

## Commission split on sales tax spending

**SANFORD** — The first salvo of dissension over a sales tax referendum was fired during this week's Seminole Board of County Commissioners meeting.

By a 3-2 vote, commissioners agreed to stick to an original agreement between the county and seven Seminole County municipalities to fund only transportation and education projects if the measure is approved by voters this fall.

The vote effectively ended consideration of rolling funding for the county's

\$44 million Courthouse Expansion and Renovation costs into the referendum, and ended debate over whether the county should use about 20 percent of funds generated by the tax to improve and maintain state roads within Seminole County.

Voters approved a penny sales tax ref-

erendum in 1991 and it expires next year. Commissioners have scheduled a Sept. 4 referendum to ask if voters want the tax extended for another 10 years. If approved, the 1-cent sales tax is projected to generate \$534 million over the next 10 years.

In preliminary discussions about set-

ting the referendum, the county had agreed to share the revenue with the seven municipalities and the Seminole County School Board. The School Board would receive 25 percent of those funds for classroom construction and renovation, another 37.5 percent would go to countywide road projects with the remaining 37.5 percent divided among the County's seven cities for transportation projects.

Two weeks ago the Board voted 4-1 to earmark slightly more than \$100 million

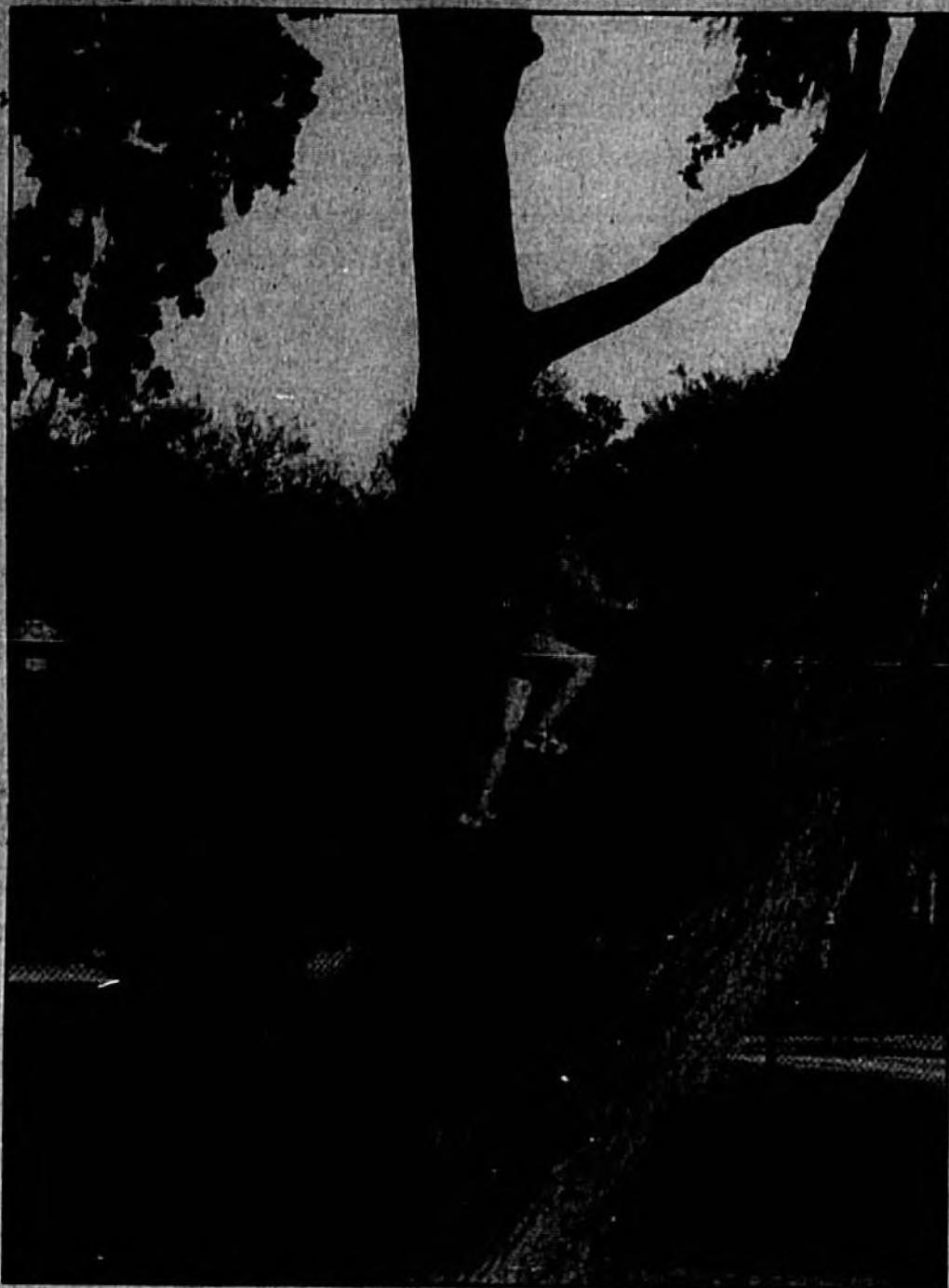

## Sanford airport celebrates grand opening Friday

**SANFORD** — The Orlando Sanford International Airport is ready to raise the curtain on its 13-month, \$27 million terminal expansion.

Airport officials are inviting the public to a scheduled grand opening ceremony beginning at 11 a.m. on March 23. In addition to showcasing the new terminal complex, a number of other grand opening festivities will take place, including food tasting from destinations serviced from the airport, commemorative gifts for those in attendance, tours of aircraft, and an opportunity for members of the public to win "Trips for Two" courtesy of Pan American Airways.

Since the terminal expansion began in January 2000, a two-story facility of more than 120,000 square feet has been added, increasing the airport's capacity to handle three million passengers a year and service up to seven aircraft at its new gates. The terminal complex now includes 12 gates, accommodates international overflow traffic and is now equipped to handle current and future domestic route expansion.

"The completion of this facility celebrates the accomplishments of our Public/Private Partnership here at the airport. We believe the facility will impress our airline customers and the traveling public," said Larry Gouldthorpe, president of

## Museum solves family puzzle

**SANFORD** — It appears many Seminole residents like a good mystery.

When Museum of Seminole County Specialist Karen Jacobs announced less

than two weeks ago she needed help solving a trans-Atlantic puzzle, she didn't know what kind of response she would receive.

Now, a native of Cheshire, England, has many of the answers she was looking for about her American ancestors.

Irene Fitzpatrick of Cheshire contacted the Seminole museum after discovering several old

photographs with Sanford ties. However, she couldn't identify the people or the houses in the photographs, so she began corresponding with Jacobs.

The museum specialist decided to begin the search by identifying the two early 20th

**SANFORD** — A familiar face has returned to the city's recreation department.

## Police seek leads on 'phantom' vehicle

**SANFORD** — Sanford police and family members of the Erick Vielman family are seeking public input in efforts to locate a "phantom" vehicle involved in an I-4 auto accident March 7 that sent Vielman to the Orlando Regional Medical Center with serious injuries.

Vielman died Thursday, March 15 as a result of pelvic and leg injuries.

According to investigators the

accident, involving two automobiles and the motorcycle

Vielman was riding, took place on I-4 at about 7:42 p.m. on March 7 approximately one mile from the SK-46 exit. From what investigators have been able to piece together a large, box-type truck, dark in color, attempted to change from the outside lane to the inside lane. The attempted lane change forced a passenger vehicle traveling in the inside lane to veer into the emergency lane, ultimately losing control of the vehicle and

skidding into a 360 degree circle.

The skidding vehicle eventually came to a sideways stop blocking the outside lane. Vielman, also traveling westbound on I-4 at the time on a motorcycle did not have enough time to stop or avoid the passenger car and struck the left front quarter panel of the stopped vehicle.

According to Sanford Police public information officer Cleo

## It's time to celebrate Bishop Patrick

I doubt if anyone isn't aware that Saturday, March 17, is St. Patrick's Day. Across the nation, people will be attending parades, wearing green clothing, and some will be drinking green beer.

