

The Cast Of Strike Just what a great econor mic loss to the whole m

any interruption of production in a great industry such as occurred recently in General Motors is, can hardly be realized by anyone far from the scenes of the disturbance, but the fact remains that the General Motors strike has cost every business in this country something, and has cost many of them millions of dollars.

One newspaper writer is quoted by the Tampa Trib-une as saying, "the statistics alone do not tell the whole story and sets out the picture in terms that can be easily nderstood. "The motor industry tops all others as a user of steel, rubber, gasoline and lubricants, plate glass, mo-hair, nickel and lead. It is a great contributor to the railroad freight volume of the country. Automotive products represented 3.525,000 carloads in 1986."

"Referring directly to the General Motors situation, he points out that during 1936 more than two million cars represented the output of G. M. establishments. Then he estimates some of the resultant losses that might appear if an output of such size and scope had been longer interrupted. The railroads will lose business at the rate of at least 50 million dollars worth of revenue freight a year and cotton consumption would be curtailed by 140 million To Uphold Constitutional Government lion pounds of rubber annually go into tires for General Motors cars and some 28 million pounds into other parts of

"The items suggested, of course, involve not only losses of profits to owners of the enterprises that sold goods to General Motors but also infer tremendous losses for labor in the form of idleness that would ensue in these industries, in the event the strike had been indefinitely

prolonged.' In view of the enormous costs involved for all of us, it is to be hoped that John Lewis did not mean what he said at his last press conference to the effect that he is now planning a strike in the coal and steel industries, or perhaps that he did not say it at all. It would seem that there might be some less expensive way of "organizing" these industries, or at least some way that would confine the expense to the interested parties.






