## Wild fires: Disaster declared Federal funds to aid victims, county wants helicopters

SEMINOLE COUNTY - First the tornado and then the wild fires. Twice in 5 months, Seminole County has been declared a National Disaster Area. On Thursday, President Clinton approved federal assistance to help victims of the recent fires in Seminole and 7 other Florida counties.

There are additional funds available from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to Seminole, Flagler and St. Johns counties for what is labeled the Pine Coast 98 wildfire.

Under FEMA authorization, FEMA will pay 70 percent of the state's eligible firefighting costs that are above \$1,497,394. The figure, called a floor cost, is derived from the

state's 5-year annual average cost for fighting fires.

Seminole County's firefighters have been put to the test the last 3 weeks, many having to work overtime and other agencies called in to assist. Even Thursday when there were thunderstorms in the area, the county's firefighters had to answer 7 calls for lightning strikes.

The president on Thursday

ordered federal aid to supplement wildfire recovery efforts in 8 Florida counties - Seminole, Flagler, Duval, Columbia, Putnam, St. Johns, Brevard and Wakulla. Other areas may be added after assessments are completed.

More than a third of Florida's 67 counties continue to fight wildfires that have ravaged nearly 50,000 acres of land and

## Tree harvest to aid replanting

GENEVA - After a careful inspection, Senior Forester for the Little Big Econ State Forest Mike Martin, Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Division of Forestry, estimates that 80 to 90 percent of the trees did not survive the devastating Geneva fire.

Martin, a forester since 1979, recommends harvesting the trees. Having the trees professionally harvested will aid in the cleanup of the area and money made from selling the trees could be used for reforestation.

After surveying approximately 400 acres of property owned by Seminole County, Martin determined it was beyond salvaging. Calling his estimate conservative, Martin explained, "Some of the trees could respond, but they are so stressed they would

likely succumb to insects". The roots of low growing brush were probably not damaged and regrowth should begin within 2 weeks of the fire, though Martin notes regrowth could be hampered by the drought conditions.

Based on Martin's assessment, the county will contract with a lumber buyer to harvest the trees. The trees, though the bark has been charred, can still be used for wood products including plywood, dimension lumber, chip and saw board, and pulp for paper. Time is a factor if the trees are to be useful. Harvesting should take place within about a month of the fire, before the trees lose their moisture content.

Dry conditions and a buildup of fuel load, according to Martin, contributed to the intense heat associated with this fire. The crowns of most of the trees were scorched and the damage was too exten-

sive for the trees to survive.

"Fire is a natural process in the south," explains Martin. Controlled burns are an important tool used regularly by the Division of Forestry. When properly used, fire allows for new growth, benefits wildlife and vegetation adapts to it. Prescribed burns do not burn as hot and are used to control the amount of dry leaves and pine straw available for fuel in case of an unplanned fire.

Private landowners may also want to sell the burned trees from their properties. Martin recommends that property owners get at least two estimates before contracting with a timber buyer. He warns landowners to check references and verify the company's insurance coverage.

He also recommends having a written sale contract that details the responsibilities of the company and the property

## Lake Mary passes emergency water conservation ordinance

LAKE MARY - It's drier than anyone thought with still little rain in sight. Lake Mary now will join Seminole County, Sanford and other local governments in declaring water restrictions.

An emergency ordinance was

approved by the Lake Mary City Commission Thursday night.

According to a memo from City Manager John Litton, "We had previously asked for voluntary cooperation, and to some degree, that was successful. However, as the days have gone by it is only natural that the demand would in-

crease." Litton said the city is very fortunate that it has recently completed plant improvements including new wells, or the stress on city water usage would probably be even greater than at present.

Lake Mary's restrictions are similar to those in Sanford and the county. Persons with even

numbered street addresses will be allowed to irrigate Monday, Wednesday and Friday between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. Units with odd numbered addresses may irrigate on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

In all instances, no one is to irrigate on Sunday. Lake Mary is also specifying

that washing of sidewalks, walkways, driveways, porches, exteriors of homes or other buildings is prohibited. Irrigation for new lawns and landscaping is exempt from the restrictions, but only for 30 days.