Here in Sanford, the Main Street Cruise and St. Patrick's Day Celebration will be from 5:30 p.m. until 9 p.m. in downtown Sanford, mostly at the Magnolia Square. A number of streets including First Street will be closed in the areas around activities which will include a Classic Car Cruise, street party, performing musicians, and food (and beer) concessions in Magnolia Square. The event is sponsored by Sanford Main Street, and should prove to be one of the best St. Patrick's Day events held locally in a long time.

Across the nation, events include the St. Patrick's Day parade in New York City, with possibly a million folks turning out. New York City has had its parade every year since 1762. As many as 125,000 people are expected to be in the parade which will cover a two-mile stretch in downtown Manhattan.

Other parades and events are to be held in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Roanoke, Virginia, Hornell, New York, Huntington, West Virginia, Savannah, Georgia, and many other locations.

The event is in observance of Bishop Patrick, given name, Maewyn. Reports on his birthdate differ from AD 385 to AD 389. He died in AD 461.

Even his birthplace differs. Some say it was Wales, others believe it was the Severn Valley in England. Apparently he left home as a slave in about 432. He gained his freedom after six years in slavery and moved to Gaul where he studied in the monastery under St. Germain for 12 years.

Reportedly hearing voices telling him to do so, he subsequently returned to Ireland where he eventually became the second bishop to Ireland, and is credited with bringing Christianity to that country. After teaching and preaching for 20 years in Ireland, he returned to County Down, where he died on March 17, AD 461, the date we now celebrate as St. Patrick's Day.

Some folk lore says Patrick raised people from the dead. He is also said to have given a sermon on a hilltop that drove all the snakes from Ireland. It is, however, as the name implies, folk lore, and has not been proven.

The use of the shamrock in our observance is said to be attributed to Patrick's use of the three-leafed shamrock to explain the Trinity during his sermons.

St. Patrick's Day was first reported in America in 1737 when the first celebration was observed in Boston.

Hard sell, soft sell. The jockeying for ballot language on a Sept. 4 public referendum on a Second Generation Penny Sales tax began this week. Seminole County Commissioners Grant Maloy and Randy Morris favored using \$50 million of the anticipated \$584 million that would be raised with voter approval to fund construction of the County's Court House Expansion and Renovation.

Commissioners Carlton Henley, Dick Van Der Wiede and Daryl McLain dug in and upheld a promise to municipalities involved in revenue sharing, saying the original intent of the referendum was to fund only school construction and road projects if voters agree to continue taxing themselves for the next 10 years.

Even with the voting disagreement, privately board members feel the public will be easier sold on traffic jam and school overcrowding solutions rather than tacking a laundry list of other proposals crafted into the referendum.

Bronze it. City Commissioners were discussing a change order for the Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium renovation when District 1 Commissioner Brady Lessard decided poke a little fun at out-going mayor Larry Dale. Lessard, who will take over the mayor's gavel April 3, asked Dale if the additional \$30,000 the commission approved for larger locker rooms included "the big bronze statue of you in front of the stadium." Without missing a beat, audience



member and former Seminole Community College baseball coach Jack Eckstien chimed in: "There's not enough bronze in the world for that."

Paw Park Platitudes. Sanford City work crews and Parks and Recreation Landscape Architect Howard Jeffries deserve a well-earned pat on the back for their work over the past few months. Collectively they've transformed the old, abandoned, litter-filled Jaycees Park into a first for Sanford, Paw Park. Friends of Our Paw Park chairman Mike "Gordy" Knipfer likewise earns a kudos for spearheading the effort and fund raising drive on behalf of local dog owners.

Just do it. Sanford City Commissioner Whitey Eckstien, who teaches at Seminole High School, was reminiscing during a recent work session about working with Art Woodruff, the new

commissioner from District 1. Woodruff had taught at Seminole High for a number of years before moving to Oviedo High School. "I remember we worked on a couple of things together. We worked well together, didn't we," Eckstien said. "Yes," responded Woodruff, "I did everything you told me to do."

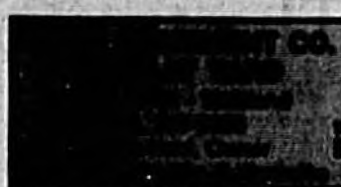

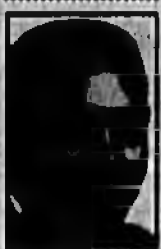

## Pointing fingers Don't blame guns for the Santana High tragedy

Andy Williams spent his Wednesday afternoon in a San Diego County courtroom. The 15-year-old was charged with gunning down two of his classmates at Santana High School and wounding 13 others. "Why?" asked the teachers who taught him, the police who arrested him, the prosecutors who charged him, and the media horde that covered him.

Jeff Cody spent his Wednesday evening at Dave & Buster's, a national "food and entertainment" chain that just opened a San Diego location. It's quite popular with virtual-reality and video game junkies.

So 11-year-old Jeff spent a matter of hours with exotic weaponry in his hands, gunning down human targets on really cool video games. Like Sega's "L.A. Machine Gun," in which the president of the United States is subject to an armed assault. And Konami's "Silent Scope," in which the player is transmogrified into a sniper.

Between games, the fifth grader pondered whether exposure to violent video games might contribute to school shootings, such as the one up the road at Santana High. "Maybe a little," he responded.

Meanwhile, the "search for answers" in the Santana High shootings continues. Is the boy the product of a dysfunctional family? Does he have a history of mental illness? Is there a substance abuse problem? Was he tired of being bullied?

So far, none of these possibilities has panned out. His single, divorced dad had not physically abused him or sexually molested him or anything like that. The ninth grader wasn't seeing a shrink, hadn't been previously diagnosed with any mental problems. He wasn't drug or alcohol addicted at the time of the shooting. And he had no beef with the kids he randomly shot.

So the school-shootings "experts" have settled on the usual culprit — the gun.

If only there were not so many guns in this country. If only guns were not so easily acquired by kids. If only gun-owning parents kept their weapons locked up. If only there were more gun-control laws.

Well, yes, there are a lot of guns in this country, somewhere between 200 million and 250 million. But Americans have been armed to the teeth since the nation's very founding. Yet the rash of underage gun violence, particularly on school campuses, is a fairly recent phenomenon. Yes, there have been national surveys suggesting that more than half of middle school and high school students know how and where to purchase a firearm. But most licensed gun dealers are law-abiding business folk, contrary to prevailing myth. If a minor tried to buy gun from them or tried to get them to commit an obvious felony, they would toss him out on his underage ear.

No, the accused reportedly "borrowed" his dad's gun, locked away in a cabinet. Apparently, he was determined to get the weapon, locked up or not. And a trigger lock probably would have been no more of a deterrent.

It's hard to imagine any new gun control law that would have prevented the carnage at Santana High. For the problem is not the gun; it is America's culture of violence. Indeed, America's youth are inured to violence through saturation exposure to violence-laden video games — such as those at Dave & Buster's — and movies and television and music.

Before the average American child finishes elementary school, he or she will view 100,000 acts of violence on television, including 8,000 murders. Then, when they become old enough to go to the movies by themselves, they are exposed to even more violence. In fact, the Federal Trade Commission issued a report last year finding that movie studios "routinely undercut their own rating restrictions by targeting (the) marketing (of) violent films ... to young audiences."

