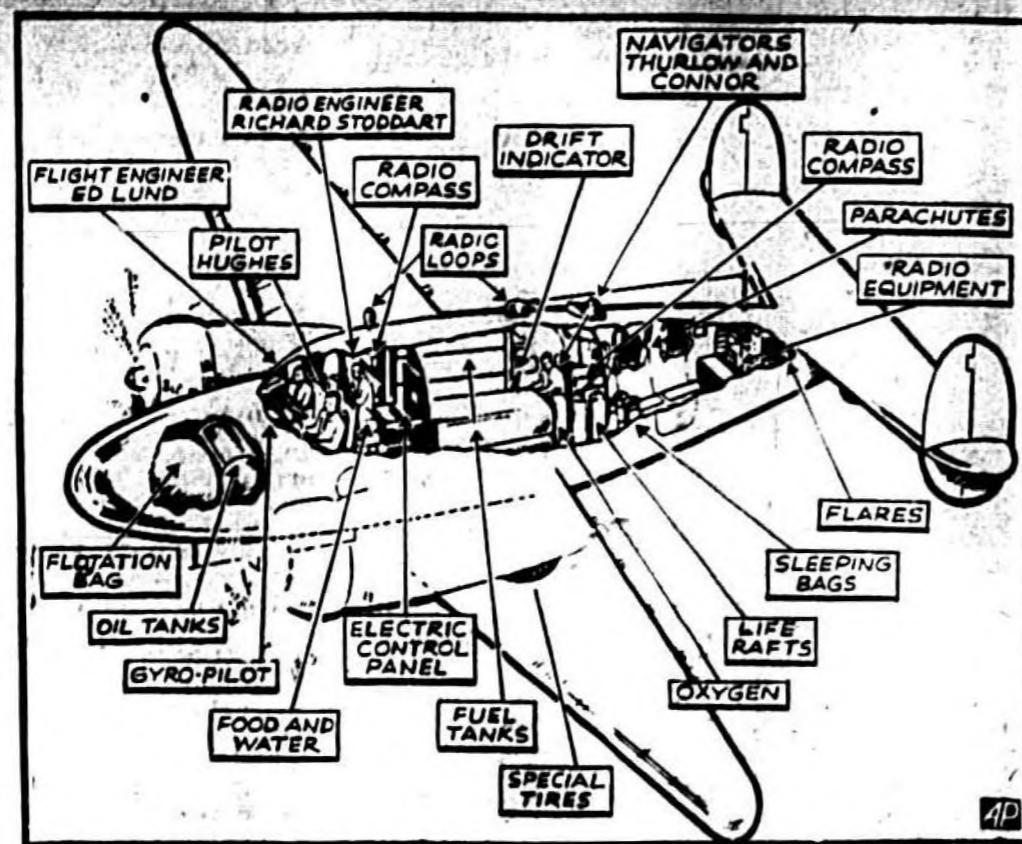


Jaycees Sponsor Auto Races At New Smyrna Beach

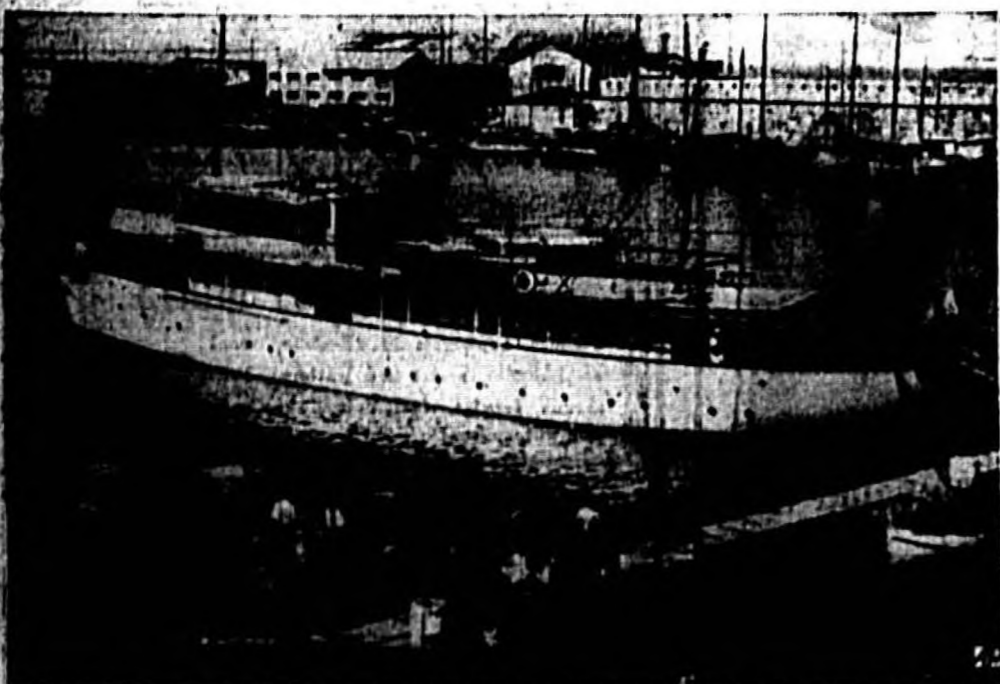

Plants Used Gold Miners For Transportation

Plenty of gold lies hidden in the mountain fastnesses of the South American Andes but only recently has it been possible for intrepid prospectors to get the precious metal out in paying quantities.

No roads, of course, exist, between the Peruvian valleys where all transportation is available, and the inaccessible gold mines, high in the Andes, so that the cost of getting mining machinery into the mines or of getting the ore out has been until recently prohibitive.

It was not until Hugh I. Wells, well-known American pilot, landed one of his four huge Curtiss Condors, transformed from bombing planes to commercial airliners, on the gravelly beach of Lake Titicaca, 12,500 metres above sea-level, with three and a half tons of mining machinery, that the rich Andean gold deposits were opened up.