Private wells are also included in the Lake Mary ordinance. Please See Water, Page 4A

### Cheap trash

LAKE MARY - The city commission Thursday passed on first reading the extension of the franchise agreement with Jennings Environmental Services for solid waste services.

In negotiating the extension, the city was able to reduce the consumer and commercial rates effective for the July billing cycle.

City Manager John Litton, in a memo to the city commission, said, "I believe this is a win/win for the city, our residents and Jennings. When implemented, our rates will certainly be on the low end of the spectrum with an enhanced guaranteed franchise fee for the city."

On the July bills, mailed later this month, the residential garbage, yard waste and recycling rate will be \$13.10, down from \$14.02. Commercial rates for uncompact bin refuse is \$4.34, down from \$4.54.

The city negotiated the extension, which is in effect for 5 years, instead of requesting bids, in order to retain the consistency of service that the company has provided to the city for several years.

### Cell tower approved

LAKE MARY - A 140-foot wireless communications tower was approved by the city commission Thursday, without a stipulation that the tower be camouflaged.

The cell tower will be located near Sun Drive, behind Holy Cross Lutheran Church.

The monopole, to be installed by AT&T Wireless

# Florida Film Festival: Slice of history from jazz age

MAITLAND - Screened at the 7th Annual Florida Film Festival Thursday night, *The Spitball Story* is a slice of history many people were probably unaware of. That is, unless you're an avid follower of jazz.

Continuing to show a flair for the obscure, producer Jean Bach has come up with another story that may be little known, but certainly had a profound effect on the world of jazz. Bach was responsible for the Oscar nominated documentary, *A Great Day in Harlem*, which told the story behind a photograph of a group of jazz musicians. Both *Spitball* and *Great Day* will be double billed on a video due out in the fall.

"My documentaries have not so lofty a purpose as others," said Bach speaking from her home in Manhattan, New York. Maybe not, but her docs seem to pull out these interesting, significant tales. Bach and her late husband Bob used to hear of these stories at parties since they traveled in the same circles the jazz musicians did. "We [Bach and her husband] got into the inner circle," said Bach. "You could overhear these things," Bach admitted that it was her husband who should have made the documentaries since he was an experienced television producer. Bach was herself, a producer for a radio show that lasted for 24 years.

Bach is currently working on a third documentary which will be about Jerry Mulligan, the famous saxophonist. Bach calls herself "slow moving" when it comes to making her docs, but viewers of her last 2 trips down memory lane could care less. These are insightful, amazing stories.

Consider *The Spitball Story*. When Cab Calloway was crooning about Minnie the Moocher, his band consisted of noted bebop legends including one, Dizzy Gillespie. As the story goes, Cab was in the middle of a show when he noticed a spitball on the floor, being a stickler for perfection, Cab had it out with Dizzy and

fired him from the band. The divorce ended with the 2 going their separate ways. But, since he left the band, Gillespie ushered in the sound of modern jazz. The little prank from a known prankster, Gillespie's exit from Calloway's band turned into a turning point for jazz.

Bach discusses the incident with Gillespie, a good personal friend of Bach's, Bill Clinton, bass fiddle player for Calloway,

and Jonah Jones, who was a trumpet player for Calloway. Incidentally, Bach calls Jones her "cute little elf" neighbor. Bach is critical of today's jazz sound. "I think they're all played out," she said, "but that pretty much goes with all of our culture." Bach said that each musician had a distinctive voice and had a way of distinguishing themselves. You can say the same thing about Bach's documentaries.

owner. The contract should contain specific information about payment and who is responsible for damage, if any should occur, such as to a fence or other structure. Martin can provide interested landowners with a list of timber buyers and a sample contract.

Reforestation is an important part of the recovery process. Pine seedlings should be planted beginning in Decem-

ber, but Martin suggests that property owners order early to ensure availability. Seeding trees can be ordered through the Division of Forestry beginning in July. The seedlings are shipped in time for winter planting. Brochures are available.

Aug. 3.  
"A new name was just what we needed to complete the project," said principal Jim Shupe.

Lakeview's School Advisory Committee sponsored a name change contest during the last school year. Staff, students and community members were encouraged to submit names. The committee ended up with 25 names from which to choose.