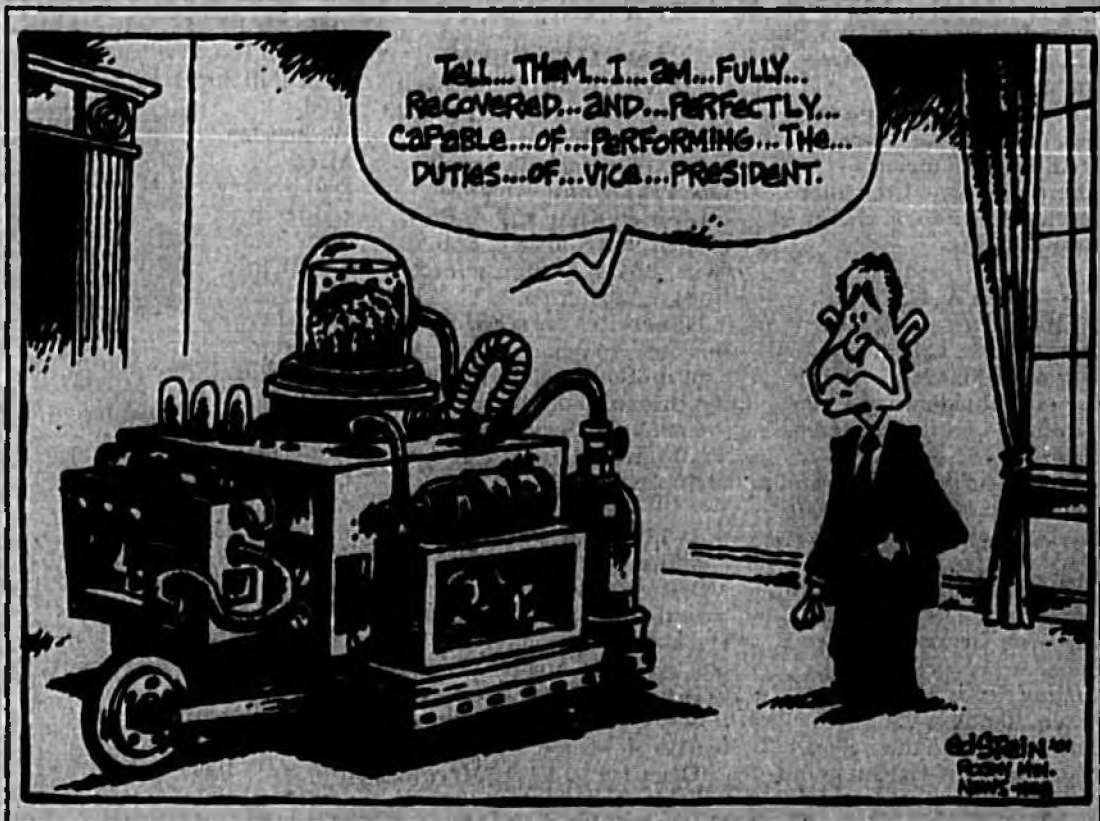
The music industry is no different. When kids go to Warehouse or Tower Records, they see in-store promotions — sponsored by record companies — for the latest CDs featuring hard core, violence-glorifying lyrics. Record execs insist they behave responsibly because they affix parental warning labels on their violent product.

But parents don't really know what their kids are listening to. And record companies know it. Because parents may hear a cleaned-up version of a certain artist's music on the radio and feel comfortable allowing their youngsters to purchase the artist's CD. But the music store sells the kid the uncensored CD — unbeknownst to their parents — violent lyrics intact.

Against this backdrop, it is easy to understand how, according to police, the accused shooter could show no obvious signs of being distraught, disturbed or under great emotional stress after blowing away his classmates.

Violence came as naturally to the teen-age shooter as grooving to his Walkman, catching a movie, checking out the tube, or playing a video game.

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## The two opposing sides of a Russian spy

If my information is correct, Russia's alleged spy in the FBI, Robert Hansen, and FBI Director Louis Freeh were not only both members of the same Roman Catholic church in suburban Virginia, but among the dozen or so communicants who also belonged to the local chapter of Opus Dei, an organization for especially devout lay Catholics.

There is of course something piquant about the notion of the FBI's director and Moscow's mole in the Bureau rubbing shoulders at chapter meetings, but it doesn't reflect on Mr. Freeh. He is, of course, ultimately responsible for the fact that there was a spy in the FBI, but their common membership in Opus Dei is simply an amusing coincidence. The whole affair does, however, prompt further speculation into what, exactly, was going on in the mind of Robert Hansen.

In 1956-57, I served as associate counsel to the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, and in the course of my job got to know some of Hansen's opposite numbers: Russians who had spied for

the United States while working for the KGB or the GRU (Soviet military intelligence) and who, unlike Hansen, were lucky enough to escape their bosses' clutches and find haven here. I was fascinated by what I could learn about their motivations.

They were a very mixed bag. Not all were angels. A few had defected to the West only because they were about to be caught embezzling government funds.

Others were simply tired of their wives and children in Russia. Still others, no doubt, were chiefly interested in the money that Western intelligence agencies were willing to pay for the information they could provide. But some were Russian patriots — with a white-hot hatred of what Communism had done, and was still doing, to their native land — who were willing to risk their lives to do battle with the Soviet system.

During the 1930s and '40s most American spies for the Soviet Union — Hiss, Rosenberg, et al. — were, in their perverted way, idealists, too. They despised American "capitalism," believed

with an almost religious intensity in Communism, and were confident that they were helping in their small way to bring to life a better world. To this idealism, they conjoined a serene arrogance: They found it positively exhilarating to pit their individual wills against the awesome power of the United States.

In subsequent decades, the dominant motive for American spies became money. This certainly seems to have been the chief lure as far as the infamous Aldrich Ames was concerned, and he was only one of many. But what about Robert Hansen?

Money undoubtedly played a part in his decision. When the FBI assigned him to New York, it apparently gave little or no thought to how an agent with six children could be expected to survive in New York on \$46,000 a year. Sympathy for Communism, on the other hand, or even disgust with the United States, doesn't appear to have been a significant part of the picture; at least, they do not surface in his communications with Moscow, insofar as these have been retrieved and published.

What the communications do suggest, however, with their references to the American intelligence

community as a "sleeping tiger," is that Hansen positively relished the risky life he was leading. This, too, was a common motive on both sides of the Iron Curtain. A double life is, of course, an immensely exciting thing to live. (What chuckles Hansen must have enjoyed, at Louis Freeh's expense, at those meetings of Opus Dei!)

But that seemingly devout Catholicism deserves closer attention. It may, of course, have been simply a cover — like the subscription Hansen took out to my old magazine, *National Review*, not long after he began his career as a spy. But maybe not. I don't know whether Hansen was raised a Catholic or, if not, when he became one. But to its believers, the Catholic faith is rooted in a tradition far older than any that Communism can claim — much older, in fact, than Hansen may have been able to comprehend himself that he could maintain a sort of weird allegiance to it while simultaneously betraying the United States for fun and profit.

As Sir Walter Scott put it, "Oh, what a tangled web we weave, / When first we practice to deceive!"

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## Grave robbers should leave Kennedy's legacy alone

Driving along the Potomac at night, I regularly look for that little flicker of light just below Robert E. Lee's mansion. It's the Eternal Flame marking the grave of John F. Kennedy, set among the thousands of others who died in this country's service.

That hallowed ground of Arlington Cemetery is guarded day and night in respect for those of every rank and service who fell doing their duty.

JFK was one of them, of course. He rose to public notice in World War II when he risked his life saving the crew of his PT boat after it had been rammed in half by a Japanese destroyer. He won his place in history through his cool-headed resistance to a

Soviet missile base in Fidel Castro's Cuba. He died a casualty of the Cold War at the hands of a pro-Castro zealot.

For this, Kennedy deserves the respect due a patriot, the reverence due a leader fallen in battle. The memory of his public service deserves, at the very minimum, his compatriots' protection from desecration.

I refer to the TV ad campaign, aired by a group of Republican political "consultants," which exhumes Kennedy's voice and image to champion the Bush tax-cut proposal.

Where do we go next with this ghoulish stuff?

Will we hear Kennedy's heroic "Ich bin ein Berliner" speech

played at a neo-Nazi rally? Will we hear Ronald Reagan's salute to Afghan "freedom fighters" used to justify the current Kabul regime's demolition of ancient statues of Buddha? Will we hear diehard Russian communists playing FDR's words of friendship from WWII?

Senator Edward Kennedy and Caroline Kennedy have asked the creators of the TV ad to stop exploiting her father's 1962 speech to the Economic Club of New York.

