

VAH-11 Receives Commendation

The Checkertails of VAH-11 received a commendation Friday from Rear Adm. Kenneth Craig, commander, Fleet Air Jacksonville, for their outstanding performance aboard the Franklin D. Roosevelt while deployed with the Sixth Fleet.

The commendation was presented to Cdr. Charles O. Donnaud, commanding officer by Capt. Frank G. Edwards, commanding officer of Heavy Attack Wing One, during inspection ceremonies conducted for the presentation of awards.

Admiral Craig's commendation cited the squadron for meeting or exceeding all requirements during the course of six NATO and Sixth Fleet exercises. The admiral further commended the squadron for establishing an "outstanding safety record." The Checkertails are the first heavy attack squadron to complete a shipboard Sixth Fleet deployment without an aircraft accident.

After reading the commendation, Cdr. Donnaud presented individual awards to many members of the squadron. Nineteen officers and men were awarded coveted Navy "E's" for outstanding achievement in bombing and navigation and three men were awarded Good Conduct medals.

Campaign Among Youth Against Smoking Hailed By Cancer Group

NEW YORK (UPI) — A cigarette-smoking education campaign among school children was described today by the American Cancer Society as "a major cancer prevention program of public education."

The society's public relations director, Walter G. James, said the cigarette education program is being carried to high school students throughout the nation in cooperation with school officials.

James made the statements in a report submitted today to the annual meeting of the American Cancer Society which runs through Friday.

He said the society's color sound filmstrip "To Smoke Or Not To Smoke" has had a record response as an education tool on cancer. "More than 10,000 copies of the filmstrip, together with related material, have been distributed in the last eight months," James said.

The filmstrip stresses that the best prevention against lung cancer is not smoking. A leaflet dis-

tributed with it states "most scientists agree that cigarette smoking is a major cause of lung cancer."

Also included in the "cigarette kit" is a chart entitled "More Cigarettes, More Lung Cancer." It says: "What are your chances of getting lung cancer? It depends on how much and how long you have smoked. Half a pack of cigarettes a day? Your risk goes up eight times. Two packs or more? Twenty times greater."

James said the Illinois, Pennsylvania, Missouri and California divisions of the cancer society had put about 3,000 of the anti-cigarette filmstrips in use.

As a result of first reaction to the program, James said, the society is considering the calling of a youth conference on smoking, featuring teen-age leaders from all nations.

Shocked German Officials Probe Jet Collision

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI)—Shocked West German officials tried to find out today which two pilots came within a jet-age hair of colliding with a plane flying Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip home to Britain.

Some British newspapers intimated the German Sabre jets deliberately buzzed the Queen's plane, a Royal Air Force Comet. "Who nearly killed the Queen," asked the London Daily Sketch.

"Queen's Comet 'shot' by Luftwaffe," proclaimed the Daily Mail.

West German officials pushed their investigation all through the night, vowing to head off a possible damaging of relations with Britain.

The investigation was compl-

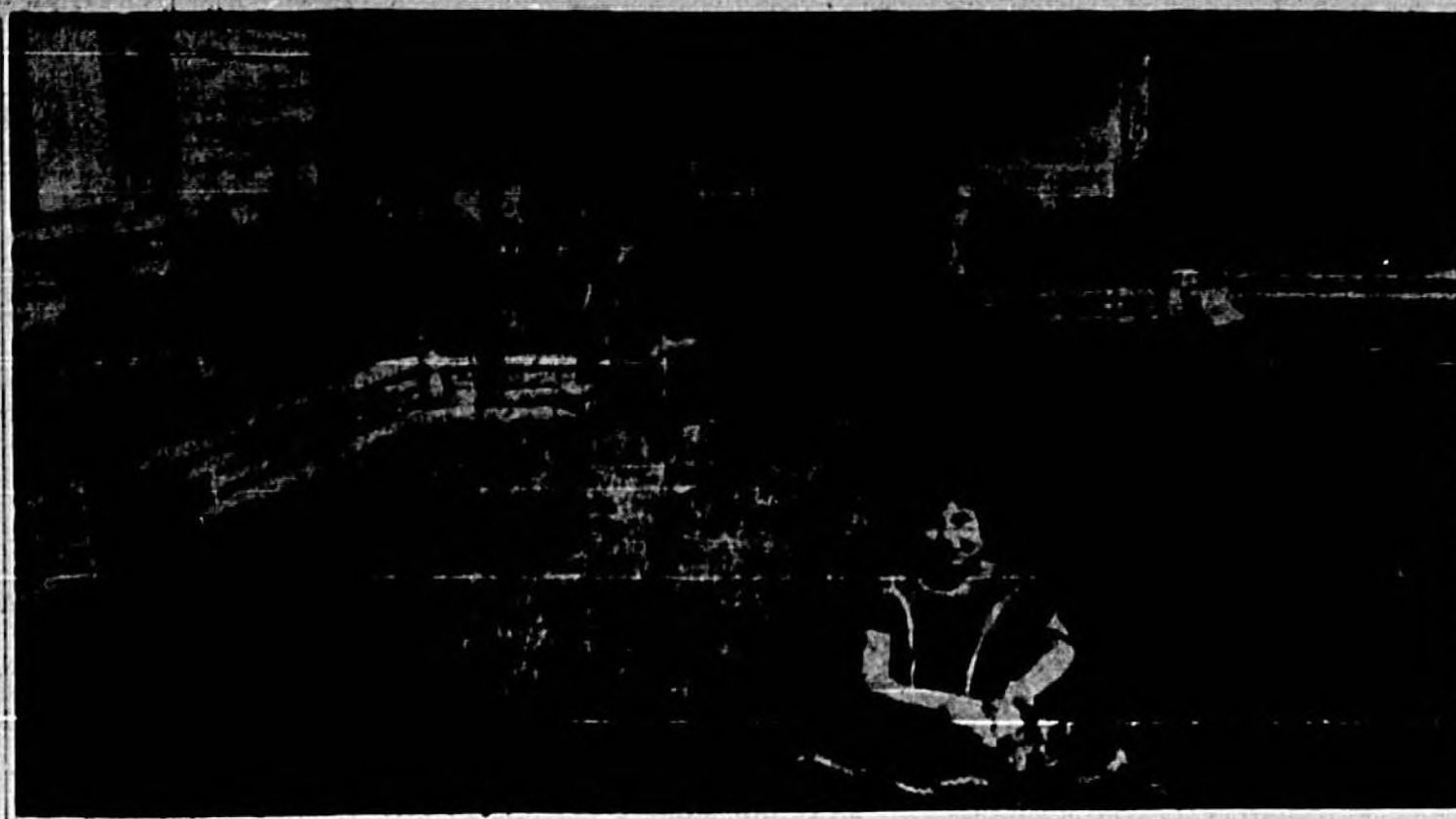
eted by the fact that, with perfect flying weather, nearly 800 West German air force pilots were in the air at the time.