The committee unanimously chose Millennium and presented the suggested name to the school board this past week.

In addition to the new name, the school will get a new look by the start of the new millennium.

The architectural firm of Starmer and Rinaldi and the school board agreed on a \$14 million plan which will open up the campus with buildings surrounding a courtyard. The proposed construction would include a new gymnasium, a new 2-story classroom complex, a new media center, a

new performing arts center and a new administrative/guidance center.

The new state-of-the-art facility is expected to be completed in 2 years.

"The creation of the new facility is unique, because the new program of the school will dictate construction," Shupe said. "Form will follow function."

In addition to architectural and name changes, the board has directed staff to look into the costs of constructing a new entrance to the school from Airport Boulevard. Currently the only access to the school is a road which snakes around the back of Seminole High School.

Dr. David Meador, chairman of the school's advisory committee, is pleased with the plans and with the "positive attitude" the school board has displayed toward the school.

"I am so pleased with the positive tone the school board has taken toward the school," Meador said. "This is such a positive thing for the school and for the community."

80 homes. Seminole County authorities are investigating what may be a heat-related death of a 42-year-old man. He was found Thursday in the carport of a home on Lake Howell Road.

The county's emergency management officials huddled this morning to discuss a number of issues, one of which is the acquisition of two helicopters (free of cost from the California Division of Forestry) which Schenk said will be refurbished into a single "Heavy Lift" helicopter to be shared by the EMS/Fire Rescue Division of the county and by the Sheriff's Office.

"If we had this helicopter available, I believe we would have stopped these fires on the first day," Schenk said. "There would not have been anywhere near the damage and property loss. If we had this kind of waterdrop ability from a heavy lift helicopter."

Schenk said the helicopter

could carry as many as 15 firefighters and rescue people. It could also be used to transport SWAT teams and be used effectively by both the safety department and sheriff's office. The helicopter could also carry 500 gallons of water to drop on fire sites.

"We had to borrow a helicopter from Marion County and it could carry 100 gallons," Schenk said. "This new copter will help us a greatly. It's a good deal for the county."

Schenk will make a presentation to the Board of County Commissioners on Tuesday. The cost to refurbish the two helicopters, using the parts to make one heavy lift copter is estimated at \$375,000. This money would come from developer commitment fees and from the impact fee fund. There would be no raise in taxes.

If approved, Schenk said the county would send out bids for the work on the helicopters and be ready for use by the end of the year.

nance, as it is the approved Sanford ordinance. Irrigation which uses (privately owned) well water must comply with year-round restrictions established by the St. Johns River Water Management District, calling for a restriction on watering any day of the week between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Monday night, the city of Altamonte Springs approved a similar ordinance for both potable and reclaimed water, specifying the same odd/even watering restrictions and time periods.

In Sanford, project coordinator Bill Marcous said the city's restrictions, adopted May 25, are already proving to be beneficial. "Since we issued these restrictions," he said,

"the citizens have apparently become more aware of the need to conserve water, and it has had a positive impact on the pressure at our pumping stations." He added that the water users in Sanford are to be commended for helping in this critically dry period.

One of the reasons for the need specified by both municipalities is public safety, which must have sufficient water pressure for fire fighting, becoming more and more important with the increase in woods and other fires springing up throughout the drought areas of Central Florida.

Marcous said even though there may be a rain shower or 2, the restrictions will probably remain in place until there is sufficient water available through normal means.

DEAR ABBY: Thank you for all the letters you are printing about abuse. Your recent letter from Michael Grottsch in Kenner, La., about "serial batterers" really got my attention.

I was in an abusive marriage for 34 years, and I know what breeds abuse - it's silence. Abby, I'm not silent anymore. I now work for a women's crisis center, and I was recently asked by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to tell my story. I was on a victim impact panel for a sensitivity training seminar for law enforcement. I have since been asked to speak at other meetings and plan to do so.

On the door to our office hangs a sign. It says, "There's no excuse for abuse." Those few words say quite a lot. Keep up the great work, Abby. There should be more out there like you.

DEAR KAREN: You are to be commended for your activism in helping other abused women.