"It is intellectually dishonest and politically irresponsible," they said in a letter to the pro-Bush group, "to suggest that President Kennedy would have supported such a tax cut."

But the Kennedy family argument that the two tax cuts differ in both design and circumstance is, to any decent person, unnecessary. The fact that the brother

and the daughter, the recognized keepers of the hero's flame, want the ads pulled should be sufficient.

Had events gone otherwise, their intervention would not have been needed.

Had Jack Kennedy not been the tough, vigilant anti-Communist he was, he might not have stood so strong and true when Nikita Khrushchev tried building his missile base 90 miles from Florida. He would not have incurred the hatred of a pro-Castro zealot named Lee Harvey Oswald. He would have been here today, at a seasoned 73, to defend his record and expound his views.

But had he not been the great American he was, his would not be the treasured memory the other side now tries to desecrate.

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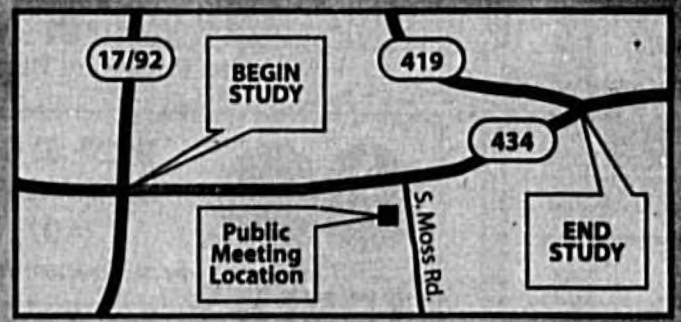

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# The Way We Were: Who's Who in Sanford circa 1933

The following biographies are from the Who's Who Edition of the Sanford Herald published April 29, 1933.

**R.J. Holly**  
R.J. Holly was born in Hamilton, Ohio and attended public schools there. He had continued his studies at Miami University, Ohio.  
A newspaper man with over 30 years experience, he had served as editor of the Orlando Reporter

Star (1906-07) and had come to Sanford early in 1908 to organize the Sanford Herald.  
Mr. Holly continued to operate Sanford's only daily newspaper until 1922 when he sold his interest. Shortly afterward, he edited and published the "Florida Trucker" magazine. More recently he had been publicity agent for the Florida Public Service Company with offices in Sanford.  
During the World War, he had made eight trips across the

Atlantic to France on U.S. transport ships as a YMCA secretary. At present he was a member of the Sanford Elks Lodge and Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.  
Mr. Holly had recently been elected Seminole County representative to the Florida Legislature. He had been a member of the Florida Democratic Executive Committee for many years and was presently chairman of the Seminole County

Democratic Committee.  
His wife was the former Miss Mae Tyner and they had three children; Robert, Holly, Jr., Sanford, Mrs. Beach Hazard, Boston, and Mrs. Horace Walker, Petersburg, Virginia.  
**T.L. Dumas**  
T.L. Dumas was born in Rome, Georgia but received his early education in Seneca, S.C.  
Mr. Dumas began his career as a railroad man with the Southern

Railroad where he had held the positions of chief dispatcher, yard master and ticket agent in several towns in the Carolinas and Virginia.  
He became connected with the Atlantic Coast Line in 1907 as a trainmaster and served in that position until 1917 when he was promoted to the office of the supervisor of the Jacksonville district. He had moved to Sanford just a few months before being promoted to this position.  
Mr. Dumas was a former mayor of Sanford, a present city commissioner, past president of the local Kiwanis Club, member of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, and a vestryman of Holy Cross Episcopal Church.  
His wife was the former Miss Harriet Thopson and they had two daughters, Mrs. Arthur Hazard of Augusta, Ga. and Mrs. Raymond C. Phillips of Gainesville.

He was a member of the Sanford Elks Club and the First Presbyterian Church.  
His residence was at 800 Elm Avenue. He was fond of baseball and fishing.  
**L.R. Phillips**  
L.R. Phillips was born December 9, 1860 at Ethorah and lived on a farm in that area until 1878 when he entered the sewing machine business in Gainesville.  
In 1879 he began helping with the survey of the South Florida Railroad extension between Orlando and Kissimmee.  
He moved to Sanford in 1882 where he worked as a clerk in his brother's store. In 1889 he moved to New York City where he was cashier with the New York-Ontario and Western Railroad.

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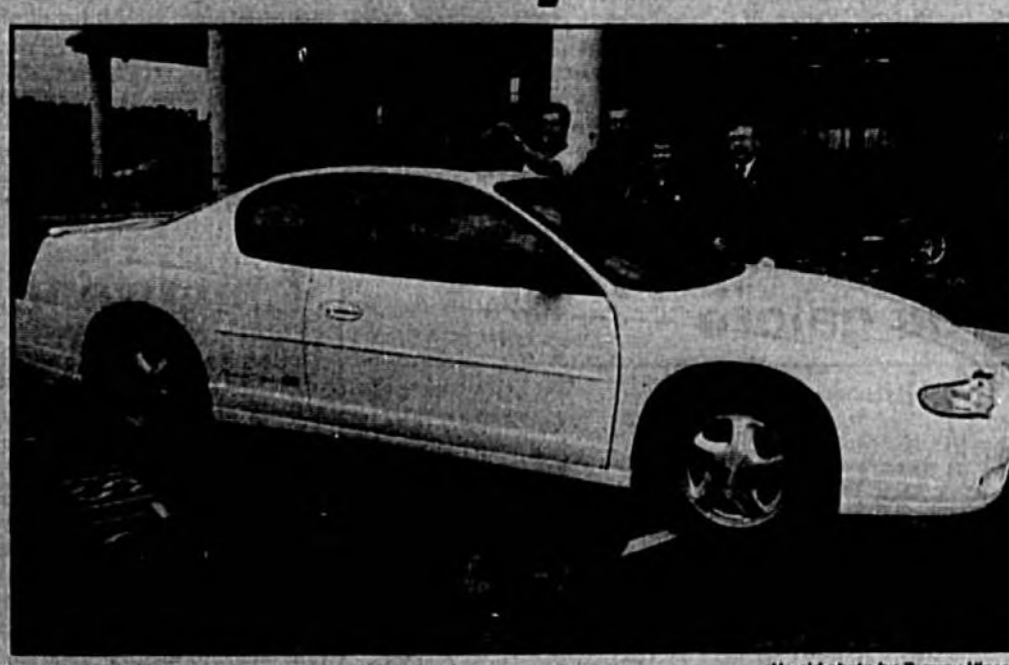

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# Street lighting district to go before city soon

SANFORD — City Commissioners will get a formal look at a Historic District street light initiative within the next 30-60 days.

Public Works Project Coordinator Andrew Van Gaale indicated this week the proposal, brought forward by the Sanford Historic Trust, will likely be discussed in a work session presentation and could become a future agenda item. Van Gaale is currently reviewing proposals from both gas and electric companies to provide installation and maintenance of the proposed street lights. Details of insurance and liability

issues are also being worked out.

"We'll forward the proposal to the commission and see which way they want to proceed after reviewing costs and assessment methods," said Van Gaale.

Roughly 577 Historic District property parcels would be affected by the special assessment if approved. The plan calls for the installation of 142 four-mantel historically replicated street lights, powered by either gas or electricity depending on which option the board might choose.

The Historic District runs from 3rd Street to 13th Street north and south and from French Avenue to Sanford Avenue east and west.

Perched on 12 foot fiberglass stanchions, the street lights would be placed at mid-block on each of the District's tree named avenues and at mid-block on each street running east and west. The 142 proposed lights would compliment the existing 65 electric street lights currently in operation.

One sticking point in moving the initiative ahead could be dramatically rising fuel costs for all types of energy and the recent volatility in the energy market.

Utilizing gas street lights with photo cell sensors, each assessed property owner would pay \$7.88 per month for a 10-year period. If electric street lights are installed the cost would rise to

\$18.22 per month for a 10-year period. Those cost estimates are based on current market prices and do not factor in any level of inflation or price fluctuation.

