#### Strikers Cheer As Poland Recognizes Right To Strike

GIANSK, Poland (UPI) - Government negotiators told strike leaders at the Lenin Shipyard today that the regime recognizes their right to strike - one of the workers' key demands in the 13-day walkout along the

Baltic Coast. Workers cheered the comment by First Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Jagielski at the two sides' first negotiating session since the shipyard talks resumed following the past weekend's Communist Party purge

Jagielski promised the government would issue a new law on labor unions guaranteeing their right to strike when other means to resolve disputes have

He apparently was referring to a law governing operations of the official labor unions, not the free trade unions the workers have demanded. But the strikers felt his statement represented a victory

#### Killers Hold Prison Workers

MONTREAL (UPI) - A band of convicted murderers, foiled in an escape bid in which one prisoner died in a hail of bullets, took 12 prison employees hostage and spent the night huddled in the open courtyard of a maximum security jail surrounded by police sharpshooters.

The prisoners, armed with revolvers and knives, refused to release three sick hostages in exchange for food and water and a prison negotiating team said it was up to the inmates to end the standoff at the Laval Penitentiary in Montreal.

"We're expecting it to be long because the inmates told us this morning they had plenty of time. Most of them are serving life terms," Federal Penitentiaries spokesman Guy Verreault said of the nine prisoners. One of the prisoners, an American serving a life sentence for killing a Canadian policeman, was killed by prison guards in the escape attempt.

Verreault said prison officials John Conearney, 44, of South Quincy, Mass., serving life for killing a policeman during a 1973 bank robbery in Ville LaSalle, Que., was shot and killed by a guard during the escape

#### Fishermen Tighten Blockade

PARIS (UPI) - Six ships ran the fishermen's before dawn today, but defiant strikers tightened their grip on several harbors afterward, defying authorities. Three car ferries and three small cargo ships slipped in a single convoy out of Le Havre, third biggest port of central Europe, apparently taking by surprise several fishing trawlers that were on hand to prevent escape

attempts during the night. At dawn, the fishermen responded by bringing in reinforcements to block the channel leading from the main port. Others gathered at the entrance to the

nearby oil tanker terminal at Antifer. At the Mediterranean oil port of Fos-Sur-Mer, 10 fishing trawlers milled about outside the entrance to the deserted facility. Fos-Sur-Mer is the nation's largest facility for unloading oil imports and Antifer the second largest, but no tankers were at piers in either port Tuesday morning.

## Tass Admits To Failures In Socialism

an unprecedented admission that socialist economic policies have failed, endorsed the Warsaw communist leadership's handling of worker unrest that has crippled Poland's Baltic

In the first Soviet reaction to the strikes sweeping its communist ally, Tass accused Western media of blowing the situation out of proportion and charged they were ignoring recession and unemployment in the United States.

The article, which is the first the Soviet people have been told of the 11-day crisis in Poland, blamed "serious economic problems" on "mistakes in economic policy" and "many objective factors." But it said "the strategic course has been shaped to remedy

the situation," although it did not comment on Sunday's purge of top Communist Party officials by Polish party chief Edward The article signed by leading political commentator Yuri

Kornilov, could not have appeared without the approval of the



## 9% For Retirees

Boston and Honolulu as retirement havens. Consider the attractions of Atlanta - it's more affordable. Wherever its home, a retired couple in the United States is probably living on a budget about 9 percent higher than a year ago, the largest increase since 1974, the Labor Department said Monday

Also with financial problems, according to other economic reports, are the U.S. auto industry, with mid-August sales down 36.5 percent from a year ago, and the Treasury Department, with the government spending \$15.1 billion more in July than it took in.

And Patricia Harris, secretary of Health and Human Services, said Americans spent \$212.2 billion on their health last year, an average of \$943 per person and an increase of 12.5 percent over the previous year. The HHS figures show by far the biggest health cost is hospitals — \$85.3 billion last year. The Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics issued updated hypothetical budgets for a retired couple consisting of husband over the age of 65 and his wife in low, intermediate and higher income levels.