I would like to correct a statement I made in my answer to Michael Grottsch: I stated that the majority of domestic

abuse comes at the hands of men who are "unable to control their anger - not psychopaths," and I added that these people can be helped through therapy and anger management programs. I regret today that I may have spoken too optimistically.

In his book, "No Promised Land Stay" (C.P.L., 1997, \$14.98), Mr. Grottsch points out that a batterer who is motivated to change and feels remorse can be helped. But a serial batterer is generally cold, detached, and does not possess a conscience. Professionals report that therapy with a serial batterer is rarely, if ever, successful. While the habitual offender may enter a treatment program (often court-ordered), he rarely completes it. He generally enters counseling only to manipulate his partner into dropping criminal charges and returning to him. The safest recourse for victims of chronic abuse is to end the relationship, once a comprehensive support system and personal safety plan have been established.

**DAYTONA BEACH** — For Daytona Beach resident Mark Martin, who is in the midst of his most successful season as a driver, Fourth of July's inaugural nighttime running of the Pepsi 400 could prove to be his best opportunity to gain his first career NASCAR victory at Daytona International Speedway.

SANFORD - Two years ago when John David of Sanford began his routes as a Meals on Wheels volunteer, he worked only on Thursdays and with only one route.

This month, David has been working 5 days a week on as many as 4 routes.

Without David's contribution, more than a hundred people who depend on the Meals on Wheels program from the Better Living for Seniors, Inc. would not be serviced. The program needs immediate help, says manager Cindy Collins.

The heat is a factor, Collins said as she helped David load up his Dodge Van with food for the elderly, disabled and others unable to leave their homes. He had pulled the vehicle up to the gymnasium entrance to the Salvation Army building on 24th Street.

"We wouldn't be delivering without him (David)," Collins said. "He's serving 40 and more meals a day. We desperately need help all over the county, especially in Sanford. Our Sanford program is pathetic. We desperately need more help here."

David, 63, says that with more volunteers the workload isn't too bad. "I'd like to spend some time with those I visit, chat awhile, make sure everything is going well," he said. "I can't do this when I'm going to so many more residences."

Collins said many of the people who receive Meals on Wheels are extremely grateful not only for the meals but the time a volunteer spends with them. "They'll say how they love to see us come, that they get so bored or lonely and that they have nobody else. A couple of weeks ago we found one elderly woman had passed away."

Better Living for Seniors began with a Meals on Wheels and transportation program in 1973. Since that time the senior community has grown enormously, and the agency has tried to accommodate them.

Collins said that programs are funded with grants from local and federal governments, United Way, civic organizations, businesses, foundations, client contributions and individual donations.

Cookouts and picnics are a frequent and honored tradition of summer—a time for family and friends to gather, socialize and have fun. But hot summer temperatures can also speed the growth of foodborne bacteria, which spoils food and can cause illness.

When left unrefrigerated, various food products can become contaminated with bacteria. Some bacteria—undetected by sight, smell or taste—produce dangerous toxins that cause food poisoning. Especially at warmer temperatures, they thrive on foods that are left out. Even if the bacteria are later killed by heat or cold, the toxins can remain to cause illness.

You can help safeguard your health by observing these tips:

- Keep foods cold (below 40 degrees Fahrenheit) or hot (above 140 degrees Fahrenheit). Foods left out between those temperatures for more than two hours should be discarded.
- Keep cooked foods separate from raw foods. Cross-contamination of foods could occur if bacteria-harboring raw food comes in contact with cooked foods. Wash hands, utensils, cutting boards and counter tops after preparing or handling raw meats.
- Don't interrupt the cooking

process. If you are partially cooking foods indoors to finish cooking on the grill, make sure the food goes directly from the oven to the hot grill. Don't let the food stand partially cooked.

- Store leftovers in small,

separate containers and refrigerate.

- Meat, poultry, fish, oysters, and other shellfish, and eggs should not be eaten raw. These

foods should be maintained in a refrigerator at a temperature below 40 degrees Fahrenheit and cooked thoroughly before eating. A cooking temperature of 160 degrees is advised. When cooking, use a meat thermometer or follow these tips:

- Poultry—cook it until the meat is white and the juices run clear. Don't eat if you see blood or pink meat.
- Hamburgers—because the

meat is ground and mixed, bacteria is present throughout the burger. Don't eat it if there are traces of pink in the center or blood in the juices.