Florida Power Corporation recently increased residential electric rates by four percent. Florida Power & Light this week got approval from the Florida Public Utilities Commission to increase prices by nine percent because of rising global energy acquisition costs.

Should the board place the street light initiative on the formal agenda, two public hearings will be held on the issue. Depending on public comment a public referendum on the initiative is a possibility.

## County unveils water Web site

SANFORD — Beginning March 17, those wired to the web will have a new resource from which to gather information on Seminole County's lakes, rivers, and streams.

As part of the County's ongoing commitment to local natural resources, Seminole County's Watershed Atlas Web site can now be accessed and information downloaded at [www.seminole.wateratlas.org](http://www.seminole.wateratlas.org).

"The atlas is a single comprehensive information source for citizens, students, scientists, planners, and government agencies to access information related to Seminole County's water resources available via the Internet," said Mark Flomerfelt, manager of the County's Stormwater Division.

Last summer Seminole County contracted with the University of South Florida to develop the interactive-based atlas to bring together all information from agencies throughout Florida. Developing the Web site cost approximately \$150,000 with input and shared costs split between the county and the county's seven municipalities.

According to Principal Engineer Kim Ormberg, the atlas was designed to obtain important information on water quality, hydrology (lake levels, rainfall data, bathymetric maps), flora/fauna (plants, fish, wildlife), management (aquatic plant control, consumptive uses of water) and the community (historical viewpoints, geographic information).

"There's a lot of educational material on the site," said Ormberg. "And its interactive which allows residents to input data to the county about possible illegal dumping into bodies of water on an anonymous basis."

Ormberg said input from interested parties and users of the county's natural resources will help guide county decisions in the future.

"The Web site is useful to anyone," she said. "We have input from several advisory committees that monitor the Wekiva River, St. Johns River, Friends of Lake Jesup, and others."

The Web site also forms a historical snap shot of water trends in the county for the past year, past five year period and past 10 year period, and allows the county to attract volunteers through the Internet to help monitor local water use and the condition of local bodies of water.

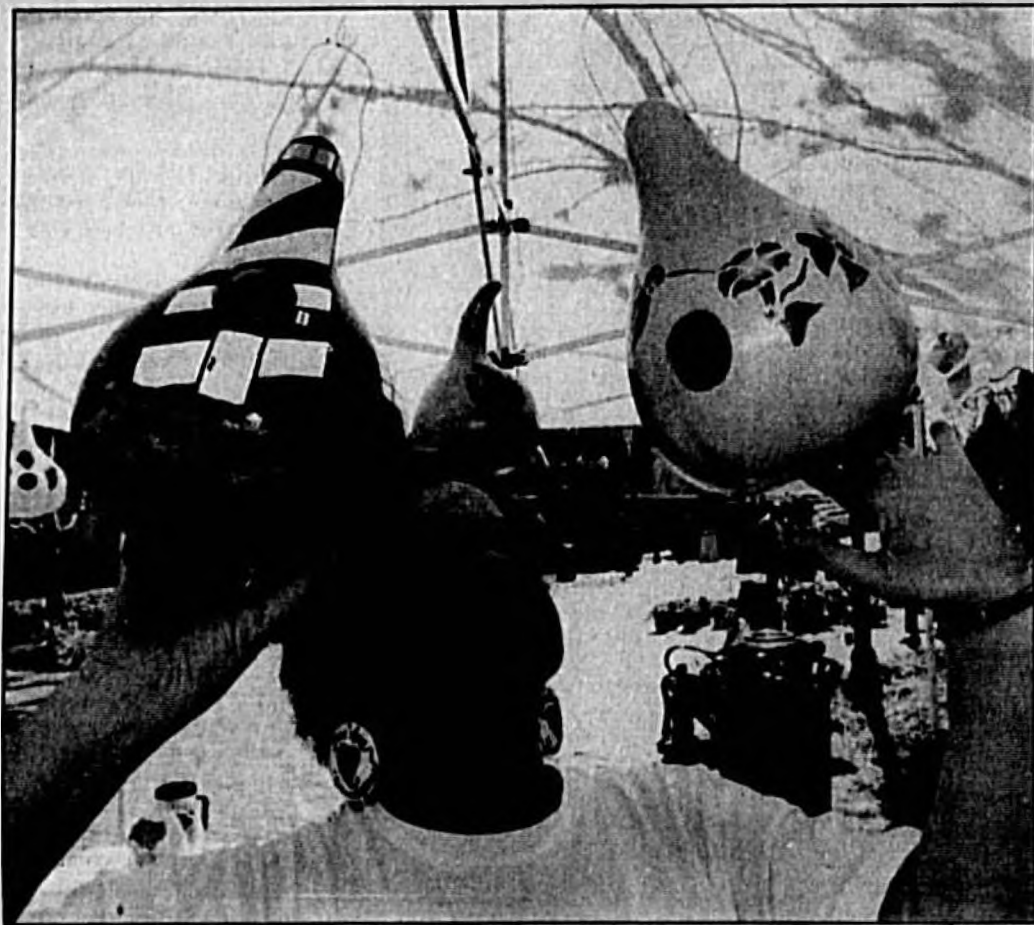
"Last summer interns from the University of Central Florida joined the University of South Florida in developing metric, three dimensional level maps that monitor lake level data," Ormberg said.

"This summer we hope to add a more humanistic touch to the Web site by incorporating oral histories, sound bites, and video clips and old photos."

The county has applied for an Environmental Protection Agency grant to enhance the content of the web site. Ormberg indicated the county should receive word on possible grant funding within the next two months.

Ormberg said the grant would be used to develop interactive teaching curricula for grades 5 through 12.

for improvements to state roads, hoping to be reimbursed from Tallahassee in the future.

Commissioner Grant Maloy cast the dissenting vote then, and was unwavering Tuesday when the Board addressed the State Road Component of the proposed referendum.

"I still see this as an issue of double taxation," Maloy said prior to Tuesday's vote. "We are not getting our fair share of transportation dollars from the state now to maintain state roads — and there is only the possibility of being reimbursed in the future. State roads are not a county responsibility."

Maloy said he favored using half the money earmarked for the state road component of the package to fund the projected \$44 million courthouse expansion and renovation project scheduled

for groundbreaking in the Spring of 2002. He was joined in that support by commissioner Randy Morris.

"The voters need to examine this issue closely," Morris said. "The courthouse is not a city issue, it's a county issue and this is still the taxpayers' money. If we used the \$44 million designated for state roads (to pay for

the courthouse) we would save the county a lot of money in the long run. The debt service on issuing a \$40 million bond for courthouse construction floated over a normal 30-year period runs the actual costs close to \$100 million."

Commissioners Carlton Henley, Daryl McLain and Board chairman Dick Van Der Wiede cast the three votes reaffirming their support of the original agreement between the county and city's in its entirety, including the state road component.

"We need to fulfill our commitment to our city partners," Henley said. "They originally came forward with a lot of different funding requests and then backed off — agreeing only to roads and schools."

"I sympathize with the courthouse idea but I would be reluctant to go back on our word," Henley added. "We shouldn't be putting things into the mix after an agreement has been structured."

McLain said adding the courthouse project into the sales tax would spell certain doom when the referendum goes before county voters in September.

"We need to stay on the issue of roads and schools," McLain said. "I'm not willing to sit back and wait until the state moves on improving our transportation problems in Seminole County. Let's build now and then go after the state money."

McLain added, "If you will recall, when we voted on the courthouse project I wanted a

cap put on spending for it. We didn't do that and now we're seeing projections in excess of \$20 million higher than we anticipated. We can't sit still

and watch our road systems continue to fail for the next 10 years."

Van Der Wiede said he agreed with the original plan between the county and

cities for school and road projects only.

Between now and Sept. 4 a number of issues regarding the referendum will take shape in a planned timeline. Among them:

- The execution of interlocal agreements between the county and municipalities.

- The setting of public hearing dates on the issue.

- Board approval of final ballot language.