The incident occurred Tuesday 25,000 feet over Holland near the German border. The Queen and her husband were flying home from a visit to Denmark.

The co-pilot of their plane, Flight Lt. Frank Stevens, said two FRAP Sabrejets zoomed within 50 feet at 600 miles an hour. Since the Comet also was flying at 600 the collision distance closed at the rate of 1,200 miles an hour.

However, the Queen and prince were not told about the incident until later and they passed it off calmly when they landed in England.

When the royal couple flies anywhere in Europe the RAF notifies other nations of the route several days in advance.

Rains Add New Misery In Texas

Fresh downpours added new misery today to rain soaked communities in South Texas.

An estimated 14 inches of rain deluged Kennedy, Tex., in 24 hours. Eight inches of rain which fell Tuesday night drove 300 to 400 persons from their homes.

An estimated 2,000 persons at Rio Grande City had to spend the night in emergency shelters because of a downpour which turned the community's northeast side into "a big lake."

Other storms moved across the Middle West, dousing Albia, Iowa, with a 1.15 inch rainfall. On the Pacific Coast, Brookings, Ore., received .81 inches and North Bend, Ore., .65.

New York State cleaned up damage from a storm which piled up snow 22 inches deep in some places.

Snow measurements though the state included 18 inches at Parris Mills, 5 inches near Utica and 22 inches atop Whiteface Mountain in the Adirondacks.

ORLANDO (UPI)—It was bad enough when the student pilot's plane ground looped on landing during his first solo Tuesday but the light plane bounced back into the air. The control tower radioed the right landing gear was damaged. Then the entire wheel assembly fell off. Such were the troubles faced Tuesday by Airman SC. Richard Neville of Orlando Air Force Base.

But his instructor, Sgt. Buford Stanly, told Neville via radio to stay in flight long enough to burn up most of his fuel, and then used the radio to "talk down" the young aviator. On the second try, the plane almost ground looped again, but only spun 140 degrees. Neville stepped out un-injured.

DeGaulle Forces Win Atom Dispute

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle's regime weathered a censure motion in the national assembly Tuesday and won reluctant approval to build an independent French nuclear striking force.

The opposition, protesting the move would weaken France's ties to the North Atlantic Allies, mustered 207 votes on the censure motion against Premier Michel Debré's government.

It was the greatest show of parliamentary hostility to Debré — and therefore to De Gaulle — since the Gaullist Fifth Republic was installed two and a half years ago. But it fell 70 votes short of the majority needed to oust the government.

Failure of the censure motion meant automatic approval of the atomic force plan. There was strong speculation that if the vote had been on the military plan itself De Gaulle would have been defeated.

The bitter debate preceding the vote reflected deep-seated resentment to De Gaulle's penchant for a strongman rule.

Titan Warhead In Record Flight

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — An Air Force Titan intercontinental ballistic missile hurled a dummy warhead 6,100 miles over the Atlantic Monday in its longest successful test flight to date.

The missile took about 30 minutes to fly to a target in the South Atlantic off the west coast of Africa. Its range was just 200 miles short of the distance that war-ready models will be able to travel with nuclear warheads.

The shot marked the 18th success in 25 flight tests of the bullet-shaped, 98-foot tall missile since the test program began here less than two years ago. There also have been three "partial" successes and four failures.

In one respect, it was one of the most dramatic rocket tests here in many months. As the missile rose through the thin high atmosphere at a speed of several thousand miles per hour, its exhaust touched off a brilliant display of high altitude gas displays seen as far north as Virginia.

The shot is expected to lead to the first test of a Titan from an underground "silo" launcher at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., probably early in November. In that test the rocket will be raised by an elevator mechanism to ground level for firing.