The couple is presumed to be in good health, capable of taking care of itself, and owning its home with no payments for mortgage principal and interest. "In the autumn of 1979, the estimated U.S. average annual cost, excluding personal income taxes, of the lower level budget for an urban retired couple was \$6,023," the depart-



### No Easy Way To Restore Productivity

The GNP (gross national product) is the total of all marketable goods and services produced by a

nation. Ours is falling. It dropped at an annual rate of 9 percent in the BUSINESS WORLD April-Jungouarter this year. That was as bad as any quarterly drop in postwar experience. Right after World War II, we had the greatest

GNP per capita of any nation. But we have now fallen behind Switzerland, Denmark, West Germany and Sweden among the industrialized nations. And Japan moving faster than any other industrialized nation, is closing fast on our heels. The Persian Gulf sheikdoms, with their oil riches, have higher GNPs than wew but they are

in a class by themselves. The rising price of oil has made them rich beyond the fortune of Ali Baba. By the same token, it has tended to make us poor, taking the equivalent of something like 2 percent a year out of our GNP the last two years.

We, of course, have oil of our own. We should be better able to survive the oil shock than Switzerland, Denmark, West Germany, Sweden and Japan - none of which have any oil of their own. new profession or vocational field called But it is not so. Our economy is reeling worse than the exonomies of these other industrial countries. Why? We better find out soon and do something

Here's part of the answer. Japan invests 20 percent of its gross national product in new, productive facilities. West Germany invests 15 percent. We invest 10 percent

At this rate, it is clear that in the long run our productive power will deteriorate in comparison with Japan and West Germany, the wartime foes we helped recover from the effects of World War

Like Japan and West Germany, our country practices democratic capitalism. In capitalism, capital is the name of the game. Winners invest it and become stronger. Losers spend it and become

The low rate of saving and investment in this country must be a primary concern of our policymakers. It is a major cause of our inflation

There is no way to increase the percentage of our GNP which we invest in new productivity without decreasing the percentage that we spend for other purposes. That means discipline and it means sacrifice. two words sufficiently unpopular that they are seldom seen in the national platforms of either major political party. Who will be chosen to make the sacrifice?

Fingers point at the other guy. We are in a recession now that is a kind of the regulations, companies increasingly disorderly cure for the inflation fever. The cure entrust the writing of annual reports and involves sacrifice by those who become unem- other communications to lawyers instead of ployed and lose their paychecks, therby being forced to lower the level of their standard of living. It is not a remedy of any precision or equity. It works, but only in a blundering and unfair manner. housing, clothing, vacations. Our economic pie is no longer growing. In fact, it is shrinking. Once more, we hear the call to get America moving again. This time it is going to be harder than ever, and it is going to involve some hard political decisions, decisions unlikely to be given much attention in this fall's election campaign. The candidates will make many promises but will issue few warnings about the necessity for sacrifice. That, unfortunately, is the nature of our political system.



### Was Mauch Tired Of Today's Player?

NEW YORK (UPI) — The last thing in the world Gene Mauch will ever do is knock a ballplayer publicly. That's not

That doesn't necessarily mean he was ever blind to their faults or aware of the fact he couldn't get some of his Minnesota Twins' players to care as much as he did about winning

And, oh, how that kept eating away at his insides. Only those who have some idea of Gene Mauch's sheer intensity or of his consummate passion for giving his own total effort will ever know how much it tore him up whenever he'd see one of his the general welfare of the team.

Mauch, in his fifth season as manager of the Twins, saw a lot of it. He saw far more of it than he could take.

So last Friday, in Bloomington, Minn., he told Twins' Chairman of the Board Calvin Griffith he was resigning because he didn't feel he could do the job anymore. Two years ago when Mauch wanted out, presumably to accept the job of managing the California Angels whose policy of spending liberally for free agents was directly opposite from that of the

"I stopped him from leaving once before, but I didn't try to talk him out of it this time," the Twins' owner said. "You had to see the look on his face, how completely drained it was, to

Several other factors undoubtedly contributed to Mauch's decision to give up managing after having done so for 21 years in Philadelphia, Montreal and Minnesota and some are bound to conclude Griffith's economic measures had something to do with it. Maybe that was true to a degree, but transcending everything else was the general attitude of his players. That was what really got under his skin.