- A public hearing to adopt an ordinance authorizing the referendum.

- The vote itself on Sept. 4.

The School Board component of the referendum package calls for the schools to get 45 percent of its share in the first three years in order to jump start classroom construction and then scaling back that share in subsequent years of the 10-year tax period.

"Several people came to the museum to see the photographs," Jacobs said. "When they saw them and realized neither one was their house, they were disappointed. We also got calls from people who thought their houses were the ones in the photographs."

Many tips led to dead ends, but there was one from a Sanford resident that gave Jacobs the information she needed to identify one of the houses.

"Mrs. Russi called and said she remembered Mrs. Martin, who was in the photograph," Jacobs said. "She remembered where she lived, and she remembered that Mrs. Martin was always saying 'Bundles for Britain.'"

On the assumption the Martins owned the house, Jacobs called the Orlando Library and asked a researcher to look in a 1930s Orlando phone book for a Martin family from Sanford. She came up with the name I.D. Martin, who lived at 1351 Mellonville Ave. The house located at the address today matches the house in Fitzpatrick's 1938 photograph.

Jacobs discovered Ira D. Martin's obituary in the Jan. 14, 1941, issue of the Sanford Herald. According to the news-

paper, the Sanford resident owned a grocery and general merchandise store on Celery Avenue and later a paint store in the Sanford Arcade. He was also married to Ellen "Holehouse" Martin, who was the sister of Fitzpatrick's great grandmother, Bertha.

All that remains of the mystery is the woman's identity in the second photograph and the second house.

"It's like a jigsaw puzzle," Jacobs said. "We only need one more piece before it's complete." Jacobs said her new English friend is ecstatic about the infor-

mation concerning her Florida ties. She plans on sending several more photographs to the museum, which will be placed in the facility's archives.

"This has been really neat," Jacobs said. "I feel like I have a kinship with these people."

The photographs will continue to be displayed at the museum. Jacobs encourages anyone with information about the house or the woman in the photograph to call the Museum of Seminole County History at 407-321-2489 or visit the museum, located at 300 Bush Blvd. off of Highway 17-92.

Cohen, witnesses have been unable to provide a tag number or identifying marks on the phantom vehicle. The only other information rendered by witnesses was that the phantom vehicle was shaped like a U-Haul type vehicle.

"I'm mad. I want the driver of the phantom vehicle found," said Vielman's son, Erick Jr. "I know it's close to impossible, but my whole family is devastated by the outcome of this."

"During the week my dad made some progress in battling back from his injuries but the doctors told us there would be complications," he added.

Vielman Jr. indicated his father's most serious injuries resulted from a broken pelvis and dislocated knee as well as severe leg bruises.

Cohen said a reward of \$1,000

for information leading to the discovery of the driver of the phantom vehicle is being offered by Crimeline.

She added that depending on the ultimate outcome of the investigation, charges against the driver could possibly be upgraded to include vehicular homicide.

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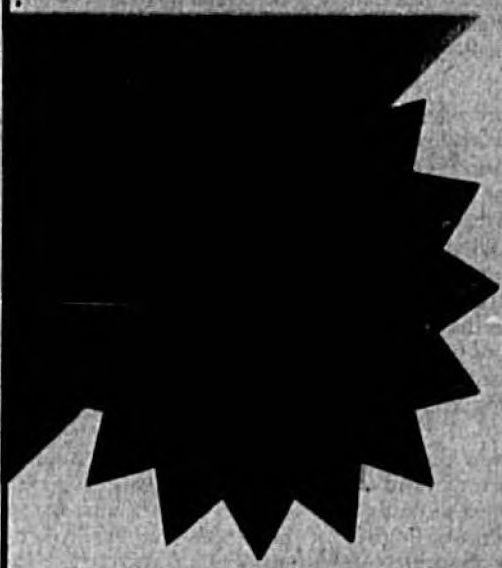


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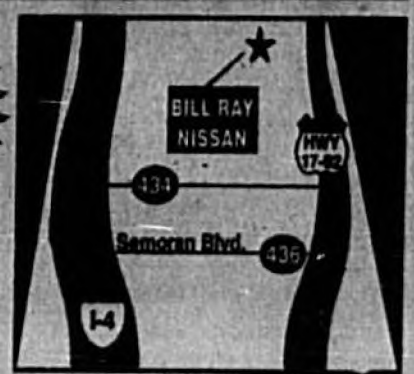

Lake Mary was to have faced Bishop Moore, which suffered its first loss on Wednesday, on Friday with the winner earning at least a share of the tournament.

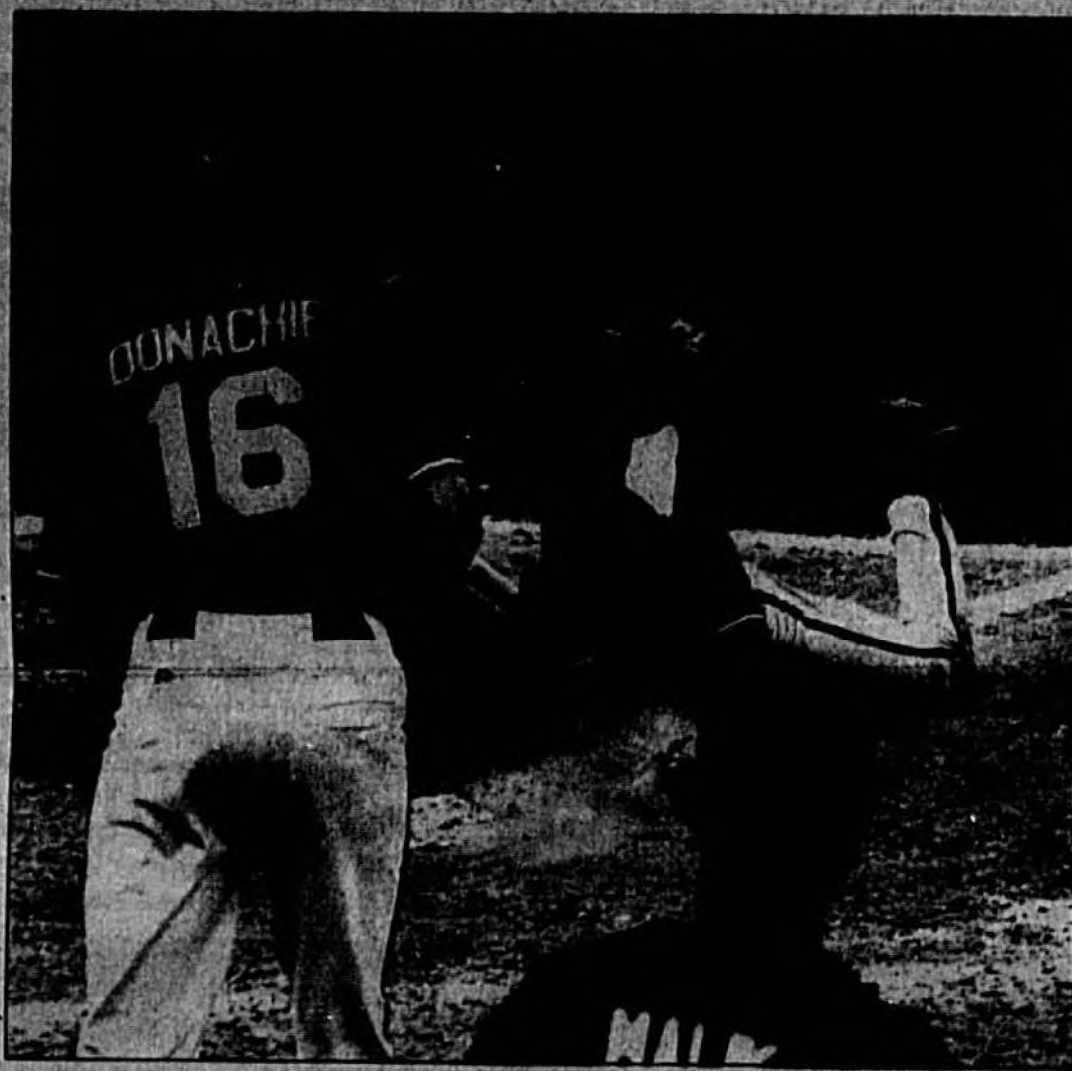

Even though it was far from enough, the Grenadiers' Carl Schuster did blast two home runs himself.