- Steaks—harmful bacteria in beef are generally found on the surface of the steak, not in the interior like hamburger. But the meat should be cooked at least medium, with no trace of red in the center.
- Fish—cook until it flakes easily and is no longer translucent in the center.
- Eggs—cook egg and egg dishes thoroughly. Don't eat samples anything containing raw eggs such as uncooked dough and cake batter.

## My mom is an alcoholic

Dear Mary,

I'm pretty sure my mom is an alcoholic. She and my dad split up about 3 years ago (he left her for another woman), and she started drinking pretty heavy then. When I mention to my mom that I think she might have a problem, she gets real defensive and says she's OK because she doesn't have a drink every day and she holds down a job and takes care of us kids. The only thing is, sometimes she sneaks a drink when she doesn't think us kids know what she's drinking. Also, I've snuck it on her when I've come into the house in the evening when I've been out with my friends. I'm 17 and will be gone pretty soon, but I'm really worried about my younger sister. Mom's always telling her she will get her stuff and take her places, but then she doesn't do what she says she's going to and it hurts my sister's feelings. My sister thinks up plans just doesn't love her, but I think Mom gets so drunk up sometimes that she just plain doesn't know what she's doing or remember what she's said she's going to do. I would like to help my mom see what she's doing to us, but whenever I try to mention it, she just gets mad and tells me to mind my own business. I think if she really loved us like she says she does, she'd see what she's doing and stop. Don't you agree?

Alcoholism's Son

Dear Son,

I admire your concern for your sister and your mom, but you can bet that if your mom is an alcoholic (and I agree that she probably is), her drinking doesn't mean she doesn't care about her family. It means she's caught in the claws of her addiction. Unfortunately, there's nothing that you, or anybody else other than your mom, can do about her addiction. You do, however, need to make plans for you and your sister to be able to protect yourselves, should it become necessary.

Is there someone you can talk to—a relative, your dad, a person at church or a neighbor? You may even have to make other living arrangements if the drinking continues or gets worse. The most important thing to remember is that it is NEVER a kid's fault that a parent has a problem with alcohol. No matter what has happened, she started drinking because she wanted to and she'll stop using alcohol and begin her recovery when and if she decides to. No one else can make the decision for her.

Focus your energy on finding support for yourself and your sister; refuse to keep the problem a secret, and let your mom know that you are terribly concerned about what her drinking is doing to the family, and that you will do what you have to do to protect your sister and yourself from the damage it causes. Good luck and God bless you.