"Maybe Gene didn't agree with our spending policy earlier, but after he came to understand the reason for it, he said, 'Calvin used good common sense," Griffith said. "I hate to lose him because I think he's a fantastic manager and he and I worked wonderfully as a team, but I could see he just didn't want to manage anymore. He told me he wanted to go home to California and take it easy.

Following Mauch's resignation announcement Sunday which came almost immediately after a game the Twins lost to the Tigers, a half dozen Minnesota players went into his office to thank him for all he did for them and wish him well. Some of

One of the Twins' players made a special point of not going in to see Mauch right at that time because the player felt too emotional over what had happened. But Twins' shortstop Roy Smalley, who also happens to be Mauch's nephew, did see him and talk with him later in the evening.

"I really have mixed emotions about his leaving," Smalley told me Monday from Cleveland. "I feel sad for myself best manager in the game. And I'm relieved for Gene because I feel he can't function in the atmosphere that he was forced to

Smalley was only one of the Minnesota players sidelined

extensively by injuries this season. The fact the Twins were never really a contender this year and were such a disappointment on the field only added to everything else. Mauch always was a hard loser.

Years ago while he was finishing his playing career for Minneapolis, Mauch was so disgusted with his own performance, he ordered the clubhouse man to get him a hammer and nails after a game.

"What for?" the clubhouse man wanted to know.

"Just get 'em." Mauch snapped. When they were brought to him, Mauch nailed his baseball shoes to the wall, signifying he had played his last game. It would appear he also has managed his last one. That's the way he feels now. At 54, however, he is not an old man. Baseball is in his blood and I don't believe he'll ever get it out. I also believe he's likely to be managing another big league club some day. Most likely one of those on the West Coast. We'll see.





## Winter Springs Divided On Pay

The Winter Springs City Council developed several splits Tuesday night as members argued over salaries for city employees for the coming year.

While some council members support City Manager Richard Rozonsky's proposal to raise salaries by a total of about 12 percent, Councilwoman Maureen Boyd has called for raises up to and over 20 percent for some employees. Mayor Troy Piland has threatened to veto any pay hike porposal over

mployees have too long been paid less han employees of comparable cities, eading to high turnovers in city jobs, Piland said the city has given out too nany large raises and must stop. Mrs. Boyd presented her own salary schedule, which called for close to 20

percent pay hikes for most city emoloyees except supervisors, but came out with a total package price of \$709,955, about \$4,000 less than Rozansky's recommendation, which promised only 12 percent pay hikes. But, after questions from other council

nembers, Mrs. Boyd said the actual cost of her package might go higher, once promotions for present employees and new employees were added in. Rozansky told the council his \$715,000

package would probably leave about \$45,000 in the salary account at the end of

His figure was based on the assumption that every job would be filled and every promotion given, he told the council members. He and Piland explained that method of budgeting was the one tile city had used for years in producing its budget, allowing it to end the year with a surplus, while meeting problems like an unexpected 5 percent salary increase given city workers this year. The increase was given after Longwood and Casselberry increased pay to their

workers by that amount, they said.

Councilman Wilfred Arnold said he was confused by both sets of figures because he could not make either add up. He demanded Rozansky prepare a detailed, line-by-line breakdown of the proposed salary schedule for next week's council meeting.

Mrs. Boyd said she offered

proposal in order to bring Winter Springs salaries in line with salaries paid by Longwood and Casselberry. She and Rozansky have complained firefighters and police officers use Winter Springs as a place to gain some experience before taking higher paying jobs elsewhere.

But Piland said he would veto any budget passed by the council with 15 to 20 percent salary hikes.

Piland told the council he feared the present trend of large salary hikes every year would lead to larger and larger

A starting Winter Springs police officer or firefighter earns \$9,493 a year now, ess than the same people would earn in Longwood or Casselberry. Rozansky proposes raising that figure by 7 percent when the new budget goes into effect and 5 percent more toward the end of the

Mrs. Boyd's budget suggests a total increase of 15.76 percent above present salaries plus a 2 percent longevity in-

Mrs. Boyd also called for setting porposed salary increases for supervisors to 10 to 13 percent, rather than the lanket 12 percent in the city manager's

Debate on the budget continues next Tuesday when Rozansky presents the full breakdown of his proposal.