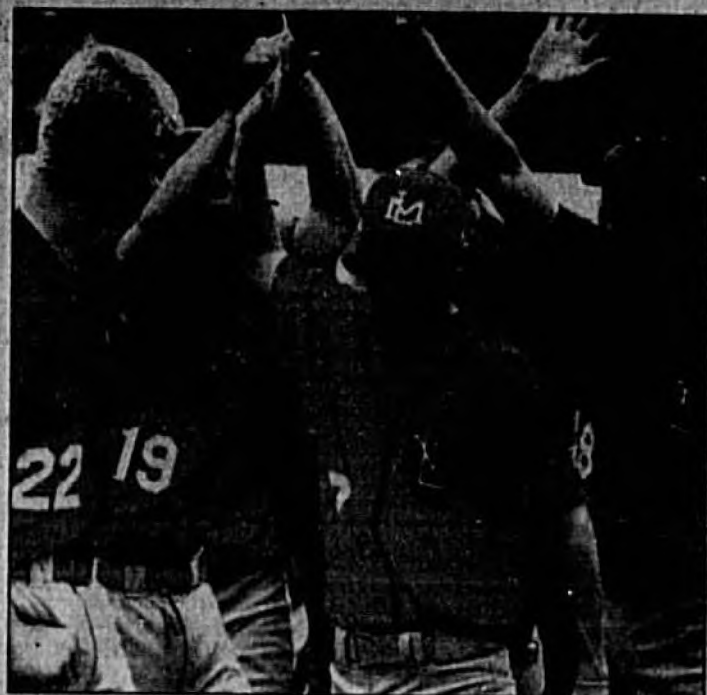
The first run of the game, however, would come from not a home run but a double.

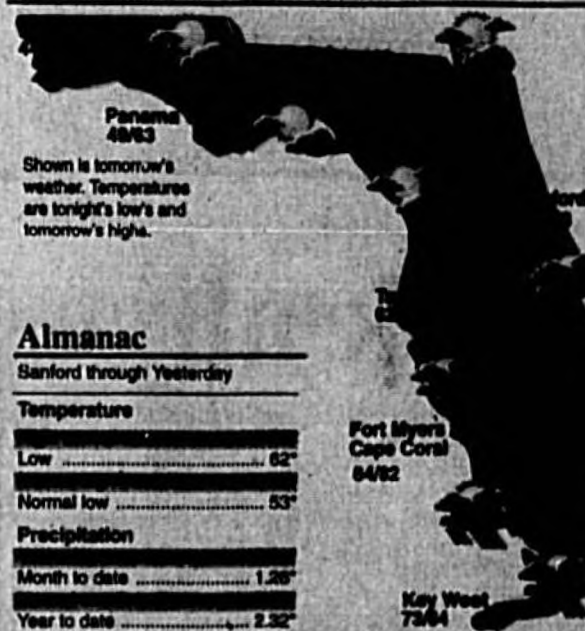

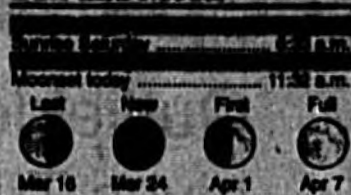

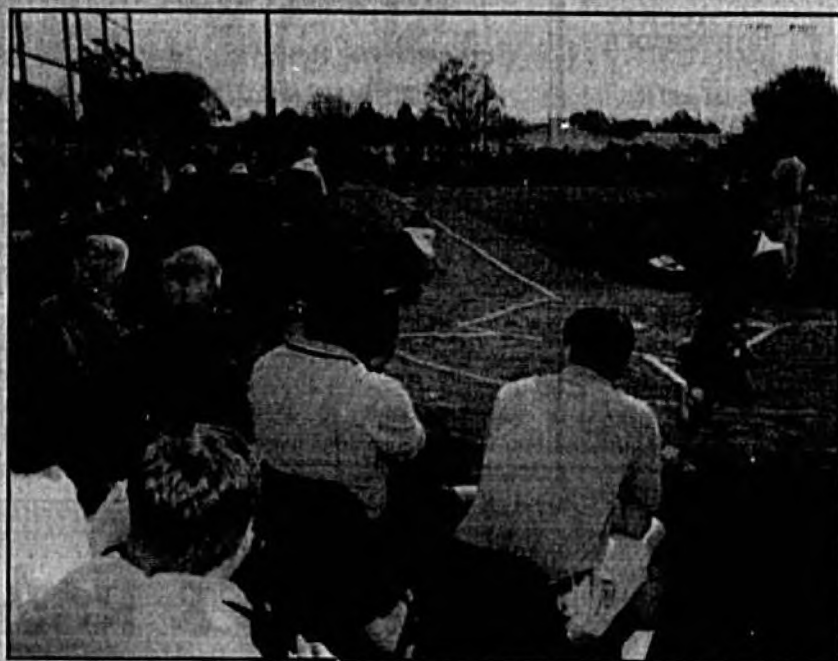

# Expert briefs women on many facets of crime

"Be aware of crime," Dotti Burkett told members of the Sanford Woman's Club at the March meeting when she was the guest speaker.

Burkett is no newcomer to law enforcement, according to Linda Sparrow, chair of the club's Home Life Department. She is an Elder Service Officer/Crime Prevention Practitioner with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and has been an active presenter on the local, regional and national level for the past eight years, Linda said.

As the recipient of the Florida Crime Prevention Award 1999-2000, Burkett was awarded the FBI Community Service Award for her efforts in personal safety and in 1998, the governor presented her with the Florida Finest Award for her efforts during natural disasters in the area, Linda added.

Club members agreed that being assaulted was their greatest fear. But the most crimes committed pertain to money, the speaker said, from purse-snatching to all forms of fraud. Burkett said that auto theft is the No. 1 crime in the country with elder abuse ranking high.

"You can't judge a book by its cover," Burkett told the club-

women. Criminals are everywhere and many target seniors as easy prey. She cited that a tattooed person in tattered clothing could be perfectly harmless while the smooth-talking, nattily dressed man could well be another Ted Bundy. The message is to beware of all strangers and don't give out personal information to anyone including telemarketers and Internet transactors.

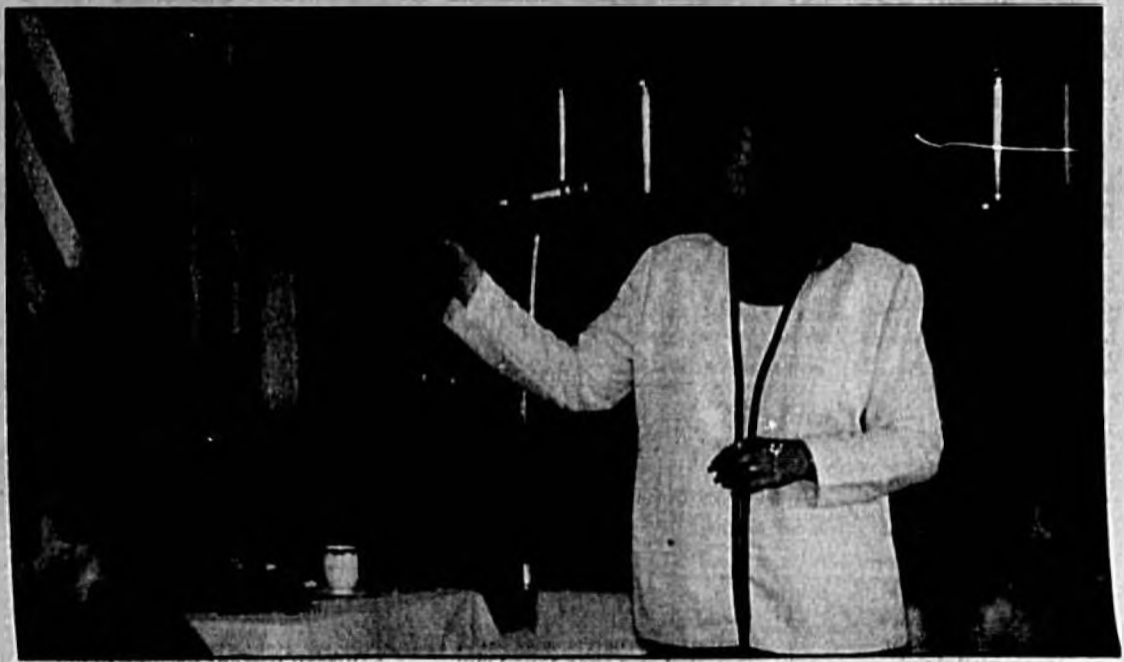
Suggested tips to avoid becoming a victim are: Establish a buddy system with a neighbor and check on each other daily. Let a trusted neighbor know when you go on a trip in order to watch your home and set up a "House Watch" with the Sheriff's Office. If you are attacked, yell, "Fire," instead of "Help."