Today, sky-trucking from Trujillo to Lake Titicaca has become a daily achievement and already more than 1,000 tons of mining machinery have been landed high in the Andes, in spite of up-drafts and down-drafts, tall-winds and rain squalls.

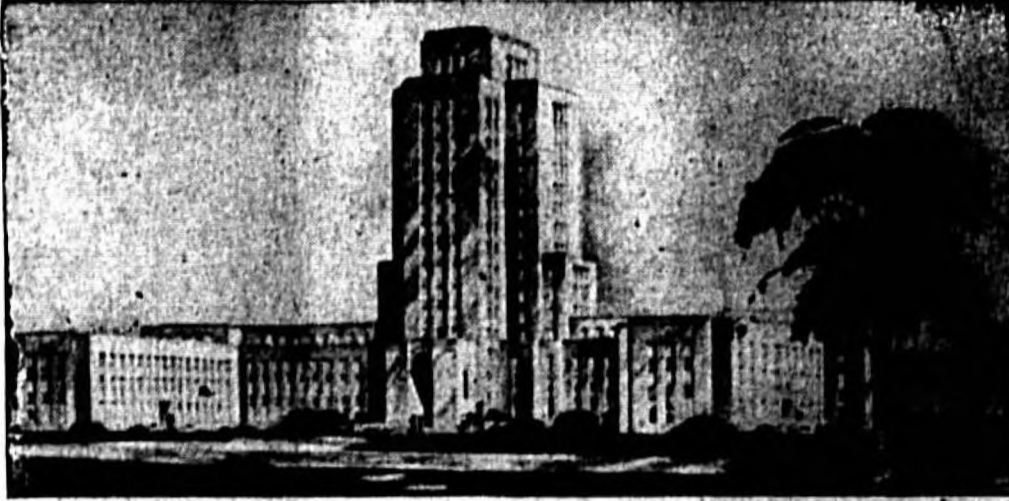
The doors have been cut in the heavy cabins of the huge Condors and heavy machine parts are now transported, at \$85 a ton. The planes are equipped with oxygen for the pilots rise to 15,000 feet over the Cordilleras and make the trip, that formerly took almost a week, in an hour and 10 minutes. The biggest single day was when 22 tons of machinery and supplies were flown into Lake Titicaca from Trujillo.

Because the failure, while landing at high speed, in such a thin air, with a full load of mining machinery, would be disastrous, officials of the Condor Peruana de Aviacion, operating the line, insist on maximum safety in every part of the General airplane throes with which all their ships are provided.

Thus far, officials of the Condor Peruana de Aviacion say, the Condors have withstood tests far in excess of the stress for which they were originally designed.