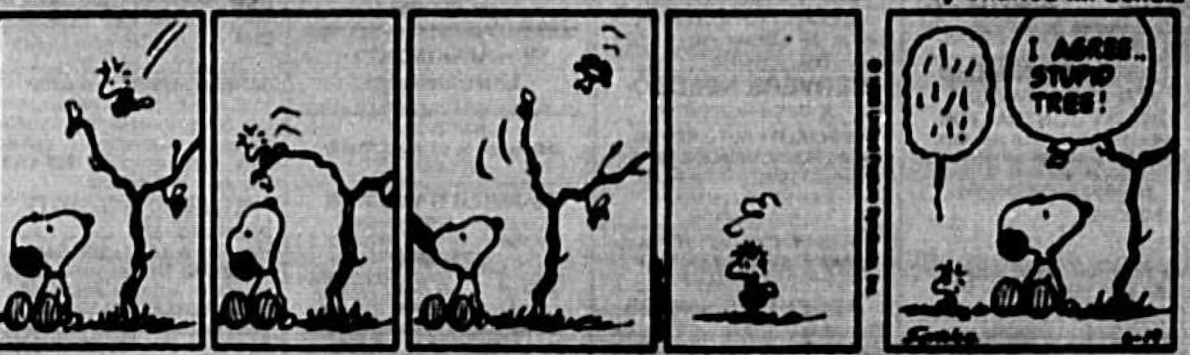

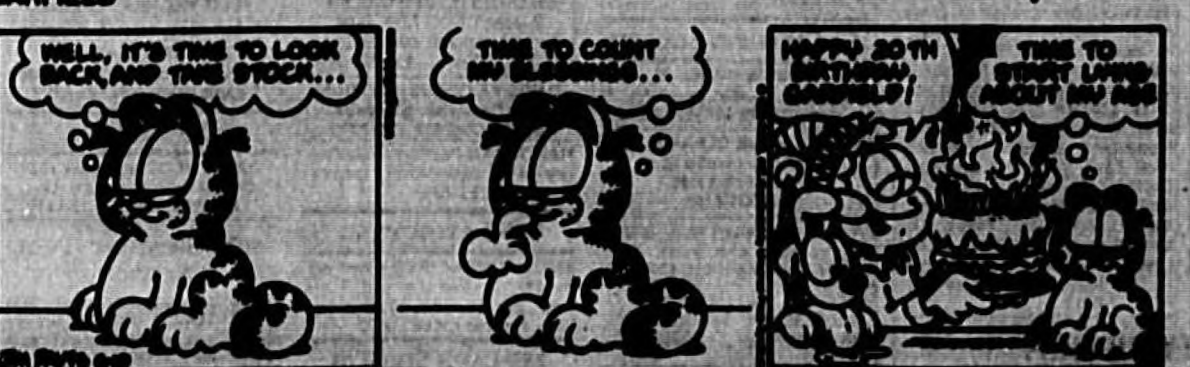

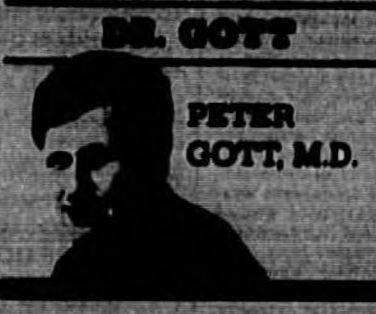

Diarrhea may cause mineral deficiency

DEAR DR. GOTT: A month ago, I suffered from a sudden bout of explosive diarrhea that lasted two days. I ended up in a hospital for IV fluids to correct dehydration. I was also found to be deficient in potassium, which added to my weakness and overall sickness. What is a potassium deficiency and how can I avoid it in the future?

Instead, go to a long specialist, who will address your potassium deficiency by prescribing more effective therapy, such as breathing exercises, oxygen, and certain medicines.

DEAR READER: During an episode of prolonged diarrhea, patients lose minerals (such as potassium) as well as fluids. This can result in a marked potassium deficiency, as well as dehydration. Such a deficiency may lead to weakness, faintness and problems with the heart rhythm.

There is really no effective way to avoid an occasional bout of diarrhea, most of which are caused by a short-lived virus infection in the intestine. Everybody experiences this from time to time.

However, in the presence of diarrhea, there is much you can do as an adult to avoid getting into trouble.

First, abstain from all solid food for 24 to 48 hours.

Second, keep up a generous intake of clear fluids, such as water, tea, beef broth and ginger ale.

Third, consider supplementing your fluid intake with a mineral-containing beverage, such as Gatorade. This will supply the potassium that you lose from the diarrhea.

Fourth, use an over-the-counter anti-diarrhea medicine, such as Imodium AD, Pepto-Bismol or Kaopectate.

Finally, if the diarrhea continues unabated, seek medical assistance.

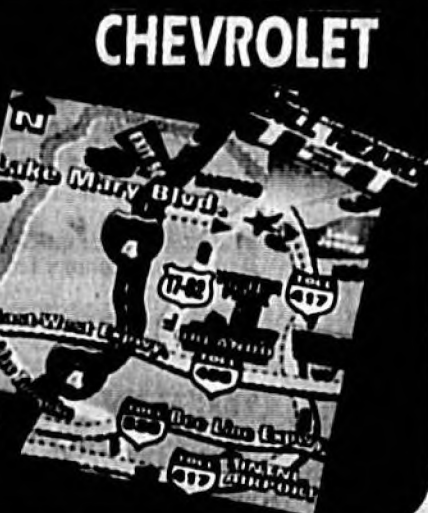