## No matter who wrote it, 'Lindy's 59' offers advice on how to live a good

According to a magazine I read many years ago, when Charles Lindbergh was a young man, he used to review himself each night on 59 character traits he wanted to develop.

The alphabetical list began with altruism — doing good for others without hope or expectation of being rewarded, repaid or benefited — and ended with unselfishness.

Lindbergh was said to have put a red X next to the traits he had satisfactorily mastered that day. Those he failed would get a black X. If he had not had an opportunity to demonstrate a particular trait, these would be no mark at all.

For years, I gave talks based on "Lindy's 59." I also used the character traits as a Lenten checklist for readers of my newspaper column.

Then the idea came to me to write to Lindbergh, asking him how he happened to compile the list, how long he had stuck to it, etc. I never really expected to get a reply. Lindbergh felt a deep hostility toward the press after the kidnapping and murder of his baby son. He resented the media's hounding of him and his wife, Anne. It made him bitter and aloof.

So I was surprised to find in my mail one morning a letter from Lindbergh, sent from his home in Hawaii.

He apologized graciously for his reply being late. Then he let the bombshell drop. He wrote: "The character-trait list is pure bunk, one of those numberless concoctions of the press that have no basis in fact whatsoever — like the cat I was supposed to have carried with me in the 'Spirit of St. Louis' to Paris."

These stories get into the newspaper record files and are

carried over and over again through the years until they are rather generally accepted as factual.

"The 'character-trait' list attributed to me has even been carried in a dictionary. Actually, I had no such list and had no interest in this type of thing."

Lindbergh's letter appeared in newspapers across the country — including The New York Times, The Boston Globe and The Philadelphia Inquirer. It carried such headlines as "Lindy Debunks 'Character-Building' Myth" and "Lindy Calls Character List 'Bunk.'"

Whether Lindy's 59 is pure bunk or not, it would do us all good to grade ourselves every night on qualities such as "cheerfulness, no fault-finding, no sarcasm, perseverance, politeness, self-control, no talking about others, clean speech and pleasant voice."

While public wickedness and vice (the kind of sins we go to jail for) are pulling America down, these things are not as responsible for our country's decline as the lack of ordinary goodness in ordinary people — what we call "lack of character."

The best idea of all for getting America back on the straight-and-narrow might be for each of us to go on a character-building program. Lent is a good time to start. Never mind that we are already into Lent. A lady in my parish in Boston used to say, "If you can't begin in the beginning, begin in the middle."

## Butter: From ancient remedy to modern delicacy

Butter was first introduced to the Greeks by the Scythians. In one of his stories, Herodotus describes slaves who had poked out eyes so nothing would distract them from churning the milk. Romans used butter mainly as a remedy to heal wounds. The Gauls produced butter, but it was the Normans who established its reputation. By the Middle Ages, local production of butter had become wide spread. Large pats of butter

**Sica Nacu** were sold at the markets and stored by the purchasers in large earthenware pots covered in salty water.

Butter is a very rich natural food with a high energy value (750 cal/100g) of saturated fat containing vitamin A and D, calcium and phosphorus.

In Europe, butter is made exclusively from cow's milk, but in Africa and Asia it is made from buffalo, camel, goat, mare and donkey milk for strong flavor and richness.

### Keeping Butter Fresh

It is very important to keep butter fresh by keeping it in a closed air tight container. Butter will absorb all odors, and if it is exposed to light and air it will oxidize and become rancid. My grandmother kept her butter in a dark, cool cellar stored in a covered clay pot sealed with paraffin.

During the war, Russian soldiers went from house to house confiscating dried goods and all provisions, which were put away for the winter. To avoid the Russians taking his family's provisions, my grandfather dug a hole underneath the floor, dropped all the canned meats (fried meat and lard in big jars), dried cheeses and butters, covered it with vines and then put the dirt back to make it look like nothing was there.

There are mainly two types of butter to choose from — sweet cream and lactic butter. Sweet cream is obtained from pasteurized cream that has salt added to it. It has a mild and delicate flavor and keeps well in the refrigerator. Lactic butter is mainly imported from The Netherlands and Denmark and is made from cream that has been allowed to ripen under special conditions. Its distinctive full flavor and smooth texture, along with a yellowish color cream could give some people who are not used to it lactose intolerance.

### Cooking With Butter

There is no doubt butter containing dishes are very rich in flavor and calories. However, one should be very careful in how long and what temperature the butter is cooked at. Of course, butter can be used for grilling, broiling, frying, braising, and sautéing, but you need to be cautious and not burn it, as burned butter releases a very toxic substance for the liver (acrolein), which is indigestible, and increases the cholesterol.

Butter is essential for hot emulsified sauces, for roux and soups, and for binding creams.

### Flavored Butter

In the Roman Empire the coloring of the butter was forbidden (even though

plant coloring was used — such as marigold flower). Today, we use different herbs to flavor butter and add color to it. Butter should always be served cold with grilled meat or fish, boiled vegetables, rice, breads etc.

Cold beurres composes (compounded butters), are prepared using fresh herbs and, or vegetables such as: thyme, basil, garlic, shallot, tarragon, horseradish, anchovy, etc.

Hot butters are usually prepared with crushed crustacean shells (lobster for cardinal butter).

### Caviar Butter

Grind 4 ounces pressed caviar in a mortar. Add

to the softened butter and sieve. This butter is used to garnish canapés or various cold hors d'oeuvres and to flavor some fish sauces.

### Crab Or Prawn Butter

1 1/2 cup of prawns or crab meat  
2 tablespoons of butter  
Sprinkle of salt  
Paprika

Pound in a mortar the meat or use a blender. Add the butter after heating it. Salt and paprika season to taste.

Use it to top baked salmon, cold fish, or file mignon

### Thyme Butter

In a mortar pound fresh thyme with a pinch of coarse salt until it becomes almost a paste. Add the amount of butter you would like and continue to mix until it is very well incorporated in a creamy, fluffy texture.

Serve to enrich certain sauces or on top of hard crust bread.

### Tomatoes Soup

2 cups onions diced  
1 cup celery diced

1 cup carrots, diced  
1 cup green peppers  
1/2 cup parsnip  
1 cup rice  
10 medium fresh tomatoes  
1 cup butter  
6 cups water  
Salt  
Paprika  
Bay leave  
Thyme

In a pot, boil all vegetables and rice except 1 cup of the onions. Drop the tomatoes whole in your soup. After 10 minutes, pick the tomatoes up and cool them off. Peel them, and chop them or pass them through a sieve. In a saucepan, add all the butter and the other cup of onions. Sauté the onions, add the tomatoes puree, and simmer at slow heat for about 20 minutes. Return them to the pot with all the other vegetables. Season with salt and paprika, add a bay leave and fresh thyme, and continue to simmer for 10 more minutes. Very delicious!
